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150 from area attend "Panhandle Day in Austin"

Approximately 150 people from the Panhandle area recently attended "Panhandle Day in Austin."

According to Spearman Chamber of Commerce Manager Cindy Blackman, the group had three main issues to discuss with the Legislature when they went to Austin. These issues were health care, trucking reform and product liability.

She added, "We were also able to ask some questions on the education budget and public utilities."

Gruber City and Chamber of Commerce Manager A.J. Ratliff said, "We mainly contacted legislators outside our district and discussed the three major issues, but we were able to contact legislators from our own districts. We talked to them about local issues."

But the legislators were not the only ones seen during "Panhandle

Day in Austin," Governor Ann Richards addressed the groups at their luncheon.

"I thought the day was very worth while. I think we may try to do it every two years during each regular session," Ratliff said.

Blackman explained how "Panhandle Day in Austin" got started, "The idea originated through P.A.C.E., Panhandle Area Chamber Executives, back in September of 1992."

"The executives worked with the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce since they were centrally located and had the staff to organize it," she said. But she stressed that each chamber had an input as to what would be addressed.

She also stressed that during the entire planning process the day was always referred to as "Panhandle Day in Austin." "We went down there as a group not as a town," Blackman stated.

"The week before we went down

there we had a training session in Amarillo," she said. During this session the issues were discussed. They also discussed the dos and don'ts of what we could do when addressing legislators. City Manager Kelvin Knauf, Blackman, Ratliff and Kenneth Irwin attended the training session.

Attending "Panhandle Day in Austin" on February 16 from Gruber were Ratliff, City Commissioner Mark Irwin, K. Irwin and Linda Weller, both of Gruber State Bank. Those that made the trip from Spearman were Blackman, Knauf, Mayor Burl Buchanan, Larry Trosper of First State Bank and Pete Fisher.

Other area towns sending spokespersons were Amarillo, Borger, Canadian, Canyon, Clarendon, Dalhart, Dimmitt, Dumas, Friona, Hereford, Pampa, Panhandle, Perryton, Shamrock and Tulia.

H. C. Commissioner's Court... appoints 3 to board

The Hansford County Commissioner's Court appointed three hospital board members at the regular meeting held Monday, March 8.

According to County Clerk Amelia Johnson, the commission re-appointed Bobby Hicks and Leslie Barkley to the board. They also appointed a new board member, Tom Dortch, Johnson said.

In other business, the Commissioner's Court awarded the depository contract bid to Gruber State Bank. "A lot of time was spent weighing the differences in the bids," Johnson stated. She added, "It was not an easy decision. County Auditor Elaine Morris helped with it." She concluded by saying, "This

was the decision they made after a lot of study." All the banks in Hansford County placed a bid for the depository contract.

The commissioner's then set the salary for Sheriff's Dispatcher Shannon Scroggs. Johnson explained that this item is required to be on the agenda, because the commissioners have to approve the hiring of a new employee in order for that person to be placed on the payroll. She added that there was no discussion on the item, Scroggs was hired on the same basis as everyone else.

In regular business the commissioners approved the minutes, approved payment of bills and received and approved the Treasurer's report and investments.

5 days left to apply for positions on May 1 ballot

Counting today there are just five business days left to apply for a place on the ballot for the various positions in the Hansford County school districts and cities.

As of Tuesday, March 9, only two more applications had been filed. This brings the total to seven for the 12 positions up for re-election.

Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. had one more application filed. It was filed by incumbent Clyde McCloy, who has served one year on the school board. Incumbent Clay Reid had previously filed an application for a position on the ballot. These figures show two people running for the three school board positions up for re-election on May 1.

The other new application filed was by incumbent Steve Benton. He applied for a place on the ballot for alderman at the City of

Spearman. There are two alderman positions up for re-election.

In the City of Gruber, it was reported that no applications have been filed for either the mayor or the city commissioners seat.

In both the Gruber I.S.D. and the Spearman I.S.D. the incumbents have applied for positions on the ballot. Both of these entities reported that no other applications had been turned in.

Incumbents applying for the Gruber school board are Stan Seagler and Corky Chapman. Those turning in applications for the Spearman school board were incumbents Carl Kunselman and Craig Schumann.

Wednesday, March 17 is the deadline for applying for a place on the ballot. Persons that would like to apply should contact the entity's business office during regular business hours.

and \$25 for couples. They can be purchased at the door or in advance by calling 659-3830 or by contacting any Spearhead Corporation board member.

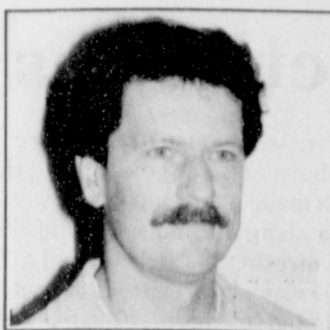
The Vera Brothers Band of Spearman are donating their time to play for the dance. Come two-step to some great country music while donating to a community project.

RADICAL LIVING

FIRED UP Matthew 3:8-12

In order to graduate from college with a degree in forestry I was required to take a 3 hour course in forest fire control and use. Years later I developed friendships with a couple of Forest Service firefighters. These men had extensive experience fighting fires in National Forests throughout the western U.S., and in Alaska.

As a result of my exposure to the field of forest fires, I learned something of spiritual significance: 1. Fire can be fought with fire, 2. Controlled (prescribed) burning is a necessary practice to avoid wildfire (regardless of how many of the uninitiated think otherwise) and 3. Raging wildfire is virtually uncontrollable, or its expense unjustifiable. A wildfire, feeding on itself can throw trees, 200-foot tall, in the air like match sticks, and create thermal updrafts that change local weather conditions.

In terms of the human heart, it is the prescribed burning of the Holy Spirit that protects us from God's ultimate wildfire, the lake of fire, at the end of the age. It seems the church often considers the deep and burning work of the Holy Spirit as optional. We quench and grieve Him and then wonder (if we even recognize our lack), why there is no power, no light in us.

Forest firefighters set backfires to establish a fireline; fighting fire with fire. God sets the blaze of the Holy Spirit within us. Burned over for righteousness sake, His wrath will not burn against us.

Jesus baptizes with the Holy Spirit and fire. It's not an optional or pentecostal work. The Holy Spirit simply applies the fire of God's Word in our conscience. If we quench His work, we prepare ourselves for wrath. Our God is a consuming fire.

Recently the City received a letter from an organization called "TexasConnect" asking us to join their organization. The organization promises to work to create jobs and stimulate economic development in Texas. How they plan to do this is not mentioned in the letter.

Upon a closer look and investigation into "TexasConnect" we found that the organization really is an organization, made up of telephone companies, which is asking the Texas Legislature to end the regulation of telephone companies in Texas. Currently, telephone companies are regulated under the Public Utility Regulatory Act and have to receive permission from the Public Utility Commission in order to raise telephone rates. To get out from under regulation, the TexasConnect group hired 88 lobbyists to try and convince the Legislature that telephone companies should not be regulated.

While I have never been a big supporter of the Public Utility Commission, de-regulating telephone companies is totally ridiculous. All other states regulate telephone utilities. Telephone companies have a monopoly over their service areas and, if de-regulated, would be able to charge whatever rates they wanted to insure that their investors get a hefty return while the rate-payers would have no way to

protest against high telephone rates. If it were not for the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Public Utility Commission, ratepayers would be a the mercy of utility officials when it came to telephone rates. I know my telephone bill, even without the long distance calls, is high enough already.

I am urging all Spearman residents who have had enough of high telephone bills to contact members of the Texas Legislature and urge the legislators to resist the lobbying efforts of "TexasConnect". This lobbying effort should be resisted for several reasons.

First, utility companies have a monopoly over their service areas and are therefore not in competition with other telephone companies for local service. It's not like we can choose from one month to another what telephone company we want to provide our local telephone service. Second, the Public Utility Commission has been studied by the Sunset Advisory Commission on ways to improve the regulatory process. The Sunset Advisory Commission has come up with some recommendations which will make the PUC operate better. Let me briefly highlight these recommendations.

The Sunset Advisory Commission recommends reorganizing the Public Utility Commission and the Office of Public Utility Counsel to reduce the amount of political influence that the Public Utility Commissioners can put on the staff and the legal advisor to the Commission. This reorganization should be implemented by (a) moving the hearings examiners from under the control of the commissioners and to the State Office of Administrative Hearings, (b) eliminating the legal advisor from representing the interests of the utility companies before the Commissioners, and (c) moving staff and funds from the general counsel to the Office of the Public Utility Council, which represents consumers before the PUC. Utilities are not suppose to lobby Commissioners regarding their positions in a case. However, under the present system, utilities accomplish the same result by lobbying

the Commission start to present a recommendation which the Commission wants anyway. The recommendations of the Sunset Advisory Commission will reduce the ability of the utility companies to influence the PUC staff, reduce the ability of the commissioners to twist the arms of the hearing examiners, and give consumers a bigger voice before the PUC.

Another recommendation is to let the governor appoint the chairman of the Public Utility Commission. Currently, the Commissioners elect their own chairman. A third recommendation is to strengthen the ability of the PUC to assess penalties of up to \$5000 per day on the utility companies for failure to comply with PUC statutes, rules, requirements and orders.

Another recommendation is to appoint a special task force to develop a plan for telecommunications in the state. The Sunset Advi-

sory Commission suggests a task force composed of representatives from the PUC, the Office of Public Utility Counsel, the Department of Commerce, the telephone industry, consumer groups, and the State Legislature. This task force would study the effects of the changing telecommunications industry and develop a plan to determine how to best meet the needs of consumers and the telecommunications industry.

These are the major recommendations before the State Legislature, I think the Sunset Advisory Commission recommendations should be considered by the Legislature and given a chance to work before there is any discussion of de-regulating the telecommunications industry in Texas. Streamlining the current process for both utilities and consumers is the right answer to the problems with utility regulation in this state; de-regulating utilities is the wrong solution.

Make the Food Guide Pyramid Work for You

In 1992, the United States Department of Agriculture released a new representation of the healthy American diet. The Food Guide Pyramid is an outline of what foods to eat each day. But it goes further than that; it visually represents what amounts of different foods should comprise the diet. It also emphasizes the fact that, while fats, oils and sweets may be included in the diet, they should be used sparingly.

The Pyramid tells us that starchy foods such as breads, cereals, rice and pasta, represented as the base of the Pyramid, should make up the bulk of the diet. The next level of the Pyramid shows plant foods, vegetables and fruits. As the Pyramid narrows, dairy products and meat, poultry, fish and other protein foods are represented. At the tip of the Pyramid and in the smallest section are the fats, oils and sweets.

But how can the Pyramid be interpreted in making everyday food

choices? The Pyramid is different from previous food group recommendations in that it shows a range of servings for each food group: 6 to 11 servings for grains; three to five servings for vegetables; two to four servings for fruit; two to three servings for meats and two to three servings for milk products. At first this may seem confusing, but the range takes into consideration that different individuals need different amounts of food and calories depending on various factors such as age, sex, physical size and activity level. Almost everyone should have the lowest number of servings in each range. The minimum number of servings will provide about 1600 calories, that is when low-to-moderate-fat foods are selected and the level of added fats in the diet is low. This number of calories is about right for many sedentary women and some older adults. Eating the highest numbers of servings in each group will provide about 2800 calo-

These people do not realize how lucky we are to have such a facility and personnel so close at hand.

I watched my uncle, Clyde Longley, die several times on Tuesday afternoon. The heart monitor was a flat line. Dr. Behney used his knowledge and experience, and the knowledge and experience of the E.R. nurses to help keep him alive and then stabilize him enough so that he could be transported to the

specialist in Amarillo.

Right now, we are holding our breath, hoping Uncle Clyde will come through this okay. We don't know what is going to happen. We really know only that he is still alive and that he would not be lieve now if not for Dr. Behney, the H&S Ambulance crew, and the nurses at Hansford Hospital.

You need 12 gold stars and 20 "atta boys". Just saying thank you doesn't really convey my feelings, but thank you and God bless you all.

The committee unanimously agreed to reelect all current officers. They are Sylvia Robertson, chairman; Clementine Renner, sec-

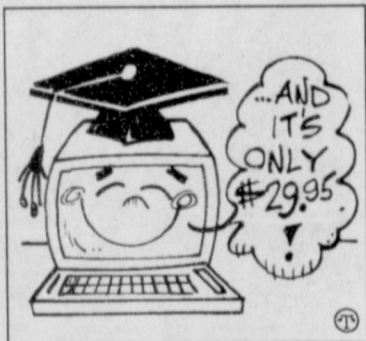
retary; Rubyjo Wilbanks, treasurer; and Juanita Pierce, vice-chairman.

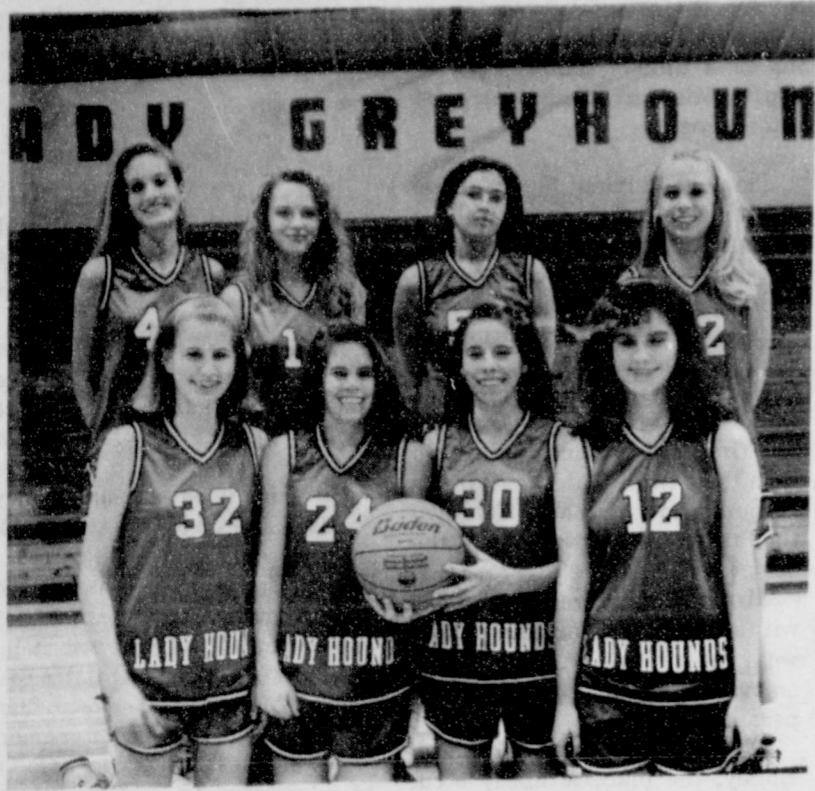

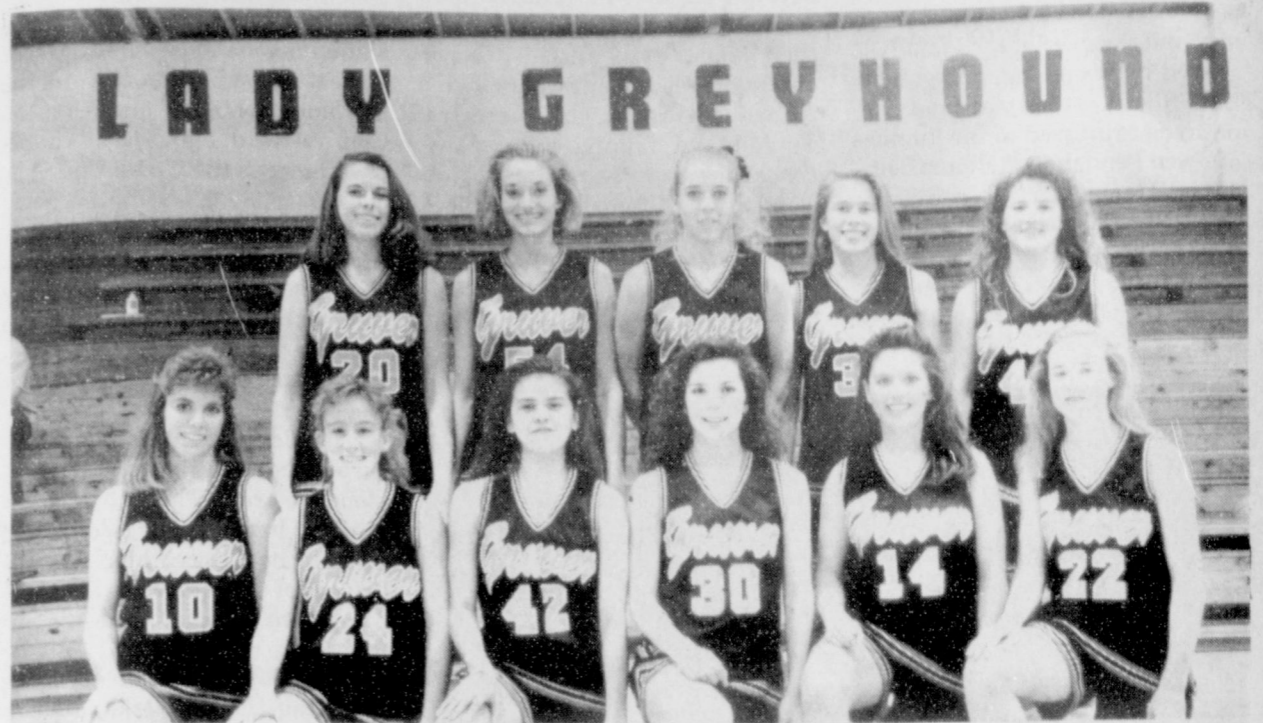

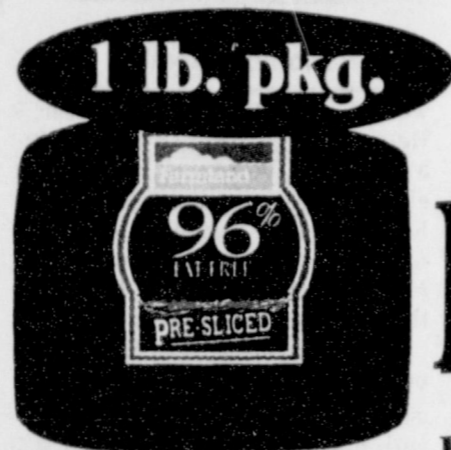
