## **Texas Crop & Weather**

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: The region was hot and dry, with temperatures above average in the triple-digit zone. Isolated thunderstorms brought some hitand-miss showers, as well as a few incidences of small hail. Moisture accumulations ranged from a trace to up to 4 inches, while some counties were left high and dry. Producers continued to prepare fields and fertilize for wheat planting in the fall. Most corn was in good condition. Spider mites were reported in some corn fields. Cotton was fair to good in most areas. The extreme heat caused irrigators to pump a lot of water. Pastures were reported as doing very well in some areas and showing signs of heat and moisture stress in others. Cattle were in fair condition.

On Aug. 10, Gov. Perry met with border sheriffs in Austin and credited them as "the first line of defense against the growing drugrelated violence that is tearing apart northern Mexico" and noted "an absence of adequate federal resources" at the state's disposal.

On Aug. 12, Congress passed a \$600 million border security supplemental appropriations bill that would provide surveillance drones and station more federal customs and border patrol agents where needed.


In an Aug. 13 White House briefing, Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano told reporters it takes about eight months to train new agents and station them on the border.

In other news, while the president was in Texas, Democratic gubernatorial candidate Bill White attended fund-raisers of his own. Obama told reporters he understood White had a campaign schedule to keep. Obama did not make an issue over the fact that White did not meet with him.





IFESTYLE

What does it mean to be a Christian, to be part of the church? We study Isaiah 58: 9-14, Psalm 103: 1-8, Hebrews 12: 18-29, and Luke 13: 10-17.

After the return from the exile, the people were disappointed with their living conditions and were divided in their opinions of each other. The prophet tells the people that Yahweh's favor depends on two things. First, remove the bonds of injustice, let the oppressed go free. In other words to have justice, do justice. Feed the hungry care for the ill, care for the orphan and the widow. Second, avoid 'pointing the finger', the people must rid themselves of slander and gossip. Disappointment over current living conditions will change when the people of God live like true Children of God. What's the lesson here, dear Christian? Does it apply today?

The Psalmist sings of thanksgiving and praise. The first two verses are a call to praise and the succeeding verses indicate the reasons to praise God. We as believers need to praise God for his steadfast love.

The writer of Hebrews compares the experience of the presence of God at Sinai with that of the experience of the presence of God at the heavenly Jerusalem. At Sinai, the people were afraid of blazing fire, darkness, gloom and a tempest. They were afraid. Yet, they did not follow the law which they were given via Moses and suffered thereby. Those who arrive at the City of the Living God arrive at a joyful experience. This lesson is a warning to us. Those that heard Moses, the transmitter of the law and ignored what they heard were lost. The writer of Hebrews emphasizes how utterly lost those will be who do not heed the word of Jesus because such are the words of God. He concludes that since we have been given a kingdom that cannot be shaken, we must give thanks by acceptable worship with reverence and awe, lest we be consumed by the fire of our God.

Jesus is visiting a synagogue on the Sabbath. A crippled woman who is bent over and cannot straighten up enters. Jesus sees her, calls her over, and says, "Woman you are free from you ailment". She rejoices and praises God. The synagogue leader is appalled. He rants about the desecration of the Sabbath because Jesus has worked' on the Sabbath because healing is 'work'. Notice the difference in perception. This 'healing' can be viewed as a fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy of releasing from bondage or as a re-enactment of the Exodus journey from slavery to freedom. So the question is not 'should we keep the Sabbath?' The question is 'how?'

We cannot 'be' the church without loving people more than we love our system, our liturgy, our order of service, our conceptions of propriety. We, as the Church, are the body of Christ; hence, we should emulate his deeds. May the Holy Spirit enable you to love your neighbor more than your sense of propriety.

The Spearman Independent School District will hold a public meeting on September 13, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. in the Spearman High School Library, 403 East 11th Avenue, Spearman, Texas 79081. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the school district's performance under each of the 21 indicators of the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST). Public participation in the discussion is invited.

The FIRST ratings are based upon analysis of staff and student data reported for the 2008-2009 school year, and budgetary and actual financial data for the 2009 fiscal year (ending August 31, 2009). The FIRST rating system was developed by the Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 76th Texas Legislature in 1999. The primary goal of the FIRST is to achieve quality performance in the management of the school district's financial resources.

### **Riding the Bus**

School bus transportation is safe. In fact, buses are safer than cars! Even so, last year, approximately 26 students were killed and another 9,000 were injured in incidents involving school buses. More often than not, these deaths and injuries didn't occur in a crash, but as the pupils were entering and exiting the bus. Remember these safety tips: · Have a safe place to wait for your bus, away from traffic and the street.

· Stay away from the bus until it comes to a complete stop and the driver signals you to enter.

. When being dropped off, exit the bus and walk ten giant steps away from the bus. Keep a safe distance between you and the bus. Also, remember that the bus driver can see you best when you are back away from the bus.

· Use the handrail to enter and exit the bus.

 Stay away from the bus until the driver gives his/her signal that it's okay to approach. • Be aware of the street traffic around you. Drivers are required to follow certain rules of the road concerning school buses, however, not all do. Protect yourself and watch out!

## Walking and Biking to School

Even if you don't ride in a motor vehicle, you still have to protect yourself. Because of minimal supervision, young pedestrians face a wide variety of decisions making situations and dangers while walking to and from school. Here are a few basic safety tips to follow: · Mind all traffic signals and/or the crossing guard -- never cross the street against a light, even if you don't see any traffic coming.

Walk your bike through intersections.

· Walk with a buddy.

Wear reflective material...it makes you more visible to street traffic.

The Partnership for a Walkable America has some more information on this topic.

## **Riding in a Car**

· You might have heard before that most traffic crashes occur close to home ... they do.

· Safety belts are the best form of protection passengers have in the event of a crash. They can lower your risk of injury by 45%.

· You are four times more likely to be seriously injured or killed if ejected from the vehicle in a crash.

· Everyone needs to be buckled up properly. That means older kids in seat belts, younger kids in booster seats and little kids in child safety seats.







More than 23 million kids ride a school bus every day. And it's up to those kids to take some safety precautions when it comes to waiting for and riding on the bus.

Going to the bus stop ...

- · Whenever possible, walk with others from your school.
- . Try not to walk in the street. If you have to walk in the street, walk as close to the curb as possible.
- · Be alert and avoid any signs of danger.


