Spearman Heritage Days to kick off June 2 through June 11

The time has come again for the annual Spearman Heritage Days celebration. This year the festival will be held from June 2-11, 1995.

The festivities will start off with a wild time at the Hansford County Team Roping contest which will be held Friday at 7:00 P.M.

The Miss Hansford Pageant will be held the following Tuesday, June 6th, and will begin at 7:00 P.M.

Friday has two events scheduled for your enjoyment. A Duck Soup softball tournament will be held during the day, and that night, from 9-12 P.M. will be the Teen Dance at the O'Loughlin Center. The price for admission to the dance is \$4.00.

Saturday, June 10th will have enough activities to keep you busy from sun-up until well after dark.

There will be a sidewalk coloring contest hosted by Movie Madness and Debbie's Ready or Not. Three age groups can participate: 4-5, 6-7, and 8-9. The kids will color their blocks with the theme "What would you like to see in the parade?" Come join the fun anytime between 9 and 11 a.m. Judging will be done and results posted by noon.

During this same time the Spearman Study Club is sponsoring an Arts and Crafts show during the celebration. Dealers will display their merchandise on the courthouse lawn from 10 a.m. until 4 P.M. Both local and out of town dealers are participating. Exhibits

will include country wood decor items, ceramics, doll furniture, clothing, jewelry, and lots more. Spots are still available, if anyone is interested they should call Claudine Hardy at 659-3440.

The Showtime Car Club will present its Shine and Show: Antique Car Show and Rally on Saturday from 10 a.m. until 4 P.M. It will be held at the First State Bank parking lot. This is an open show and all vehicles are welcome. There is a \$5 entry fee for vehicles and all vehicles are encouraged to participate in the Road Rally or Parade or both. An Old Timers Reunion will be held at the Stationmasters House Museum starting at 2:00 P.M. This will be a great time to visit old friend, make new ones, and inspect the improvements at the Museum.

The First National Bank and the Spearman Chamber of Commerce are hosting the Heritage Days Parade. The parade starts at 3:00 P.M. Letters have been sent out to Spearman and surrounding areas and while there is a good response from Spearman more interest from the surrounding areas would be great. There will be 10 military vehicles in this year's parade which is new. The military vehicles are

owned by Joel Lee Lackey and Jeff Lackey. After the parade they will be by the City Hall for your inspection. A history of the vehicles will be on display next to the vehicles themselves, concerning Hansford County residents who used them in Vietnam, compiled by Jerry Virden. There will also be an art display at the same location as the military vehicles. They are painted canvas jeep tops painted by Glen Ayres while in Vietnam. This art has not been displayed since it was painted so do not miss this. There will also be antique cars and the newly crowned Miss Hansford, in the parade. Spearman bands will participate and an invitation has been extended to the Gruver bands. Line up for the parade will begin at 2:00 P.M. at the Junior High School parking lot. City of Spearman holds meeting

The City of Spearman met in regular session on May 16, 1995 with Mayor Pro-Tem Mike Cudd presiding. Aldermen present: Charles Elliott, Steve Benton, Don Reed and Ed Garner. Mayor Burl Buchanan was absent. Staff present were Kelvin Knauf, City Manager; Cheryl Gibson, City Secretary; Chris Eppley, Assistant to City Manager, and Larry Kenealy, Chief of Police. Visitors present were Brian Gillispie, newly appointed Alderman, Patricia Cudd, Jeff Beedy, Buddy and Yvette Hopper, Valerie Shields, Paul Moore, Mark Thomas, Randall Sauer, and Dean Coates.

For the consent agenda the Council gave consideration to the minutes of previous meetings, monthly reports by city offices, monthly bills, cash position, and expense report.

A motion was made by Alderman Garner to approve the minutes of the regular City Council meeting held on April 18th and the minutes of the special meeting held on May 8th as written. To approve the monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court, animal control, solid waste, and recycling reports for April. To approve the monthly bills totaling \$452,443.39, and to approve the revenue and expense report for April, as presented. The motion was seconded by Alderman Reed. The motion unanimously carried.

The City Council then moved on to the regular agenda. Being a Notary Public, Cheryl Gibson, City Secretary, gave the Oaths of Office to Aldermen Ed Garner, Steve Benton, and Brian Gillispie. Nomination to elect Don Reed as Mayor Pro-Tem was made by Alderman Benton. The motion was seconded by Alderman Garner, and

unanimously carried. Newly elected Mayor Pro-Tem Reed took over the meeting and presented Mike Cudd with a plaque for his service to the City as an Alderman since 1985 and Mayor Pro-Tem since 1990. Mike Cudd thanked everyone for their help and wished the city well in the future.

Mayor Pro-Tem Reed declared a public hearing, open at 7:40 P.M. to adopt ordinance #646, an ordinance amending Chapter 14, planning and zoning, of the Spearman Municipal Code; amending the zoning code by amending certain district boundaries on the zoning map of the City of Spearman, and providing for an effective date. Dean Coates, applicant was present. Buddy and Yvette Hopper and Valerie Shields, adjacent property owners, were present and protested the rezoning. After lengthy discussion the meeting closed at 7:54 P.M.

A motion was made by Alderman Garner to deny adopting Ordinance #646 without prejudice and to instruct the planning and zoning commission to review the zoning ordinance for any updates and additions that might need to be made. The motion was seconded by Alderman Brian Gillispie, and the motion unanimously carried.

On May 3rd, sealed proposal for a janitorial service contract for City Hall and the Police Department were publicly opened and read. Aurora Vela bid \$35 a night. Lorena Medley bid \$30. Joyce Wolley bid \$30, and June Patterson and Carey Menard bid \$27. Motion was made by Alderman Benton to award a contract for janitorial service to the low bidder, June Patterson and Carey menard in the amount of \$27.00 per night. The motion was seconded by Alderman Garner and unanimously carried.

Representatives of the Spearman Little League, Jeff Beedy and Regan Baker were present to request help from the City in funding the new lights installed at the Little League fields. Mr. Beedy thanked the City

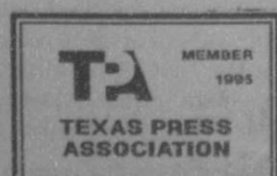

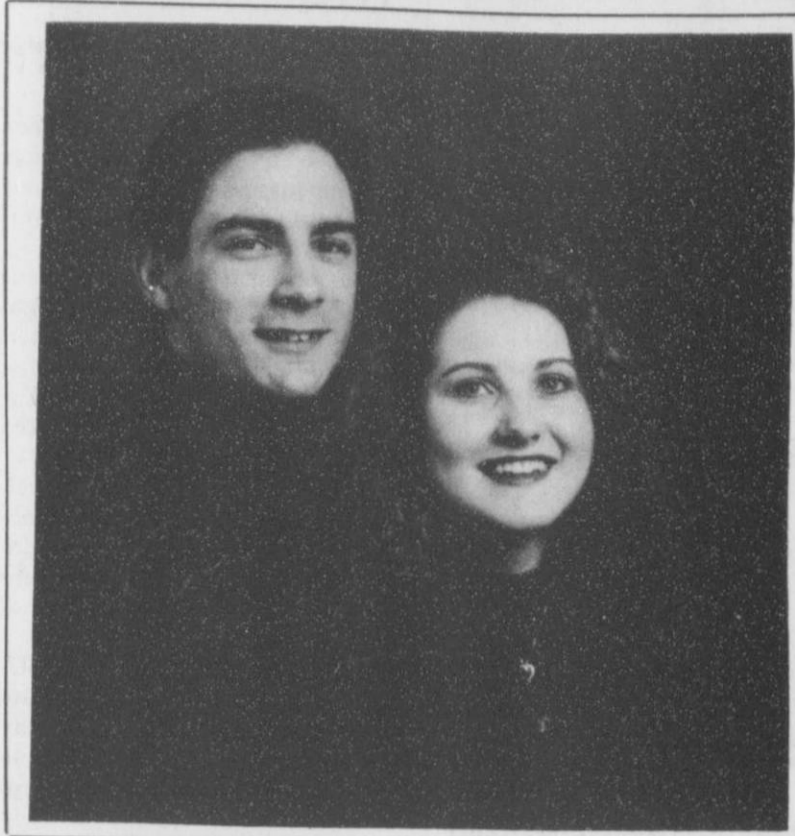

Museum Musings

June 10 will mark the start of the reign of our Heritage Days Queen, Fannie Venneman. She will be in the parade at 3:00 P.M. that day and at the Old Times Reunion at the Museum right before that.

The following is an article Fannie wrote so everyone could be better acquainted with her.

My parents were John Gray Bynum Sparks and Mary Elizabeth (Douglas) Sparks. Most people called Papa "J.G.B." or "Gray" Sparks, and Mama was lovingly called Lizzie. They were married in January of 1890 and lived in Collins County, Texas for eight years. During this time, while Papa farmed, four children were born.

After moving to Greer county for a short time, Papa finally settled 2 1/2 miles South of Old Hansford in 1902 where he staked a claim on 160 acres. It seemed he was always looking for something better for his family. They all lived in a dugout owned by Mr. Dressen, while building a house.

Papa farmed, had a few cattle, hogs, and, of course, milk cows for the family. Mama took care of the chickens and a big garden. She washed with a black pot of hot water outside and cooked for the harvest crews.

Mama's family was complete with 12 children. They were: Tabitha, Bertha (who died at the age of two years), Cora, Lenard (Jake), Mary, Barney, Bernie, Ailene, Roy, Ramond, Fannie, and last, but not least, Willoughby.

Everyone helped each other in these days. Even the neighbors would come to help Papa and Mama during harvest. Two that I remember were Mansieur and Margie (Harris) Barkley.

We were happy growing up, at-

tending church and Sunday School in Hansford. Mama died in 1915 when I was only three years old and my baby brother, Will, was only 11 months. My sisters, Cora and Mary, took over the job of taking care of the home.

I attended school in Spearman, graduating from high school in 1931. I decided to become a teacher, so I enrolled in college at West Texas in Canyon. I taught school one year at New Hope, located on the Old Newcomb Place, one year in Hitchland, and three years in Spearman. I loved teaching, and I loved my pupils. I remember them always walking to school. No one had a car back then. At the end of each year I never thought I could love the next year's class as much, but I always did. I thought my fourth grade was always the best, and I have wonderful memories of all the cute things the pupils would say and do.

While I was teaching in Hitchland, I met Johnny Venneman who was on the school board. We were married on April 23, 1941, in Borger, Texas. We lived close to Johnny's parents, Joe and Hattie, and his sister, Clementine. We farmed and raised cows and calves. It seemed to work was always hard, but we were doing what we loved. Johnny and I had three children, Joe T., Hattie Marie, and Mary Elizabeth. (An interesting note—my father, J.G.B., was a County Commissioner and so was Johnny, who was appointed to serve the unexpired term of Ed Vernon. My son, Joe T., is presently a commissioner. All three accomplished a great deal for Hansford County.)

Johnny died December 1, 1987. Mary and I still live on the Venneman place, and we like to refer to ourselves as the "straw

bosses." We enjoy checking the cattle and crops. When everyone is busy, we take lunch to the field. When everyone is gone from the place, Joe T. tells Mary and I the we are "in charge."

I have six grandchildren who bring me happiness. Mark, Clint, Micah, Holly, Kim, and Kaley come to see me often and it seems they are always hungry. We share good meals and often spend time playing dominoes. Those games are really "hot" with the kids trying hard to beat Grand-Ma. They don't do it very often because the Sparks family always played dominoes. I enjoyed listening to them and always try to give them good advice.

I have lived in Hansford County all my life, and I attend Sacred Heart Catholic Church. I love all my friends in Spearman, Gruver, Morse, and Oslo.

One of Fannie's former fourth grade students was Worley Smith. He said, "Fannie is the most wonderful person in the world." When asked why, he told me, "She loved us, and we loved her. Any other teacher could paddle me and it wouldn't hurt as much as Fannie giving me a frown."

What a wonderful impact a teacher can make on a student's life.

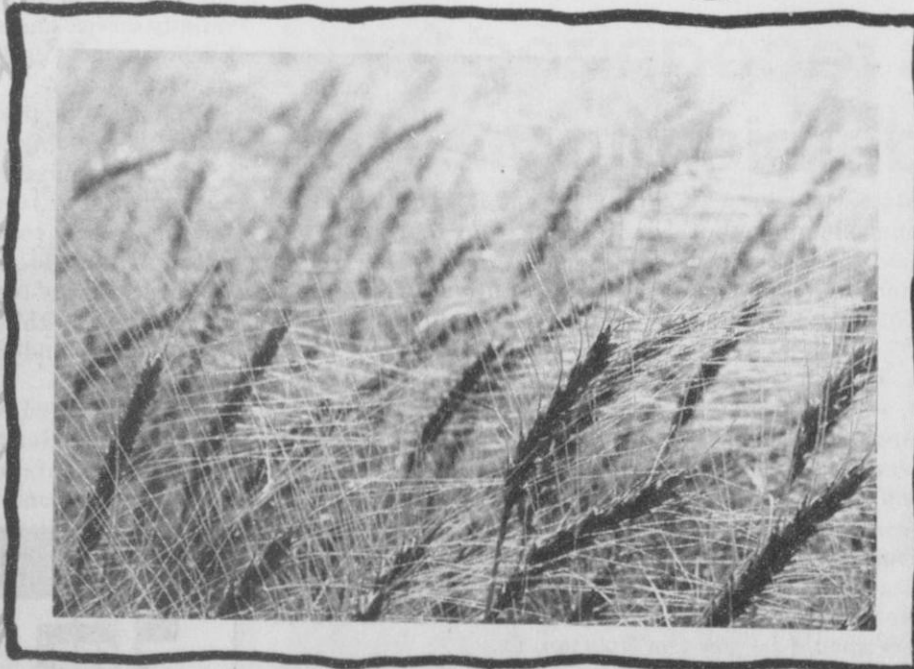

Extension News

A tanned complexion used to be viewed as healthy. Things are changing as people recognize the dangers of too much sun.

Your skin does not become more protected by the tan. Instead, the darker your tan, the more your skin has already been damaged. Long term results of exposure to ultraviolet rays, either from the sun, or from tanning booths, include: premature aging, wrinkles, thick, rough skin and skin cancer.

Even though tanning booths emit UVA rays, they are not harmless,

according to Dr. John Epstein, clinical professor of dermatology at the University of California.

UVA penetrates much deeper into the skin than UVB, he said, so the rays can damage dermal blood vessels. Thirty minutes exposure to UVA has been shown to suppress the immune system while prolonged exposure to UVA has been linked with skin aging, skin cancer and eye damage.

The most immediate severe damage caused by UVA is corneal burning. Goggles must be worn in tanning booths; simply closing one's eyes will not protect corneas and lens from damage, because UVA

passes through the eyelid.

Suntanning devices also aggravates certain diseases such as systemic lupus erythematosus.

Over 600,000 new cases of skin cancer are reported every year, making it the most common form of human cancer.

Any unusual growth or coloring change in the skin should be checked by your physician as should any mole that changes size, shape or color, or a sore that does not heal.

Prevention is the best defense

against skin cancer. Cover up with a wide-brimmed hat and use sunscreen with SPF of 15 or higher. Try to stay out of direct sun at midday.

Sun protection should begin in infancy and continue throughout life. It can take between 10 and 20 years for the damage to your skin from childhood sunburns and sun-tans to develop.

Remember, the sun's rays are harmful throughout the whole year, not just during the summer months.

The success of the garage sale was discussed. A special appreciation to all who helped work at the sale and to those who came was expressed.

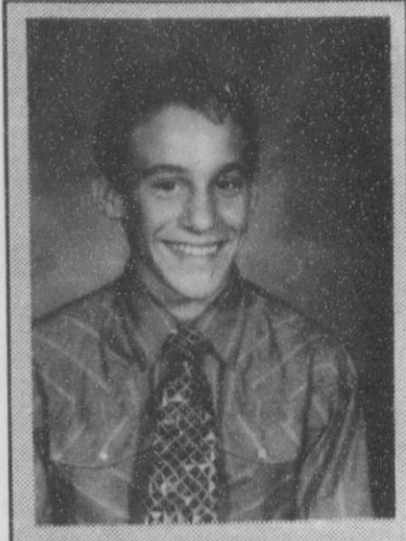

Another set of visitors were five college girls from North Carolina that were traveling and camping across country. They did pitch their tent near three RV's from Guymon, as they evidently felt safer being near others.

My grandchildren that live on the Palo Duro Creek saved a live snake that they found for me to see before they turned it loose where they had found it. It was new to me, although one of my books said it is found in all the North American grasslands except the California Grasslands. If you have it in your heart to call a snake pretty, this Ringneck Snake qualifies. It was a small slender snake with an orange neck ring and bright orange belly. They rest of the snake was a shiny gray. This secretive snake prefers moist places and is often seen under flat rocks, logs, of loose bark of dead trees. When threatened it displays the bright colored underside. It rarely attempts to bite when picked up, but it will void musk and foul-smelling contents. Some of these snakes have yellow or red neck rings.

Chad Wilkerson and Bill Pittman, two of Spearman's best in tennis this year, then received the boy's version of the same award.

If anyone is ever forgotten, it is the Cheerleaders. However, this banquet paid honor to those young ladies who stand on the side and cheer their team on no matter what. The girl who was to win the outstanding spirit award must always present a smile and cheer her team on no matter what the circum-

stances. According to Kandi Wolf, SHS Cheerleading Sponsor, "The girl who best fits that description would be Samantha Beasley." After Beasley was presented her award, Wolf then gave Senior Head Cheerleader, Mika Pipkin the most Outstanding Cheerleader Award.

Thanks to the generous support of the town of Spearman, the Booster Club was able to give out five \$500 scholarships to those in need. Not only could these five use the money, but they are also five athletes who have really given the fans at SHS a real thrill in the four years of high school. The five are: Josh Furlow, Valentine Macias, Mika Pipkin, Shawn Moore, and Chad Wilkerson.

This is the final of final for anything involving athletics for the town of Spearman. Every athlete, in no matter what they did, is surely appreciated by the fans of Spearman for all of the great memories.

Mayor Pro-Tem Reed stated that Fire Chief Ron Antalek has resigned. Randall Sauer, represent-

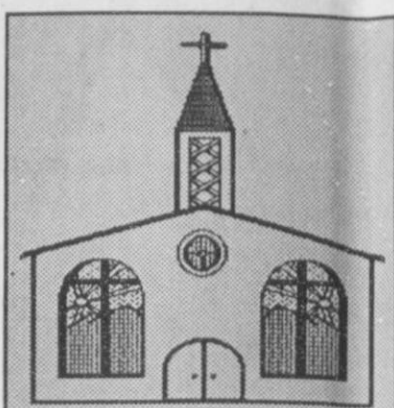

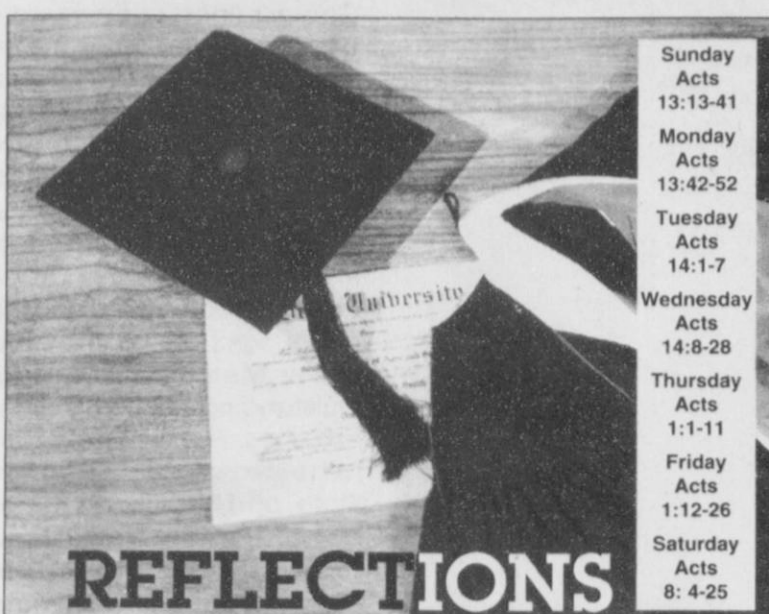

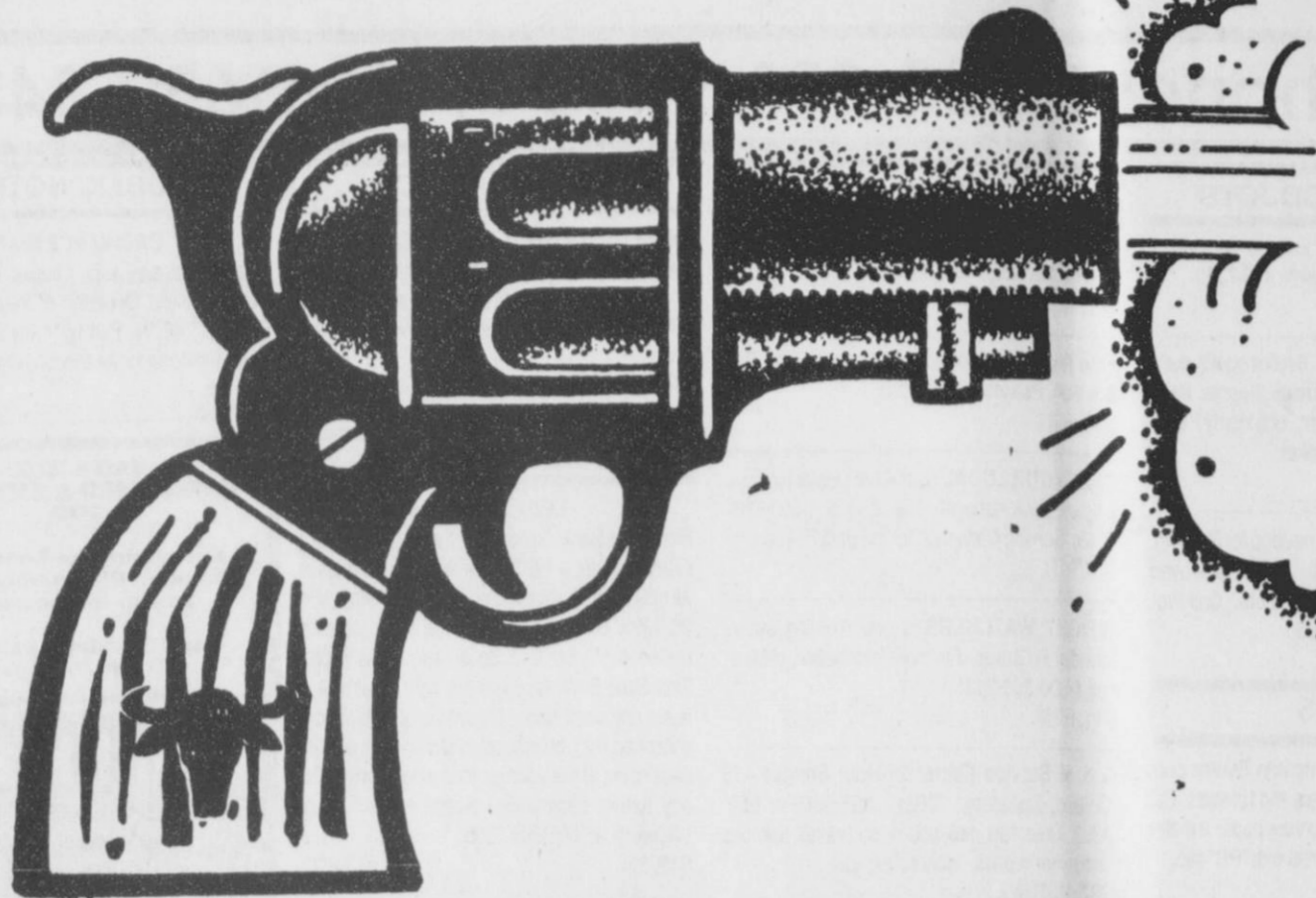
