Texas, March 12- Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 6.8 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.65/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 3.8 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.75/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 22.8 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 22.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 28.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 22.4 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"With a likely peak in gasoline prices still as much as two or more months away, the national average for a gallon of gasoline has already hit the bottom of the range that we projected back in January in our 2012 gasoline price forecast, which is quite concerning," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick De-Haan. "While the recent pace of price increases has slowed somewhat, the spotlight will now shift to refining facilities as they start and finish maintenanceany unexpected problems arising from such may cause prices to resume a quick climb," DeHaan said.

GasBuddy operates, TexasGasPrices.com, and over 225 other local gasoline pricetracking websites that follow prices at over 125,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. Words from
Faith & Grace by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

In the fourth week of the Season of Lent we learn more of God's redeeming love and our need of redemption, as we study Numbers 21: 4-9, Psalm 107: 1-3,17-22, Ephesians 2: 1-10, and John 3:

14-21. The Children of Israel have been wandering in the desert for almost forty years. They are tired, dusty. thirsty, hungry and grumbling. They complain of Moses and they complain of God. The Lord sends poisonous serpents among them; many are bitten and many die. The people repent and beg Moses to intercede for them with God. Moses does so and God tells Moses to "lift up" a brass serpent on a pole. Moses makes the pole, erects it and all those who gaze upon the brass serpent recover from their bite. Learn from this that God does not remove the sources of our suffering, but he provides what we need if we "look in the right direction."

The Psalmist provides a community hymn of praise. Verses 1 through 3 call upon all people to praise God for his steadfast love and goodness. Verses 17-22 show us that some are sick (because of their sinful ways); but, when they cry to the Lord, the Lord saves them from their distress. Note that the Hebrew word " 'awal" which is translated here as 'sick' also means 'foolish'. We can read this as "foolishness" is a result of sin and inasmuch as the foolishness of sin separates us from the love of God, it is a 'sickness'. Learn from this that God hears the cries of sinners if we "look in the right direction"; and God's steadfast love provides us with what we need.

In Ephesians, the writer tells the congregation that they were once dead through trespasses and sins; living among the 'demons' in the passions of their flesh and were therefore children of wrath. But the believers need not fear, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God..." Regardless of how dark our sin is, God's steadfast love provides us with what we need through faith in

Jesus The Christ. John tells us that just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so Jesus the Christ was lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. John then stated, "For God so loves the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life". We cannot by ourselves save ourselves from the consequences of our sin. But when we, as sinners, cry out to God, God hears us and by his grace enables our faith in Jesus The Christ, we are forgiven and redeemed. You could say that we are then, "looking in the right direction".

May the Holy Spirit enable you to have faith in Jesus The Christ who provides us with what we need.
