Hansford County Library Uses Power of the Internet to Increase Library Holdings

People have always looked to the Hansford County Library to find information and answers to homework questions. But these days, more and more people are supplementing their research by going into the Internet. Much of the information found on the Internet can be inaccurate, unverified, and difficult to locate. Now a program from the Hansford County Library, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission and the Texas Telecommunications Infrastructure Board combines the best of both the library and the Internet by providing electronics sources of information called databases. They can be accessed at both the library and in your own home or office, or anywhere that has an Internet connection.

This program extends the resources of the Hansford County Library by providing 60 databases at a cost of 10 million dollars, paid for by the Texas State Library and the Telecommunications Infrastructure Board. This "Library of Texas" allows a user to find full-text articles in encyclopedias, almanacs, journals, newspapers, and even allows a user to read entire books. Best of all, these services are reliable, credible, appropriate for children, and easily searched by subject, topic, keyword, and various other ways. The databases cover a diverse area of subjects. Researchers and students can go to specific databases to find information as needed. For instance, some of the databases include:

Homework Help for Students. High School students can find information for homework assignments, research papers and essays from reference materials, read primary source documents, and look at magazines about literature, science, history and biographies. Younger students can use databases that contain World Almanac of the USA and World Almanac for Kids as well as searchable full-text from over 50 of the most popular K-12 magazines. Numerous encyclopedias, almanacs and magazines, maps and newspapers are also accessible.

Health Information. Instant access to carefully compiled and trusted medical reference resources land key health web sites. Find information on remedies, nutritional guidelines, and treatments. Some databases include searchable full-text for more than 160 popular health magazines.

Business Information. Find dynamic and up-to-date company and industry intelligence of more than 300,000 companies. Company profiles, including parent/sibling relationships, industry rankings, products and brands, current investment ratings, and financial ratios can all be found in the business databases.

Biography and Genealogy Information. Biographical information can be found on people from all time periods, geographical locations, and fields of study. Find biographies on authors, scientists, sports professionals, actors and many others. Some databases

allow you to trace your family tree, research folklore topics, and trace the history of your hometown.

Electronic Books. Search through thousands of books online and then download on of them and read it on your computer! 19,000 titles available by the beginning of 2002.

Literature. Find critical interpretations of over 600 authors, along with the content of 600 books taken from the series United States Authors, World Authors, and English Authors. Other databases contain 52,000 poems drawn from 750 volumes of Thea century;y American poetry.

Information about Books and Articles. Some databases provide information about materials found in US archival libraries, including records and detailed indexes. Searching for the information can be achieved by typing in a city, a state, a collection name, or library name. Others allow you to find title, author, ISBN number (a unique number for the book) and publisher information for over 3.4 million books, along with 600,000 full-text reviews of many of these books. Acquire the information you need in another database or through your library. The possibilities are endless. Much more is available by using these databases, including topics about American history and Spanish language resources, just to name a few more. Please check with your library staff at the Hansford County Library for more information.

Dedication Set For Windmill Park

Mayor Steve Benton and the Spearman City Council would like to invite all Spearman and Hansford County residents to a dedication of the new Windmill Park at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, October 12.

Located east of the Spearman High School, this park, upon completion, will feature six newly-renovated tennis courts, a 1/2 mile fully lighted walking trail, windmills from the J.B. Buchanan collection, a covered pavilion area with picnic tables, and playground equipment for children. This park should be 95% completed by the time of the dedication.

The mayor and the council would like to thank Ralph Blodgett for donating the land for the park. This generous donation added over \$170,000 of land value to the grant project which was matched by Parks and Wildlife funds.

Appreciation is also expressed to the Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association for the donation of the two mills that will be added to the park. These mills will be a wonderful attraction to the park.

Without the support of Mr. Blodgett, the Windmill Association, the Spearman

Independent School District School Board, and many citizens, this project would have never been achieved.

The park is considered a work in progress, and due to its size, its possibilities for additions are limitless. The city is already in the process of applying for additional grant money to provide trees at the park.

Blowin' In The Wind

I was somewhat nonplused to read in last week's paper about the dedication of Windmill Park across the street east of the high school because I had been referring to Windmill Park as the location of the windmills in the southwestern part of Spearman.

Anyway, a visit with City Manager Robert Patrick cleared up that contradiction. For purposes of the grant used to fund what was formerly Blodgett Park, the area was renamed because an existing entity could not be used for a grant so Windmill Park is the area lying just behind Blodgett Park. Blodgett Park is a fifty-foot strip of land across from the tennis courts.

The dedication of the park adjacent to Blodgett Park is to be Friday. The Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association has erected a single mill in the park. It is an Aermotor mill donated by F. W. Thomas and placed on an Aermotor tower donated by Dean Paul. A working windcharger is also to be placed in the park. That windcharger is presently being readied and will be put in the park by Mike Huffaker.

On Thursday, October 4, Burl Buchanan, Orville Latham, Don Reed and I went five miles northeast of Farnsworth to take down

the Aermotor tower on the Dean Paul farm. It was brought to Spearman and the ten-foot Aermotor mill donated by F. W. Thomas was mounted on it and at the time of this writing is planned to be in the park by the Friday dedication.

The impressive Aermotor mill will give the Windmill City a landmark mill on each approach into Spearman.

In other SPWA news, the second Currie Mill that was taken down for restoration is very close to

being ready to be re-erected. The mill has a renovated wheel and a totally new tower. Next mill of the J. B. Buchanan collection to be restored is the wooden Eclipse mill which is the mill closest to the highway.

Burl Buchanan was rejoicing earlier this week about the promise of a Perkins windmill that he has been interested in for sometime and whose obtainment I have given much moral support for (not monetary, you understand, because I have more mouth than money.)

The Perkins mill is an unusually beautiful mill. In the time when a

farmer's windmill was as much a mark of financial stature as his car or house is today, a Perkins mill must have been a prized addition to the farm.

If the crocodile hunter on TV can become rhapsodic about a rattlesnake then I guess it's all right for windmill collectors to wax-poetic about the beauty of the Perkins mill. It's beautiful!

Now what we need is someone to adopt the Perkins mill. It is a unique mill and will be a great addition to Spearman's windmill collection.

Lynx Swat Hornets

The Spearman Lynx didn't want to have a let down Friday like they did against Highland Park a year ago when they were almost upset by the Hornets. Instead, the Lynx totally dominated this game from the start. The only time this game was close, was at the coin toss!

Spearman scored first and they scored often as they routed Highland Park 61-0 in the second week of district play in District 6-2A. The victory puts Spearman's record at 4-1 for the year, but more importantly, the win puts them 2-0 in district and sets up a show down with West Texas next week, who is also undefeated in district play.

The Lynx held Highland Park to three first downs the entire night and all of those came in the first half. The Lynx scored on every possession except one and the Hornets held them on a 4th down attempt early in the 4th quarter. Spearman's John Brock scored first with 9:48 left in the first quarter from 10 yards out after Eduard Vasquez' 57 yard run the play before set up the touchdown. Vasquez' PAT was good and the Lynx led 7-0 and they never looked back after that.

After the Hornets went 3 and out and had to punt to the Lynx, John Brock took the punt and ran it back about 60 yards, but the Lynx were called for illegal use of the hands. That was the first of three touchdowns that were called back on the night. On the first play from scrimmage, Kevin Beedy threw deep over the middle to Lance Baker, who danced his way down to the 1 yard line. Vasquez ran in for the TD on the next play from 1 yard out. The PAT was good and Spearman led 14-0 with 7:12 left in the first quarter.

It was much the same scenario on the next two possessions. Highland Park went three and out and punted to Spearman. Spearman had a 42 yard touchdown called back and then Brock broke loose around the end and ran to the Hornet's 12 yard line before being tackled. On the next play, Beedy threw to Jared Lozano in the end zone for the touchdown with 3:50 left in the first quarter. The PAT was good and the Lynx increased their lead to 21-0.

The Hornets once again went three and out and the Lynx took over at the HP 34 yard line. The Lynx moved the ball down to the HP 11 yard line. On the first play of the second quarter, Kevin Beedy threw to Tanner Beedy in the corner of the end zone for another Lynx TD. The PAT was good and it was 28-0.

Things didn't get any better for the Hornets. On the second play from scrimmage, Zach Young, the HP quarterback, fumbled the ball and Spearman's Lance Baker scooped the ball up and ran 28 yards for another Lynx TD with 10:56 left in the half. The PAT kick failed and the score was 34-0.

On the second play from scrimmage after the Lynx kicked off, Young dropped back to pass and fumbled the ball and Tanner Beedy was there to fall on it at the HP 22 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, Brock ran wide around the right side from 22 yards out for the TD and after the PAT was good, the Lynx led 41-0.

Highland Park picked up their first 1st down of the night with 5:40 left in the second quarter. A few plays later, Colton Miller intercepted a HP pass and ran it back to mid-field. On the first play from scrimmage, Miller ran the counter and raced 50 yards for yet another Lynx TD with :56 left before intermission. The PAT was good and the Lynx led at half 48-0.

The second half wasn't any better for the Hornets as the Lynx continued to dominate. The Lynx did not allow the Hornets a first down the entire second half. After HP was attempting to punt, Dustin Mackie broke through the line and blocked

the punt and Spearman recovered at the HP 30. Three plays later, Baker ran it in for another TD to make the score 54-0 after the PAT failed.

Baker scored again on Spearman's next possession from 14 yards out with 3:41 still left in the 3rd quarter after HP went 3 and out on their possession. Vasquez' PAT kick was good and that made the score 61-0. Highland Park's only bright spot of the night came when they held Spearman on 4th and 3 at the HP 16 yard line. The Hornets could not move the ball and had to punt it back to the Lynx. The Lynx then stayed very conservative and ran out the clock. The clock ran continuous the second half to shorten the game as much as possible.

This was a confidence builder for the Lynx as they prepare for the biggest game of the year next week against West Texas. West Texas defeated Canadian Friday night 42-21 in a game that was expected to be much closer than the score. West Texas is for real and the Lynx must be ready to play in order to keep their perfect district record in tact. We need a huge crowd next week at Stinnett, so make plans to attend and support the Spearman Lynx!



Clara named Mrs. Whitefield as the teacher who has influenced her the most.

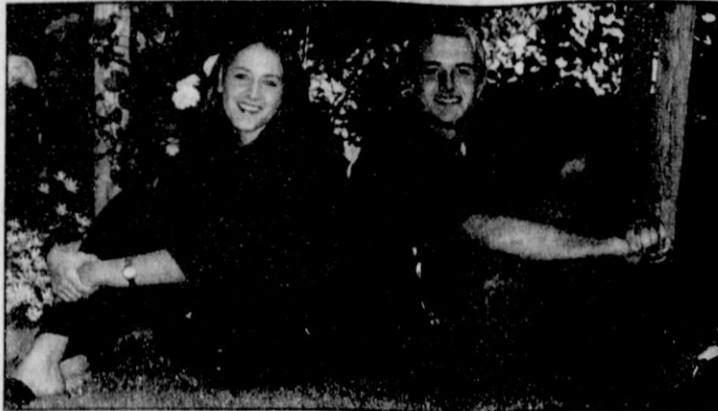
After graduation, she plans to attend Oklahoma State University or Texas A&M and major in accounting or meteorology.
