regarding safety of foods such as eggs, follow these suggestions for
selection, preparation and storage of selection, preparation and storage of
eggs to contribute to a happy,
healthy holiday healthy holiday. When purchasing eggs, check to be
sure that eggs a sure that eggs are clean and not
cracked.
Cracks cracked. Cracks give
microorganisms a chance to enter
and contaminate the egg. If a crackand contaminate the egg. If a cracked egg is accidentally purchased, do not eat it.
Refrigerate purchased eggs as
soon as cartons in which they were purchas ed, on a shelf in the refrigerator. The egg slots on a refrigerator door are not the best place to store eggs
because the temperature fluctuates
in this area as the door in this area as the door opens and
closes. Egas need to be stored at con closes. Eggs need to be stored at constant reffigerator temperature to
maintain safety maintain safety.
For hard cook
in water in a pan and cover. Bring to a boil. Do not stack eggs. This will prevent uneven cooking. When water heat and let sit for 20 minutes. Pour off hot water and cool the eggs under cold running water.
Hard cooked eggs are still in the refrigerator until time to
as fabric softener and starch. Fabric
softeners tend to yellow with age and "hidden," "hunted" and gathered in a short period of time. Either follow the two-hour rule or don't eat them. The two-hour rule says that any room temperatures for more than two hours. Room temperatures promote the growth of bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. Be wary of
consuming any eggs that may have become cracked in the hunt.
Any hard-cooked eggs not used in the hunt can be held in the refrigerator for up to a week.
It's wise to take precautions with any perishable foods including protein foods such as meats, poultry, eggs, fish and dairy foods. Cleanliness is very important in handing these foods in order to pre-
vent contamination by bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. This is especially important for those people highly susseptibie, inciuding the very
young, the very old, pregnant women young, the very old, pregnant women
and those with chronic diseases and weakened immune systems.
Raw or under-cooked eggs should not be consumed, especially for those
susceptible groups. Exercise special susceptible groups. Exercise special
caution with soft-cooked, scrambled, soft-fried and poached eggs. Do not taste any cookie or cake dough that contains raw eggs and alwa refrigerate leftover egg dishes.
STORING WINTER CLOTHES Spring means warmer weather is coming and it is time to clean and store your winter clothing. Clean all
items before storing. Even tiny spots of soil or food make the fabric more susceptible to staining, mildew and insect infestations. Launder washable items and garments, but
avoid using laundry additives such starch attracts insects.
Reduce dry cleaning casts by having "dry clean only" garments cleaned, but not pressed. Store wool garments in moth repellant (ball,
flakes, or crystals), but avoid putting flakes, or crystals), but avoid putting
moth repellent in baby or children's cotton clothing.
Tailored and professional clothing should be stored on padded hangers protected in a cloth garment bag.
Avoid storing garments in plastic whenever possible. Plastic garment bags and dry cleaner bags trap moisture during the humid summer
season and sometimes season and sometimes cause
garments to become yellowed and garments to become yellowed and cleaner bags has been known to degrade onto garments leaving an ink stain.
If you do not have cioset space
available for winter garments, then available for winter garments, then
stuff the sleeves and shoulders with tissue paper. Store in a tissue lined box. Choose large flat boxes so that
the garments may be folded fewer the garments may be folded fewer
times and are not crushed by the times and are not crushed by the
weight of other garments. Store the heaviest garments on the bottom and
heighter weight lighter weight garments on top.
Good places to store out-of-sea Good places to store out-of-season
garments include the "far end" of a gedroom closet, under the bed, and the top shelves of a clothes closet. Avoid hot attics, damp basements
and damp garages, because mold and damp garages, because mold
and mildew grow in humid conditions. Also avoid storing good clothes next to the outside wall because outside walls tend to draw dampness
with outside temperature fluctua with ou
tions.
