
I then explained to them about how here in Texas if you get your oil changed at a service station that you have to pay a "disposal" fee for your oil filter.



Sharp Delivers March Sales Tax

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, delivered a total of \$151.2 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,086 Texas cities and 117 counties on Friday,

March 14, 1997. "Sales tax rebates to Texas cities and counties are 6.4 percent higher for the first three months of 1997 than for the same period last year, as consumers continue to show their confidence in a healthy Texas economy," Sharp said.

Sharp delivered sales tax rebates to Texas cities totaling \$137.8 million, 5.3 percent above last year's March payments of \$130.8 million. Rebates of \$13.3 million to Texas counties were virtually unchanged from county

allocations in March 1996.

The net payment this period for Gruver was \$8,079.10, compared to \$9,129.05 for the same period last year, an 11.5% decrease. 1997 payments to date total \$26,251.88, compared to \$24,720.70 for the same period in 1996, a 6.19%

The net payment this period for Spearman was \$33,872.17, compared to \$15,158.02 for the same period last year, a 123.46% increase. 1997 payments to date total \$92,781.26, compared to \$43,969.36 for the same period in 1996, a 111.01% increase.

This month's payments include sales taxes collected in January and reported by businesses filing monthly returns in February.







write a guest column for Museum Musings, I began to try to decide what to write about. I made a trip to the Museum to see if something there would give me an idea. While looking back over my notes, realized the same theme ran

through all of them--memories. I saw wonderful old quilts and remembered my Mother sitting early and late stitching away at the intricate pieces and once saying, " I don't have time to quilt for pretty; I just quilt for warm." Her quilts were lovely none-the-less!

I remember the year our house burned. Friends and neighbors took time from spring gardens and busy lives to hold quiltings until eight quilts were finished for our family. I also remember the days when Mother was busy, my brothers were in school, and I spent the day in bed with the measles or some other illness. I passed the time by "reading" the quilt tops on my bed. The pieces were cut from the fabric of clothing made for our family. I would think of all the memories they held. One fabric was from grandmother's split bonnet that she wore the days she picked blackberries and when she and I went fishing by ourselves. There were pieces from little brothers' shirts that made me remember the wild, funny, and dangerous things they did. Don't laugh until you've tried reading a quilt!

The old irons brought back the memories of Mother teaching me to iron with a sad iron when I was just tall enough to iron on the seat of a chair. She taught me to do it with pride and pleasure in a job

In the kitchen area, the cooking and canning utensils held lots of memories. On this cold January day, I could almost feel the heat of summer canning, made easier by the fact that I could listen in on the conversations of my mother and her sisters. These conversations taught me a lot about compassion, humor, and all the other things a daughter needs to know while growing up.

The curling iron, resting in the lamp chimney, brought back memories of my daddy's sisters, the southern bells of the family, smelling of face powder, lilacs, and lavender. They were endlessly interested in what new potions would fade my freckles and tame my wild hair. I laugh now at some of the things they tried. I am amazed that some of these things have been proven to

work and are used today. The old typewriter and business machines have a special place in my memories. Even the smell of the oil that was used on them takes me back to early visits to my mother's oldest sister who went to Washington D. C. to work in the Pentagon during the war. She then went to the National Archives to work for the rest of her life. This aunt did not let very many days go by without writing to me or sending a little package. I never heard a word of preaching from her, but through her involvement in my life, I learned I was a person in my own right and could do anything I really wanted to do.

I saw the old photos and picture albums. I saw that others had was. I can still see the sweetbemused expressions I found on their faces as they listened to whatever I had to say. The hugs, the encouragement, the sympathy, and the comfort they extended to me is always with me. Now when I see my own children doing these same things for the children in our family, I know the legacy of what it really means to be a family is being passed on.

Take a trip to the museum! Remember the good things! It will make the world a better place. I once read that if you want to know how to deal with the future, remember and learn from your past. See again what a wonderful legacy we have inherited!

And yet, something as good as gold did come from Saturday. "I wanted to win---that was my main goal--but I wanted a good time," Brock said.

Brock's time was certainly good enough to make her a high school All American for the second year. And she plans to swim her favorite race, the 200 meter breaststroke, which they don't have in high school, at the U.S. Nationals in Nashville in July.






The Gruver Tennis Team won their own tournament this weekend with a score of 89 over Dumas, Sunray, and Dalhart.
