
The bid for gasoline was awarded to Morse Implement, and Morse Oil received the bid for diesel fuel.

A CRY FOR VENGEANCE PSALM 58

I don't cry very often. Certainly not at silly things. But this past week I found myself sitting at the kitchen table reading a magazine article, eating a sandwich and weering. I wondered, "Why am I crying at the story of a circus eleph. It cone berserk, having to be shot by policemen."

For two weeks proor to my crying ag I had been studying the topic of grief. I was preparing to teach a seminar on bereavement to a group of hospice volunteers and staff. In the process I raked my memory for my previous encounters with grief. Some had been very painful losses.

I also read several books on grief and explored the Bible for its cause and cure. I discovered several things.

Grief is universally experienced, but it must be individually dealt with. It's caused by loss: the loss of a loved one, a prized possession, a pet, a job. The cure for grief is hope. Real hope. Hope in what is true and eternal. Hope in the God of the Bible. Outside of Him, a wise man said, "you are without hope in the world.

I know God. I have hope. What was I crying about? The loss of an elephant? Yes, but more than that.

I was crying this, "O Lord, come quickly. Right the wrongs. Heal the wounds. Destroy your enemies. Destroy my enemies. 'Shatter their teeth in their mouths.' And take your people home, Father." And He's going to. Are you going?





In reflecting upon Mark's gospel story, 6:7-13, in preparation for my sermon last Sunday, my thoughts kept turning to "Paradise", or at least to a kind of "Paradise experience." Now Mark's story is about Jesus' sending His disciples out in mission and ministry,about His making apostles out of them. This would seem to be such a serious, sober business; so why did I keep thinking of Paradise?

I'm quite sure that part of the reason was that I've just returned from an especially good vacation experience-- one in which, despite certain discomforts, inconveniences, uncertainties, etc., the experience was so good that I found myself savoring many of its moments, ... especially aware of my own contentment and satisfaction and fullness and fulfillment, and fully enjoying every aspect of the experience I was involved in.

Undoubtedly, another reason for Mark's story's triggering thoughts of Paradise for me has to do with my experience of my "work" here in Spearman. There have been times during my ministry here with my two congregations, when I've allowed myself to savor those moments and to immerse myself fully in "the pleasure of their company,"

"intrigued both by their personal "newness" and their "Christian" familiarity to me. Every now and then, in the midst this "work", I allow myself to dwell on the absolute beauty of this place and its people and my sense of the "fullness" and "satisfaction" of my ministry here with others, ... and it's difficult for me to say at such times whether this is "work" or "vaca-

This is in no way to diminish either the "work" of ministry in Jesus Christ nor the necessity of 'provisions" for such "work". In Mark's story, Jesus provisioned the disciples (1) by "sending them out in pairs" and (2) by "giving them authority over the unclean spirits."

And then He "provisioned" them in a third way that may seem at first more of a "non-provision" than a "provision", but it is pertaining this third item of "provision" that Jesus had most to say.

.He instructed them that they should take nothing for their journey, except a mere staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belt; "but to wear sandals..

Going out in witnessing "pairs". taking nothing for their journey but " a mere staff", and following the instructions of Jesus to remain vulnerable and focused, the disciples lived up to and into their new identities as apostles -- ones "sent out" by God through Christ. In their going out and preaching that people should repent, in their casting out of many demons, and in their anointing with oil and healing many who were sick, these ordinary "followers" actively demonstrated their acceptance of the "authority over ... unclean spirits" given to them by Jesus as effective "provi-

Even though summers seem to number. For some items, like apget shorter and busier every year, time still drags for many schoolage children. Parents can help by getting kids started on a summer project to fill their time off.

One project useful to the whole family is a home inventory book. A home inventory is a record of everything thing you own. It is a valuable aid in case of a fire, theft, or other loss of property. It provides a basis for estimating lost value and establishing insurance claims. In addition, a home inventory can help your family determine the amount of insurance you need to cover your possessions.

For kids, creating a home inventory is helpful for other reasons. It makes them aware of the value of items in their home. It gives them a chance to find out the history of family heirlooms or antiques that have been passed from generation to generation. And it provides a source of fun and pride through taking pictures and producing a useful product.

Equip your children with camera and film, pens, loose-leaf paper and a notebook binder. On each sheet of paper, your child or children will place a picture of one item in your home and a description of the item. The description should include information such as the manufacturer, model and serial





Gustavo Travain Camargo will take his first trip out of his home country of Brazil next month. He will be traveling to the United States, live with a Gruver, Texas family and attend the first semester of high school (Aug. - Dec.) in Gruver

Camargo, a 15 year old sophomore, has thought about studying in the United States since he was 12 years old. This three year old fream will come to fruit through World learning who has placed him in the home of Chris and Melyn Johnson of the Oslo Community.

"It will probably be the most important experience of my life and I will probably never forget it," says Camargo. He hopes to learn about the western American culture and improve his English.

Camargo resides with his family, father Roberto de Abreu Camargo, an engineer; mother Maria Cecilia Travain Camargo, an assistant principal; brother Ricardo Travain Camargo, 12; and sister Fernanda Travain Camargo, 14, in a suburb of Sao Paulo, Brazil. His American siblings will be Justin, 13; Luke, 12; Missy, 12; and

Sao Paulo is described by Gustavo as the largest city in Latin America. Although it is not the capital of Brazil, it is the most important city because of the industries and cultural events. "It is a cosmopolitan city with a lot of different cultures.

Gustavo will be going from this size city to a small Norwegian com-

munity 18 miles from the nearest town where the biggest and nearest cultural event is the Guymon Pioneer Day Rodeo. His favorite music, reggae, blues and rock, will in all likely hood be drowned out by country tunes for his five months in the Texas Panhandle.

There are many similarities in this young Brazilian student and the typical American student. His favorite subjects are history, biology and literature. He dislikes math and chemistry. Last year Gustavo's high school schedule included Portuguese, English, artistic education, physical education, history of the social and political origin of Brazil, physics, chemistry, biology, math and civil and moral education. He enjoys spending time on the computer and reading. He is very ac-

Gustavo will arrive in Texas on August 12. He has found an international host family through World Learning, which was founded in 1932. It is one of the oldest private, nonprofit, international educational service organizations in the world. Through World Learning, telephone number).

more than 80,000 international participants have been welcomed into the homes of host families across the United States.

World Learning maintains that hosting an international student in your home gives you and your family an education of the world, a new awareness of cultural values, and a new appreciation of your own country. When the family gathers around the dinner table, talking about everything from baseball to politics to what happened that day at school, a global understanding starts to take shape in a personal

There is no typical host family. They are rural, suburban and urban families that might be young couples with or without children, single parents, retirees, business people, blue-collar workers, teaching professionals and homemakers. With different backgrounds and lifestyles each is a family who shares an interest in young people and in learning about another culture.

It is not necessary to have special accommodations or even an extra bedroom for your international student. Simply provide your new family member with a bed, a quiet place to study, and two meals a day (breakfast and dinner). Full health and accident insurance is provided and each student brings his or her own spending money for personal expenses.



Grand Slam of Panhandle Bass Fishing

After serving three years as the tournament director for the FUN TOURNAMENTS and the BIG BASS TOURNAMENTS at Baylor Lake, I have been honored to get to know some of the best anglers in our region. Since 1990, over 800 individuals have paid their money and taken their chances in this friendly rivalry some call "Bass Wars.

The results of these tournaments tend to verify the old adage that 10% of the fishermen catch 90% of the fish. One of the unique aspects of the catch-and-release tournaments is the post tournament interview with the winners. We do not try to learn the exact location of their honey holes; instead, the interview includes some details of lure presentation and the type of structure that held active bass.

Skillful anglers who have won two tournaments includes BRENT BRESNIK of Fritch, BRAD CAR-PENTER of Borger, DANNY MURDOCK of Memphis, DE FRANCIS of Amarillo, Texas Tech linebacker BEN KIRKPATRIC of Post, TRENT LOUKAS of Amarillo, SANDY CARROLL of Pampa, and BILLY MOORE of Amarillo.

EXPERT bass anglers who have visited the winners circle three times are MIKE HARBER of Borger, JAY FRIEMEL of Canyon, and "Lucky" JACKY IVY of Ama-

Winning one tournament is a compliment to any angler's fishing ability, winning twice requires real talent, but winning three events is the mark of an outstanding angler who has few equals in the world of competitive fishing.

All the anglers above are special, but none have matched the remarkable fishing record of Pampa's GARY CARTER in 1993.

The multiple wins of these other anglers covered a span of several years. When Gary Carter won the July FUN TOURNAMENT at Lake Meredith, he achieved the Grand Slam of Panhandle Bass Fishing by winning three tournaments on three different lakes during the same calendar year.

After sharing some time in Gary's Javelin bass boat, I can share a few reasons for his remarkable fishing success.

Number 1. He is a student of bass; he never stops learning or studying their seasonal and daily feeding patterns. Number 2. He searches out some subtle and productive spots away from the heavily pounded shorelines. Number 3. He listens to the fish and knows how to use the proper equipment to catch them. He can use a pool cue for flipping a saltcraw in the cattails or grab a wimpy spinning rod with a weeny worm and finesse a limit of bass off a hump in the middle of the lake.

It's not easy to "pack light." My suitcase was heavier than all but one other on our trip. It's not easy to choose sandals over comfortable hiking boots or shoes. I got stickers, thorns, and some rather pesky blisters, as I'd expected I would. It's not easy to accept the awesome 'authority" for dealing with "unclean demons." What shall we say and what shall we do and what if this and what if that?

I don't have an answer or an argument to convince anyone or anything. It would be like trying to talk a person into going into the ministry, ... or into going on a trip. The thought I'd like to leave us with is this: Because of our common basis in faith -- our common reliance on the same "mere staff" and the same "authoritative instructor" -- we may always share a wonderfully full and satisfying apostles' Journey. And I can't help but wonder if perhaps we of Christ's church, in our many and diverse attempts at being faithful apostles, receive along the way a virtual "Paradisein-lie" -- a real and tangible Paralise of absolute contentment, deepest satisfaction, and fulfillment only ireamed of, perhaps tentatively noped for, but seldom gained by others either in this lifetime or at all. And it is ours! -- Paradise is ours! -- not as a goal in itself, but as the free and gracious provision/gift of God in Christ Jesus, Included in the work -vacation-journey of apostles merely trying to be faithful! Amen! And God Bless!

The district made arrangements with Dr. Behney of Spearman for bus driver physicals, Sears said. He continued, the district will pay the cost of the physical; however, if an employee chooses to go to another doctor for the physical, the district will pay \$20 toward the

In other businesses, Pringle-Morse School was designated as a smoke free workplace by the board. According to Sears, the policy which was approved states that employees shall not use any tobacco products at school and there will be no designated smoking areas in any of the school facilities.

Jean Ann Behney, who is certified in English and French, was hired to teach middle school language arts next year, Sears stated. Behney is of Spearman.

According to Sears, the district will continue to pay teachers \$2,500 above the teacher's state rate. He added, auxiliary and paraprofessional personnel will receive a three percent salary increase.

Health insurance was another item on the agenda. The districts employees are currently covered by the Texas Association of School Boards Employee Benefits Plan. ears explained that those ra have increased to \$199.36 per month per employee so the district is considering several options in-

cluding a partially self-funded plan. Pringle-Morse School was recognized by the Texas Education Agency for the school's gains in student achievement during the

1992-93 school year, Sears stated. He continued that the school was selected for a 1993 Texas Successful Schools Award System Performance Gain Award and a cash award of \$30,000. The ceremony to recognize the schools was held in Austin on Saturday, July 17.

A discussion was held on Senate Bill 7 and the possibility of an agreement with the schools in Hansford County. Spearman I.S.D. interim Superintendent Allen Alford and board member Dr. Tom Latta, and Gruver Superintendent Barry Haenisch and board member Stan Seagler were present at the meeting for the discussion.

According to Sears, Under SB 7, Pringle-Morse District is required to either purchase attendance credits from the state, or to contract to send money to other districts. It was stated at the community meeting to try to keep the money in the area is at all possible.

Sears and Haenisch met with the Texas Education Agency officials in Austin Monday, July 19 to discuss costs of the options and the impact to all districts.

The board approved an energy audit from Energy Systems of Austin. The company recommended the following for energy conservation: the installation of a thermostat control unit, a new heating/air conditioning unit and a new lighting installation. Sears said, "The district will now make application to the state for LoanSTAR Fund to implement the recommendations.

In regular business the board approved expenditures for the month in the amount of \$32,443.94. Sears stated that this includes a tuition payment to P-S-P District in the amount of \$14,662 and \$9,990.50 to E.D. Baker of Borger for paving and parking lot construc-



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
