Hansford County Residents Warned of **Telephone Scammers**

A warning to area residents has been given by Gruver Police Chief Dee Mayfield. of a possible telephone scam.

In information received by Chief Mayfield, two Gruver residents have been contacted concerning free federal grant money of up to \$25,000 being given to individuals.

The caller asks for banking information, such as the person's bank account number, as a step to receive the money.

"Residents are urged not to give their banking information to anyone who may contact then by phone," Mayfield said. "Once the scammer has your banking information, they will have access to your account.'

Chief Mayfield said that the website cited by the caller is a legitimate website, but is only used as a ploy by the caller in an effort obtain accounts numbers.

Suspect fraudulent calls may be reported to the Gruver or Spearman Police Office.

The victim of an aggravated kidnapping, Leslie Ford of Borger, is trying to prevent others from falling prey to crime by organizing a Crime Stoppers program for Hansford and Hemphill counties.

The new program, which is being coordinated by Lt. Dennis Burton of the Borger Police Force, seeks to stop criminal acts and protect innocent people by taking anonymous tips from the public.

"We want those phoning in to use a code name, as all tips are to be anonymous," Lt. Burton said. "No caller ID will be used on the crime stopper's call-in

Sheriff McFarlin Receives Texas Peacemaker Award

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin recently attended the Association Conference in Wichita Falls. During this conference, Sheriff McFarlin received the "Texas Peacemaker Award."

The Texas Peacemaker Award was established to honor a law enforcement professional that has exemplified, over their lifetime of public service, an extraordinary devotion to the public good and community which they have served and whose approach to law enforcement has been not only to maintain order, but bring justice. In support of the common good, they have endeavored to bring out the best in people, to recognize the dignity of others and to serve as role model and mentor for the younger generation of law enforcement officers. To go beyond being a lawman, to unite

as well as protect. This award was established in honor of the late Tieman H. Dippel, who served as Sheriff of Washington County from November 5, 1940-January 1, 1965, by Brenham National Bank. The award consists of an engraved plaque, State Resolution and five \$500 scholarships given by SAT in the recipients name.

In 1989, Sheriff McFarlin received the Tom Tellepsen Award. This award is named in

American. The Tellepsen Foundation, to honor his lifelong support of law enforcement, provides this award. The Foundation trustees unanimously approved the initial establishment of this award in 1975, and since that date, the Sheriff's Association of Texas, through its Officers and Board of Directors, has selected the outstanding individual in law enforcement who will be the recipient. The Award consists of a presentation by a member of the Tellepsen family on behalf of the Foundation, of \$2,000 and a plaque.

The Tellepsen Award is the highest of tributes to the individual who is selected as its recipient. The selection criterion includes the recognition of outstanding contributions to the advancement of law enforcement and criminal justice and honors more than ability and performance. The recipient, who must possess these qualities, must additionally have demonstrated the human element that engraves his name in the hearts of all the law enforcement community, a genuine love of the profession.

Also presented during the annual conference is the Lawman of the Year/Greg McFarlin-Max Banks Award. This Award was instituted at the close of the 1985 Annual Training Conference to recognize an outstanding law enforcement officer in the State of Texas. The Award was established in memory of Greg McFarlin, son of Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, Jr. and Kay McFarlin, who died at the age of 9 1/2, due to an unfortunate accident. Sheriff Howell was honored for his diligent efforts to find the mother of a baby found by the side of the road, wrapped in plastic, eleven years ago. Howell was Chief Deputy at

the time, and insisted that some of the baby's blood be held, to help with identification of the mother, if she were found. Sheriff Howell has never for-

gotten the baby girl, and periodically ran the blood through the system in hopes of finding a DNA match. His efforts payed off on June





Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District

August 26, 2004

To the Registered Voters of Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District:

The Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. Administration and Board of Trustees make every effort to be good stewards of your tax dollars and pledge to continue to do so in the future.

The Board of Trustees has proposed a 2004 tax rate of \$1.40 per \$100 valuation, which is 10 cents less than 2003's rate of \$1.50. Although the rate is less than last year, it is still above the rollback rate of \$1.12. The rollback rate is determined by the State based on previous year's revenues. The State says the District should be able to raise enough revenue to operate the school at the rollback rate, but it is simply not possible. The District, therefore, is forced into the rollback process. Extreme fluctuation in oil and gas values from year to year triggered this process.

The Board has proposed a tax rate of \$1.40 per \$100 valuation in order to meet the needs of the District. Besides salaries and routine maintenance, the budget includes a bus and a \$275,000 wealth equalization payment to the State. The effective tax rate of \$1.12 will not raise enough revenues to meet the budget.

This letter is to request your support in the September 11 rollback election. The election will provide Pringle-Morse CISD voters with the opportunity to approve the tax rate set by the Board of Trustees. This is a very important election for the school and the community. If the tax rate is not approved, the school will tax at the \$1.12 rate and will expend \$350,000 of the District's fund balance. The School Board zealously maintains the fund balance in order to ensure financial stability for the District.

Early voting began on Wednesday, August 25, 2004. Realizing how important the school is to the community, we know we can count on your support in the rollback election on September 11. Please do not hesitate to contact the school if you have any questions regarding this very important matter. Thank you for supporting Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. with a yes vote.

USDA Seeks Public Comment for CRP

In 2007, 16 million acres under CRP contract will expire. Another 6 million acres will follow in 2008, 4 million in 2009 and 2 million in 2010. President Bush's directive to offer early reenrollment and extensions of existing contracts to current CRP participants underscores a commitment to full enrollment of CRP up to 39.2 million acres.

A request for public comment on various aspects of CRP will be published in the Federal Register in early August 2004. Among other issues, USDA is seeking public comment on the following:

How to manage the large acreage set to expire from CRP;

How to manage future CRP sign-ups and acreage;

 How to evaluate the program's environmental effectiveness; · How to better utilize information technology such as Geographic Information Systems that evaluate acreage for enroll-

· How to improve CRP, including the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program, through partnerships that better address

local environmental issues.

Groundwater Leasing, Marketing and Sales Focus of September 14th Conference

COLLEGE STATION - Groundwater leasing, marketing and sales will be the focus of a conference Sept. 14 at the College of Forestry Conference Center at Stephen F. Austin State University, Nacogdoches.

The conference is designed for landowners, real estate agents, bankers, and members of soil and water conservation districts and groundwater conservation districts involved in groundwater transactions, said Dr. Ronald Kaiser, a Texas A&M University recreation, parks and tourism professor whose specialty is water marketing, law and policy.

Buying and leasing water is not a new idea. Landowners and cities have been buying and selling water for more than 100 years,"

"However, in the last five years, cities have increasingly sought to acquire groundwater from rural areas and move it to growing population centers. It is a hot topic, and the political and public interest is definitely up.

"East Texas has water," he said, "and there have proposals in the past to move water from East to Central and South Texas called Trans-Texas." Nothing happened with that because of political

Speakers include a number of experts and attorneys who deal with water issues. A question-and-answer forum will allow participants to interact with the experts. The conference will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m.

- Kaiser, the status of groundwater marketing in Texas.

- Russell Johnson, an attorney from San Antonio, ownership of Texas groundwater and landowners' rights to use and sell their

- Mary Sahs, an attorney from Austin, the powers and duties of groundwater districts regarding water sales and transfers and the fees that districts can charge when water is exported.



Workshop to Show How wildlife/Cattle Can Cohabit

FORT WORTH - Wildlife, beef cows and eco-tourists can all safely cohabit the same farm or ranch, and often to the advantage of the landowner's wallet, said a Texas Cooperative Extension

"It's possible, for example, to set aside small cover strips for bobwhite quail in a pasture. They may lose a little in pasture production, but in the long run, they'll be dollars ahead," said Ken Johnson, Extension agent agricultural and natural resources in Tarrant County.

Johnson is one of the speakers at an upcoming wildlife management workshop set Sept. 8-9 at the Tarrant County Extension

Office, 401 E. Eighth Street, Fort Worth.

The workshop was originally designed for absentee landowners

those living in the Fort Worth-Dallas area but retreating to rural land on the weekends. But the workshops have a lot to offer fulltime farmers too, Johnson said. Agricultural producers are aware of the benefits of wildlife man-

agement, whether for enjoyment or to reap extra income from hunting leases or eco-tourism. It's Johnson's observation, however, that many don't know where to start.

"They may have had this (wildlife management) in their mind for some time. They just don't know how to put all the pieces together," he said.

Most of the program presentations will not only show how to put existing pieces together, but also how to start a wildlife manage-

ment program from scratch. The workshop will start at 5 p.m. both days. The first evening's

program will include presentations on managing for quail, waterfowl, dove and feral hogs. Understanding and planning for the wildlife tax valuation will also be presented. Wildlife tax valuation is important for absentee landowners who

have recently bought agricultural land but have neither the time nor the inclination to raise cattle or crops, said Dr. Billy Higginbotham, one of those giving presentations. The wildlife tax valuation allows landowners whose property is

already listed as agricultural tax valuation to maintain the same tax rate, said Higginbotham, an Extension wildlife and fisheries specialist. Land appraised as agricultural land will have substantially reduced property taxes.

The second evening will include presentations on managing for large mouth bass and white-tailed deer. Other programs will go into detail on growing supplemental forage for deer and using remote sensing cameras for taking a deer census.

Those with a private pesticide applicator's licenses will earn two continuing education units.

Pre-registration is \$50 and must be received by Aug. 31 Registration after deadline and at the door will be \$75 per person.

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

PERRYTON -- A Perryton family and their community are mourning the loss of a son, brother and friend. Lance Corporal Seth Ryan Huston died on Saturday, along with two other Marines, after being hit by fire from Iraqi insurgents while on patrol in the Al Anbar Province, according to information from local veteran service officer Darrell Hickey.

Nineteen-year-old Seth believed his American duty was serving his country. He is the son of Steve and Renee Huston, both of whom served in the United States Navy.

Seth enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in 2002, and after graduating from Perryton High School in 2003, officially joined the

"He loved being a Marine; he was a good Marine," remembered Steven Huston, Seth's Father. "He was so proud every time he put

When Seth left for Iraq in March, his biggest fear was taking someone's life. But Seth's last call to the family bore the upsetting news that his fear had come true. Then, just three days later, the family got the news that Seth had

been killed Saturday, August 22nd, during fighting in the Al Anbar province. Seth was assigned to the Second Battalion, First Marine Regiment, First Marine Division of the First Marine Expeditionary

Force at Camp Pendleton, CA. Two other U.S soldiers were reported wounded in the attack. "Iraq was tough on Seth," said Renee Huston, Seth's mother, "but he never wavered in his commitment to his duty."

"I talked to him two days before he died," Renee said. "He said they were still getting mortar attacks.

"He's always been gung-ho and proud to be a Marine. But he said, 'We're tired; we want to come home.' They were just doing what they had to do to come home."

Seth was scheduled to come home in a little more than a month. "He said he was already packing up (to come home on leave)," Renee said. "He was leaving for Baghdad first week in October. He was really looking forward to coming home to do some deer hunt-

"We always told him, 'You do what you have to do to come home," Renee added. "He just didn't make it."

His dad says all he wants now is his son. "He's coming home, he's coming home," Steven cried.

Steven admits his other sons have taken on a big role. "I was going to be holding them up," Steven said. "I think they're doing

most of the holding. "Seth turned 19 in Iraq," Renee said. "He saw more at 19 than most of us have seen in our whole lives."

Flags across the county were flying at half staff Tuesday by order

of Ochiltree County Judge Kenneth Donahue. "I think everyone is feeling it," Donahue said of Huston's death.

"Little communities like this are a lot like a family. You know everyone and their families and you watch their kids grow up."

Seth's family has these memories and many more to hold on to knowing he died a hero.

"He's my hero, he's my best friend," Steven said. He is also survived by two brothers, Steven and Heath.

A memorial service is planned this Thursday, August 26, at 10 a.m. at Full Gospel Church, with Rev. Mike Waterbury and Rev. Marlon Sparks officiating.

Services with military honors will be held at a later date.

The young women's love of music is among the many things parents and friends will remember about them.

Mike Lunney, Wylie band director, recalled the sisters as hardworking and dedicated students. Jennifer was editor of the Wylie school newspaper and also par-

ticipated in several other activities, including varsity softball. Sabrina, who ran track and played flute and tenor saxophone, was named drum major her senior year in 1998-99, Lunney's first year at Wylie. She helped make the transition for him easier,

Lunney said. Jennifer, a French horn player, followed in her sister's footsteps as a drum major for Wylie.

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


The Hounds hope to run against the Riders but will take to the air if necessary, according to Coach Terry Felderhoff.



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
