In Hansford County individuals applying for place on the ballot for expiring terms in the cities and the

school districts is off to a slow start. Thus far a total of five applications for the 12 positions up for reelection have been filed. All of these applications are for positions on the school boards.

Incumbents Stan Seagler and Corky Chapman have both filed for re-election to the Gruver Board of Trustees. Seagler has served six years on the board, while Chapman was elected to finish out a one year term. There are two positions expiring. Both of these positions are for 3-year-terms.

Spearman Board of Trustees also has two positions expiring. Both incumbents, Carl Kunselman and Craig Schumann have applied for a place on the ballot. Kunselman March 17.

has served on the board for three years, while Schumann has served for one year.

In the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. there are three positions expiring. As of Monday incumbent Clay Reid was the only person that had applied for a place on the ballot. Reid has served one year on the board.

Both the City of Gruver and the City of Spearman reported that they had no applications for a place on the ballot for their expiring positions. The City of Spearman has three alderman positions expiring. In the City of Gruver, the position of mayor and one city commissioner's seat are expiring

State Comptroller announces sales tax rebates

Hansford County recently received \$31,043.45 in February sales tax rebates. This is a 2.17 percent increase from the \$30,383.55 received in February 1992.

Thus far in 1993, Hansford County has received \$44,509.36 in sales tax rebates, which was 0.18 percent less than the \$44,591.70 received for the same time period in 1992.

The breakdown of the above amounts in February are as fol-

Spearman received \$25,789.81 in February 1993, which was a 2.45 percent increase over the \$25,173.21 received in February 1992. For the year Spearman has received \$35,557.33. This is a 0.02 percent increase from the \$35,549.33 for the same time in 1992.

Gruver has received \$5,253.64 in sales tax rebates for February 1993, an 0.83 percent increase from the \$5,210.34 in 1992. Thus far for 1993, Gruver has received \$8,952.03, which is a 1 percent decrease from the \$9,042.37 mailed in 1992.

According to the release, State Comptroller John Sharp mailed a total of \$212.5 million in sales tax rebates to 1,071 Texas cities and 109 counties. These figures represent a 17.3 percent increase over the payment one year ago.

This month's payments include taxes collected on December's Christmas sales and reported in January by businesses filing monthly returns. February's rebates also reflect taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for sales made in October, November and December.
