## Library Book Notes

#### Abstract

Since this is National Library Week, I thought it might be inter eating to cover a little bit about the sting to cover a little bit about the history of Hansford County Library as well as some current facts. In 1932, the Twentieth Century Club decided that we needed a library here in Spearman so they held a tea and book shower. With a little money and sixty-five books, the li brary began taking shape. In 1934 what was then called the Spearman Public Library, officially opened in City Hall. In 1960 the library moved City Hall. In 1960, the library moved to the Hansford County Courthouse so there would be more room. The so there would be more room. The name changed to the Hansford County Library in 1967 when the present facility was purchased, and the library has been going strong ever since. The library is presently funded by money from the Thrift Shop, monthly allotments from both the City of Spearman and Hansfor County, and the quarterly distributon of the voluntary assessments collected by the city for the library collected by the city for the library parks and recreation and economic parks and rec development various organizations that hav helped the library with funding an sists of two people appointed by th city, two appointed by the county, three appointed by Twentieth Cen tury Club, one appointed by Lions Club and there is one vacant sea on the board caused by the recent disbanding of the Spearman Book Club. The people serving on th board include Myrna Biggers, pres ident; James Cunningham, vice president; J.L.
