Hansford County Library Uses Power of the Internet to Increase Library Holdings

People have always looked to the Hansford County Library to find information and answers to homework questions. But these days, more and more people are supplementing their research by going into the Internet. Much of the information found on the Internet can be inaccurate, unverified, and difficult to locate. Now a program from the Hansford County Library, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission and the Texas Telecommunications Infrastructure Board combines the best of both the library and the Internet by providing electronics sources of information called databases. They can be accessed at both the library and in your own home or office, or anywhere that has an Internet connection. This program extends the

resources of the Hansford County Library by providing 60 databases at a cost of 10 million dollars, paid for by the Texas State Library and Telecommunications Infrastructure Board. "Library of Texas" allows a user to find full-text articles in encyclopedias, almanacs, journals, newspapers, and even allows a user to read entire books. Best of all, these services are reliable, credible. appropriate for children, and easily searched by subject, topic, keyword, and various other ways. The databases cover a diverse area of

subjects. Researchers and students

can go to specific databases to find

information as needed. For

instance, some of the databases

Homework Help for Students. High School students can find information for homework assignments, research papers and essays from reference materials, read primary source documents, and look at magazines about literature, science, history and biographies. Younger students can use databases that contain World Almanac of the USA and World Almanac for Kids as well as searchable full-text from over 50 of the most popular K-12 magazines. Numerous encyclopedias, almanacs and magazines, maps and newspapers are also accessible.

Health Information. Instant access to carefully compiled and trusted medical reference resources land key health web sites. Find information on remedies, nutritional guidelines, and treatments. Some databases include searchable full-text for more than 160 popular health mag-

Business Information. Find dynamic and up-to-date company and industry intelligence of more 300,000 companies. Company profiles, including parent/sibling relationships, industry rankings, products and brands, current investment ratings, and financial ratios can all be found in the business databases.

Biography and Genealogy Information. Biographical information can be found on people from all time periods, geographical locations, and fields of study . Find biographies on authors, scientists, sports professionals, actors and many others. Some databases

allow you to trace your family tree, research folklore topics, and trace the history of your home-

Electronic Books. Search through thousands of books online and then download on of them and read it on your computer! 19,000 titles available by the

beginning of 2002. Literature. Find critical interpretations of over 600 authors, along with the content of 600 books taken from the series United States Authors, World Authors, and English Authors. Other databases contain 52,000 poems drawn from 750 volumes of Thea century;y American poetry.

Information about Books and Articles. Some databases provide information about materials found in US archival libraries, including records and detailed indexes. Searching for the information can be achieved by typing in a city, a state, a collection name, or library name. Others allow you to find title, author, ISBN number (a unique number for the book) and publisher information for over 3.4 million books, along wrath 600,000 full-text reviews of many of these books. Acquire the information you need in another database or through your library. The possibilities are endless. Much more is available by using these databases, including topics about American history and Spanish language resources, just to name a few more. Please check with your library staff at the Hansford County Library for more informa-

I was somewhat nonplused to read in last week's paper about the dedication of Windmill Park across the street east of the high school because I had been referring to Windmill Park as the location of the windmills in the southwestern part of Spearman.

Anyway, a visit with City Manager Robert Patrick cleared up that contradiction. For purposes of the grant used to fund what was formerly Blodgett Park, the area was renamed because an existing entity could not be used for a grant so Windmill Park is the area lying just behind Blodgett Park Blodgett Park is a fifty-foot strip of land across from the tennis courts.

The dedication of the park adjacent to Blodgett Park is to be Friday. The Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association has erected a single mill in the park. It is an Aermotor mill donated by F. W. Thomas and placed on an Aermotor tower donated by Dean Paul. A working windcharger is also to be placed in the park. That windcharger is presently being readied and will be put in the park by Mike Huffaker.

On Thursday, October 4, Burl Buchanan, Orville Latham, Don Reed and I went five miles northeast of Farnsworth to take down

Paul farm. It was brought to Spearman and the ten-foot Aermotor mill donated by F. W. Thomas was mounted on it and at the time of this writing is planned to be in the park by the Friday ded-

The impressive Aermotor mill will give the Windmill City a landmark mill on each approach into

Hounds Pitch Riders

The Hounds paid no attention to titles as they knocked off Boys Ranch, the Amarillo Globe News' team of the week, 27-20, to take

their first win of the season.

Making their intentions clear early, the Hounds scored on the second play of the game and then again midway through the first quarter. The Rough Riders came back to knot the game at 13 in the third quarter and again at 20 in the fourth quarter.

With the game on the line late in the fourth, the Hounds tipped a Boys Ranch field goal attempt and marched 80 yards for the winning touchdown, and shut down the Riders final effort with an inter-

ception.

Zack Christian set the tone for the game with a 76 yard scoring run on the second play, and then punctuated his effort with the PAT

In the Riders first possession, an Aaron Boyd tackle for a six yard loss on third down forced a Rider kick. David Puebla returned the ball to the 50 yard line.

In a march down the field punctuated with runs by David Hernandez and Gab Lopez, Hernandez scored on a one yard run to give the Hounds a 13-0 lead in the middle of the first quarter.

The Riders put three points on the board late in the first quarter when they settled for field goal after Hound Jose Rodriquez stopped their drive on a big third down play at Gruver's twenty yard line. The second quarter was highlighted by a pair of gutsy Hound plays that yielded excitement but no points for the effort.

One, a forty yard pass- run play from Hunter Bevill to Kade Carthel on 2 and 11 moved the Hounds to the Boys Ranch 30 yard line before the drive died.

The other, a "you-got-to-see-it-to-believe-it" play came in the last 30 seconds of the half when a faked Hound punt resulted in a first at the Rider 20 yard line. With only one second remaining, a pass into the endzone fell incomplete.

Seeking to come back, the Riders took advantage of two Hound turnovers. A fumble recovery on the Gruver 31 yard line netted the Riders their first touchdown of the night.

Intercepting a Gruver pass and returning it to the Hound 24, the Riders threatened to take the lead with a second touchdown. Two crushing tackles for losses, one by Carthel and one by Hutch Reed, made the Riders settle for a field goal to tie the game at 13.

With the Hound offensive line in high gear the second half, the Hounds were able to score late in the third on a 10 yard pass from Bevill to Lopez to put the Hounds seven up.

The lead was short-lived as the Riders took advantage of a short Gruver punt in the fourth quarter to take possession on the Hound 34. The tying touchdown came on the first play from scrimmage on a run by Rider Ronnie Anderson.

With the clock expiring and the score knotted, a Rider interception on the Gruver 40 yard line could have proven fatal with the Rider's adept kicker, but the longarm of a Hound defender, deflected the goahead field goal try.

With overtime looming before them, the Hounds aided by a long run by Hernandez and a hardfought nine by Puebla, scored on fourth down with a one-yard Hernandez run with 39 seconds remaining.

The Riders last hope failed with an interception by Salvador Luciano on the Gruver 45.

With a big win under their belts, the Hounds will begin district play in a 7:30 p.m. clash with White Deer at White Deer.

The Spearman Lynx didn't want to have a let down Friday like they did against Highland Park a year ago when they were almost upset by the Hornets. Instead, the Lynx totally dominated this game from the start. The only time this game was close, was at the coin toss!

Spearman scored first and they scored often as they routed Highland Park 61-0 in the second week of district play in District 6-2A. The PAT was good and Spearman led 14-0 with 7:12 left in the first quarter.

It was much the same scenario on the next two possessions. Highland Park went three and out punted to Spearman. Spearman had a 42 yard touchdown called back and then Brock broke loose around the end and ran to the Hornet's 12 yard line before being tackled. On the next play, Beedy threw to Jared Lozano in the end zone for the touchdown with 3:50 left in the first quarter. The PAT was good and the Lynx increased their lead to 21-0.

The Hornets once again went three and out and the Lynx took over at the HP 34 yard line. The Lynx moved the ball down to the 11 yard line. On the first play of the second quarter, Kevin Beedy threw to Tanner Beedy in the corner of the end zone for another Lynx TD. The PAT was good and it


The pelicans are gone but lots of ducks are coming in. They stay mainly in the creeks.






