In the succeeding 26 years, CHDI has grown from an initial staff of four to more than 100, and operates with an annual budget of more than \$6.1M. Research indicates that CHDI serves approximately 83% of the area's residents determined to be living in poverty and 62% of the area's unincompassion for serving families in sured Following an extensive needs assessment study for the area, CHDI is currently in the second phase of a capital campaign to build a new \$5.8M Center for Community Wellness at 908 Evans St. to include expanded dental services, a new mental/behavioral health dept., exercise/fitness and health education facility, and electronic health records technology center. Already \$4.7M, or 80 percent, of the goal has been raised for this needed expansion, including a \$1M gift/challenge from the Kresge Foundation.


Fill the Truck

Dr. Margaret Nikol, of Bulgaria, shares the experience that as a child, she only had one, single, solitary page of scripture, which she clung to and cherished. To have even just that one page made her feel tremendously blessed. How many of us have complete Bibles, that for whatever reason, we no longer use? Perhaps we have chosen to study a different translation. People around the world would literally risk their lives for even just one page from the unused Bibles sitting on our shelves.

None of us could stand to discard a Bible. Isn't there a way to get used Bibles into the hands of those who are without? Recently, some Bibles were sent to the Edwin L. Hodges Ministries (ELHM) in Decatur, Alabama. From that donation, it was discovered that ELHM receives donations of not only Bibles, but also all Christian materials. The goal is 11,000 lbs of Bibles, books, and materials; yes, that would be 5 1/2 tons! The truth is that if 11,000 lbs of books are collected, ELHM will send a truck to pick up the materials – thus "Fill the Truck" campaign was birthed!

As of July 1st, 2800 lbs. of Bibles, books, and materials have been collected. Being only 1/3 of the way to the goal, we need your help to "Fill the Truck"! Scouts Visit Florida Sea Base Brinton **Environmental Center**

On June 14, 2009, Mikal Willimon, Travis Wolf, Bill Carson, Tim Anderson, Jake Willimon, Conner Wolf, Seth Carson, and Taos Anderson of Troop 551 of Spearman Texas visited Florida Sea Base's Brinton Environmental Center on Summerland Key,

Our trip didn't go exactly as planned when our flight from Miami to Key West was canceled, and we ended up having to rent a couple of minivans and make the three hour drive from Miami to Key West instead. We didn't even get to enjoy the view of the overseas highway, because there was no moon and it was pitch black.

The next day when we finally got to the Brinton Center, we were relieved to spend some time in our air conditioned quarters. The next day, we helped clear brush at The National Key Deer Refuge, and then we took a tour of Key West. Jake, Conner, Seth, and Taos walked up the 183 steps of the Key West Lighthouse, while Bill Carson took a Tour of the Hemingway House across the Street. Then we walked down the world famous Duvall Street, and visited the many shops. That evening, we went to Mallory Square and watched the amazing Sunset Festival held every night of the year. The next day we went sailing. There wasn't much wind, so we ended up motor sailing most of the way. We were able to stop and snorkel before a storm built up directly over us and seemed to devour our ship. Somehow they failed to mention that the boat we were on had already been struck by lightning twice this year. After the storm passed, we were heading back to the Brinton Center, but before we got there we stopped to eat lunch. When we stopped, our anchor line got caught in the prop, and our ship ran aground in three feet of water. After nearly an hour of hard work get-

ting the anchor line out of the prop and pushing our ship back in to water, we finally set off. That evening we went night snorkeling in a flooded rock quarry called the Horseshoe, due to its horseshoe shape. We saw many things we didn't see out in the ocean. Jake even got to enjoy getting stung by a jellyfish.

The next day we went deep sea fishing. When we were about twenty-five miles out, Bill spotted some debris on top of the water. Our captain pointed the boat that direction, and when we got close, we could see a giant school of mahi Mahi swarming around it. We quickly threw out all of our lines, and almost instantly they all hooked up with a fish. Conner caught the biggest fish at thirty-five inches and fifteen pounds. After that we trolled and came up on other schools of Mahi Mahi, but that was the only kind of fish we caught. That afternoon, we were dropped off at Big Munson Island, where we would spend the night and the entire next day.

The evening after we got off the island, we went bridge fishing. Jake caught the first fish, a mangrove snapper about the size of his hand. The next day, we went snorkeling at Looe Key, the third most dived spot in the world behind only the barrier reef off Belize and the Great Barrier Reef of Australia. However, the current was much too strong that day, so we went to a spot called Munson Rocks, a patch reef off the coast of Big Munson Island. That night we had our Luau. We played games, and ate the Luau feast of crabby patties, stuffed crab, Mahi Mahi, chicken thigh, and key lime pie.

If you give your brain the right nutrients, you will be able to think quicker, have a better memory, be better coordinated and balanced and have improved concentration. I am sure you have heard there are no magic pills. This almost sounds like magic. We will once again go back to the old adage, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Younger folks tend to have a sharper mind. If we keep up with proper nutrients "brain food" our mind will not become so dim. Important factors to boost your brainpower and keep your brain healthy and your mental processes operating effectively are nutritious foods, water, oxygen and, do not forget to enjoy life a little. EMOTIONS play a much bigger part in our lives then we realize. Every part of the body has specific nutrient needs in order to function most efficiently. The brain is no different.

According to Dr. Larry McCleary, board certified neurosurgeon and expert

zymes require iron, and iron is essential to produce energy. Since women lose iron through menstruation, they need 15 mg of iron a day; men require 10 mg of iron a day. Some foods that are rich in iron are Sunflower Seeds, Sesame, Tahini, Lima Beans, Kidney Beans, Navy Beans, Soy Beans, Chick Beans, Pinto Beans, Black Eye Beans, Spinach, Collard Greens, Mustard Greens, Kale, Turnip Greens, Parsley, and Cabbage. The beans are highest in iron with the exception of spinach. That is one of the reasons Dr Christopher suggests that you eat spinach every day. It is packed full of nutrients. Black strap molasses has a good amount of iron in it as well. Not just any molasses but unsulfered Blackstrap

Zinc does quite a lot. It is found in almost every cell in the body. It's responsible for activation of about 100 enzymes that do a wide variety of things like heal the body, support the immune system, cell division, cell growth, wound healing, and the break down of carbohydrates. Zinc is also needed for the senses of smell and taste. It is something helpful with memory and can be found in brewers yeast, raw sesame seeds, raw pumpkins seeds (highest), peas, and whole wheat. (Not whole wheat bread unless it is enriched with it). Unrefined whole foods contain more zinc. Men should get 11 milligrams a day and women need 8 milligrams. The research I have done shows the zinc is very important in both the old and young as far as memory is

There has been studies done in rats that have found when feeding aged rats _ cup of blueberries daily, it has reversed declining memory and poor coordination. Texas running out of jobless money

The Texas unemployment insurance trust fund is going broke quickly, and the state will have to borrow \$643 million from the U.S. Department of Labor soon. Those borrowed funds will cover unemployment claims through October 1, according to the Texas Workforce Commission.

About 285,000 Texans remained on unemployment compensation through June 27, according to a commission official. That was triple during the same period last year.

Governor Perry rejected \$556 million in federal stimulus funds to expand unemployment benefits, saying too many strings were attached.

Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister During the eighth week of Pentecost we study 2 Kings 4: 42-44, Psalm 145: 10-18, Ephesians 3: 14-21, and John 6: 1-21. The prophet Elisha is receiving offerings from the first fruits of the harvest. A man brings twenty loaves of barley bread and fresh corn to the prophet. Elisha tells an assistant to give it to the worshipers who have gathered to eat. The assis-tant protests that it is not enough to feed a hundred people. Elisha replies, "They shall eat and have some left." And that is exactly what happened. Here we see the miracle in daily living. God provides for all his people. Yet it was one man's act of piety that allowed God's miracle to occur. Think about it.

The Psalmist sings of God's glory, God's Kingdom, God's graciousness. Verse 16, "You open your hand, satisfying the desire of every living thing", is the key to this acrostic psalm. It is God who provides for all living in his creation.

Paul gives us a great picture of the Church. He describes the chaos in the world, wars, famines, tragedies. Yet God's will is to make all one in Jesus Christ, bringing order to the chaos. Paul says that "I bow my knees before the Father". This literally means to prostrate oneself. Paul is grateful because God is our Father, not in just the physical sense of creation but in his loving kindness to us. Paul prays that the faith community in Ephesus will be strengthened in their inner beingin their reason, conscience and will, and will know the love of Christ that surpasses all knowledge. We experience this love in our faith community, in Church.

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, and went up a mountain and sat with his disciples. The Passover was near and a large crowd approached him. Jesus asks Philip "Where are we to buy bread for this people to eat?" Philip replies, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." To Philip this was an impossible task. Andrew goes forth to see what he can do. Andrew brings a boy who has five barley loaves and two fish to Jesus. Jesus has the disciples to sit the people down. Jesus takes the loaves, gives thanks, and distributes the broken bread to those who were seated. In a like manner, he blesses the fish, and distributes this to the people. Jesus then has the disciples collect the fragments in twelve baskets. Five thousand people are fed. We can view this as a miraculous multiplying of food; we can see a sacramental image in the breaking of the bread; we can see a miracle of sharing. We hear again, "You open your hand, satisfying the desire of every living thing." The people then rush to Jesus seeking to make him 'king'; they want more. May the Holy Spirit enable you to see the miracle of God's

presence in your life.



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
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

HISTORICAL MUSINGS

History reflects the need for these plans and Dorothy received research from Curt Holdaway of Amarillo that provides more information on the 1947 disaster that destroyed many of our towns. He provides us with the following summary of the destruction:

aged, 95 people killed

Ellis County - 52 homes destroyed and 133 damaged, 6 people killed

Woods County - 25 homes destroyed and 25 damaged Lipscomb County (Higgins) - 83 homes destroyed

and 116 damaged, 51 people killed Hemphill county (Glacier)-36 flattened and 1 damaged,

16 people killed He sent us a list of our victims and the location of their burial site. There are a few that he could not locate.

Another community in our area that has a tornado background is Mobeetie. It was devastated by a cyclone in 1898. (Interesting history question - When did cyclones become tornados?)

The community, considered the "mother city" of the Panhandle, developed from Charles Rath and Bob Wright's supply store on Sweetwater Creek at a buffalo-hunters camp called Hidetown in 1874, and grew to 150 residents the following summer as a trading post for nearby Fort Elliott. In 1879 the town applied for a post office and the Indian word Mobeetie, possibly meaning "sweet water", was chosen for the community. The 1898 cyclone took seven lives and leveled many of the buildings, including the Huselby House hotel and the townhouse of pioneer cattleman Robert Masterson.

The friends did not mention losing any calves to the predator, but Derryla said there were several deer in that area. The big cat may have preferred venison to beef.






