Spearman City Council . . .

City manager search begins

The search for a new city manager for Spearman was begun Thursday, June 13 when the Spearman City Council met in special session.

The council voted to hire Stephens Management Consultants Inc. to assist in hiring a new city manager. Bill Stephens, representing the firm, told the council that for a fee of \$3,000 plus advertising expenses, his company will advertise the position, receive and screen applications, conduct preliminary interviews, and present the council with a "finalist" list of applications plus a set of interview questions for final interviews.

Council members decided upon Aug. 15, 1991 as the deadline for receiving applications for the city

manager's position and then gave Stephens a list of qualifications to be met by applicants.

In other business, the council decided that refurbishing the city's present wastewater treatment system is preferable to constructing a lagoon-land application type of system. Dwight Brandt, representing Brandt Engineers Inc., presented a report which compared costs of each system. He summarized that the systems would be of equal value in 22 years.

After receiving the report, the council voted to proceed with refurbishment of the present system.

Council members voted to enter into a contract with the Spearman

Chamber of Commerce. The city will assist the chamber in providing recreational services to Spearman residents at a cost of \$2,000.

Jim Murray, city manager, told the council that he met Wednesday, June 12 with an attorney and representatives of Mission Cable. Murray said that he did not see any progress in Mission Cable's compliance with its franchise agreement with the city. He also gave the council an update on the current rate case involving Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

The council was scheduled to meet in regular session Tuesday, June 18, and another special council meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, July 2.

Reservoir not open yet

Palo Duro Reservoir is not yet officially open, according to Johnnie Lee, general manager of the Palo Duro River Authority.

Lee said that right now, the lake is open for viewing and picnicking only. Because of debris and the depth of the water, he said, the lake is closed to fishing, boating and swimming for the time being for safety reasons.

Lee also pointed out that the road on the northwest side of the lake is closed because of water, and there is no entrance to the lake area on that side. Sightseers and picnickers should enter the lake area from the

south side on the caliche road. The lake depth was at 32 feet, 5 inches on Thursday, June 13, said Lee, and "holding real well. The bottom's not soaking up like we thought it might." He added, "After all the crops are harvested, we're ready for a good rain."

The Palo Duro River Authority met Tuesday, June 11 and appointed two board members as a committee to write rules and regulations concerning use of the reservoir and the surrounding park area. Lee said PDRA members discussed ideas for park rules, and also discussed a time period when offices, a shop building and more park areas could be built.

The board accepted bids on a shop building, said Lee, and the bids are

under review at this time. He said the board will probably let a contract at its next meeting. Maxus Corp. was granted two easements for tying in wells, he said.

PDRA members also discussed the purchase of a mower. Lee said money has been budgeted to buy a mower, but the PDRA is having some difficulty in finding a mower that will "do the job." He said a mower which leaves vegetation at the right height and will "roll" well through the sand.

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Gruver 4th of July . . .

Holiday celebration planned

The Gruver Chamber of Commerce and Alpha Mu Psi sorority are in the final planning stages for the Gruver Fourth of July celebration. According to celebration coordinator Buster Davis, final plans for the event will be completed the end of this week.

Davis said that the celebration is tentatively scheduled to get underway at 10 a.m. on Thursday, July 4, at the swimming pool park in Gruver. There will be games for adults and children, a noon barbecue dinner, and a fireworks display after dark at the Gruver football stadium.

He said that community organizations are in the process of signing up to sponsor games and refreshment booths at the celebration. Though he did not have a complete list, he did mention some of the groups and their booths.

Alpha Mu Psi and Xi Psi Kappa sororities will each have a booth. Alpha Mu Psi will be selling snow

cones. Xi Psi Kappa members have made a quilt they will be auctioning off, as well as conducting a bingo game at the celebration. The quilt can be seen at Main Street Store in Gruver.

The junior and senior classes at Gruver High school have indicated they will have booths at the celebration. The senior class will have soft drinks to sell. The junior class will be selling ice cream.

Other events and activities that Davis expects to be going on include children's bicycle races, adult horseshoe and washer toss competitions, and adult and children's sack and three-legged races. Davis pointed out that not all of these activities have sponsors yet, and that there is still room for more booths. He invites any groups or individuals in Hansford County who want to sponsor a booth or a game to give him a call at Gruver State Bank, 733-5061.

To give celebration-goers the

strength to participate and enjoy all the festivities of the celebration, the Gruver Lions Club will offer a noon barbecue meal. According to A.J. Ratliff, the club has already purchased 750 pounds of meat for the meal. He says he and his fellow Lions will start cooking the meat on July 3, so it will be good and tender when served on the 4th.

Ratliff is also coordinating the fireworks display which will conclude the celebration. He said the City of Gruver is underwriting the purchase of the fireworks and will be in charge of the display. Ratliff said the city has already purchased the fireworks for a class B aerial display. He added that there may be a short program preceding the display.

Davis said the goal of the celebration is for everybody to get together and have good fellowship and a good time. "It will be a chance for people to see each other, who do not normally get the chance," he said.

Survey completed . . .

Area's education needs shown

Editor's note: The following story is reprinted by permission from the Perryton Herald, Sunday June 9 issue.

A recently completed survey by the Tri-County Education Committee, a part of a Kellogg Foundation research grant, has shown a definite need for more adult continuing education in the area.

Survey forms were printed in newspapers in Hansford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties, asking the public's thoughts in six major areas. In all there were 111 returned, 55 percent of those from Ochiltree County, 28 percent from Lipscomb County, and 17 percent from Hansford County.

All of the opinions expressed indicated that better educational services beyond a high school education are definitely needed, said Chris Aylett, one of Perryton's representatives on the committee.

All levels of education were mentioned, from non-college credit classes like English as a second language, to master's degree courses.

Of those responding, an overwhelming 96 percent felt there was a need for continuing education in

those counties. Aylett said that many respondents were interested in taking non-college credit classes for their personal enrichment.

Some of those courses mentioned included bridge classes, cake decorating, conversational Spanish, childbirth and prenatal care, gourmet cooking, basic bookkeeping and computer training.

Aylett mentioned Dalhart as an example of a community which has coordinated its own continuing education classes. There, those interested in taking a course sign up and pay a fee. An instructor is found, and paid with those course fees to teach a four- to six-week course, which meets once a week.

The Tri-County Education Committee is hoping to start a similar program, using Perryton as a central location, this fall. Initial courses planned are conversational Spanish, basic bookkeeping and one other, yet to be named.

Another area in which respondents expressed interest was offering more GED classes. Those classes, which prepare people to take the high school equivalency exam, are not offered as often as people would like.

Aylett added that no GED classes will be offered in the area until Oc-

tober. To make studying for the exam easier, the committee has looked into purchasing GED videotapes to be available at the library in each county.

The tapes to be purchased are the same as those used through the learning center at Amarillo College, Aylett added. To buy the tapes and workbooks for all three counties would cost around \$2,000, she said, and some money has already been raised for that effort.

Some 86 percent of the respondents also expressed interest in college courses toward a degree. Aylett said that Frank Phillips College currently offers those, both in Perryton and Borger.

The committee would also like to secure the services of a mobile lab, offered through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, to help people update their reading and math skills in preparation for taking college courses.

Around 82 percent of those completing the survey expressed an interest in some sort of master's degree program offered in the area, without having to drive to Canyon or other

Emergency loans available

PERRYTON - Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by the high winds and range fire which occurred on March 5, 1991 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office located in Perryton, FmHA County Supervisor James M. Heck said.

Hansford and Ochiltree Counties are two of nine in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the high winds and range fire.

Heck said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Heck said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Jan. 22, 1992 but farmers

should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming session," Heck said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on far-

ming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office is located at Six Southwest Third, Perryton, and is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Gibson, Irwin sworn in on Wednesday

Gruver Mayor Keith Gibson and City Commissioner Mark Irwin were sworn in as newly elected members of the Gruver City Commission at the Commission's Wednesday, June 12 meeting.

Gruver City Manager A.J. Ratliff administered the oath of office to the two men, who were re-elected to their posts in May.

In other business, members of Gruver's Planning and Zoning Commission were appointed or reappointed, according to Ratliff. T.J. Bergin was appointed as the newest member of that board. Nancy Gar-

cia, Randy Brown, Fred Davidson and Corky Chapman were reappointed.

City commission members voted to close a portion of West Ninth Street in Gruver, said Ratliff. He explained the street is unimproved, and that the owner of land adjacent to the street requested that the street be closed. The city will put up a gate, Ratliff said, so the area can be accessed if necessary.

Regular business for the Gruver City Commission included approval of minutes of previous meetings, and approval of accounts payable for the month of May.

Sorghum producers to elect new directors

Texas sorghum producers will vote by mail later this summer to elect directors to fill five seats on the 15-member Texas Grain Sorghum Board (TGSB). Elections will be held in four of the five TGSB districts this year. Directors will be elected to represent producers in the Panhandle, West Texas, South Texas, and Upper Coast districts.

TGSB administers the funds collected by the statewide assessment on grain sorghum. The assessment is collected on a refund-only basis and is used to fund programs of research, disease and insect control, education and promotion.

Those eligible to vote are persons who are subject to the assessment collected by TGSB, including producers of grain sorghum and owners of land on which grain sorghum is grown. Any eligible voter may be nominated for a seat on the board.

Nomination forms are available from the TGSB office at P.O. Box 560, Abernathy, Texas 79311. The forms must be signed by the nominee and ten eligible voters and returned to the TGSB office no later than July 31, 1991.

TGSB will provide ballots to eligible voters prior to the election. Ballots will also be available at county extension offices and at grain elevators. Ballots must be mailed to the TGSB office by September 10, 1991.

Some type of vocational training for adults was also high on the list, with 91 percent feeling there was a need. Those could involve automotive or barber courses, for example.

The final area on the survey was whether or not people believed there was a need for the Amarillo PBS station to be broadcast in this area. Around 84 percent felt there was, and Perryton's cable company plans to have KACV-TV out of Amarillo on the Perryton programming by the end of this year.

Overall, Aylett said the survey indicates "better educational services can be made available in our area, but it's up to our community to make them available."

The committee is made up of people representing each of the three counties. Serving from Lipscomb County are Jerry Woodard and Pam Sanders; from Hansford County, Tye Winger and Donna Murray; and from Ochiltree County, Bill Gentzel, Mary Lou Rowland, Carl Ellis and Aylett.

The Kellogg Project was established to promote the economic development of the northern Panhandle region.

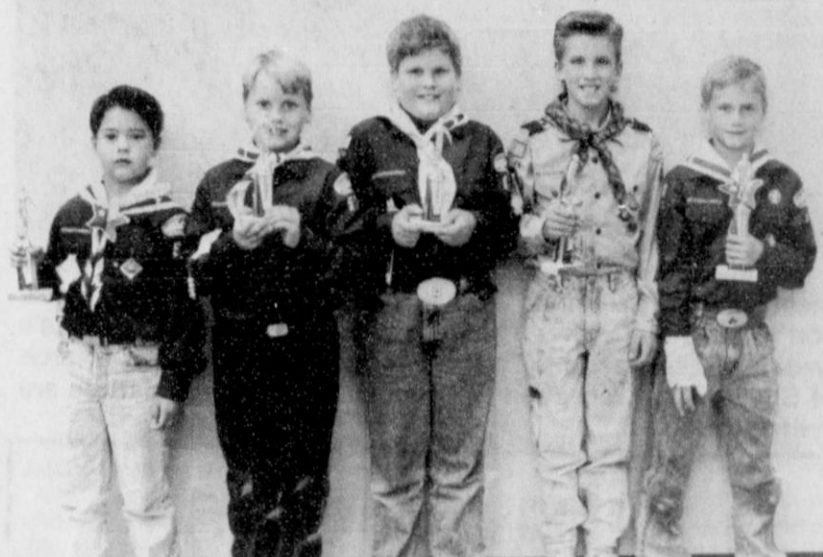
Several research instruments were developed and monitored through Texas A&M University over an 18-month period. They pinpointed areas of concern regarding the region's ability to bring industry and business into the area.

Training offered by Perryton police

PERRYTON - Perryton Police Department, in conjunction with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Panhandle Crisis Center, Denton County Crisis Center "Friends of the Family," and Ochiltree County Attorney's Office, will present a training program dealing with domestic violence.

The program, set for Saturday, June 22 at 9 a.m. in the Ochiltree County Expo Center, will present current and future trends concerning domestic violence, and specifically, the batterer and batterers' treatment issues and programs.

CEU's and TOOLESE credits will be available to all participants through the Perryton Police Department's In Service Training Academy. Tuition fee is \$10, and a Certificate of Training will be provided the day of attendance.

Person who should attend include mental health providers, medical care personnel, school officials and teachers, law enforcement personnel, and court officials. The program will also be of interest to the general public. All are invited and encouraged to attend.

Mark Sandel, M.S.S.W., will present the program. He is currently Director of Denton County's Friends of the Family batterers treatment program. He has designed, planned, and implemented Denton's current batterers intervention program. He co-authored the original grant application and has secured additional funding through local contract proposals in the Denton area.

dle east, primarily in offshore drilling.

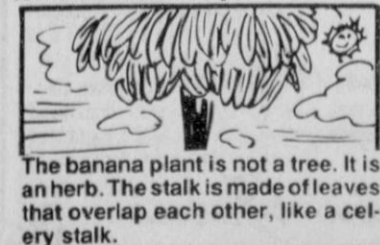

Mary and J.L. Brock, Kim's parents, for the first time since the arrival of their firstborn, will have none of their children living here.

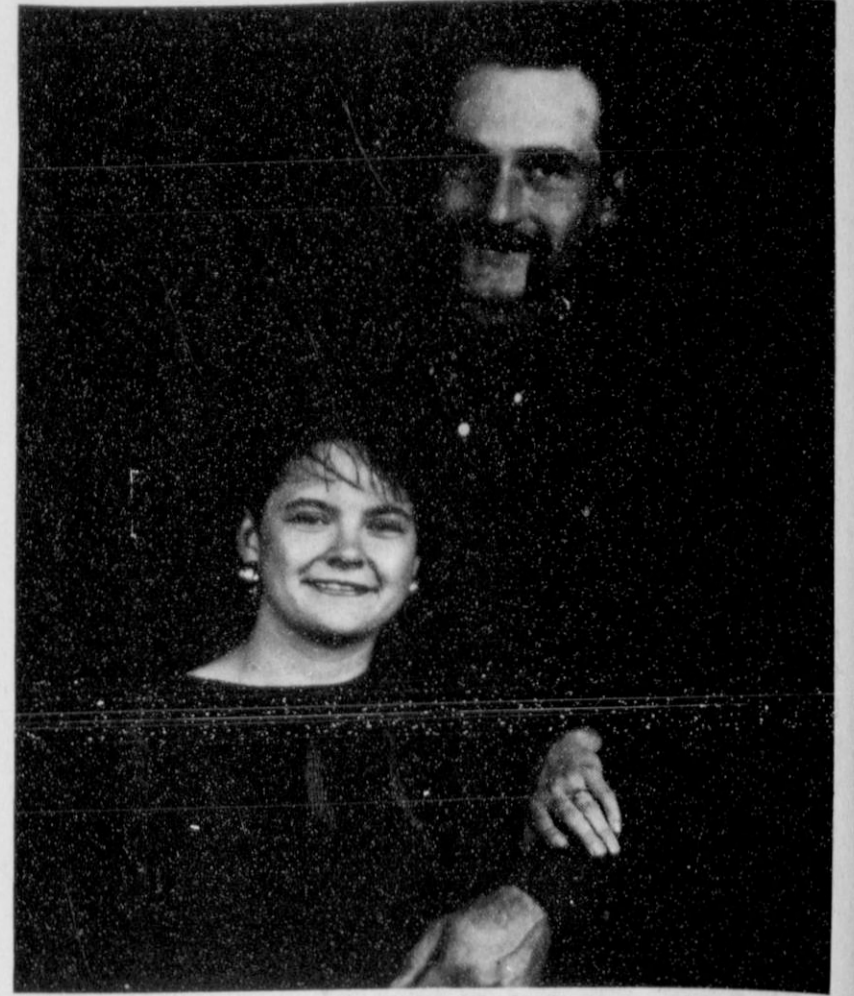

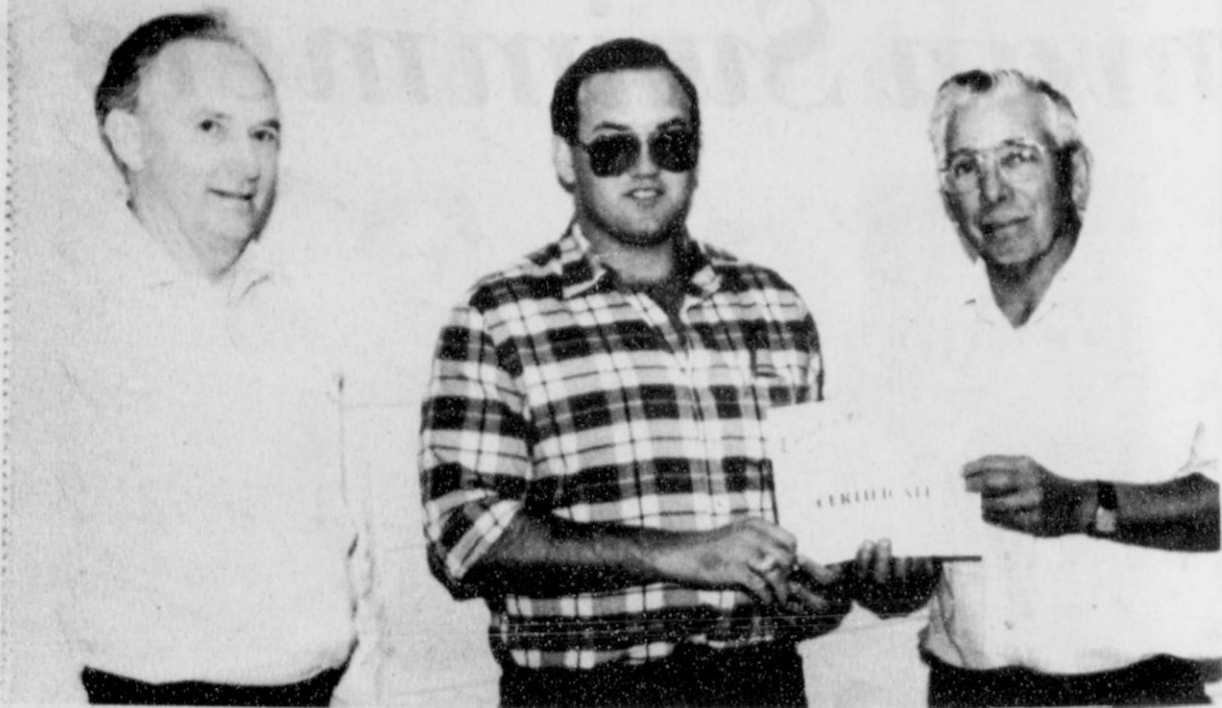

AUSTIN - Texas citizens and their families who have been struck by catastrophic or terminal illness must make many difficult decisions. The Texas Young Lawyers Association has produced a handbook to inform Texans of their rights and provide guidance when faced with these decisions.

The handbook, entitled "Practical Considerations in Dealing with Catastrophic or Terminal Illness," identifies and discusses issues which

deal with ensuring that patients' desires regarding health care and the continuation of life are met and carried out in a way which is acceptable to a health care provider.

Information on basic estate planning, guardianship, directives to physicians (living wills), and durable powers of attorney is included.

The handbook also addresses the growing cost of health care in sections about Medicaid and Medicare. Medical coverage under personal

and group insurance and through public services and community resources is also discussed. Tax considerations also apply to many planning situations involving a family member who is seriously ill and a separate section is devoted to this issue.

TDA distributes new hunter's directory

AUSTIN-The 1991 edition of the popular "Hunter's Clearinghouse Directory" is now available for distribution by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"The hunter's directory is an extensive listing of Texas landowners who lease their land for hunting and fishing," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

This year's directory features nearly 500 private landowners with about 750 leases covering more than 4 million acres. The listings specify the county where the lease is located, the number of acres, the type of game and amenities available, as well as other pertinent lease information.

Leases with whitetail deer, spring turkey, dove, quail, pheasant, duck, goose, javelina, and exotics are listed in the directory by region.

Copies of the directory have been distributed to local chambers of commerce and to individual hunters upon request.

To receive a copy of the directory, write to Hunter's Clearinghouse, TDA, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711 or call (512) 463-7642.

Because limited copies of the 1991 directory are available, TDA is asking the public to update last year's directory by requesting a copy of listings that have been added and removed from the 1990 edition.

Hunters interested in leases in a particular part of Texas can obtain exclusive listings from specific regions, including the Panhandle, South/Rolling Plains, West, Central, East, South and the Gulf Coast.

The Parks and Wildlife Department also distributes the "Texas Deer Hunting Lease Register," a list of landowners licensed to lease their land specifically for deer hunting.

In addition to private leases, Parks and Wildlife provides information on a variety of public hunting areas in Texas.

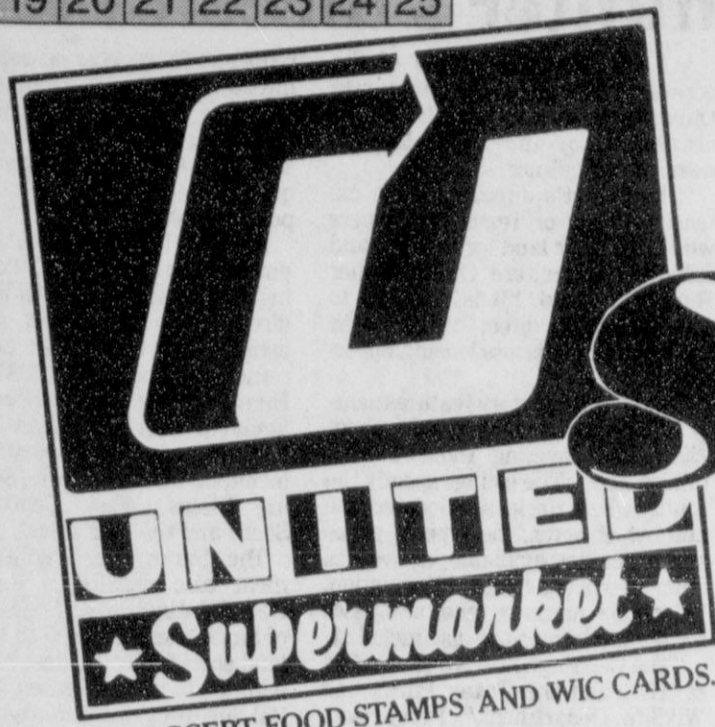
