

by Pam Dillard, Texas Agricultural Extension Service The region's largest power utility provides more than electricity to the communities it serves, says Angela Burkham, area 4-H and youth development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who serves youth education needs for 41 counties in the Panhandle and South Plains. Each year Southwestern Public Service Company supports area and local 4-H programs across the High Plains.

According to Burkham, the Texas 4-H Foundation Board wanted to recognize SPS with its highest award for the company's long history of working with kids, swing its employees as volunteer educators, and the substantial financial support it provides each year.

The Gruver Greyhounds are launching a new basketball season with a new head coach at the helm.

Former Texas Tech basketball standout, Glenn Hallum, who moved to Gruver with his family this summer from Brownfield, is the new varsity boys basketball coach. He and his wife, Kay, have three children, Diana, who lives at Hale Center; Alisa, a Texas Tech student and former Clarendon College basketball player; and Lance, a sophomore. The couple also has one grandchild, Katie.

Hallum is a graduate of Brownwood High School where he played for Coaches Slim Warren and Pete Murray. During Hallum's senior year, his team won district honors and competed in the regional finals. Unfortunately, for Hallum and his team, he broke his foot in a practice game with San Antonio just prior to the regional playoffs and was unable to play.

That regional tournament was the last game Hallum would ever miss as a basketball player. Continuing his play at Texas Tech, Hallum started in every game in each of his four seasons with the university. He served as captain of the Tech team his senior year and played with such notables as Doug McMaliase, Norman Ruther, Harold Denny, and Dave Olsen.

In Hallum's senior year, Tech led the Southwest Conference by four wins making a conference title award seem inevitable . It was then, however the Tech team discovered that one player had

Personable and talented Hallum received many honors at the university including second team all-conference, senior class favorite, and the coveted Mr. Texas Tech title.

After graduation from Tech, Hallum procured his Master's Degree in Dairy Food and Technology with a minor in Agricultural Economics.

Hallum then began his coaching career as head boys basketball coach in Brownfield. He also coached at Alice High School where his good friend Spike Dykes was head football coach.

After coaching at Lubbock High, Hallum was contacted by a builder in Houston who offered triple his coaching wages for a job in the construction field. After six years in Houston, Hallum and his wife, Kay, moved back to West Texas to raise their family. After stints in the backhoe, convenience store, and insurance businesses; Hallum returned to his first love of coaching at Brownfield High School. He cites his reasons for returning as "missing the kids and the competition involved in basketball" and his son's desire to be coached by his father.





fishermen out. Jim has been enjoying seeing the bald eagles that have been staying around the Lake. He has seen as many as 6 at a time, with 2 of them mature with the white heads and tails.

If you are interested in birds, stop at the office and see the terrific poster of Birds of Prey that A. J. Ratliff, City Manager at Gruver, found, had framed, and gave to the PDRA. It is hanging in the lobby and is well worth a special trip to see it. Many thanks, A. J.

Our game warden, Mike Wheat of Perryton, had a memorable moment at the park last week when he spotted a bobcat kitten. He followed it, and it led him over a little hill to 3 more kittens and their mother. He said they were all very dark.

Many of us are keeping up with the move of the 40 or 50 buffalo from the JA Ranch to the Caprock Canyons State Park at Quitaque by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. A television report showed them shooting a cow with a dart tranquilizer and then loading her in a stout crate like trailer to haul to a pen where she was branded, vaccinated, and had a blood sample taken to DNA type the herd. The last news item I saw in the Amarillo Daily said so far they had only captured 18 head. They were going to stop during deer hunting season and resume after Dececember 7. The bison are to be moved to their new home by February 28.

This historic herd was saved


from extinction by Colonel Charles Goodnight and the owners that have followed him on the JA Ranch.

Does anyone know when the last buffalo was killed in Hansford County? In Jim Cator's short diary of 1884, he tells of hunting buffalo on March 28 at Tylers. In his words "I got Roany and the Creedmore gun and went and killed 3 buffs and wounded 4 more--But as I had to come back for Knives I could not bother to follow them as I wanted to save the meat."


On April 3 he wrote, "Taylor and mailboy left with Tobacco for Billy Dixon--Clara and Tom ran some buffalo. They were just west in the lake 4 miles out."

On April 5, he went after his buffalo hides. This makes Mr. Cator sound bloodthirsty, but he had let a buffalo bull stay around the place all winter. He mentioned that he had jumped into the hay corral once, but the remarks make the reader know he enjoyed having him near.

As a child I heard stories of how Clara Cator, riding sidesaddle, would ride into a herd of running buffalo and run with them for the thrill. Her brothers finally convinced her that she was being foolish--that if her horse stumbled that was the last of Clara. Then as I got older, I read that the buffalo were killed out by 1879, and I also learned that Clara did not arrive at the Zulu Stockade until 1879. I hated to turn loose of this story, but I also hate to revise history. Now with Mr. Cator's diary, I think I can have my story. The buffalo were still coming but in smaller and smaller numbers.

When I read the following editorial in the most recent issue of Library Journal, I felt that it was certainly something worth thinking about and sharing with all of you. Think what we might accomplish through better collaboration that we cannot accomplish alone or as individual entities. I think that we are starting to see the possibilities in some instances, but there are so many more that would benefit from shared resources and a common goal. Just a little food for thought ...

The following is an editorial by John N. Berry III, Editor-in-Chief for the Library Journal.

"It's the community," he said. "We have to move beyond the more narrow mission of each institution to unite behind the mission of the community." Larry Leverett, the superintendent of schools in Plainfield, NJ, made that statement at a program on the future of public institutions put together by Libraries for the Future (LFF), a New York-based library advocacy organization.

Like many epiphanies, the idea seemed obvious and familiar. It resonated with my professional experience. Even though it is already part of library and community practice in experiments nationwide, it is, in fact, a radical new idea for public-sector institutions and public professions. Embattled public-sector professionals struggling under the tax-cutting, downsizing, outsourcing tactics of current



mayors and managers may not want to hear about a new way to work right now. The library mission - i.e., as librarians understand it, not necessarily the formal mission statement - is not always compatible with that of other local institutions. It may overlap or compete with schools, parks and recreation, or even the cops and firefighters.

When professionals are told they can achieve more together than they can in their separate institution, they begin to have turf and competency fears. Consider the phobias that plague our own profession. Think of our ancient knee-jerk opposition to school and public library sharing and our repeated rejection of shared facilities, school-based library branches, and any loss of control.

When we start collaborating (not simply cooperating, but real sharing of purposes and service), we must share the control, the money, the policymaking, and the facilities; we must agree on the mission. Old barriers are tough to overcome. When turf issues come up, everyone becomes a control freak.

But it isn't just turf issues. Working with varied institutional cultures is even tougher. Try the library view of unfettered freedom of individual inquiry on a middle school teacher. Tell the United Fund information center that the library can do it better! Tell the recreation professionals that the library's summer program is


"better" because it reaches kids' intellect. Tell the new city manager that it has to be free to be fair, when other people are saying they'd be glad to pay for "better service" as they are already paying fees for tennis courts and museums. When you get deeper into opposing theories of government, politics, education, recreation, discipline, or security,


things can really break down. On the back of Billie Dancy's business card is not the mission of the library she directs but the mission of the City of Oakland. LFF is helping Dancy's West Oakland Branch try real collaborations with kids, parents, and other pubic institutions. Out in Westchester County, NY, despite long experience in the education culture wars, librarians and educators are working together in the Tall Tree Initiative to create a new, integrated kind of library/school experience for kids. They get support and a strong push toward real collaboration from Claudia Edwards and the Reader's Digest Foundation. In Darien, CT, technology has been used to tie the library to the schools and nearly every other town department. In Corvallis, OR, the library works together with parents, children, schools, and parks on the hugely successful Yes for Kids program.


All these people and professionals discovered that a shared community mission takes more hard work and deeper compromise than going it alone. At risk are professional pride, identity, and exclusive ownership.

Still, if the movement toward collaboration survives, it could mean restored faith in public institutions, new civic pride, and new evidence that government has the power to solve problems. Those are such compelling needs in our self-absorbed American society. Despite the high risk, we must add library power to community power right now!








ahead 20-21.


