#### THE RURAL SCHOOLS

The rural school problem in Texas for many years has been worrying educators and others who have realized its importance. It is also the pet theme of the politician, and the "little red school house" has been the inspiration of much forensic bombast. But to those who have given the question serious thought, there appears to be little improvement over former years. The average rural school, no doubt, compares favorably with many of those in the towns, during the short time they are the teacher, the student is handicapped by the brief term. The question is, how can the matter be remedied? It is not wholly a question of money, for the average farmer needs all the help he can obtain at sertain seasons of the year to handle his growing crops. And that season often conflicts terminology is confusing and needs to be straightwith the school term. If the rural schools could arrange to have a short summer session, after the erops are "laid by" without shortening the winter term, a great part of the problem will have been solved. Here is where the question of sufficient funds obtrudes. Appropriations ought to be made to provide money for summer terms of two or three months and inthis way the rural schools can meet the requirements of the student until he reaches the higher grades.

#### A VISION OF THE FUTURE

Speaking before the State Federation of Labor, at Houston, E. J. Crocker had this to say: "I can see a time not far away when there will be no strikes, and differences between employe and employer will all be settled as sensible men should settle them-around the conference table." It is to be hoped that the State Labor Commissioners' vision of the future will prove correct, and it would seem that he is justified in his belief. Arbritrary methods never settle a dispute permanently and the side that makes a concession usually has something to say at a later date. The proverbial and more or less fictitious war between capital and labor was encouraged by a few leaders whose motives were selfish. They do not impose their will upon their followers as readily as in former years. It is becoming more apparent that the rank and file recognize that a question is never settled until it is settled amicably.

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
