The emphasis of International Visitor Program is to increase mutual understanding through communication at the personal and professional levels. Participants in the program are established or potential foreign leaders in their countries and are selected by American embassies overseas to visit the United States to meet and confer with their professional counterparts and to experience our country firsthand. Among the program's alumni are 192 current and former Heads of Government or Chiefs-of-State.

Of great importance to the program are the commitment and skills of 97 community-based organizations across the country. WIC Clinic Offers Free Class

Outreach Health Services' Women, Infants and Children program is sponsoring a free health and nutrition education class entitled, "Childhood Obesity: Lily Faces A Problem" throughout the month of June.

Cases of childhood obesity in the United States has risen about 50 percent over the past 20 years. The alarming rise in overweight children, however, is no surprise to Linda DeFrank, Outreach Health Services WIC nutritionist and education specialist WIC employees routinely graph the height and weight of children enrolled in local WIC programs. Just as the studies and statistics are saying, DeFrank does see more and more young children who are tipping the scale a little too much.

This issue is much bigger than worrying about whether or not your child will get teased at school," DeFrank said. "When children are obese, they are at a higher risk for developing type II

diabetes, heart disease, hypertension and other unwanted health problems. Most people don't develop these diseases until they are well into their adult years. Also, most overweight children grow up to be overweight adults. So the higher threat of disease stays with them.'

Joyce Deveraux, Director of WIC Programs at Outreach Health Services, said the epidemic of childhood obesity is a combination of two social trends: Lack of physical activity and poor food choices.

Perhaps even more concerning than the sedentary lifestyle is the diet many children consume today. According to Deveraux, society eats "convenience" foods more than ever.

To help parents come up with healthier, alternate food choices as well as fun physicals activities, WIC will offer a free seminar to the public entitled, "Childhood Obesity: Lily Faces A Problem," which includes a video, take-home

literature and a question and answer session on the following dates: June 21 (3 p.m.); June 26 (8 a.m. and noon); and June 28 (2 p.m. & 5:30 p.m.).

Starting in July, WIC will present a new education class entitled "Growing Healthy Families Through Physical Activity." Voice of Compassion

Fiorello LaGuardia was mayor of New York City during the worst days of the Great Depression and all of WWII. He was adored by many New Yorkers who took to calling him the "Little Flower," because he was so short and always wore a carnation in his lapel.

He was a colorful character - he rode the New York City fire trucks, raided city "speakeasies" with the police department, took entire orphanages to baseball games, and when the New York newspapers went on strike, he got on the radio and read the Sunday funnies to the kids.

One bitterly cold night in January of 1935, the mayor turned up at a night court that served the poorest ward of the city. LaGuardia dismissed the judge for the evening and took over the bench himself. Within a few minutes, a tattered old woman was brought before him, charged with stealing a loaf of bread. She told LaGuardia that her daughter's husband had deserted her, her daughter was sick, and her two grandchildren were starving.

But the shopkeeper, from whom the bread was stolen, refused to drop the charges. "It's a real bad neighborhood, your Honor," the man told the mayor. "She's got to be punished to teach other people around here a lesson."

LaGuardia sighed. He turned to the woman and said, "I've got to punish you. The law makes no exceptions. Ten dollars or ten days in jail." But even as he pronounced sentence, the mayor was already reaching into his pocket. He extracted a bill and tossed it into his famous hat, saying, "Here is the ten dollar fine which I now remit; and furthermore I am going to fine everyone in this courtroom fifty cents for living in a town where a person has to steal bread so that her grandchildren can eat. Mr. Bailiff, collect the fines and give them to the defendant."

The following day, New York City newspapers reported that \$47.50 was turned over to a bewildered woman who had stolen a loaf of bread to feed her starving grandchildren. Fifty cents of that amount was contributed by the grocery store owner himself, while some seventy petty criminals, people with traffic violations, and New York City policemen, each paid fifty cents.

Someone beautifully said, "Sympathy sees and says, 'I'm sorry.' Compassion sees and says, 'I'll help.' When we learn the difference, we can make a difference.



Sunray Co-Op, Gruver Branch, received their first load of wheat on Tuesday, June 12. The load was delivered by Tony Shapley.

According to Robert Johnson, manager, test weights are running between 62-65 pounds per bushel.

The harvest will be in full gear this week as elevators are also beginning to receive wheat from irrigated fields.

The price of wheat on Monday, June 18, was \$2.78 per bushel at both Bernstein and Gruver.

Last year, the first loads of wheat in the Gruver area were delivered to both facilities on June 8., with the test weights fluctuating between 55 - 61 pounds per bushel and the price between \$2.47 -\$ 2.52.

One thing is clear when it comes to fairness: It is often a matter of perception. There is usually more than one fair choice, when making decisions based upon fairness. However, there are some basic practices to be considered when making decisions. These include:

* Consider all the facts, including opposing

views, before making a decision. * Use the same criteria, rules, or standards




