HC Sheriff's Office Early Weather Warning System

The Hansford County Sheriff's Office is offering a new service to better serve residents in the rural areas of the county and surrounding areas. This service is designed to provide you and your neighbors an early warning to various emergency situations that might endanger you and/or your property. We are aiming this toward residents that do not live near warning devices like sirens and cable T.V. that cities like Spearman and Gruver offer their citizens.

This service is a computerized

telephone notification system,

sometimes referred to as the 'Big Mouth System'. This is an automatic dialing program that calls your phone number and broadcasts an emergency message. This system will be activated from the Hansford County Sheriff's Department in Spearman when needed. The system would tell what the emergency is, than give instructions that will refer you to provided packet containing certain precautions or actions that need to be carried out. most of these calls will pertain to

fires in your area. The reason that by being 'too early' there may be we are providing written some false alarms. Our response to instructions instead of broadcasting them over the phone is to free up the computer quicker. This allows it to dial a phone number, broadcast the type of warning, direct you to the emergency procedure packet, hand up and dial the next phone number in your area, hopefully within 20-30 seconds. The computer can only deliver this message in English. It is capable of leaving a message on an answering machine; and if your number should be busy, the computer would automatically go to the next number. Also, if after six rings there is no answer, the program hangs up and goes to the next number. After it has completed dialing the entire list of numbers for a certain area, the system will start over and try to make contact again with those phones that were busy or did not answer the first time.

We have radio contact with all surrounding counties, including those in the Oklahoma Panhandle. These counties, also have excellent spotters and are very dependable to give notice to our units of bad weather approaching our area. We also will have contact with Danny Richards, Director of Emergency Operations for Hutchinson County. They have weather radar in Borger that will be extremely beneficial to the Hansford County spotters. This notification system is provided free to our rural citizens by the Hansford County Sheriff's Office in a continuing effort to

At your convenience, fill out the information request forms and return to the Sheriff's Office. Your number will be added to the automatic dialing system as soon as the forms are completed and returned. Also, should you wish to discontinue this service, notify the Sheriff's Office and your number will be removed.

We are hoping to have this system operating by late spring or early summer. We would like to ask you to also tell your neighbors of this service so that all who would like this service can be served.

Furrow dikes are small mounds of soil mechanically installed in the furrow. Installation of these mounds of soil creates a small reservoir in front of each dam.

In most instances, area soil infiltration rates are adequate to absorb small amounts of rainfall with little runoff. However, when rainfall occurs in amounts exceeding soil infiltration rates, the furrow dikes hold the water in place until it can soak into the soil.

Water is the limiting factor in crop production in this area. It must either be obtained from precipitation or by pumping ground water from the Ogallala Aquifer. Maximizing precipitation reduces the amount of withdrawal from the aquifer, reduces agricultural production costs associated with meeting crop water needs, and has the potential to significantly increase crop yields.

A three year study at Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock indicated an average annual runoff of 2.73 inches from land with varying degrees of slope.

Keeping rainfall on the field rather than allowing it to flow ditches and/or play basins provides additional water for crop use.

HC Firework Hazards

used to retain similar amounts of additional water. Producers should also remember that furrow dikes are especially effective when used under a center

pivot sprinkler system. The furrow dikes hold the irrigation water in place until it can soak into the root zone soil profile.

Furrow dikes are the single most cost-effective conservation practice that High Plains producers can implement to increase crop yields and profits. Choosing not to use furrow dikes and subsequently pumping an amount of water from the Ogallala Aquifer equal to the average annual runoff of 2.73 inches will cost t he producer from \$8 to \$12 per acre. In addition, the water pumped this year form the Ogallala Aquifer may not be available for use in future years. I say to Cousin Mike,"Let's run."







As far as I know, a prairie dog has not been a popular pet in Hansford County, but sometime ago Frances Murrell told me about a young prairie dog that O.V.



City Lites

The following article is a summary taken from the book Outwitting the Neighbors by Bill Adler, jr. as reported by the National Enquirer. Normally, I don't trust the tabloids but I thought this story had a lot of merit to it. The words in italics are mine.

Americans seem to be having more problems with the people next door today than in the past. We don't get to know them and that makes it easy to fight.

Adler offer the following tips to help keep the neighborhood peaceful.

1. Get to know your neighbors. It's a lot easier to talk to a person about a problem if you've taken the time to make friends.

2. If a problem arises, drop by your neighbor's house with a plate of cookies or other baked goods and try to resolve it in a friendly manner.

3. See if other neighbors are having the same problems as you are with the offending neighbor. If so, gain their support and talk to the offending neighbor. If so, gain their support and talk to the offending neighbor as a group.

4. If none of that works, write a letter to the problem neighbor; if they are violating an ordinance, cite the ordinance and enclose a copy. The city hall staff will be glad to help you research the city codes and ordinances.

5. Seek a fair compromise. For example, if your neighbor plants a hedge or builds a fence that blocks your view, you could suggest that they move it to a more desirable location. Tell them, "If you have it moved, I'll pay the cost." Spending a little bit of money now may help save you from constant aggravation with you neighbor.

6. Don't wait too long to talk to your neighbor about a problem. If you wait too long, t he offending neighbor may think that you don't really care.

7. Never call the police or city hall first unless it is a dangerous situation. Adler says "once somebody call the police or sets the zoning authorities on their neighbor, there is almost no chance of repairing the relationship." It is City policy that we never tell the name of the neighbor making the complaint. This is to prevent any revenge against the one doing the complaining. However, sometimes neighbors retaliate against a neighbor who they believed had turned them in. Sometimes it turns out to be the wrong neighbor! Revenge is a bad idea.

In Spearman, we have a history of being good neighbors. However, it seems as though people are getting less neighborly all the time. If the ideas outlined above are followed, then I'm sure we can get back to the friendly little town we used to be.





Following is a history of the Christmas In April program, as written by Bobby Trimble.

In the Summer of 1972 I was teaching a young Adult Men's Sunday School Class at Alamo Heights Baptist Church. I began to try to teach those young men that there was more to being a Christian than going to Church. So, we began to work on houses of women without husbands. We started out by doing small things like fixing evaporative air conditioners, gates, furnaces and other small things around their houses. We continued doing this through the summer of 1973.

In the Fall of 1973, the Park Center YMCA), which was located in a very poor minority section of Midland, wanted to clean up vacant lots in the area. I went to the first meeting and we decided to repair some of the elderly peoples' homes. So, in October of 1973 we worked on 17 homes.

In December of 1973 all of the House Captains met. We talked about what we had done in October. Everyone was up-beat about it and we decidea we would do another project in six months (which would put our work taking place in April).

In 1974, while we were interviewing one of the women whose house we had worked on in October, we asked her what she thought about the program and she said, "Lordy, it was just like

own 501-C Tax exempt status. This was accomplished in September of 1980.

In May of 1976, I set up a Board of Directors for Christmas in April and was elected President, and have been serving as President of our Midland Christmas in April program ever since.

In 1981 I received the Governor's Award for Outstanding Volunteer Service.

In 1982 Mrs. Clements (the Governor of the State of Texas' wife) nominated me for the Presidential Volunteer Action Award, which was initiated by President Ronald Reagan. received the award in April of 1982 at a luncheon in the White House. An executive with the Reader's Digest was at the Luncheon and he sent one of his Senior Editors to Midland, Texas to write a story about me and the program.

Trevor Armbrister came to Midland, Texas on the Friday before the big Christmas in April workday. He went from project to project (houses) and talked to the homeowners and all the many volunteers that were working (approximately 2500). He couldn't believe people would take their time and money to buy materials and to work on strangers' houses. By the time he left for Washington, D.C., he was completely sold on Christmas in April.

When Trevor got back to Washington, T.C. he went to his church and told them about this great program in Midland, Texas. Trevor and his friends in his church then started a Christmas program in Washington, D.C. in April of 1983.

My wife, Shirley, and I went to D.C. in the Fall of 1985 and met with the Washington, D.C. Christmas in April Board. By 1983 we had programs in Midland, Cisco, Big Springs, Pecos, Odessa and Wichita Falls, Texas.

Shirley and I began to get inquiries from other cities about Christmas in April programs and how to get one started. We would

make up "packets" and mail them from our home. Shirley and I
