# **Texas-New Mexico Power offers budget** plan to lessen impact of summer electric bills

Fort Worth, Texas -- Through the month of September, Texas-New Mexico Power Company (TNP) has opened eligibility for its Budget Billing Plan to all residential customers. According to Perryton Area Manager Craig Vinson, TNP wants all of its residential customers to have the opportunity to use the Budget Billing Plan to reduce the impact of high summer electric bills on their budget.

Vinson explained that the Budget Billing Plan allows customers to smooth out their electric bills by paying an average amount instead of the actual amount for electricity used in a given month. Usually, customers on the Budget Billing

Plan pay less than the actual cost of the electricity they use during the summer, and more than the actual

cost of the electricity they use during the spring and fall. Vinson emphasized that, overall, Budget Billing customers pay for the exact amount of electricity they have

The following chart illustrates the general theory behind the Budget Billing Plan, which is to even out the highs and lows in customers' bills so that they pay a more equal amount each month. The chart shows what bills with and without Budget Billing might look like for a customer who, over the course of a year, consumes 12,000

kWh of electricity, or an average of 1,000 kWh per month. A variety of factors, including changes in weather patterns or electric consumption from one year to the next, could cause individual customer

bills to look different with and without the Budget Billing Plan.

Normally, only the following customers are eligible for the Budget Billing Plan:

\* new residential customers \* residential customers who have not been disconnected for nonpayment within the last 12 months

\* residential customers who have not been billed with arrears more than twice within the last 12 months

However, Vinson explained, due to the extremely hot weather which has been experienced in much of TNP's service territory recently, the company has decided to expand the Budget Billing Plan through September to include all residential customers. "We realize that very hot weather can translate into unexpectedly high electric bills,"

Vinson noted. "We hope this program will help cushion our customers from the effects of those bills by spreading the costs over a 12-month period."

Vinson suggested that customers who want to take advantage of the Budget Billing Plan to smooth out summer bills should call or visit their local TNP office as soon as possible. "The sooner they sign up, the sooner they will see the effects of the plan on their bills," he stated.

TNP serves more than 212,000 customers in 90 towns and cities in Texas and New Mexico. It is the principal, wholly-owned subsidiary of Fort Worth-based TNP Enterprises, Inc. (NYSE: TNP).

# Last of the "Dinosaurs" leaves the newspaper

When I began my job at this newspaper over six years ago, typesetting was done on a Compugraphic Compuwriter JR. Only one line of typed copy could be seen on the screen at a time and there was no way to save the copy. The typed copy left the machine in a canister containing film that had to be processed in a Compugraphic CompuKwik and was put into a microwave to dry.(On more than one occassion the copy was left to dry too long and it would burn and have to be redone). The copy was then waxed and placed on the pages. Any mistakes in the copy had to be typed again and placed over the copy with mistakes.

Headlines and ads were typed in long, continuous streams of two inch wide film and run through the processor to develop the film, then cut and pasted to make the ads or

The subscriptions were typed on a special stencil typewriter that made imprints on stencil cards. These were loaded into an Elliott Stencil Machine one tray at a time and addresses were stamped on the newspapers one at a time by the person operating the foot pedal.

easier soon replaced the a time and the equipment was up-Compugraphic CompuKwik. Not dated to the computers we are now MDT 350 that stored copy on a Spearman Reporter, The Gruver had it's first printer.

With the introduction of the Macintosh Classic Computers, copy could be typeset, headlines and all, and printed on the new Personal LaserWriter. Ads were built on the screen complete with borders and artwork and ready for the lay-out sheets when printed.

One thing that hasn't changed is the way we do inserts. They are still inserted by hand into the newspapers. Some newspapers used to be quarter-folded so they would fit into mailboxes easier but this step has been eliminated which is a great time-saver.

The equipment is not the only thing I've watched come and over the years. I have worked for four different Publishers during this time. James Jarrett was the Publisher that hired me. He was leaving when I started but had just won three awards at the Panhandle Press Association Awards. These

awards included a second place for Special Edition, a third place for Sportswriting and a third place for Feature Stories, in Division I for the Hansford Plainsman.

Byron "Laddie" Hale took Mr. Jarrett's place as Publisher but was replaced by Karen Goodman after only a few months. Karen would cover the Friday night football games and then work most of the night so the stories and pictures would be in the Sunday edition which was printed on Saturday.

At one time, the typesetting processor went out and Karen had to develop the film in the dark room by hand.

Robert Hulett replaced Karen as Publisher. He was instrumental in updating the equipment. The

A Compugraphic Trendsetter mailing labels were on computer so 812 that processed the film much more than one person could label at long after came the Compugraphic using. The three newspapers, The floppy disk and the newspaper also Statesman and The Hansford


Plainsman were combined into one weekly paper, The Hansford County Reporter-Statesman. The price was also increased from 35 cents to the present day 50 cents per issue.

Mr. Hulett was transfered to the Overton Press and was replaced by Molly Zimmerman. Molly changed the style of the Masthead and added the mascot circle. The newspaper started offering business cards service and a few office supplies. The bookkeeping was computerized and the office took on a new look.

The newspaper recently won third place for Best Special Edition for the 1993 Homecoming Football insert at the Panhandle Press Association Awards and at the Texas Press Association Awards on July 1, 1994, the newspaper brought home a second place in Advertising and a fourth place in Sports Cover-

Mrs. Zimmerman has recently been promoted to Group Publisher for both The Hansford County Reporter-Statesman and The Overton Press and will be leaving this week for Overton. A new Publisher will begin on Monday, July 25.

As the old equipment was replaced by the new, it was hauled into the back room which has been nicknamed "The Dinosaur Roo" The Stationmaster's House Museum has shown an interest in having the old equipment for a display showing the early days of the newspaper. # Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. School Board accepts resignation, hires new teachers

Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday, July 18, 1994. Action items included consideration of food, milk and ice cream, and fuel bids, revisions of the employee handbook, curriculum waivers, and request.

Approval was given for bid items for the 1994-95 school year. Mrs. Baird's was low bidder for bread, Ben E. Kieth for food products and milk, United Supermarket in Dumas was low bid for meat and cheese, and Schawn's was low bid for ice cream. Morse Implement of Morse was low bid for fuel. Borden's had been supplying milk to the District but declined to bid for next school year.

Mike Davis from Ghia Corporation of Spearman presented a request for a waiver of accumulated property tax penalty and interest on an oil lease that he is trying to purchase. After consideration, the Board voted to waive the penalty and interest on the taxes from 1985 to 1990 in the amount of \$8,532.98. The lease had been in bankruptcy and the taxes are current since 1991. The District will receive taxes for those years in the amount of \$10,219.19. Davis agreed to pay collection and attorney fees of \$2,785.82.

The Board considered a request Sunray.

The Pringle-Morse Consolidated from Bob and Melanie Zimmer to abandon a portion of a bus route in the northwest part of the District to allow a Gruver I.S.D. bus to come into the Pringle-Morse District to pick up their son that they plan to transfer to Gruver. The abandonment of the route is allowed by Texas Administrative Code 21.177 and 21.079. However, after consideration the Board voted to deny the request since the School plans to continue bus service to the entire

Approval was given to the 1994-95 school budget as presented by Superintendent Beryl F. Sears. The budget for next school year is in the amount of \$1,260,010. This amount includes approximately \$350,000 for purchase of attendance credits to equalize wealth among public schools as required by Senate Bill





For many years the existence of the short grass prairie as a distinct plant was denied. It was not until 1923 when a range ecologist proved that it is, a fact known to ranchers for 50 years. There are three midcontinent grasses - the tall, the mid-high and the short. The shortgrass prairie also known as the Great Plains or High Plains variety is the most arid.

Palo Duro Lake and Park was developed because a majority of the citizens of Hansford County, Moore County and the city of Stinnett hoped to provide for future city water, knowing that underground sources are being depleted. Regardless of whether a drop of water s ever transported to one of the cities, the Palo Duro Park of almost 9.000 acres could become one of the flowers, birds, animals, trees and finest and most noted of the short grass prairie parks. 


# Third Annual Cowboy Fest rodeo and dance



# New mothers often return to smoking

HOUSTON - Pregnant women may be getting the message about the dangers of smoking, but the majority return to the habit following pregnancy.

One hurdle for pregnant women who quit smoking is the change in attitudes of those around them once the baby is born, said Dr. Marianna Sockrider, pediatric pulmonologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"During pregnancy, people are sensitive about smoking," she said. "They don't smoke around the pregnant woman or offer her cigarettes. But, once the baby is born, the pressure to smoke resumes."

Sockrider suggests that new mothers who wish to quit permanently examine why they smoke and look at different post-pregnancy smoking mechanisms. They can also seek the cooperation of smokers around them.
