Reduced-Tillage Farming Program

and specialist from Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas will gather in Gruver, Texas on Wednesday February 5th to discuss reduced-tillage farming. The program will be held in the Hansford County Show Barn in Gruver, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Various implement dealers will have no-till and ridge-till equipment on hand. Four CEU's will be offered, and the noon meal will be provided.

With rainfall being the foremost limiting factor in crop production on the High Plains of Texas, the manner in which a producer makes use of his or her soil moisture can very well determine the profitablility of the operation. With the hike in the prices of diesel and natural gas, a reduction in pumping and equipment hours can make a substantial impact on produciton costs. A growing number of producers are finding that conservation tillage systems have the answers they are looking for.

Dr. Hans Kok, professor of Agronomy from Kansas State University, will provide the keynote address. He has performed extensive research into rainfall management, and farmers relate well to his

Ridge-till and no-till producers explanations of how conserved moisture and restored organic matter translates into increased yields and profits.

In addition to Kok, some of the area's foremost authorities on ridge-till and no-till farming will provide presentations on their operations. These speakers bring a number of years of experience and diversity to the program. Systems highlighted will include nonirrigated systems, furrow and center pivot irrigated systems, and operations encompassing stocker cattle and cow/calf programs. Scheduled to speak include; Harold Grall and Kurt Stallwitz of Dumas, Texas; Bob Dietrick of Tyrone, Oklahoma; Gaylon Beer of Guymon, Oklahoma; Jim Reinert of Engisn, Kansas; and Richard Schad of

These presentations will be given during breakaway sessions to allow producers to build their own program. There are four opportunities to hear classroom sytle presentations. Six speakers and topics will be offered, with each speaker making their presentation twice.

TAES Computer Workshop

The workshop, using Quicken 6 for Windows 95, will be taught by Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension economist who specializes in farm and ranch management. The registration fee is \$75, which helps offset costs of leasing the computers and teaching materials for the course.

Quicken 6 for WINDOWS 95 is an inexpensive, easy to use record keeping program widely used by agricultural producers. Participants will use a case study to learn in a hands-on setting. Tasks include entering transactions in the register, write check screens, categorized by type of income and expense, split and saving transactions to help develop meaningful financial reports. No prior computer experience is necessary.

Couples are encouraged to attend the workshop and will be charged only one registration fee

Area farmers and ranchers can if they share one computer. Class provide hand-on experience for all participants. Classes will be taught in a two day format. Each session will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m.



News From The Post Office

We are going to talk in the future about different ways to send your mail. Hopefully, this will help you decide the best way to send your letter or package.

Express mail is the fastest form of mail service. Naturally the earlier your mail leaves the faster it will reach its destination. You will need to call your local Post Office and find out when the mail leaves your town. The Postal Service can reach most places the next day, but not always. If mail leaves your town two different times per day, you need to try to make the earlier dispatch.

The Post Office has boxes and large envelopes to send your Express mail. Our supplies are free to the public for just using our States Postal Service.


service. This is a plus. NO need to buy an envelope. We also have the label you will need. You will receive back a copy of the label that has a number in the upper right corner. If something happens to your Express mail, we can make a phone call and in most cases find its location in seconds.

The Express mail goes into a special sack that is recognized by all Postal Employees to be worked first. Express carries automatic insurance. The cost up to one half pound is \$10.75, 1-2 pounds is \$15.00, 3 pounds is \$17.50, 4 pounds is \$19.40 and increases with the weight, all the way to the 70 pound limit.



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Focus On The Family

QUESTION: What place should fear occupy in a child's attitude toward his mother or father?

DR. DOBSON: There is a narrow difference between acceptable, healthy "awe" and destructive fear. A child should have a general apprehension about the consequences of defying his parent. By contrast, he should not lie awake at night worrying about parental harshness or hostility. Perhaps a crude example will illustrate the difference between these aspects of fear.

A busy highway can be a dangerous place to take a walk. In fact, it would be suicidal to stroll down the fast lane of a freeway at 6 p.m. on any Friday. I would not be so foolish as to get my exercise in that manner, because I have a healthy fear of fast-moving automobiles. But as long as I don't behave ridiculously, I have no cause for alarm.

I want my child to view me with the same healthy regard. As long as he does not choose to challenge me, openly and willfully, he lives in total safety. He need not duck and flinch when I suddenly scratch my eyebrow. He should have no fear that I will ridicule him or treat him unkindly. He can enjoy complete security and safety--until he chooses to defy me. Then he'll have to face the consequences.

Out At The Lake

Very few people used the Park this past week, but it will be memorable to Jim Derington because one day about noon, as he was coming across the dam, he counted 21 eagles. Some were standing on the ice a others were perched in the dead trees. Only 7 were mature bald eagles with white heads and tails, but Jim felt the others were immature bald eagles rather than golden eagles. Remember the head and tail become white when the bird is 4 or 5 years old.

Jim and others have been watching the eagles feed on ducks and geese during the cold snaps that are causing part of the Lake to freeze. They have numerous fights among themselves over who is going to feed first on the dead waterfowl. Although eagles prefer fish, they will eat small animals, road kill, or injured ducks and geese. Neither bird book I checked mentioned their

eating ducks or geese in good condition, but I've my own suspicions.

Bob Cluck told me he had seen 5 eagles standing on the ice on a playa lake south west of Gruver. I have hopes to see this sight, too, this winter.

There are big flocks of geese at the Lake yet. They go out to feed around 8 o'clock in the morning, come back in from 10 to 11 and go back out before sundown. Jim said the best spots to view them were generally from the dam or on the east side of the Lake.

The Channel 7 newsmen that came out last week to do the story on the meeting of the member districts of the Palo Duro River authority were delighted with the abundance of the geese and eagles. They spent about 2 hours videoing the birds.

Bald eagles have yellow eyes, yellow beaks, and yellow legs.

In 2 or 3 weeks, I will try to help the interested Gruver property owners get their tax permits.

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

OSU Honor Roll


A total of 2,938 Oklahoma State University students earned recognition on academic honor rolls for the fall 1996 semester.

Part-time undergraduate students who have accumulated at least 12 semester credit hours during the most recent consecutive OSU enrollments are also named to the lists. Grades of "pass" or correspondence coursework may not be included, and dropping a course prohibits a part-time student from being placed on the honor rolls. Non-degree seeking students are not listed on honor rolls at OSU.


