Agco Rises From Tornado's Destruction

When Agco Buzzard Elevator of Spearman was destroyed by a tornado June 5, 2003, only two years after a tornado had destroyed Agco A Elevator, there was never any doubt in Jimmy Shieldknight's mind to

Relying on a philosophy that had served him well - turning bad luck into something good, Shieldknight had no hesitation in rebuilding what the tornado had devastated.

"We will build her back," Shieldknight said, "We owe it to our customers, family, and employees

He told his eldest daughter, Marcia, "We will not miss a paycheck to our employees.'

Shieldknight, known for his persistence, often told his children, "If you start something, finish it.

And Shieldknight did just that. On September 18, less than four months after the storm's devastation, Agco Buzzard Elevator was rebuilt with greater storage capacity and new innovations for faster and more efficient grain handling. The completion was a bitter sweet time for the Shieldknight family with the death of Jimmy Shieldknight on September 4,

But Agco Elevators is only a chapter in the story of Shieldknight's life and legacy. His story is characterized by the merits of hard work, strong family ties, persistence, and trust.

Shieldknight was just ten when his family moved to Spearman to start a new life. The dream of the family dimmed when Shieldknight's father died only two years after the relocation. His mother, a noted seamstress, worked at the cleaners to help provide for the family, and young Shieldknight eventually became a butcher in a local grocery.

But changes were on the horizon for the young man.

"My mother and dad were married in July 1947, and shortly after that time, he began to work on my granddad's (George Buzzard) farm," said Charles Shieldknight, Jimmy's eldest

In 1957, Shieldknight began work at Excel Chevrolet, located at the present site of Hansford County Library. His work at the dealership also brought him in contact with owner Erlis Pittman, a man whom Shieldknight would have a working relationship and partnership at different times in his life - not only in the car dealership but also in grain elevators, cattle and the Pittman-Shieldknight office building.

Although details vary on how Shieldknight went from shop worker to dealer of Excel Chevrolet, the fact is evident that Shieldknight and Pittman meshed as a team.

"Jimmy (Shieldknight) and my dad had very different personalities, but in business, they complemented each other," said Frank Pittman, son of Erlis

Frank Pittman's remembrance of the story is that when the elder Pittman's partnership in Excel Chevrolet did not work out, Pittman walked to the shop of the business where Jimmy Shieldknight was working

"He asked Jimmy if he would like to run the place. When he said 'Yes,' he (Erlis) threw Jimmy the keys to the front door and said 'Don't call me,'" Pittman said. "I think my dad was looking for someone who could take care of things on their own, and he felt Jimmy was a man who could do that.'

Shieldknight's son Fred remembers the partnership beginning on a trip to Oklahoma

City.
"Erlis called and told my dad to be ready early one morning to go to Oklahoma City with him. After they arrived, Erlis talked to Chevrolet executives there and told them of his firing of his dealer and his desire to have my dad take the dealer's place," Fred Shieldknight said.

The exec said that was fine but since Dad had no experience, it might be a good idea for him to have a six week dealership course in Detroit, which

my dad took. Shieldknight eventually bought half of the dealership with Erlis Pittman telling Shieldknight to "Pay me when

The dealership was sold to Gerald Heinrick in 1977. After four years in the business, Heinrick gold the business, Heinrick sold the business back to Shieldknight and his son-inlaw Dick Gillaspie, who later became sole owner until part-nering with Jeff Beedy in 1998.

A new era in Shieldknight's career came in 1970 with the buying of a former cotton gin, which had been made into a feed mill by Bozie Hays.

"The business was used by our family as a feed mill and an elevator," Charles Shieldknight

In 1977, Shieldknight with Lloyd Buzzard and Punk Jackson, bought the Four Tex Elevator which was owned by Buzzard, Jackson, Earl Novak, and Pat Patterson.

The business, which became known as Agco of Spearman, expanded in 1980 with the building of the Buzzard Elevator. Eventually Shieldknight bought out his partners (except Pittman) in Agco of Spearman, and in 1986, became the general manager of the elevators. The Shieldknight family became the sole owners of Agco of Spearman in 2000.

With the return of Jimmy and

With the return of Jimmy and Lois Shieldknight's grandchildren over the past several years, each has become a part of the business, assuming designated areas of responsibility based on their individual interests and expertise.

"Each of us has an area of responsibility. We trust each other to take care of their part.' Fred Shieldknight said.

Today, Charles Shieldknight manages Agco Elevators with his brother Fred handling farming interests, and other family members assisting.

In a time when many family businesses fail, the Shieldknights have an amicable and smooth-running family

"Everyone supports one another," Shieldknight's daughter Leann Gillaspie said, "There is a bond of trust. Everyone does his part. Growing up we all worked together and were best

Lois Shieldknight echoed the sentiment of her children, "Our family has always worked together. We taught our children to work.

Marcia Shieldknight agrees, "It started when we were young - we did things together; we supported each other. Times were not always good, but hardships mold commitment. Mom and Dad were the catalysts.'



A friend sent me the following stories and I thought you might enjoy them.

Story Number One Many years ago, Al Capone virtually owned Chicago. Capone wasn't famous for anything heroic. He was notorious for enmeshing the windy city in

everything from bootlegged booze and prostitution to murder.

Capone had a lawyer nicknamed "Easy Eddie." He was his lawyer for a good reason. Eddie was very good! In fact, Eddie's skill at legal maneuvering kept Big Al out of jail for a long time.

To show his appreciation, Capone paid him very well. Not only was the money big, but also Eddie got special dividends. For instance, he and his family occupied a fenced-in mansion with live-in help and all of the conveniences of the day.

The estate was so large that it filled an entire Chicago City block. Eddie lived the high life of the Chicago mob and gave little consideration to the atrocity that went on around him. Eddie did have one soft

spot, however.

He had a son that he loved dearly. Eddie saw to it that his young son had the best of everything: clothes, cars and a good education. Nothing was withheld. Price was no object. And, despite his involvement with organized crime, Eddie even tried to teach him right from wrong. Eddie wanted his son to be a better man than he was.

Yet, with all his wealth and influence, there were two things he couldn't give his son; he couldn't pass on a good name and a good example. One day, Easy Eddie reached a difficult decision. Easy Eddie wanted to rectify wrongs he had done. He decided he would go to the authorities and tell the truth about Al "Scarface" Capone, clean up his tarnished name and offer his son some semblance of integrity. To do this, he would have

The Mob, and he knew that the cost would be great. So, he testified. Within the year, Easy Eddie's life ended in a blaze of gunfire on a lonely Chicago Street. But in his eyes, he had given his son the greatest gift he had to offer, at the greatest price he would ever pay. Story Number Two

World War II produced many heroes. One such man was Lieutenant Commander Butch O'Hare. He was a fighter pilot assigned to the aircraft carrier Lexington in the South Pacific.

One day his entire squadron was sent on a mission. After he was airborne, he looked at his fuel gauge and realized that someone had forgotten to top off his fuel tank. He would not have enough fuel to complete his mission and get back to his ship. His flight leader told him to return to the carrier. Reluctantly, he dropped out of formation and headed back to the fleet.

As he was returning to the mother ship he saw something that turned his blood cold A squadron of Japanese aircraft were speeding their way toward the American fleet. The American fighters were gone on a sortie, and the fleet was all but defenseless. He couldn't reach his squadron and bring them back in time to save the fleet.

Nor could he warn the fleet of the approaching dan-

ger. There was only one thing to do.

He must somehow divert them from the fleet. Laying aside all thoughts of personal safety, he dove into the formation of Japanese planes. Wing-mounted 50 caliber's blazed as he charged in, attacking one surprised enemy plane and then another. Butch wove in and out of the now broken formation and fired at as many planes as possible until all his ammunition was finally spent. Undaunted, he continued the assault.

He dove at the planes, trying to clip a wing or tail in hopes of damaging as many enemy planes as possible and rendering them unfit to fly. Finally, the exasperated Japanese squadron took off in another direction.

Deeply relieved, Butch O'Hare and his tattered fighter limped back to the carrier. Upon arrival he reported in and related the event surrounding his return. The film from the gun-camera mounted on his plane told the tale. It showed the extent of Butch's daring attempt to protect h! is fleet . He had in fact destroyed five enemy aircraft.

This took place on February 20, 1942, and for that action Butch became the Navy's first Ace of W.W.II, and the first Naval Aviator to win the Congressional Medal of Honor. A year later Butch was killed in aerial combat at the age of 29. His home town would not allow the memory of this WW II hero to fade, and today, O'Hare Airport in Chicago is named in tribute to the courage of this great man.

So, what do these two stories have to do with each other? Butch O'Hare was Easy Eddie's son.



Spearman Recognized For Recycling Effort

November 15, 2003 was Texas Recycles Day, which was also adopted as "America Recycles Day." The day was established to acknowledge the many efforts made across the State and nation to conserve precious resources through recycling.
Since many Panhandle communities are significantly contribut-

ing to this effort, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) would like to recognize Panhandle communities that have, through the Panhandle Environmental Partnership (PEP), demonstrated a street of a street o strated a strong commitment to recycling and waste diversion efforts through the past year. Two PEP awards are given annually to recognize individual communities' exemplary efforts.

The annual Recycling Award is granted to the municipality that recycles the most pounds of materials per capita each year. The 2003 recipient of the Recycling Award is the City of Canadian for recycling 196.55 pounds of materials for each resident of that community. Canadian has recycled 177.9 tons f scrap metal, 11.44 tons of newsprint, 27.73 tons of cardboard, and 2.38 tons of other materials. rials. Following in a close second and third were the City of Stratford with 186.91 and the City of Spearman with 194.67 pounds of materials for each resident.

The annual Wood/Yard Waste Diversion Award is given to the municipality who diverts the highest per capita amount of wood and yard waste from the regions landfills in a given year. The 2003 recipient of the Wood/Yard Waste Diversion Award is the City of Dalhart for diverting 252.82 pounds per capita of yard and wood waste from its landfill through chipping and composting programs. Following in a close second was the City of Amarillo with 246.18 pounds of wood waste diverted for each resident.





Amarillo Agency, Panhandle Crisis Center Receive Funds

Grants made to Family Support Services in Amarillo and Panhandle Crisis Center in Perryton aim to benefit children and divorced parents across the

The nonprofit agencies shared in \$500,000 of statewide funding for services that help noncustodial parents maintain meaningful contact with their children, the state attorney general announced Wednesday. The General's Child Support Division administers the Access and Visitation grants.

Approved services include mediation, visitation enforcement, supervised visitation, counseling and parenting educa-

Family Support Services in Amarillo will use its almost \$18,000 grant to continue fund-

ery group, parental counseling and supervised visitation, said Roy Bowen, executive director of the agency.

"This money is really an attempt to do something different. It's about accessibility to services. It's about reaching out to these young kids," Bowen

Some of those children participate in Rollercoasters, a children's divorce-recovery group, Bowen said.

The agency works with school counselors to select the neediest children, and those are divided into age groups. About 10 to 15 children in each group meet at school for eight weeks, Bowen said.

This is a wonderful way - in bringing this to the school - to work with school counselors and make sure these kids get the

The Panhandle Crisis Center will use its almost \$14,000 in funds to provide supervised visits for noncustodial parents, parenting classes and family mediation, said Cindy Smith, executive director of the agency.

The agency has used this funding for at least three years,

"It (the grant) allows us to offer programs to the general public," she said. "Most of our other funds go to victims of vio-

The crisis center, opened in 1984, generally serves victims of sexual assault, Smith said. The agency serves about 60 to 80 clients each year.

The attorney general's office will reimburse the center monthly until it has spent its grant amount, Smith said.



Panhandle Crisis Center Seeks Volunteers

The Panhandle Crisis Center, a nonprofit organization, is located at 317 South Main Street in Perryton. The new outreach office is located in the Pittman-Shieldknight Office Building, at 511 SW 11th Street in Spearman. Formed in 1981 by a group of concerned citizens, the Crisis Center serves victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Hansford, Lipscomb and Ochiltree

Along with a 24-hour hotline, the Crisis Center provides counseling, emergency shelter, transportation and emergency food and clothing. Also offered are referral services for adult (male and female) and child victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

Trained volunteers and staff conduct individual adult and child counseling. Follow up and walk-in counseling are available in the Perryton and Spearman offices and at designated outreach areas in Hansford and Lipscomb Counties. A full-time children's worker is located in the Perryton Office; this worker also goes into the Perryton school district to counsel with children. A new part-time worker has been hired for Hansford County. She will be working with children in Spearman and Gruver and counseling with the children in the Spearman and Gruver school district. The Hansford/Lipscomb outreach worker counsels with adults in the Hansford County area and adults and children in the Lipscomb area.

Advocacy and accompaniment through the medical, legal and judicial system are provided to clients as individual needs arise. The crisis center works with the Hansford, Lipscomb, and

Ochiltree County District Attorneys office in preparing protective orders.

Crisis Center staff and on-call volunteers work closely with the police departments and sheriff's office in all three counties - as many times they are the first ones the victim calls for help.

Counseling and support groups are conducted in both English and Spanish. Parenting classes are held on Tuesday evenings from 6-8 p.m. at the Trinity Presbyterian Church located at 18th and Drake in Perryton. Batterers Intervention Prevention Program Classes meet on Thursday nights from 7-9 p.m.

Even though the Crisis Center has closed the old post office for remodeling, they are still providing furniture and clothing to clients using a house located on Baylor Street. A limited amount of donations are being taken at this time.

United Supermarket of Perryton donates food items to the Crisis Center. The items are used at the Center's 24-hour shelter and at the Office as an emergency food source for clients.

All victims' services offered through the Crisis Center are free except the BIPP classes, which are based on a sliding fee. The Crisis Center is able to provide services free of charge through federal and state grants, private donations, fundraisers, city and county funds, United Way donations and the use of trained volunteers.
