Commissioners' court votes to change Precinct 1 polling place

At their Monday, July 22 meeting, Hanford County Commissioners voted to change the polling place for Voting Precinct 1.

According to Hansford County Judge Jim Brown the new polling place will be at the varsity gym at Spearman Junior High School. The old polling place was at the courthouse.

Brown noted that the new polling place will give voters more room. He said voting at the courthouse often resulted in congested hallways and offices, and hampered county employees in their efforts to conduct regular courthouse business.

In addition, the junior high varsity gym will provide easier access to voters, he said. Voters will no longer have to climb the steps at the courthouse to cast ballots.

In other business, commissioners approved the promotion of two road hands in Precincts 1 and 4 to the position of Working Supervisor. Salaries of the employees were increased by \$75 per month.

Approval was given to a personnel policy concerning employees' use of and responsibility for county vehicles and equipment. Commissioners also discussed policies concerning use of the county barn in Spearman, and decided no changes were necessary. Brown is to check with area nurseries concerning prices for replacement of trees on the courthouse lawn. There are two trees in particular, he noted, that need replacement because of age, disease or damage. Commissioners will discuss planting trees at a later date. Pamela Nielsen, director of the

Regional 9-1-1 Network for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, attended the meeting to give the commissioners' court an update on the network, which is scheduled to switch on in September.

The commissioners' court also discussed the county budget for fiscal year 1991-92, and set a special meeting for Monday, July 29 to work on the budget. Brown said that during the special meeting, each department head will have an opportunity to meet with commissioners and discuss their individual budget needs.

Regular business for the commissioners' court included approval of minutes of the last meeting, receiving the treasurer's report and report of investments, approval of claims for payment, and approval of the treasurer's quarterly report.

Gruver school board hires new teacher, works on budget

In a special meeting Wednesday, July 17, the Gruver I.S.D. Board of Trustees accepted one resignation, hired a new teacher and conducted a three-hour budget workshop, said Superintendent Tom Cathey.

The board accepted the resignation of Shane Reagan, assistant boys' basketball coach. Cathey explained that Reagan will be going to Booker, where he has accepted the position of head boys' basketball coach.

Todd Ward was hired by the board as a history teacher and the new assistant boys' basketball coach. Cathey said that Ward, originally from Vega, is just out of West Texas State University.

As part of the board's budget

workshop, new lunchroom prices were set for the 1991-92 school year. Cathey said the lunch price for students in kindergarten through fourth grade will increase from 80 cents to \$1; for grades 5-8, the price will increase from \$1 to \$1.25; for grades 9-12, from \$1.25 to \$1.50; and for teachers, from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Breakfast price also was increased, from 40 cents to 50 cents.

Cathey said the board worked for about three hours on spending reductions for the coming year, and ended up with tentative spending cuts of a little over \$100,000. He estimated GISD's budget for next year to be around \$3.17 million.

"No programs have been eliminated yet, and we're looking at having the same number of faculty members as last year, with the exception of one less kindergarten teacher," he said.

He pointed out that the budget cuts are a result of reduced state funding, saying, "We're sure not going to enjoy a good revenue next year."

The board will hold a budget hearing on Wednesday, Aug. 7, he said, and will attempt to adopt a budget at that time.

He estimated that the property tax rate for GISD taxpayers will be about \$1.01 to \$1.03 per \$100 valuation of property. The board will set the tax rate after the Aug. 10 special election, and after a tax rate is set by the County Education District. He noted the GISD tax rate is currently \$.9454. The board also set another special meeting for Monday, Aug. 12 to can-vass the Aug. 10 election results.

SISD board considers budget, personnel in special meetings

The Spearman ISD Board of Trustees held two special meetings July 15 and 16 to consider the 1991-1992 budget and to consider personnel

changes. The board accepted two teacher resignations and hired a secondary teacher and an elementary principal. The resignations of Zetha Blackburn, junior high English teacher, and Shelley Edenborough, elementary teacher, were accepted according to Larry Butler, superintendent. Karoline Ashmore was hired as a

junior high English teacher, and Richard Partney was hired as the new elementary principal. According to Butler, Partney will

start work as the new elementary principal the first week in August. He will be coming from Lancaster,

Texas, where he has been assistant intermediate school principal since 1987. According to his resume he has 17 years experience in education as a public school teacher, college teacher and public school administrator.

He received a bachelor of arts degree from Texas Tech University, and a master's degree in curriculum and instruction at the University of Texas at Tyler. He is currently working on obtaining superintendent cer-tification at East Texas State Univer-

Moving to Spearman with Partney will be his wife, Marilyn, and two daughters, Cortney and Amanda. Cortney is 5 years old and Amanda is 3 years old.

Butler said a complete copy of the SISD budget for the 1991-92 school year will be available by next week. The Reporter-Statesman will provide details of the budget.

Pringle-Morse CISD remains K-8 system

The primary focus of the July 9 meeting of the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. board was whether to remain a Kindergarten-8th grade school system, or to change to a K-6 system, according to Superintendent Roy Harris.

"That was our meeting," com-mented Harris. "It was very interesting. There were a lot of questions and some good discussion. The vote was split on the decision, three to three.'

In the end, it was decided that the P-MCISD school system will remain a K-8 system for the 1991-92 school year.

In other business, the board discussed hiring staff for the Morse School, said Harris. "We have several openings and we are trying to hire staff for next year," he said. He added that the board may have some special called meetings in the near future for the purpose of hiring personnel

The board discussed funding for

the 1991-92 school year, attempting to decide how to use the district's surplus funds. If the district does not use the surplus, that money is subject to capture by the state for use elsewhere, according to Harris. He also said that the board is "figuring out how to finance with the CED (County Education District). It looks like we'll lose about a quarter of a million dollars out of the district to the CED." he explained.

A Chapter 1 reading and math program was adopted by the board for the 1991-92 school year, and the board is currently seeking an aide for the program, said Harris.

Change 39 to the policy manual was adopted, he said, which concerns the laws under Senate Bill 1 from the last legislative session. The board voted to accept TASB (Texas Association of School Boards) bids for health insurance for next year.

Aug. 29 was the date set by the board for a budget hearing and for adoption of the tax rate for the district. Next regular meeting for the P-MCISD board will be Tuesday, Aug. 13.

9-1-1 is the universal emergency telephone number designed to give citizens an easy-to-remember number for police, fire or medical emergencies.

9-1-1 provides a single phone number to use for all types of emergencies - police, fire or medical. This is important because studies show that 90 percent of residents do not know local emergency phone numbers. Having 9-1-1 reduces the confusion of looking in the directory for the appropriate seven-digit number.

The information on the questionnaire enables local emergency service providers to match the caller's phone number with his or her address and other vital information. Having this information saves time when responding to emergencies and could save lives and property.

All information remains confidential and is only available to the emergency service providers when 9-1-1 is dialed.

More information can be obtained from the Spearman Police Department, the Gruver Police Department, the Hansford County Sheriff's Department, or from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Amarillo, 372-3381.

AUSTIN - A total of 1,025 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in June, according to RRC Chairman Lena Guerrero. In May the total was 1,244. June 1990's total was 1,228.

The June total included 572 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 44 to reenter existing well bores, 42 to deepen existing holes, 145 to plugback ex-isting holes, and 82 for other wells. Operators were also issued 140 amended drilling permits.

In the first six months of 1991, the Commission has issued 6,595 drilling permits, a 2 percent decrease from the 6,731 issued during the same period of 1990.

The 1,025 permits issued in June included 472 oil permits, 159 gas per-

The Spearman City Council listened to Mission Cable's reponse to the council's 60 day notice of franchise termination at the council's meeting on Tuesday, July 16.

The response was delivered personally by Thomas Hopping, chief operating officer of Mission Cable Company. In his remarks Hopping first apologized to the council for not attending the July 2 meeting. At that meeting the council voted to give Mission Cable 60 days to make good 14 breaches in the franchise contract that the council felt Mission Cable was guilty of.

In his remarks to the council, Hopping admitted that the cable company had been guilty of the breaches listed in the council's complaint and that he had taken steps to see that they are recified. Hopping indicated that the cable

attempting to make records available to the city which had not been provided.

He also said the company had begun work on a complete rebuild of the cable system in Spearman. This rebuild will include replacement of all wiring and equipment. Hopping indicated the rebuild will take approximately 60 days. At the end of the rebuild, Spearman will have a system capable of handling 64 channels, he said.

Hopping pointed out that there is to be no change in the number of channels carried on the cable system, but that if subscribers choose to pay for more channels the system could handle them. He added that the increased capacity of the system should lead to better picture quality.

As the system is being rebuilt, Hopping warned, some loss of service to customers may take place. In order to remedy these occurances Mission Cable will have a technician on call seven days a week

Hopping told the council he would like to return on Aug. 22 for its next council meeting, to give an update on

the rebuild of the Spearman system. In other business, the council voted to contract with Antox Company of Arlington, Md. for random drug testing of municipal employees associated with the gas system. This testing is required by the U.S. Department of Transportation. The Spearman personnel will be in a pool with several other groups who are required to undergo the tests.

The council voted unanimously to contract with Ricky Riggins for auctioning of surplus equipment and supplies of the cities of Spearman and Gruver, Hansford County and Spearman ISD. Another contract, with H and H Water Well Service, was agreed to by the council. This contract is for \$3,545 and authorizes H and H to make necessary repairs on city well number 9.

The council voted to amend its professional services agreement with Brandt Engineering on refurbishing the wastewater treatment plant. The council agreed to pay Brandt on an hourly basis rather than a percentage of the cost of the project.

Council members discussed and accepted the budget proposal of the Hansford County Appraisal District for 1991-92. They then immediately voted to enter into a contract with the appraisal district for assessment and collection of 1991-92 municipal taxes.

The council voted unanimously for the passage of ordinance 599, which denies the rate increase requested by Texas-New Mexico Power Company in the city of Spearman. The council set the effective date of the ordinance as July 16, 1991.

The council voted to advertise the intent of the city to receive sealed bids for the sale of an oil and gas lease on a 15 acre mineral tract owned by the city.

Regular business conducted by the council at this meeting included accepting the minutes of its last meeting and monthly reports from the various municipal services, and approval of monthly bills payable and the monthly revenue and expense report.

The last item the council worked on was the 1991-1992 city budget. A public hearing on the budget is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 20.



Talking so that others listen to you, and listening so others will talk has long been a guideline for effective communication skills for use by family, business and society. never You can "not" communicate. Your words, gestures, facial expressions or stance all send a message. Consider what you said and what you meant. BEWARE OF CERTAIN DIETARY CLAIMS

Certain claims have been made recently that some herbs help people lose weight as they "cleanse im-purities from the blood."

One group instructs weight loss customers that "a large amount of the body's waste products (from general metabolism) are stored in fat cells, and that for proper metabolism and weight reduction, the proper blend of herbs to activate this cleansing activity is needed." However, most of the "waste products" of metabolism are carbon dioxide and water and the liver and kidneys ultimately remove all waste products from the blood.

Some of the misleading herb claims suggest using the following for weight loss:

• Fennel seed – "to curb appetite" • Echinacia root – "to clean the blood, especially useful against obesity

Chickweed - "activates the body's burning of fat"

· Parsley - "a remarkable remedy for expelling watery poisons'

• Yarrow flower - "purifies the blood of waste materials"

No scientific evidence supports such claims. Advertising that goods "have ingredients, uses, benefits ... which they do not have "is illegal in Texas, according to the Texas state code, Deceptive Trade Practices 17.46:b5. If weight loss is your goal, follow the suggestions of the American Medical Association Council on Scientific Affairs which recently emphasized the importance of nutritionally-sound weight reduction diets and changes in lifestyle to promote long-term weight control. A study in the American Dietetic Association Journal looked at the long-term effectiveness and predictors of success of an intensive multidisciplinary program including exercise, changing eating habits and using the time calorie displacement diet-a low-fat, high-complex carbohydrate diet-to promote and maintain reduced body weight. In 213 obese adults consecutively entering the program-including dropouts-weight loss averaged about 14 pounds. Results suggest that a nutritionally sound diet, prescribed

in a multi-disciplinary program and emphasizing lifestyle changes, can result in long-term weight control in a majority of individuals.

This study reconfirms the fact that no miracle food can result in permanent weight control.

CHILDREN SHOULD GET ON

THE LOW-CHOLESTEROL TRACK Research shows kids with high cholesterol - from diet or genetic makeup - seem to maintain that as adults. High cholesterol has been linked to increased risk of heart disease the number one killer in the United States.

The National Education Program of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute issued its first dietary guidelines in April for children and for screening those who might suffer hypercholesterolemia - high blood cholesterol.

The institute recommends that kids 2 and older follow a heart healthy diet with saturated fat making up less than 10 percent of total calories, and total fat no more than 30 percent. Cholesterol shouldn't exceed 300 milligrams daily. Nutritutional adequacy should be achieved by eating a wide variety of foods. Energy (calories) should be adequate to support growth and development and to reach or maintain desirable body weight.

The panel's recommendations are not intended for infants from birth to 2 years of age, whose fast growth requires a higher percentage of calories from fat. Toddlers 2 and 3 years old can safely make the transition to the recommended eating pattern as they begin to eat with the family.

Most children diets exceed 35 percent fat. Fat and cholesterol levels in the United States are higher than most other countries. So there's room for improvement.

'The earlier you start, it seems to be easier to teach them healthy habits, get them to adopt healthy lifestyles and teach responsibility for their health," says Dr. Gerald Berenson, director of the Bogalusa (La.) Heart Study. "It keeps them out of unhealthy habits like smoking, alcohol and drugs. You're inoculating them against unhealthy

With these recommendations to guide them, parents and kids now have little excuse to avoid healthier eating. Even fast food chains are offering more healthful choices; federal agencies are working on uniform nutrition labels for supermarket food products.

It is important to be informed, but being informed hasn't been easy. These are the first official, detailed guidelines for children's diets approved by a consensus of medical

Mosquito prevention steps are listed

If there are any places around your home where water collects, such as water-holding containers, ornamental ponds, bird baths and pet watering dishes, you may be raising mosquitoes!

Most types of mosquitoes do not travel very far from where they were hatched. Because of this, most mosquitoes you come in contact with were raised in that general area.

All mosquitoes need standing water in which to lay eggs. In just

one to two days the eggs will hatch. The larvae grow quickly and develop into pupae. Approximately seven days after eggs are deposited the adults emerge. The females immediately begin to search for a blood meal which is necessary for egg production and the cycle is repeated.

The cycle can be broken if you destroy mosquito breeding places by doing the following:

1. Empty, remove, cover or turn upside down any receptacle that would hold water, particularly old bottles, cans and old tires.

2. Change water in pet dishes daily. 3. Repair leaky plumbing and out-

4. Clean clogged roof gutters and

5. Remember that any standing



"I want the governor's signature right here," said Swinford, pointing to the space on the pledge form for the governor's signature. Swinford stated that he wants to see more responsible use of the taxpayers' money. "We were elected to be good stewards of the people's money and I think that passing an income tax would be the most irresponsible thing we could do to solve our budget problems," he said. He added that any new tax would simply be a "quick fix" and would not properly address the true fiscal reform that Texas needs.

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Senate Appropriations Committee has approved funds for various national health care measures and projects, including programs to assist rural hospitals and other health care organizations in rural areas, said U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm.

Specifically, the senator said, \$165.8 million was approved for the following programs within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Fiscal Year 1992 Appropriations bill:

\$25 million for the Rural Health Transition Grant Program, which provides two-year grants up to \$50,000 each to small rural hospitals to help them develop and implement strategies designed to keep them financially viable;

•\$25 million for the Rural Health Services Outreach Program, which awards program grants to non-profit, Year 1992 private or public health care this year.

•\$5 million for the Rural Health Research Centers program, which provides grants to rural health research centers;

•\$101 million for the National Health Services Corps, which assigns doctors and other health personnel in areas having shortages of such personnel:

•\$9.76 million for the State Rural Health Network Development Grants program, which provides states with funds to implement rural health care strategies, plans and grants

Gramm is a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

It has been evident for a few years that our 4H program has been declining, especially for the girls. Oh yes! We still see the girls participating in the livestock show, but there are other programs of benefit to them, namely the food and clothing departments where they would be learning the basic skills needed when they establish their own homes. They learn these skills at an earlier age than waiting for the opportunity during high school.

What has happened to cause this lack of interest for some special training. Just this year, the 4-H Fashion Review was cancelled because there was only two girls entered for this event. So it was decided to give the girls more time to work on their garments for competition on the district level. The lack of interest among the girls and parents is another reason for concern.

Some more thoughts on the programs offered by our county extension office reveal that even though teaching and educational programs are offered free of charge to the public we are not taking advantage of them. Why? Most of these pro-grams are requested by us, and more often than not, the ones who request these programs don't show up. Last Thursday evening an instruction class was scheduled for Rag-Mop Dolls and I was the only one there besides the instructor. The instructor was there on time after a hectic day and a hurried trip to Amarillo. She gave up a chance to relax with her family that evening because it was part of her job to do this program for me. I had an appointment in Amarillo at 4 o'clock that afternoon, but I completed my business early and rushed home so that I could be there on time after signing up for this class.

I know all of you are asking "Well! So What!" The "So what!" is this. There is a bill in the making in our state legislature for the sake of economics and they are planning to merge several of our state programs and do away with several of our employees. Maybe you heard of it on the news. For instance, it could be that our extension service will be combined with the forestry program and several others which in reality means "doing away with it."

I have heard on more than one occasion

learned to make bed mattresses, cooking, canning and sewing through our extension programs. Also, because of her training in 4-H food groups, I have a relative who has had waitress jobs at times when it was necessary in earning some money. Now, I know that probably we will

never again need to know the art of making and stuffing a mattress but the extension service changes right along with our needs and offers things of benefit to us. And you know, even if most of you have these glamorous jobs in offices downtown etc., there are some of us that will need the basic homemaking skills so that we can go into your homes as nursemaids and maids and helpers to keep training your kids in these worthwhile activities. So let's take more interest in these groups along with our schools. By the way - school begins earlier this year - August 19th or thereabouts. Unlike regular wages, which are reported by employers for Social Security credit, persons earning tips and sales commissions must report their own earnings to Social Security.

If you are a farm worker, be sure to keep a record of your wages. That is because your employer only needs to report your wages if he or she paid you at least \$150 in cash. You also should ask Social Security for a free statement of your earnings every three years to verify that your wages have been properly reported.

If you work at a job where you earn tips, you must report them if they exceed \$20 or more a month from one employer. The tips must be reported within 10 days after the month ends. The report is given to the employer in writing and should include your name, address, Social Security number, employer's name

Persons earning sales commissions may be treated as self-employed workers under Social Security law. Self-employed workers, and employees who are treated as selfemployed, must have earnings of at least \$400 a year before the earnings are covered by Social Security. If you make that much, you must file a Federal income tax return and pay any Federal taxes due and the Social Security tax.

For more information on income from farm work, tips, sales commissions, or other self-employment work, contact any Social Security office or call the toll-free telephone number, 1-800-234-5772. The Pampa Social Security office is located at 125 S. Gillespie. Office hours are 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, except on national holidays.

It's time to head for the mountains because (1) hatchery raised trout are biting in the beautiful, cool Rocky Mountains, and (2) except for nighttime, fishing is getting tougher every day

The fishing was super tough at the July 18th Lake Meredith Fun Tournament. Joe Valdez of Dalhart claimed first place prize money of \$285 when he weighed in a 3.39 lb. smallmouth bass. Second place and \$133 went to Larry Jameson of Fritch for his 1.75 lb. smallmouth.

With 38 anglers, only two legal fish were presented after three hours of fishing. The July 2nd Fun Tourna-ment had 62 fishermen and only three came to the scales. For the record: Our last two tournaments at Meredith totaled 100 fishermen with only 5 catching legal fish. These anglers are good. They know the lake and are willing to fish hard, knowing that the chances of catching a legal fish are 5 percent.

Stop and think about it ... 5 percent success rate in a field of dedicated fishermen is some pretty sorry fishing. I congratulate the winners and just wish that part of the huge fee increase in our fishing license (\$8.00 up to \$13 as of September 1) would go into a real program of fisheries improvement for Lake Meredith.

Authorities in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department sit on top of their paperwork instead of picking **Mel Phillips**

up a pole and learning first hand about fishing. Times are changing at TPW. Now that the fishermen and the hunters are paying most of the bills of the TPW, it is just a matter of time until they demand better service for their money.

Right now Texans are voting with their feet, and may drive west to Ute Lake and Conchas, east to Lake Foss, or south down to Lake Texoma. More and more club tournaments are being held in either Oklahoma or New Mexico.

The goal is tourism and recreational fishing. We in this part of Texas will know that TPW is serious about helping tourism and the fishermen when they implement a Striper (or Hybrid) program on Lake Meredith. Other lakes have both walley and stripers. Lakes with stripers enjoy some excellent fishing in the summer.

I will personally pay the entry fees for any Texas Parks and Wildlife people who are willing to enter the August 1st Fun Tournament at Lake Meredith. (They should not use guides or pump our local experts for assistance.)

It is time for action and the next move is up to the experts with the TPW. Next week-the results of this Fun Tournament challenge.
