Spearman City Council approves contribution for center parking lot

The Spearman City Council approved contributing \$54,000 to the Spearhead Corporation to help construct the parking lot at the new community center.

According to City Manager Kelvin Knauf when the Spearhead Corporation first planned the community center, the city made the commitment to contribute "in-kind services" towards the construction of the center. Such services included extending utilities to the center with

Knauf continued that after the city and Spearhead Corporation exchanged property extending the utilities was no longer needed. Acontract with the City of Gruver for Solid Waste Disposal was approved. The contract is for \$18.62

Council members authorized Mayor Burl Buchanan to order the city election for May 7, 1994. In this election, the two-year terms held by Alderman Don Reed, Alderman Charles Elliott and the mayor are up for election.

Knauf reported on the volunteer P.E.D.L. (parks, economic development and library) fee. He stated the \$2 collection on the utility bills has gone well with \$2,686 in November, \$2,526.23 in December, and \$2,500.93 in January. This fee is designated for park improvements, economic development projects and library services.

The council authorized Knauf to solicit for bids to contract the mowing of the airport and the majority of city parks. He explained that it is possible that contracting the mowing could be more cost efficient than the city mowing.

Council members approved the joining of Government Services Television Network (GSTN). This network was formed by the International City Management Association and develops training videos and distributes them monthly, according to Knauf. He stated that the videos can be shown to elected officials, managers, supervisors, employees and many can be broadcast over the public access cable channel. These videos can bring more training to the work place and be more cost effective than traveling to distant cities to attend certain training seminars.

Two new parks were named during the meeting. "Holton Park" is ocated at East B Avenue and North Endicott, while "Blodgett" is at Cotter Drive and County Road #2. Some play ground equipment has been placed at "Holton Park" and Blodgett" has some baseball back-

In regular business, the minutes and the monthly entity reports were approved. The council also approved paying the monthly bills in the amount of \$259,007.40.

City of Gruver approves 2.9% decrease in rates

The Gruver City Commission approved a 2.9 percent decrease overall in the electric rates of Southwestern Public Service Company during the regular meeting held Wednesday, Feb. 9.

City Manager A.J. Ratliff explained, "Each rate was changed. Some will go up, while most will go down. Overall it will be a 2.9 per-

In other business, the commission approved several contracts.

They approved a one year contract with Hansford County for jail services. Ratliff stated that the agreement is basically the same as last years. The agreement is for \$20 a day per inmate and \$4 per meal.

Another contract approved was entering into a solid waste management agreement with the City of Spearman. This agreement is also the same as the one last year.

according to Ratliff. This agreement states that the City of Gruver will pay \$16.82 per ton for the use of the dumping grounds.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford Appraisal District presented the audit for the last fiscal year and a refund check for \$158.72. Ratliff stated that the refund was for what was paid in operating expenses in 1993.

More business before the commission dealt with the General Election. The commission called for a General Election to be held May 7, 1994 to elect one City Commissioner. A.J. Ratliff was appointed as early voting judge; while Marilyn Been and David Rosser were appointed as clerks.

The commission passed Resolution 01-94 to accept a school bus as a gift from Gruver I.S.D.

In regular business, the minutes from the previous meeting were approved. Payment of the bills for the month of January were also approved.

Gruver I.S.D. Board of Trustees Call for Trustee Election May 7

The Gruver I.S.D. Board of Trustees called for a trustee election on May 7, 1994 during the regular meeting held Wednesday, Feb. 9.

According to Superintendent Barry Haenisch, two seats are expiring. Linda Venneman's term has expired. She has served one three year term. J.W. Ward's term is also expiring. He has served two three year terms on the board. Filing for the positions on the board opened Monday, Feb. 21, with applications for a position on the ballot being accepted through Wednesday, March 23. Early voting will begin on April 18 and ends on May 3.

In other business, the board dealt with personnel maters.

The board extended one year contracts for the 1994-95 school year for Mr. Lloyd Looper, high school principal; Mrs. Laura Blassingame, junior high principal; and Mr. Bob Burgoon, elementary principal. Mrs. Margaret Fry, the district's business manager also received a one year extension.

Mrs. Amy Babbs was employed to serve as the superintendent's secretary. A letter of resignation from Angie Dahl, who had served as the superintendent's secretary for seven years, was read. Angie and her family are moving to

Wimberley Texas. Alice Peddy of the Hansford County Appraisal District reported on the annual audit of the appraisal district's financial transactions. She also briefed the board on the laws concerning homestead exemptions, veteran exemptions and ag use reductions. The district then received a refund check in the amount of \$3,063.75. This amount represents the school district's portion of unused 1993 appraisal district funds.

Roy Mayhew, one of the Gifted and Talented teachers in the district, discussed the planned G/T trip to Colorado Springs on April 30, May 1 and May 2. While in Colorado Springs members of the junior high G/T class will tour NORAD (the North American Aerospace Defense Command), the Olympic Training Facility and the

The board approved Mike Babbs proposal to renew the insurance on property, liability and musical instruments. In this proposal, Babbs recommended a 3 percent increase in property coverage to \$7,908,798. The total premium for coverage is \$19,879.62 for the year, which represents a \$578.62 increase from last year.

Other business during the meeting included transferring the title of a surplus bus to the City of Gruver. It was explained that the city plans to use the bus in the volunteer fire department. The bus is not currently in running condition, but the volunteer firemen are planning to do the work necessary to get the vehicle running.



The program restores former wetlands converted to crop production and currently cropped wetlands to their natural state. The wetlands restoration protects habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife, improves water quality and increases ground water recharge. Under the program, USDA will purchase permanent easements on eligible lands in return for restoration and management of wetlands. In addition to purchasing wetland easements at the appraised agricultural value of the land, USDA will pay up to 75 percent of the

Eligible lands include former wetlands or existing wetlands that were cropped at least once between 1986 and 1990 and remain in a condition to be cropped. Also eligible are buffer areas of non-cropped wetland and upland that protect restored wetlands and eligible wetlands currently enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program.

ASCS and SCS will determine eligibility of both land and landowner during sign-up. Eligible landowners can sign an "intention" to enroll their land in WRP. After the sign-up period, environmental benefits and cost estimates of each intention will be compiled and sent to ASCS's national office in Washington, D.C. for ranking. 





For only the second time in the last 30 years, the Gruver Lady Hounds have advanced to the Regional Tournament in ladies basketball, by whipping the Sundown Roughettes this past Tuesday night 66-63 at the West Texas A&M Fieldhouse in Canyon. In 1963 and again in 1964, the ladies made it to the Regional Tournament in class A in Lubbock, and then in 1992 the Lady Hounds made it to the Regional Tournament, again in class A, at Levelland. This is their first trip in class AA, and the Regional Tournament, this year in AA will be held this Friday and Saturday, Feb. 25-26, on the campus of Abilene Christian University in Abilene. The Lady Hounds will play Wall at either 6:30 or 8 p.m. on Friday night. The regional championship game will take place at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Wall is the runner-up in district 6-AA. They defeated Van Horn 59-27 in bi-district, then defeated Albany 60-59 in their area game. Wall is a community located about 13 miles southeast of San Angelo, so they will be right home in Central Texas at Abilene. The four teams from Region I in AA that have made it to regionals this year are Gruver (28-5), Wall (24-8), Shallowater (24-7), and Tuscola Jim Ned (30-2). Four tough teams, and it will not be easy for the Lady Hounds to win the championship and advance to the State Tournament in Austin March 3-5.

Tuesday night Feb. 22 at "The Box" in Canyon, the Gruver gals manhandled the Sundown Roughettes, despite the close score, to win their area championship game. Coach Steve Myatt of the Lady Hounds had plenty to say.

"I have been playing, studying and coaching basketball since 1969, and this is the greatest display of courage, heart and pulling together as a team that I've ever seen. The team character, the will to win and overcome was the key. We're the only girls team in the state of Texas that could have won that game, under those circumstances.

The circumstances Coach Myatt was talking about were these. Gruver lost three of their top players, senior Mika McLain to injury

with 3.46 left in the third quarter, and a 12-point lead; senior Wynn Maupin to fouls with 3:13 left in the fourth quarter; and sophomore Molly McLain to fouls in the fourth quarter. Despite losing those key players the Gruver gals banded together in unison to overcome.

There were other circumstances. 12 of the first 14 fouls called in the

game were called on the Lady Hounds. 7 of the first 9 fouls in the second half were called on the Lady Hounds. All told, Sundown was 23. 27 from the free throw line, including 17-19 by star senior guard Kyna Cosby who scored 38 points; meanwhile Gruver was 8-13 from the charity stripe, a difference of 15 points at the free throw line. Hounds succumb to Lynx, but not without a fight

The Spearman Lynx defeated the Gruver Greyhounds in a district playoff game at Dumas this past Friday night February 18th, 59-56, for the 2nd seed in the playoffs from district 1-AA, but the Hounds neversay-die attitude reminds one of an old military creed, about never giving up - "I may go to Hell, but I'll crawl there like a Marine.'

The Hounds trailed by 19 points in the second quarter, then rallied to cut it to one point twice in the waning seconds. They went down fighting, and the Spearman Lynx knew they'd been in a battle.

Coach Tim Garland of the Hounds gave his synopsis of the game. "We started out slowly - our youth and inexperience showed," said Garland. More from Coach Garland. "We saw that we were capable coming out in the second half, and then played them our typical hard-nosed ball game. We battled back, and battled back. The kids were always believing they would get the job done, and as far as I'm concerned they did get the job done."

With 11 seconds left, the Hounds and Jace Dawson had calmly dribbled the ball down court, and got the ball in the corner to Roma Tomlinson. It was the shot they wanted. The shot bounced off the rim. Tomlinson took it hard, but he had no cause to do so, according to Coach Garland.

Coach Garland talked about that last shot by Tomlinson - a trey in an attempt to tie. "We couldn't ask for anything better. His character showed - he was willing to take the shot. It was a true and pure shot. I

had my best 3-point shooter taking the shot. If he'd taken the shot again, it may have gone in."

But give credit where credit is due, according to Garland. "Jason Varnon is an athlete. We did all that we could against him. When we pressured him he kicked it out to (Chad) Cook for a 3-pointer. They had the combination tonight that they didn't have in the first two district ball games. Varnon just hit his shots. He could pose some problems for Clarendon.'

Varnon single-handedly, it seemed, killed the Hounds. He scored 26 points, including 12 in the first quarter, but he was still hitting his shots in the fourth quarter. According to Coach Garland, "He is the best athlete in our district. The Lynx were very well prepared - Give Coach (Wendell) Neff credit, and they executed well."

Coach Garland concluded, "I'm extremely proud of my team. They're already talking about next year."

The Lynx jumped out to a 6-0 lead, and never trailed in the ball game. Thanks in large part to Varnon and Cook, they built a solid 32-13 lead in the 2nd quarter, with a run of ten consecutive points. It was 34-15, when the Hounds closed the half nicely, giving them much encouragement going into the locker room at halftime. They had scored six straight points on a Travis Ferguson 3-point play, and a Tomlinson trey. The score was 34-

But Varnon started each quarter smoking, and the 3rd was no exception. A bucket made it 36-21. But then the Hounds came to life, and outscored the Lynx 6-0 on a Wylee Maupin score from under the basket, a Jarrod Hoel jumper, and a Kenton Odom score from under the basket. It was 36-27. With the score 42-31, the Hounds

outscored the Lynx 7-3 to draw within 45-38. Toby Thompson had hit a 3-point play for the Lynx only

It was still a sizeable Lynx lead, 55-45, midway through the final quarter, when the Hounds really rallied. They outscored the Lynx 9-0 to close within 55-54. Ferguson had hit a driving layup, Sammy Renteria had a steal and a layup with 3:54 left, Ferguson had a steal and a layup with 3:41 left, Odom hit the first of a 1 and 1 situation with 3:20 left - then a big play. 
