destroy mosquito breeding places by doing the following: 1. Empty, remone, cover or turn
upside down any receptacle that would hold water, particularly old bottles, cans and old tires. Change water in pet dishes daily,
Repair leaky plumbing and outside faucets. 4. Clean clogged roof gutters and drain flat roofs.

The report is given to he employer in writing and should include your name, address, Social

Study tax records before you buy a business

If you'replanning to buy an existing
business find business, find out if it owes any state
taxes beforehand. A little research may keep you from being stuck with a second-hand debt you knew nothing about.
