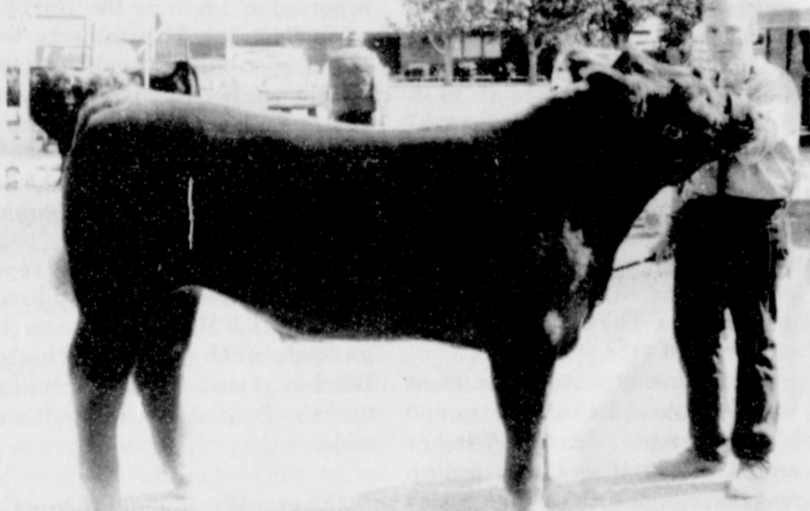

Teaching Money Skills--A Parent's Job

One of the most important tasks parents face is teaching kids the skills they'll need to manage money effectively.

Count yourself fortunate if your children attend a school where they have an opportunity to learn basic money management. But that is not always the case.

Parents worry if their children will make it financially in the decades ahead. The economy may be

unpredictable, but youngsters who know how to make good financial decisions and exercise discipline will be leagues ahead of those who don't.

A study conducted by Dr. Jerry Mason, associate professor of financial planning at Texas Tech University and Extension family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service found that high school students know less today about financial topics than did high schoolers 30 years ago.

Money Magazine recently interviewed financial experts for their ideas on age-appropriate rules parents can follow in developing kids' financial management skills. These are the recommendations:

* Grade School and Younger.

Become a model money manager; set an example worth following. Give your child a regular allowance; allowances are tools for learning to budget and save; allowances are not prizes for star performance or punishment for inappropriate behavior. Encourage the habit of saving money; by age eight or nine, children should be saving a part of their allowance. Find opportunities to describe how money works, talk about cost comparisons and how a desired item may cost as much as a family's food bill.

* Teens Gradually give your teen a larger allowance and freer rein on spending; a monthly instead of a weekly allowance is recommended because it requires more careful planning. Teach basic investing concepts; buying a share in a company whose product or service is well known can promote in-

terest in learning how the stock market works. Help kids to broaden their experience base and work habits through summer jobs, travel and part-time after-school work. Discuss how the family will pay college bills; by the junior year, the whole family should be planning together.

* College Age. Arrange for your child to receive money from you; discuss expectations for handling finances, especially if a credit card is part of the deal. Be aware that kids are most likely to drop out of school during the freshman year, so requiring kids to work long hours that first year may not be wise. Encourage kids to explore career possibilities during college through internship or cooperative programs and other arrangements.

* Boomerangs. Boomerangs are the ones who come back. This is a growing phenomenon, with about 43 percent of 20 to 24 year olds still living at home. It is important to set ground rules; decide who pays for what and what the adult child's financial contribution to the maintenance of the household will be.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in partnership with the College for Financial Planning, makes available a free, curriculum enrichment program called The High School Financial Planning Program. The program covers six money management units and targets high school juniors and seniors.

Teen Spending Power

Last year, teens spent \$93 billion, according to market research conducted by Teenage Research, Unlimited. What did they spend it on? Food, clothing and entertainment. More than half of the teens saved no money at all. The firm also found that the average net weekly income for high school juniors and seniors was \$105. \$20 came from allowance and \$85 from job earnings.

Teen Perspective on Money

Each year, the College for Financial Planning conducts a High School Financial Awareness Survey. The 1992 findings report that 45 percent of high school students surveyed were dissatisfied with saving; 44 percent were not saving from income; 38 percent said they contributed to family household expenses; 48 percent worry about paying off debts/bills; 47 percent are saving for education; and 45 percent are meeting car expenses.

Cozy, cotton, selffringed afghans (or throws), which have added charm to our decorating have a renewed spirit this fall as a fabric for the fashionable shawl collar jacket. They are seen in hip length jacket, vest, and short vest version. Seen in ready to wear stores and crafter's malls for a higher price, each can be made for the cost of the afghan plus a few notions.

The class will cost \$35.00 for the afghan and pattern. Afghans in a variety of styles are being purchased because the layout of the jacket can not be done on some styles and throws. 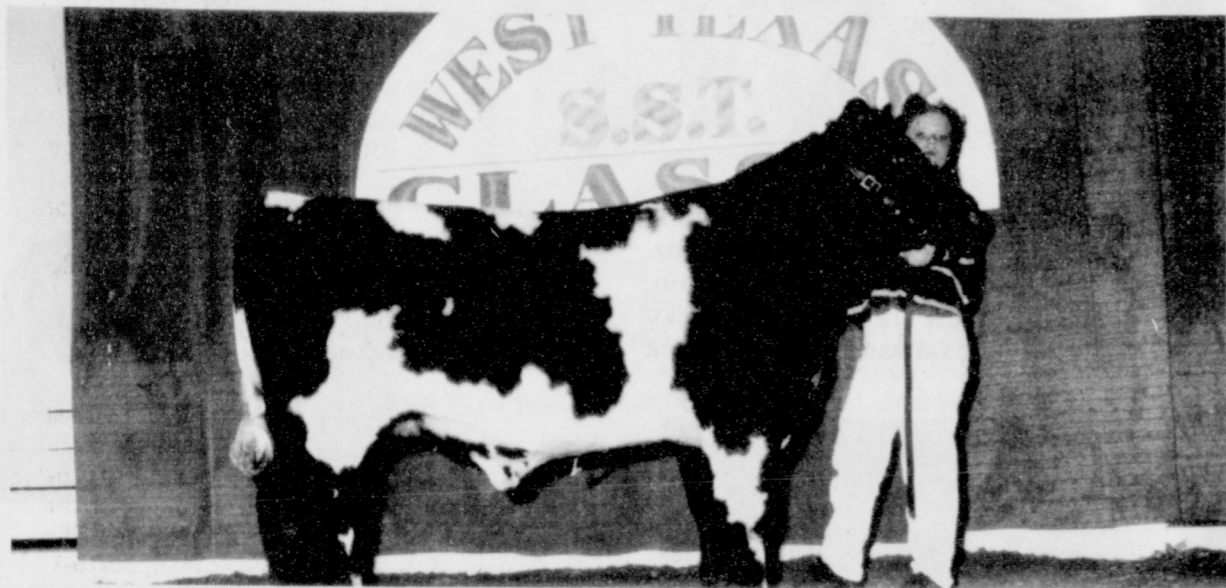

The Spearman Lynx roared past the Gruver Greyhounds in district football play Friday, Oct. 9.

When the Lynx arrived at Greyhound Stadium, Hansford County fans were set for a tough game. In the first quarter Spearman scored two touchdowns, while Gruver was held scoreless.

On defense, the Lynx recovered one fumble and had two interceptions. Garcia recovered the fumble. Vanderburg and Brad Law each had one interception. The Lynx had 44 assisted tackles and 11 unassisted tackles.

The Lynx will play the Sunray Bobcats Friday, Oct 15, at Lynx Stadium. The kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. Coach Smith had this to say about the upcoming match. "Sunray is a tough ball club. They have good running backs, a big fullback that is hard to bring down, and their half backs have a lot of speed." He concluded, "It'll take another big ball game this week for us to continue our winning ways."

Whitefield completes recruit training

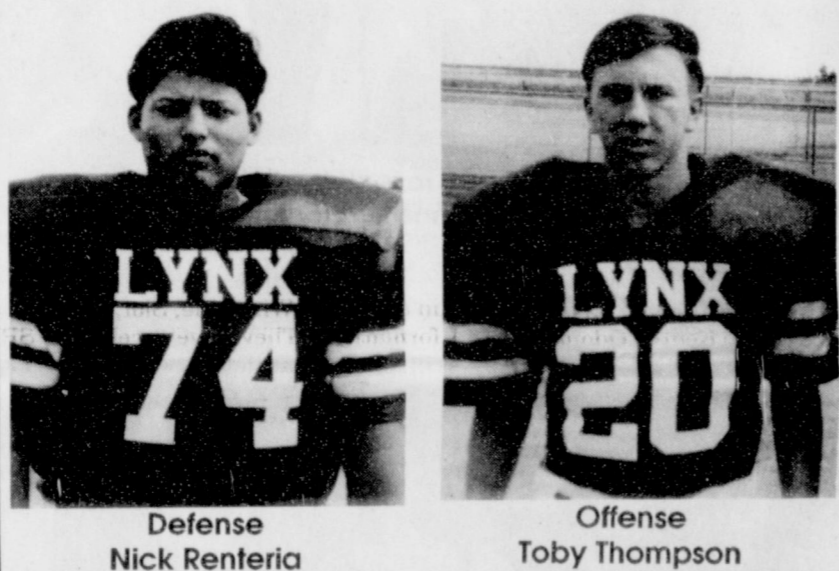
Marine Pfc. Michael L. Whitefield, son of Donlane Whitefield of Spearman, Texas, recently completed recruit training and was promoted to his present rank.

These steps are outlined in a brochure the AHA is offering participants during its annual nutritional awareness event known as HeartFest (formerly called Food Festival), held at more than 6,000 grocery stores nationwide Oct. 11-17.

The brochure, "How To Shop Smart To Help Your Heart," will contain coupons for sponsor's low-fat food products.

"With all of the low-fat and non-fat products on the market today, it's easy to simply substitute regular products like yogurt, salad dressing, mayonnaise and cheese for low-fat varieties," said Frances Williams, communication chairman,

H.C. Division. "You can save a great deal of fat just by switching from fatty cuts of meat to lean cuts. Or by eating low-fat frozen yogurt instead of ice cream. Or bagels instead of biscuits. The list is almost endless -- and it's not hard to do."

When you reduce your intake of total fat, saturated fats, and cholesterol, you can reduce your blood cholesterol, and thus your risk of developing heart disease. A high level of blood cholesterol is a major risk factor for heart attack.

"Participants at HeartFest can also learn how to read the new food label required of food manufacturers by the Food and Drug Administration," said Williams. "This new label will make it much easier to find the fat in prepared foods and to plan a low-fat menu."

The AHA recommends that total

fat intake be less than 30 percent of calories eaten each day, and that saturated fat be less than 10 percent of total calories. Cholesterol intake should not exceed 300 milligrams a day, and sodium intake should not exceed 3,000 milligrams a day.

The AHA is the nation's voluntary health organization dedicated to reducing disability and death from cardiovascular diseases and stroke which kill more than one million American men and women. Last year the AHA spent more than \$232 million for research support, public and professional education, and community programs.

H.C.H. Physical Therapy patient tells success story

People that receive serious injuries often find themselves need special care and therapy to help them recuperate.

Mildred Langford of Amarillo recently found herself in this predicament in August when she broke her right hip while grocery shopping. She required after care in a skilled facility. After much consideration, Mildred decided to come to the Hansford Manor. "It was a skilled facility with excellent references," Mildred stated. She explained that another added advantage to the Hansford Manor was that her granddaughter, Kitty Edwards, lives across the street.

Mildred arrived at the Hansford Manor on August 19. According to Carol Dunnihoo, director of physical therapy, Mildred had to be totally non-weight bearing on her hip. She continued that this causes recovery to take longer. "Patients have to learn to get around without applying weight to this area," Dunnihoo said.

Mildred went through several difference training exercises during her stay at the manor. These exercises included bed mobility, transfer mobility, wheelchair mobility, strengthening exercises, and gait (walking) training.

"Recovery here is great," Bobbi Hart, Mildred's daughter stated. "It would have been an impossibil-

ity for us to have all the convenience and the one-on-one relationship at a facility in Amarillo."

Mildred said that the hardest part for her was not being able to put weight on her right leg. "It didn't take me long to figure out I couldn't do it," she added. For a time she had to hop on one leg. "I got good at the bunny hop," she stated.

When Mildred speaks of the manor she smiles. "It feels like home to me now," she beams. Continuing she states, "After being here, I would give it (the Hansford Manor) an excellent reference."

Mildred has other connections to this area. She is a third generation Texas Panhandle ranching family and lived in Gruver for several years. She also has many friends and family members in Hansford County.

"Hansford County is fortunate to have a physical therapist like Carol Dunnihoo in Spearman. The one-on-one patient relationship is something that you wouldn't get at a larger facility," Mildred stated.

Mitzi Mires, physical therapy assistant, also added to Mildred's recovery. She worked with Mildred a lot, Dunnihoo stated.

Although Mildred likes Hansford County and the manor, she is ready to go back to her regular life. She is scheduled to leave the manor in October.

Hansford Hospital has an excellent Physical Therapy Department which serves the needs of hospital and nursing home patients as well as people who live at home. The problems they treat are in 2 main categories.

Musculo Skeletal Problems. These include back, neck, shoulder, arm, and leg injuries and arthritis. It also includes follow-up care after fractures, most frequently those involving

the hips. Treatments include moist heat packs, ultrasound, electrical stimulation and muscle-strengthening exercises.

Open wounds and burns. Treatment for these usually involves whirlpool treatments under sterile conditions followed by dressing of the wound.

The personnel in the department are well-trained and are certified by the state. It's fortunate that we have this service available.

Physical Therapy Department vital service for Hansford County residents

A Physical Therapy Department was opened in May, 1991 at HCHD. Carol Dunnihoo, P.T., M.S. is the licensed physical therapist in charge of the department. Prior to taking this position, she had been working in Perryton and the surrounding area for the past 18 years in private practice. She graduated from T.W.U.'s school of Physical Therapy with a M.S. degree. She also has a B.S. degree in Special Education from O.S.U.

Working with her in the physical therapy department is Mitzi Mires, P.T.A., and Kathy Langston, C.R.A. Mitzi is a licensed physical therapy assistant and a Spearman native. She graduated from Amarillo College's two year program and immediately went to work for HCHD in July 1992. Kathy is a new employee with the title C.R.A., certified restorative aide. She attended a forty-hour course at Garden City, Kansas and worked for one and one-half years in this capacity at Good Samaritan Nursing Home, Liberal, Ks.

The Physical Therapy Department serves inpatients, outpatients, Home health, Manor, and Hospice patients. Numerous orthopedic and neurological conditions are treated, such as cervical and lumbar spine problems, stroke patients with paralysis or paresis, cerebral palsy, arthritis, burns, athletic injuries, head injuries, wounds and decubitus ulcers. A variety

of methods are used to treat these conditions at HCH. Some of these methods are therapeutic exercise, traction, massage, ultrasound, hydrotherapy, electrical stimulation, paraffin bath, and gait training.

These services are available at HCHD. Dunnihoo has worked with area physicians and physicians from Amarillo and Oklahoma City for about 20 years. She coordinates the patient's therapy program with their respective physicians for other therapist.

The primary goal of the P.T. Department is to provide physical therapy service to Hansford county residents so they won't have to travel to other communities. Personable, quality care is another goal. Stop in and visit with the staff and see what is available at your hospital.

Lynx claw Greyhounds, 28-0

Friday, October 8, the Gruver Greyhounds and the Spearman Lynx met on the football field at Greyhound Stadium in Gruver, and it was the Lynx who tasted victory, 28-0.

Coach Doug Frick gave his assessment of the game. "We were outplayed both offensively and defensively," said Coach Frick. He continued, "They won the battle up front. We had some opportunities, but Spearman rose to the occasion and stopped us. If we could have scored on those three opportunities, who knows what might have happened?"

Coach Frick was talking about the opening drive for the Hounds, which saw them stun the Lynx with a first-play halfback pass from Aaron Frick to Kenton Odom for 37 yards, placing the ball at the Lynx 33. But the Hounds were stopped there, after four plays gained only 8 yards, and failed to score.

Then there were two bad snaps on punt attempts, both in the second quarter, resulting in the Hounds attaining excellent field

position both times - at the 25 and 20 yard line. But neither time were they able to score.

The Hounds never threatened afterwards.

Jason Varnon, Lynx QB, rushed 15 times for 66 yards, Radar Garcia had 105 yards on 11 carries, and Brandon Vanderburg had 55 yards on 17 carries. They were the heroes on this night. All told, the Lynx outtrashed the Hounds 279-38.

So the Spearman game is over and done with, and now the Hounds are thinking Stratford, and still thinking district championship and playoffs, if they can beat the Elks on their home turf this Friday, Oct. 15. The Hounds are 3-1-2 on the season, 2-1 in district, tied with Spearman for 2nd place behind the unbeaten, 2-0, Elks.

"Stratford is rated higher in the state rankings than Spearman was," said Coach Frick. "They will run out of the Wishbone, Slot, and I formations. They have excellent skill position athletes - (Marcus) Lavake (6-4, 175) is the quarterback. (Clint) Vincent and (Heath) Starves are good running backs. Their top linemen are (Colby) Wheeler (6-4, 210) and (Lawrence) Aguilera (6-3, 210)."

Coach Frick also noted, "We will

be running the Veer, same as last week."

The Elks and the Hounds will be playing for the 37th time over the years this Friday at Stratford. The Elks own the series lead, 20-15-1. The Elks have won four straight against the Hounds since Gruver upset the Elks at Greyhound Stadium in 1988. The scores of the four losses are 16-0, 40-0, 35-7, and 32-0. So it is payback time for the Hounds.

Gruver Greyhounds JV wins thriller at Spearman, 22-20

The Gruver Greyhound Junior Varsity team used the big play and a defense that bent but didn't break to thwart the previously unbeaten Spearman Lynx Junior Varsity 22-20 in a battle of unbeaten teams at Spearman this past Thursday, Oct. 7. Spearman dominated the statistics, but two big plays did in the Lynx in this game.

Freshman Jarrod Hoel broke loose on an outstanding run from scrimmage in the second quarter for 68 yards to give the Hounds the lead for good, 14-12, and quarterback Bailey Barkley and receiver Kevin McNett hooked up for a 78 yard bomb just before halftime, to up the lead to 22-12, and cement the victory. The Lynx tried gamely to come back, but they couldn't do it, as the Hounds defense made a 4th quarter stand, and came away with their 6th victory in six games this year.

The Lynx ran 63 plays in this game, as compared to only 36 for the Hounds. But the Hounds struck swiftly and with deadly precision

to win the ball game.

In rushing, the Lynx had 262 yards on 51 carries and the Hounds 164 yards on 31 carries. Phil Sanders, Greg Elliott, Jeremy Blan and quarterback Coyt Tigrett were outstanding, but it was not enough.

Hoel had 126 yards on 17 carries for Gruver, and Sanders had 121 yards on 24 carries for Spearman. The Hounds tightened their belts when they had to, and came away with the victory.

In the fourth quarter with the 22-20 lead, the Lynx were stopped at the 11 yard line in their pursuit of victory, on a 4th down play. But they got the ball back, and once again they were stopped on a fourth down interception by Hound safety Daniel Bort.

McNett also recovered two fumbles, and Andy Morris one. Morris suffered a knee injury in this game, but likely will only miss one game.

The score could have been much worse. Two of Barkley's passes, and one from Hoel, were just a fraction overthrown to three wide receivers, Tye Womble twice, and Bort

once on the halfback pass - else the Hounds would have had three more touchdowns.

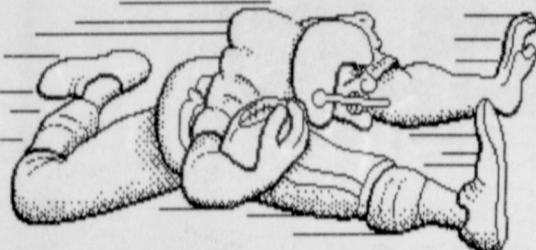
Sanders scored all three Lynx touchdowns, and Hoel scored two of the three Gruver scores, plus a two-point conversion that proved to be the difference.
