



Of course, water was not a problem with the nearby pond. Every day Ollie took a pan of maize to feed the big sandhill crane, but for many days the shy bird would not come close to her. Finally, though, she could hold the pan of grain, and he would come up to her and eat out of the pan. He had nothing to do with the dogs, cats, and chickens.

Ollie never named the crane. Her four sisters, her two brothers, and her parents all called him "Ollie's bird," and she simply called him "my crane."

When spring came and the first folck of sandhill cranes flew overhead, Ollie could tell her crane wanted to join them. When the second flock came, he left, but his wing was not strong enough, and he came back. A little later in the spring Ollie heard the garoooa-a-aa of the third flock. She rushed to the pond in time to see her pet take to the air, and this time he made it. She supposed she would never see him again, but that fall when the flocks returned south, a crane flew over the pond, circled it three times, and then joined the others. This was repeated for three years before "my crane" became one of Ollie's treasured memories.



ing a child to "forget it and get on with your life" was adequate therapy. How uninformed we were! Unless the molestation is neutralized by adequate counselling such experiences make deep wound that belch poison into future years. The victims, even when happily living with a good and considerate husband, all too frequently continue to experience hideous nightmares that jerk them awake by their own screams. There are other forms of flashbacks. Sometimes physical symptoms, for which no medical reason can be found, trace back to buried memories of such an episode. Imagine how much worse it would be if those episodes continued over a period of time.

So we are thrilled to have received the sexual assault grant. It will provide training for our staff to help those who must deal with this type of abuse, whether it happened an hour ago or years ago; whether it was once only, or many times over.


Our staff member who is currently involved in just this type of thing makes a weekly visit to a local school to provide counselling to 5 such children, ages 7 to 15 victims of domestic violence, or assault, or both. This problem does not go away by pretending it doesn't exist. The fastest way to make it "go away" is to confront it and deal with it.

Somehow we must get the message to victims, young or old, that

help is available. Our staff has also received training in "defense mechanisms." These "mechanisms" are not karate or some such physical expertise. There are other ways of diverting the unwanted behavior. All our schools should set up a time for teaching this king of management to our children.

November provided a very busy month for our fairly new Hispanic advocate. She deals primarily with those who don't speak English very comfortably, and is conducting two support groups for the non-resident women and their children. "Nonresident" means women who are not in need of a safe house but who must learn ways of dealing with a difficult situation at home. She has one group of 10 Caucasian women and 15 children, and another group of 6 Hispanic women with 12 children. For the Hispanic group she is also providing sensitivity to the cultural differences.

The Panhandle Crisis Center offers services free of charge to men or women who are victims of domestic violence, whether physical or "merely" verbal. We give counseling, support, and information to these victims, plus a shelter to those who feel themselves to be in danger at home. We are available for help 24 hours a day, at 435-5008. If you want information only, call us form 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. For those who must call us long distance, us the tollfree number: 1-800-753-5308.
