## Knauflaunches Spearman "Don't Bag It" program

City Manager Kelvin Knaufhas launched the City of Spearman's "Don't Bag It" program. Designed by Texas A&M's Extension Service, the recycling program aims to reduce solid waste transported to the landfill by urging citizens to leave their grass clippings on the lawn.

'We are committed to this program for three reasons," said City Manager Kelvin Knauf. "First, individuals can help preserve our environment while saving landfill space, and in the future, tipping and transportation fees. Second, we will use fewer natural resources with less watering and chemicals. And third, it is less work for citizens and for our city crews, reducing the cost of bags to home owners and the cost of collection and dumpster repair for the city.'

The city of Spearman will kick off the "Don't Bag It" landscape recycling program at a public meeting April 6, at the County Barn, beginning at noon. Interested citizens can learn how the program works and have a chance to win a new Snapper or Lawn Chief mulching lawn mower donated by B&B Sales. Citizens can enjoy a Lunchfor-a-Buck starting at 11:45.

County Agricultural Extension Agent Burt Williams will present the program emphasizing proper turf management. He said "Don't Bag It" is a labor and cost saving program for the people and the city. The average and low maintenance lawn will actually get better turf results from the "Don't Bag It" program than most of them get now."

Grass clippings increase the volume of solid waste from 20-50 percent during the summer, said Dr. Bill Knoop, Texas A&M turfgrass expert and creator of the "Don't Bag It" program. Leaving them on the lawn, however, returns valuable nutrients to the soil, he said.

Dr. Knoop developed the "Don't Bag It" program of fertilizing and mowing practices that allow grass clippings to remain on the lawn. "Golf courses are the model-their landscape managers never bag grass clippings," he said.

In 1990 the "Don't Bag It" program earned the EPA award for environmental excellence in so'id aste reduction.

#### NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISPOSAL PERMIT

CHARLIE WEST, 706 Lee Drive, Spearman, Texas 79081 has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for a permit (Proposed Permit No. 03784) to authorize disposal of waste and wastewater from a swine operation. The swine operation will consist of a maximum of 3840 head at Section 148 and 3840 head at Section 4. The waste treatment facilities will include two storage ponds for washdown water, flushwater and stormwater retention. Wastewater from the ponds is to be disposed of by irrigation on agricultural land. Manure and separated solids are to be applied, for beneficial use, as fertilizer on agricultural land. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The swine operation consists of two facilities in Hansford County, Texas. Section 148 is located on the south side of an unnamed county road, approximately 1 mile west of the intersection of the county road and Farm-to-Market Road 760. This intersection is approximately 4 miles south of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 760 and Farm-to-Market Road 759. Section 4 is located on the east side of Farm-to-Market Road 760, approximately 5 miles south of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 760 and Farm-to-Market Road 759. This location is in the drainage area of Segment No. 0100, an unclassified segment draining out of the State.

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

This application is subject to a Commission resolution adopted August 18, 1993, which directs the Commission's Executive Director to act on behalf of the Commission and issue final approval of certain permit matters. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless one or more persons file written protests and/or a request for a hearing within 30 days after publication of this notice.


If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing;" (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. If one of more protests and/or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application to the Office of Hearings Examiners where a hearing may be held. Commission public hearings are evidentiary legal proceedings similar to civil court non-jury trials. Although general comments from the public may be submitted either in writing prior to the hearing, or orally at the start of the hearing, the law requires that the Commission's decision about whether to approve or deny the application be based on evidence and testimony submitted during the public hearing, presented under oath and subject to cross-examination by the other parties. Public comments are not evidence and cannot be the basis for the Commission's ultimate decision. In the event a hearing is held, the Office of Hearings Examiners will submit a recommendation to the Commission for final decision.

If no protests or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will sign the permit 30 days after publication of this notice or thereafter. If you wish to appeal a permit issued by the Executive Director, you may do so by filing a written Motion for Reconsideration with the Chief Clerk of the Commission no later than 20 days after the date the Executive Director signs the permit.

# **Recycling Words**

Glass is basically silica, so why do the colors have to be sorted at the recycling center?

Research has shown that most of us would not purchase food products packaged in the colors that would result from mixed glass. Imagine buying mayonnaise in a jar roughly the same color as the mud tracked in the house on your little darling's feet. You don't want it on your floor and you don't want your mayonnaise packaged in it.

Our glass recycler, Omega Raz-R-Tex of Panhandle, uses glass to make reflective beads for highway paint. Only sparkly clear glass can be used. Omega makes sandblasting abrasives as well and is developing a process to use the colored glass for this end. They need every bit of glass available as business is booming. They will process over 150 tons a month.

Glass is crushed into cullet by the end user. Metals are magnetically removed and a vacuum process removes paper labels and plastic coatings. The cullet moves on to become the reflective beads new glass jars and Fiberglass insulation and glasphalt as well.

Why can't I recycle light bulbs, window panes, baking dishes and coffee mugs?

All these products are created out of a slightly different recipe. Light bulbs have excess soda ash,

window glass may have tints or frosting, and ceramics are made of fine rock particles. Some crystal contains lead and Pyrex has a melting temperature all its own. Therefore none of these products are com-

patible with glass recycling. The rules for recycling glass are simple. Sort by clear or colored into separate bins. Remove caps and recycle these with the steel. Don't fret about labels. They'll be vacu-



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# Water Conservation District issues position on hog farms

Editor's Note: The article is a news release from the North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. Two. The article is intended to explain the District's position on the hog operations being proposed in Hansford and Ochiltree counties. It is submitted by Richard S. Bowers.

The North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. Two is aware of the concern over the various hog facilities being proposed within the District. Directors and staff attended a "town hall meeting" held in Perryton last month. Over the past year and a half we have reviewed information as well as toured the hog facility in Dallam County.

The District is charged with conserving and protecting the underground water resource. This includes not only the quantity but also the quality of the water. Our rules mainly deal with limiting the well spacing and production. However, water quality has also been an ever increasing role for the Dis-

In fulfilling our water quality protection responsibilities the District has become involved in several activities which, in our opinion, may have threatened the wa-

ter quality. These activities include: Contamination from oil field

At that time, Texas did not have any rules which would allow for or regulate the proper disposal or storage of this substance or other hazardous or toxic substances, nor did any federal agency. In an effort to protect the groundwater, the District adopted Rules 3, 4, 5, and 6 to address this issue.

\* Imported Municipal Sludge

In 1991 the District was informed that an out of state firm was planning to transport municipal sludge from New York with plans to dispose of it in Ochiltree County. We spent several months researching this issue and met with various state and local agencies and officials in an effort to address the issue. On July 6, 1992 the District adopted a resolution addressing the disposal of municipal sludge. Consequently the firm moved to another location within Texas for the disposal operation.

I have referenced the above actions of the District to, hopefully reenforce the people in the area of the interest the District has in the protection of our groundwater resource. All of the issues above have the same common reasoning behind the District action. In each case the state or federal agency or agencies did not, in the opinion of the District, have sufficient rules to protect the groundwater. Therefore, the District took action.

As stated earlier, District Directors Staff were present at the town hall meeting held in Perryton in February. In addition, I have discussed the permit application with Enviro-Ag Engineering engineer the specification outlined in the permit application far exceed the requirements of TNRCC. It is also my opinion that much of the concern of the people of the area may be due to the activities in Oklahoma. I have discussed the hog operations in Texas and Oklahoma with a representative of the Oklahoma water Resource Board. My conclusion is that Oklahoma may be lacking in their permit requirements on CAFO's. Therefore, the fear of groundwater contamination from hog operation in Hansford and Ochiltree County could be from water people have seen or heard about in Oklahoma, many of which are very real examples of possible contamination sources.

In conclusion, I want to assure the people of the District and within the area where hog operations and other CAFO's are being proposed that the staff and Directors are staying informed on the issues and permit requirements. If at any time we feel there is a treat to the groundwater within the District we will take action. However, there may be issues on a specific site or location which we may not be aware of, therefore, please feel free to contact our main office and discuss this with me or our Hydrologist. The research, led by Dr. Tom Archer, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock, is funded by the statewide half-cent per bushel corn checkoff program administered by the Texas Corn Producers Board.

This year more than \$150,000 in Texas checkoff funds have been allocated for Texas corn insect and disease research," said Carl King, TCPB executive director. "And as in past years, finding effective and economic methods of controlling mites is one of our main priorities."

Archer said the research project is designed to help farmers "avoid having to resort to crisis management of mites." It's estimated that 50% of Texas High Plains corn receives pesticide application for mites every year. Yield losses have been 20% or higher due to mite

damage. One of Archer's objectives is to find the best method of "chemigation" to control mites via center pivot irrigation systems. It will include two pesticides, Capture, manufactured by FMC, and Comite, manufactured by Uniroyal.

Archer will compare the chemicals as applied through four separate center pivot nozzles: a traditional over-the-crop, high volume commercial nozzle; a LEPA within the canopy high volume nozzle; and two reduced volume within canopy LEPA nozzles developed at the Lubbock research station.

A second objective of Archer's program is to determine the potential of using "key (mite) predators" in making economic threshold decisions. He added that the impact of the pesticides on beneficials will also be monitored.

"A large number of predator species occur on corn, but little is known about their contribution to mite management or the environmental factors that affect predation," said Archer. "Several key predators have been identified (in recent Archer research). Research this year will help determine the potential for these predators (in affecting the economic threshold of mites)."
