



Museum Musings

Craig Clyburn, manager of Palo Duro Feeders and Texas Beef Producers Feedyard, has been a collector of Civil War memorabilia since he was a young man in his twenties. The interest in finding these artifacts was a great stress reliever after work and on weekends. Most

of the pieces were found with a

metal detector.

Always a person who loved Texas History, Craig became interested in collecting anything he could find relating to this subject. The Civil War pieces were plentiful as he lived near Fort Duncan at Eagle Pass and Fort Clark in Bracketville. Most of what was found was Civil War surplus, pieces left from the Civil War used in the Indian Wars.

Craig's favorite piece is an eagle

of polished brass with a shield and crossed sabres. It was decoration, a helmet plate, from a United States Calvary Helmet. The helmet was designed to copy Prussian helmets. Craig has thousands of pieces in his collection, some of which he still has not cleaned. There is a lot of lead shot from muskets, Army Service collar buttons, locks, shell casings, calibre lead bullets, buckles, uniform buttons, cap ornaments, and horse bits, just to name a few.

When the Union soldiers were pulled back east, they abandoned the forts. The Confederate Armies moved into them. The projectiles, missiles for a firearm or cannon, that were found, represent the Confederate Army influence.

Craig's display at the Stationmaster House Museum, allows many of us to see pieces of history that we would never have been able to see. This is a great teaching aid for the children of Hansford County. Seeing these pieces will make history come alive for the students. I urge every parent or teacher to make their children aware of Craig's collection. Take them by the Museum!

Employer guidelines for dealing with IRCA, what to do - who to call

Today's employers have many items to keep in mind to maintain a business. One of those items that has to be handled is the Immigration Reform and Control Act.

The Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA) makes it illegal to hire anyone who is not authorized to work in the United States. The law requires that employers verify the identity and work eligibility of every employee hired after Nov. 6, 1986, the date IRCA went into effect. To show verification, employers must complete the Immigration and Naturalization Service's Form I-9.

In attempting to prevent the employment of undocumented workers, however, IRCA has presented problems for employers who may be unintentionally - but illegally - discriminating in their hiring practices. Some employers mistakenly believe that they should only hire U.S. citizens or that they can legally turn away any applicant who sounds or looks "foreign."

This is apparently a widespread problem. Agovernment study found that about 19 percent of employers across the nation are violating the law by treating job applicants unfairly. Texas, with 28 percent of employers discriminating, has the worst record in the country.

Many employers do not un stand the record keeping and antidiscrimination provisions of IRCA. The requirements are not complicated, but they do take some understanding.

In essence, the law requires that employers treat all people the same - in announcing the job, taking applications, interviewing, offering the job, filling out the Form I-9, hiring and firing.

That means employment decisions can't be made based on the worker's race, ethnic heritage, appearance, or accent, or because of any suspicion or opinion about the worker's eligibility to work legally in the United States. It is illegal to favor a non-citizen over a citizen, and vice versa.

Ignorance of the law is no excuse. Employers who violate IRCA can be fined thousands of dollars by the Office of Special Counsel, U.S. Department of Justice. If they discriminate against workers or prospective workers, they can also be liable for back pay.

Allow the worker to produce these documents within three work days. If the job you're hiring for lasts three days or less, the workers must produce the necessary documents at the time of hire.

*Write down the name and number of the documents produced on the employer section of the I-9. That's all there is to it.

*Later, if a temporary work document is about to expire, you can

As an employer, what should renewed. If the document expires and is not renewed, the worker can present other documents listed on the I-9 to prove identity and work

> Remember, don't single anybody out. For example, don't ask any workers to produce documents before you hire them. And don't pick and choose among the documents listed.

* If a worker offers documents * Then, have the worker fill out from the lists that appear genuine, accept them. Don't accept documents that you know are false, or don't belong to the worker offering

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

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



This past Friday evening, September 23, was Homecoming and with it the big football game against the Booker Kiowas, and boy did Queen Julie Meyer bring the football team luck! The Hounds went into the game with a fine record of two wins and only one loss, and Booker did not produce a challenge for the Hounds, as Gruver blistered the Kiowas 41-0. It was the second rout of the season for the Hounds, the second in a row, as last week they buried Highland Park 54-6. The first floor of the press box was filled to capacity for the Booker-Gruver game, with radio stations, one in Perryton and one in Guymon, broadcasting the game. Besides those people, there were also scouts from Panhandle State University in Goodwell, as well as scouts from the Panhandle Panthers. There was hardly room enough for little ole me!

"It was a good team effort," said Hounds Coach Doug Frick this past Saturday morning. "A lot of people played very well," he continued. "Our offensive line is much improved, other than with the holding penalties. Everybody played well, and that's what you want. Our team attitude is very good. Defensively, it was the same thing- everybody played well.'

Coach Frick talked about the two quarterbacks, Jace Dawson and Bailey Barkley, who each played a half. "Both quarterbacks are doing a super job," said Coach Frick. "It is a week to week thing. They are making each other play better-they are helping each other.

Aaron Frick kicked off for Gruver at the onset of the game (he kicked off eight times for an average of 51.9 yards per kick), and the first series of downs for Booker was an indication of how things would be this night. Bobcats sweep Gruver Greyhounds, take all three games

The Gruver Greyhounds 7th, the 8th grade, and the Junior Varsity all played well, but each lost a tough decision to the Sunray Bobcats teams this past Thursday, September 22. It simply was not a night for the avid Hounds fan.
