

Amber Ramon received her Juris Doctorate from the Texas Tech University School of Law during the Hooding Ceremony on May 12, 2007. She graduated 2nd in her class of 236, with a GPA of 3.841.

Amber graduated summa cum laude, was in the Order of the Coif (top 10%), Phi Kappa Phi National Honor Society (to 10%) and Phi Delta Phi Honor Society (top 25%). She received the George W. and Sarah H. Dupree Award, whish was awarded by her class members (voted on by class members) to the student she exemplifies dedication, integrity and professional responsibility of one who is about to enter the legal profession. She also received the Jurisprudence Award (awarded for superior academic achievement) in the following classes - Contracts, Civil Procedure, Legal Practice I, Legal Practice II and Criminal Procedure. Amber is the daughter of Tindle and Kristi Ramon of Spearman.




Lady Bird Johnson Dies at 94

Lady Bird Johnson died Wednesday, July 11, 2007. She was the widow of Lyndon Baines Johnson, sworn in as the nation's 36th president on November 22, 1963, just hours after President John F. Kennedy's assassination. At 94, she was the oldest living former

Mrs. Johnson will lie in repose beginning at 1:15 p.m. Friday at the LBJ Library and Museum, 2313 Red River in Austin. Visitation will end at 11 a.m. Saturday. A private funeral service will be Saturday at the Riverbend Center in Austin.

Lady Bird Johnson's efforts to beautify America were almost as numerous as the endless miles of Bluebonnets and Indian Paint Brush flowers that dot the Texas landscape each spring.

Upon news of her death, Texas Gov. Rick Perry ordered flags in the state to be flown at half-staff.





Now that the fireworks and parades of the 4th of July are behind us, we should look back at what we were celebrating -- the Declaration of Independence -which guarantees us the freedom and liberties we enjoy as

But these blessings do not flow to all of us equally, especially in Texas. Despite Texas' great wealth, we have one of the highest poverty rates in the country.

In fact, according to the U.S. Census, one in four kids lives in poverty, or less than \$17,170 a year for a family of three.

In addition, every day, one in nearly five Texas families are food insecure, meaning they aren't sure where they'll get their next meal. Nearly 5 percent of families actually go hungry, ranking us third worst in the nation.

Texas has the highest rate of adults and children without health insurance. One in four Texans are uninsured.

These problems have real consequences for all of us. If a family is living in poverty or if a child is hungry or sick, we all pay the price.

Studies consistently show that students who are hungry perform worse in school. Kids who do worse in school tend to drop out at higher rates and do not achieve

their full potential. This in turn "all men are created equal." We makes Texas' workforce less competitive and hurts our economy.

People who cannot afford to go to the doctor turn to emergency rooms when things get bad. Emergency room costs are passed along to the rest of us in higher private health insurance premiums and increased local taxes.

Some claim that the problem is that people just won't work. Not true.

In fact, the vast majority of poor families are headed by a full-time worker.

Others claim that immigration is TX 78716-1294. (05/29/2007) to blame. If we didn't have so many immigrants, these people say, "our problems would disappear.

Again, not true.

If we took all our immigrants (both legal and unauthorized) out of the picture, the situation wouldn't change much. Texas would tie for the highest rate of people without health insurance in the nation. Texas would still have one of the highest poverty rates.

Indeed, even though California has a greater proportion of immigrants than Texas, California still fares better on all counts. Compared to Texas.


California has lower poverty rates, less hunger and food insecurity, and a higher rate of people with health insurance. The Declaration





A plumb line is an instrument used by masons to determine that a wall is truly vertical, upright. Some see this as God is checking His people to see that they are truly vertical, upright. We sense that they are not. Another translation of these verses has God standing by a wall with tin ore piled next to it. Now tin ore mixed with copper ore yields bronze, which was used for swords and spears in Amos' time. This would indicate that God was preparing for war to come upon Israel. Thus, Amos brings a message of judgment to King Jeroboam and Amaziah the priest of Bethel.

The Psalmist sings of God sitting in His council, preparing to issue judgment upon the people who have not acted justly and who have shown partiality to the wicked. The believer is created to "rule" the world for God, to act justly on God's behalf to those less fortunate; those who fail to have compassion and act in love to relieve the distress of others, are already judged.

Paul writes encouragingly to those who live in Coloss and abide in Christ. [in his earlier epistles, Paul wrote to the "church" in...] He tells them that he prays that they will come to an understanding of God's will and that God will give them the strength to apply that will to their every day living. Paul reminds the Colossians that they have been rescued from the power of darkness and transported to the Kingdom of God through faith in Jesus Christ. These believers are praised for having faith in Christ and for showing love to their neighbors.

In the ironic parable of the Good Samaritan. A lawyer asks Jesus, 'What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus points to his phylactry and asks, "What is written in the law?" The answer, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Jesus answered, "Do this and you shall live."

The lawyer then asks, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus tells a parable about a reckless man traveling alone down the steep, narrow, winding road from Jerusalem to Jericho. The man is waylaid by robbers, beaten and left for dead. A priest passes by the man but does not stop perhaps for fear of being ritually unclean. He sees his ceremonial duties at the temple as being more important than aiding a distressed person.

A Levite passes a little closer by the man but does not stop, perhaps fearing that the man is a decoy for robbers. A Samaritan, a heretic to a law-abiding Jew, comes along, sees the man, tends his wounds, and transports him to an inn for treatment. The Samaritan tells the inn keeper to provide for the stranger and pays money for this provision. Jesus asks the lawyer questioning him "Which of these three to you think was a neighbor to the man?" The lawyer answered, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said, "Go and do likewise."

May the Holy Spirit allow you to understand God's will in your life and empower you to so act.



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Officials Warn West Nile Virus is Back

Lots of rain leaves standing water. Standing water attracts mosquitoes. Mosquitoes can carry West Nile Virus. And July is the prime month for cases of the disease to start showing up, said a Texas Cooperative Extension specialist.

Dr. Greta Schuster, an Extension integrated pest management specialist in Canyon, will be dragging out her carbon dioxide light traps this week to determine how many positive mosquitoes can be found

Alexander reported West Nile Virus is already active in Texas, with one human case in the Houston area. Positive mosquitoes have been found in Collin, Denton, Jefferson, Montgomery and Willacy counties.

Schuster has been sampling for West Nile virus-carrying mosquitoes for the past five years. She started in an effort to help Extension agents and area veterinarians know the severity of the sitnated for the disease.

Each year she watches the reports from other parts of the state to know when to start collecting mosquitoes. When the positive cases start showing up in the south, she knows it won't be long before the virus moves north.

"We're trying to find out when mosquitoes are becoming active and what species is active at the time," she said.

"If they are showing up in my traps, then there are a lot more out there," she said. "That's when we start alerting the Texas Department of Agriculture and other agencies who can get the word out that it is time to be more vigilant in control and protection."

To protect against disease-carrying mosquitoes, Schuster said wear long sleeves when working outdoors, use a DEET product and don't go out from sundown to 10 p.m. if possible.

"When we were collecting mosquitoes off the horses, they were covered the heaviest from about 8 to 10 (p.m.)," she said.

Schuster said there is some concern about using products with the DEET chemical in it, but advises that if people spray most of the chemical over their clothing and use long sleeves to protect themselves, it is safe.

The DEET amounts in products vary, she said. The amount needed depends on how long an individual expects to be outside. The more DEET the repellent contains, the longer not better it will protect.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advise that products with a low concentration of active

Higher concentrations of active ingredient may be useful in highly infested areas or with insect species which are more difficult to repel.

When trying to limit mosquito of treatments is best, Schuster said.

"First, we advise sanitation," she said. "Empty water from flower pots, pet food and water dishes, birdbaths, swimming pool covers, buckets, barrels and cans. Remove discarded containers and other items that could collect water."

Second, use a larvicide chemical to control hatching mosquitoes so they never become adults, Schuster said. Larvicides, which kill immature mosquitoes, are put in water sources.

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
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The July Fourth holiday was enjoyed by many at Lake Palo Duro. These pictures show some of the RV campers, and the entertainment they brought.

A friend told me that she fried carp as you would any fish, but sometimes she likes to add lemon and oil to it, wrap it in foil, and grill it. Perhaps the secret is to catch carp that grew in clean water.
