

this prize was given in a drawing. The tickets purchased to admit people to Casino Nite were all placed in the drawing and a lucky winner was chosen.


Other festivities throughout the night included bidding at the silent auction, blackjack, dice and the "Casino Bucks" drawings.

### H.C. Commissioner's Court approves security fees

Courthouse security fees were discussed and approved during the regular meeting of the Hansford

County Commissioner's Court on Monday, Oct. 11.

According to Hansford County Judge Jim Brown it is mandatory for a fee to be collected on criminal cases and optional on civil cases filed in District Court. He continued, "No fee was implemented on civil cases at the present time." For criminal cases filed in District and County Court there is a \$5 courthouse security fee for felonies and a \$3 fee for misdemeanors. These fees are implemented upon conviction, Brown stated. He explained that the money goes into a courthouse security fund and it can only be used for that purpose.

In other business, the commissioners entered into executive ses-

sion to discuss pending litigation with the Juvenile Board. Upon opening the meeting to the public, the commissioners authorized the attorney representing Hansford County in pending litigation to enter into negotiations with the plaintiffs within the insurance policy limits, County Clerk Amelia Johnson said.

The commissioners approved the appointment of Dennis Stedje as the Hansford County Appraisal District Board Member. Brown explained that Stedje must also be approved by the other taxing enti-

A bond was approved for Clerk's Deputy Verna Gail Keim.

The court also approved advertising for bids for a Sheriff's car.

In regular business the minutes were approved, the treasurer's report and investments were approved, and the payment of the bills for the period were approved.

\* Grade School and Younger. Become a model money manager; set an example worth following. Give your child a regular allowance; allowances are tools for learning to budget and save; allowances are not prizes for star performance or punishment for inappropriate behavior. Encourage the habit of saving money; by age eight or nine, children should be saving a part of their allowance. Find opportunities to describe how money works, talk about cost comparisons and how a desired item may cost as much as a family's food bill.

Teen Perspective on Money

Each year, the College for Financial Planning conducts a High School Financial Awareness Survey. The 1992 findings report that 45 percent of high school students surveyed were dissatisfied with saving; 44 percent were not saving from income; 38 percent said they contributed to family household expenses; 48 percent worry about paying off debts/bills; 47 percent are saving for education; and 45% are meeting car expenses.



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
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


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### Hound Junior High Roundup
