Quick Thinking and Seatbelt Save Local Youth

When 17 year old Evan Cudd, looked out the window of the overturned pickup truck that he had been driving, to see the gates of the Hansford County Cemetery, he realized how fortunate he was to be alive.

Said Evan, "I saw some flowers that the wind had blown out of the cemetery and thought that if I had not been wearing my seatbelt, they would not have had to carry me very far."

Evan was delivering a Krause plow to David

Armes, who lives south of Gruver, when he lost control of the vehicle.

Although he was only driving 20 or 30 miles an hour, a combination of wind, a steep grade and a heavy load resulted in the accident.

After Evan realized that the plow was fishtailing, he saw an approaching vehicle. In order to keep from colliding with the approaching traffic, he turned toward the ditch, while clutching the steering wheel as tightly as possible.

Although the truck he was driving suffered exten-

sive damage, this quick thinking, resourceful young man walked away unharmed.

Evan, the son of Mike and Pat Cudd of Spearman said, "I think God was really watching over me."

The Spearman High School Senior went on to say, "I wear my seatbelt, because several of my friends have been in serious accidents. No one ever lectures me about it. It is just something that I do. No matter where you go, you need to wear a seatbelt."

FNB Receives Job Training Funds

The Texas Department of Economic Development has approved Smart Jobs Fund training grants to three small Texas banks.

"These are exactly the kind of jobs and paychecks that the Legislature intended to create when it established the Smart Jobs Fund," said Jeff Moseley, the agency's executive director. "Thanks to the support of Texas legislators, our agency continues to assist Texas businesses in creating high-skill, high-wage jobs for Texans."

First National Bank of Spearman will receive \$6,790 to train three people, Texas First Bank in Texas City is awarded \$7,425 to train three employees, and Texas National Bank in Jacksonville is granted \$2,422 to train one person.

The banks are participants in the Independent Bankers Association of Texas training consortium. A Smart Jobs consortium is a group of employers with similar training needs. Consortia sponsors include colleges, universities, businesses, non-profit organizations and associations that apply for Smart Jobs Fund grants on behalf of several businesses.

The three employees that will receive the grant funds are Brian Gillispie, Carrie Cenicerros, and Elaine Cook. In the application for the grant, First National Bank lined out courses for each of them to attend over the next year-and-a-half. They also agreed to review each employee after they have completed their education and to increase their salary in relationship to the education they have received.

Brian Gillispie will be enrolling in the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. His grant will pay for the first year of the three-year program.

Carrie, who was recently promoted to a new loan officer at First National Bank, will use the grant money to attend training seminars and schools dealing with credit analysis and commercial lending.

Elaine, who works in the investments area, will receive training in bank liquidity analysis and investments.

Key factors in approving the grants are the banks' qualifications as established businesses and first-time grantees offering major employee benefits and technical skills training. The banks will provide a 10 percent match to the grants in participant wages, benefits and facilities during the training period.

The Smart Jobs Fund provides grants to employers for customized training in manufacturing, demand and emerging occupations. In fiscal year 1998, Smart Jobs grants totaled nearly \$55 million to train workers for almost 43,000 existing and new jobs.

Mary Hart of Gruver, cousin of the groom, was the flower girl.

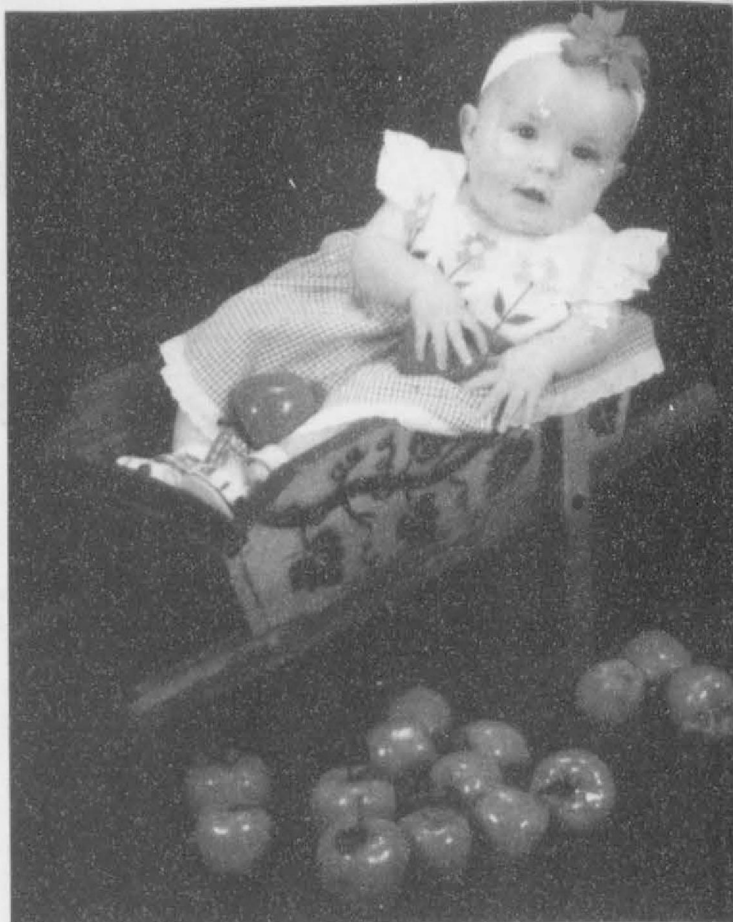

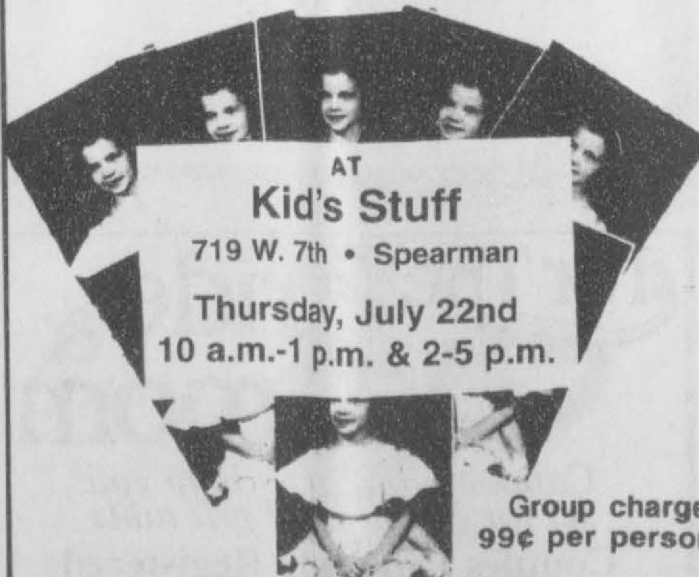

All also spent some time east of Spearman at A.D. Reeds, Hadley Reeds and Boyd Rices. This was before the 3.90 inches of rain fell there Friday evening. The Reeds seem to be in a rain zone; a couple of weeks before, they received 4.20 in one downpour.

Weather recorder Dwayne Smith, in addition to his time in broadcasting, news gathering, markets, weather watching some - "girl grinnin'" recorded data for the week of July 5th through 7 a.m. on July 12: High was on the 7th and 8th at 99 degrees; low on the 7th through 11th at 56; moisture was .95.

Two recent news items are thought provoking -

Last week Clinton toured the Oglala Sioux reservation at Pine Ridge, South Dakota. In his speech of praise for them (a vote getter), he stated that on the reservation "I have seen enormous courage." He promises more help for them, including new homes.

The article stresses the extreme, pitiful poverty, referring to it as the poorest region of America, with unemployment at 75% and only a few over half are high school graduates. No mention was made of the reservation being provided with schools, teachers, food stamps - every kind of welfare.

From the late 1800s and early 1900s, the Indians were settled on the reservations and have been the recipients of government charity -- er excuse the slip, entitlements (a century).

During this same century, from nearly every country in the world, impoverished people, unable to speak English, both educated and pitifully uneducated, have struggled to get into this country. Entering by sneaking, slipping, bribing, even some dying on the Mexican border, they came for the opportunities for a better life.

These people on the reservation - able to speak English, being schooled, with choice of leaving the reservation for employment - are in this pitiful condition after 100 years. Where is the "enormous courage?" Is more spoonfeeding the answer?

The other puzzling incident is that of the enlisted service men, one from Fritch, who recently refused to obey an order to be vaccinated for anthrax, fearful of some vague, unpleasant after

effect. Isn't enlisting in military service an acknowledgement that they will be in "Harms Way," facing danger, injury, possible death? Why did they enlist?

Jim said there were quite a few snakes being seen this summer. The July issue of Progressive Farmer has an interesting article titled Snakebites: Myths and Facts. It seems that much of what I

have been taught about the treatment of snakebites comes under the myths. I learned about tourniquets. They are out. The increased venom in one spot and the lack of circulation may lead to severe tissue damage and even amputation. The little cuts and the sucking of the blood --Out. I used to carry a little snake bite kit in my pickup that had a small scalpel and a rubber suction cup. The article said suction by the mouth or one of the rubber suckers do not provide sufficient negative pressure. Making the little cuts is also wrong. Drinking alcohol is a mistake. The article didn't mention the ice treatment that was big for awhile, but it did call the electric shock treatment that I have read quite a bit about as the best thing to do for a bite as another myth.

Proper First Aid

1. Identify the snake and calm the victim.
2. Clean the bitten area and apply direct pressure over the bite.
3. Keep the victim's activity to a minimum and keep the bite area to

the heart level to reduce swelling. 4. Call the hospital before or as you are going.

5. Ask that Poison Control be called for the proper giving of the antivenin.

We started coming to the Spearman community on a 70-day rotation about one year ago. We go to most all communities in the Texas panhandle on a 70-day rotation. This began due to the need to increase the amount of blood we collect, because the amount of blood needing to be provided has increased. On average our increase for need has been about 18%. We find no one reason for the increase, just the everyday things in life that people encounter. As a reminder, a few of those are surgeries, accidents, babies births and treatments for various diseases. Statistics show that in an average family of four, a minimum of 3 members will need blood available to them at some point in their lives.

In 1997, the residents of Spearman donated a total of 157 units of blood, in 1998 there was a total of 179 units of blood donated and in 1999 there has been a total of 89 units donated. We hope to see the numbers continuing to increase. When we come to your community we anticipate that we will receive about 20 units of blood.

We recognize that this is a busy time of year for everyone. Baseball games, summer celebrations, vacations and just your everyday work schedule consume most of our time. 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Researchers to Hold Conference in Amarillo

Speakers scheduled to address the conference include Terry Hawkins, Director of the Nonproliferation and International Security Division at Los Alamos National Laboratory, who will discuss counter/nonproliferation issues; Dr. Don Carlton, former Chief Executive Officer at Radian International, who will address chemical/biological issues relating to nonproliferation; and Ken Holley from Sandia National

Laboratories, who will talk about summer employment and research opportunities available at the national laboratories. The conference will conclude at noon on July 21.

There is no cost for attending the conference, which will be held at the Amarillo College Business and Industry Center, 1314 South Polk Street. Anyone wishing to attend the conference can register and obtain a conference agenda electronically via the ANRC web site (www.pu.org/conf99). On-site registration will also be accepted.

In this area it would be difficult to construct a brush arbor, as brush is not always readily available. We can, however erect a tent.

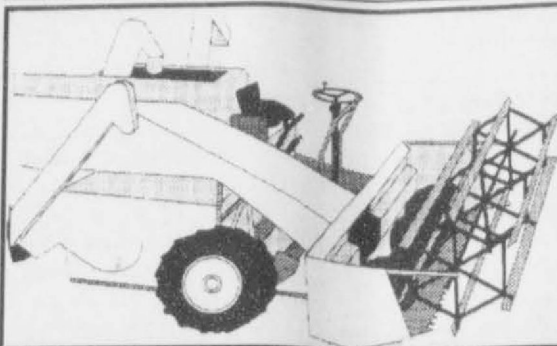

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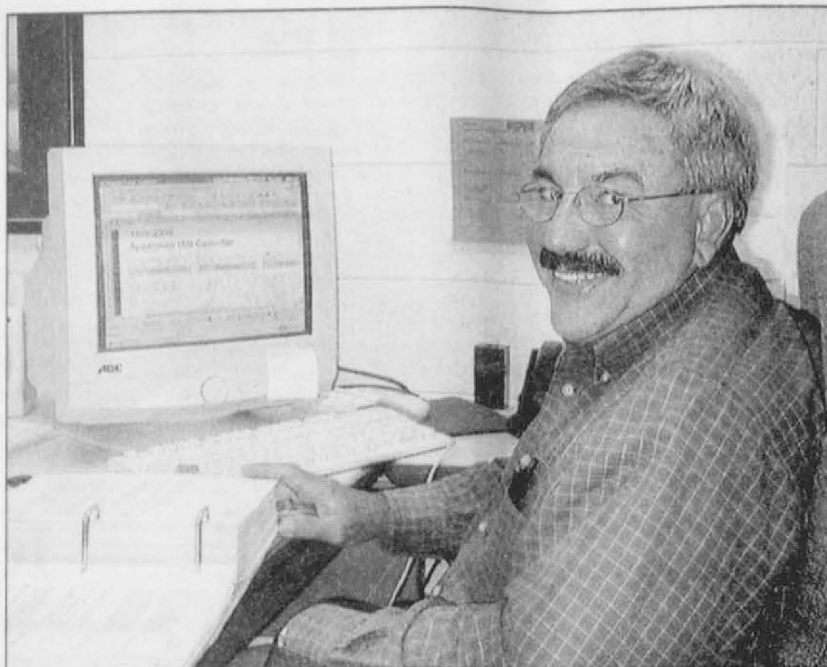
Murphy Named Spearman ISD Business Manager

Donald Bowen's cap as he officially retires from Northern Natural Gas after 40 years of service.

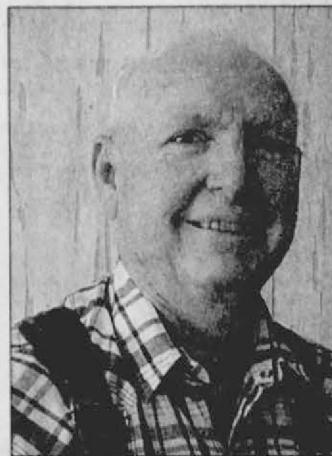
Donald and his wife, Veleta, were married in August of 1955 in Sunray. While in Sunray, Donald was employed by the Sunray Independent School District as a custodian.

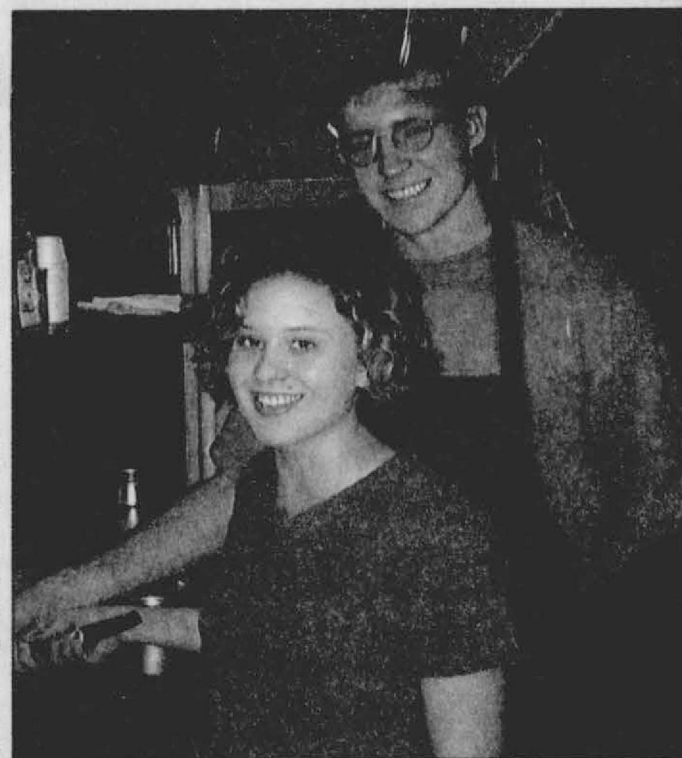
