Open Letter


An Open Letter to the Citizens of Spearman Hansford County Judge Benny Wilson has recently declared a state of disaster

for Hansford County due to drought and adverse weather conditions. This declaration prohibits the sale and use of fireworks throughout Hansford County. The City of Spearman has in many past years allowed the enjoyment of fireworks within the city limits. DUE TO THE EX-TREME WEATHER CONDITIONS THIS YEAR, NO FIREWORKS OF ANY KIND WILL BE ALLOWED TO BE SET OFF WITHIN THE SPEAR-MAN CITY LIMITS.

The Spearman Police Department and the Hansford County Sheriff's office will be enforcing these laws to their fullest extent. The penalty for violating the fireworks ban inside the city limits is a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by fine not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) and each day can be a separate offense.

Please respect the current extreme conditions and the property of those who live within our City as well as continue to pray for rain for our community and for those who have suffered loss during recent neighboring county fires.

Texas, June 13- Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 1.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.56/g yesterday. Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: The weather remained extremely hot, dry and windy, and the danger of wildfire remained high. Soilmoisture levels were very short in most counties. Corn and cotton were struggling with high winds and daytime temperatures above 100 degrees. Most farmers with irrigation were pumping continuously on all crops just trying to keep up with evaporation losses. Rangeland and pasture conditions were very poor. Livestock producers continued supplemental feeding. Some producers were dispersing herds.



THE PURPOSE OF THIS ORDER IS

Burn Ban extended as of June 13, 2011 Benny Wilson, Hansford County Judge

Disaster Declaration

WHEREAS, Hansford County has not had rainfall for an extended period of time, creating hot and dry conditions; and

WHEREAS, the hot and dry conditions pose the threat of large, dangerous and fast moving wildfires; and

WHEREAS, such fires have the potential of endangering lives and damaging property on a large scale; and WHEREAS, the Texas Government

Code Chapter 418 gives the county judge the power to declare a local disaster within the county "if the threat of disaster is imminent"; and WHEREAS, the magnitude of the po-

tential damage and the rapidity with which such a fire could escalate to major proportions constitute an imminent threat of disaster; and

WHEREAS, declaration of such disaster authorizes the imposition of controls on activities which tend to increase the likelihood of fires; and

WHEREAS, such controls, once implemented, have the potential of protecting lives and property by mitigating the threat of dangerous fires; and

WHEREAS, a declaration issued under Section 418.108 of the Texas Government Code may include a prohibition or restriction on the sale or use of all fireworks within the county, and

WHEREAS, a local disaster declaration expires seven days after its issuance, unless the Commissioners Court consents to its renewal or continuance; and

WHEREAS, to the extent that a declaration includes a provision related to fireworks, any portion of the provision that exceeds the restrictions authorized by Local Government Code §352.051 is effective only for 60 hours, unless the county judge requests and the governor authorizes an extension of the broader fireworks restriction.

BE IT THEREFORE PROCLAIMED that I, Benny D. Wilson, County Judge of Hansford County do hereby declare a local state of disaster based on the threat of large wildfires in Hansford, County,

BE IT ALSO PROCLAIMED that this state of disaster will continue until rescinded in accordance with the above cited statute, but in no instance will this declaration continue for more than seven days without being authorized by the Hansford County Commissioners Court, or in the event the declaration pertains to fireworks, no more than 60 hours unless an extension of the restriction on fireworks has been received from the gover-

BE IT ALSO PROCLAIMED that the purpose of this order is the mitigation of the hazard posed by wildfires by curtailing the practice of outdoor burning, and the sale and use of all fireworks, which purpose is to be taken into account in any enforcement action based upon this order.



Shapiro said her bill also removes the current salary floor for teachers and does away with the "last-in-firstout" policy when terminating teachers. The bill, if passed in its current form, also will void the contract of any teacher who does not keep up to date with state certification requirements.



Words from Faith & Grace

We celebrate Trinity Sunday as we study Genesis 1:1 2:4, Psalm 8, 2 Corinthians 13: 5-14, and Matthew 28: 6-20.

The Doctrine of the Trinity confuses many Christians and causes consternation among those who are Jews and Muslims. The core of the Jewish faith is that God is One. The core of the Muslim faith is that God is One. We as Christians worship One God presented in three persons--God the Father, Almighty, Jesus The Christ, and the Holy Spirit. The Doctrine of the Trinity was not fully developed by the church until the fourth century. However we see the basis of it in today's gospel lesson and in the gospel of John.

Genesis show us God, The Almighty, The Creator The Very God who made us and gave us our place in

The Psalmist sings of the majesty of God's name and the wonders of his creation. He asks, "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?" Yet, the Psalmist praises God for crowning humans with glory and honor. We may all have felt the 'smallness' of ourselves when alone in the wilderness and observing the myriad stars in the sky; yet, this is not the Psalmists point. For the Psalmist, he is surrounded by the gracious works of God and knows that God has given him his place in the creation. The powers that God has given to humans are God-like and should abuse nothing. We are given dominion over the earth, but not the right to destroy it.

Paul calls upon the errant Corinthians to rejoice. Rejoice despite persecution and enmity within the church Paul asks that the Corinthians work at putting their lives in order to restore their relationship with God. Paul asks that the Corinthians agree with one another as to the basics of the Christian faith and the requirements of that faith. Paul asks the Corinthians to live in peace and put their things in order (mend their ways). He ends his requests with a blessing, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you."

Jesus after the crucifixion tells Mary Magdalene to tell his brothers (disciples) to meet him in Galilee. When the disciples arrive in Galilee they worship Jesus, but some still doubted the resurrection. Jesus tells these disciples "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And, remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Jesus answered their doubts with assurance of his power. Jesus gave them a commission to work and promised them that they would have his 'presence' with them to the end of the

May the Holy Spirit enable you to understand our triune God is One God!



Tuesday April 12th we had 22 golfers show up for a round of golf. This week we did not have a team winner or a closest to the pin winner so both pots will carry over to next week.


April 5th

In addition to personal and professional contacts made, Holt contends that participating in collegiate rodeo at OSU taught her a great deal about herself and helped her building key life skills.

"I have learned how to multitask and juggle many re-
