The O'Loughlin Center will be hosting a musical night of Country-Western Opry singers this Saturday, April 22 beginning at 7 p.m.

Performers from throughout the Panhandle will be on stage in Spearman.

Scheduled to perform are Clint Christie, Laquita Evans, Betty Chisum, Trooper Barker, Sharla Lee Hayes, Stan Cobb, and Carla's Dance Studio.

Trooper Barker of Stinnett, Texas has been writing music since 1970, and has recorded for the "Love Record" Label and, more recently, the "Texas Soul" Label. He has performed at the Big Texas Opry and the Berger Opry as a solo act.

He is also a member of what is considered one of the hottest bands in the area - "Country Express", in which he plays rhythm guitar and sings lead vocals. Barker has performed as a soloist and as a member of "Country Express" in Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Missouri and Texas.

Barker will be appearing in Branson, Missouri and surrounding areas this summer and at the XIT Rodeo Dance in August this year.

Betty Chisum, former of Gruver and now living in Adrian, Oklahoma, began singing in a gospel quartet while she was a student at WTSU. Since that time, she has performed in many oprys and country music shows in the Tri-State area.

She has appeared on the Johnnie High Country Music Review in Fort Worth, the West Texas Opry in Lubbock, the Silverton Opry, the Hereford Opry, the Kaufman Country Opry, and is currently a regular

performer on the Big Texas Opry in Amarillo.

She was also the opening act for Michael Martin Murphy in Clouderoft, NM in 1993.

Laquita Evans, a resident of Spearman, has performed as a one woman show at area country clubs, private clubs and parties. She has also appeared on the Johnnie High Country Music Review in Fort Worth and numerous area oprys. She is now appearing on a regular basis on the Big Texas Opry in Amarillo.

Sharla Lee Hayes, daughter of David and Sandy Hayes, is a 17-year-old freshman at Amarillo College. She plans to attend Belmont University in Nashville, Tennessee, majoring in the music business.

Hayes has been performing in dance and vocal since she was three years old. She performed in Fun Valley, Colorado; at Branson, Missouri; in Nashville, and is currently a regular performer at the Big

Texan Opry with the Top of Texas Cloggers.

She will be in Austin performing with the Texas Musical Drama for the rededication of the State Capitol, and is scheduled to perform at the Loretta Lynn Talent Search in Hurrigan Mills, Tennessee; and at the original "Grand Ole Opry House" in Nashville. She will also be at Opryland with the Top of Texas Cloggers for National Clogging Championships from July 16th through the 20th.

Also appearing will be Clint Christie, a terrific 16-year-old from White Deer. He has also performed at the Big Texan Opry as well as many local and area events in the panhandle.

Stan Cobb, AKA Cowboy Jack, is a sought after Cowboy Poet, humorist, entertainer and after dinner speaker. He has been on television several times including Fox Television's "Best of the Worst".

**Gruver's Frick signs with Sam Houston State**

Senior, Aaron Frick, will continue his excellence in track, in the throwing events, as of this fall he will be attending Sam Houston University in Huntsville, Texas. Thanks to his awesome ability in heaving out the discus and shot put, Frick has received a scholarship to the school, in which he signed a letter of intent last Wednesday, April 12th.

Frick has dominated both rings at every meet he has competed in, and being chosen for a scholarship for throwing, should be no surprise to some. Even as a freshman, Frick competed quite well on the varsity squad. He currently holds the Gruver High School disc and shot record, with a chunk of 169' 6" in the disc, which he earned at the Texas Relay's in

Austin, and a big throw of 54' 6" in the shot.

Also, due to astounding throws this past weekend at the District Track Meet in Gruver, a 167' 8" in the disc, and 54' 3 1/4" in the shot, Frick will be making a stop at Abilene for the Regional Meet. He should do well there, and should be propelled into this year's State Meet in Austin.

He also has proved this year that besides track, he could play outstandingly in football, with an appearance on the all-district team, and basketball, as he was part of the winning Houndball team.

He is the son of Coach Doug and Peggy Frick, and, in addition, he has a younger brother, Max, and a younger sister, Bonnie.

**TxDOT to hold public meeting to discuss planned projects**

The Amarillo District of the Texas Department of Transportation will hold a public meeting to explain how transportation projects are planned by the department and to gather public input regarding the current Transportation Improvement Plan for the district. The meeting will be Thursday, May 11, 1995 at 7:00 P.M. in the second floor courtroom of the Hansford County Courthouse in Spearman, Texas.

The public meeting will cover transportation plans for all areas of the Panhandle and the overall view of the planning process, as well as the criteria used for selecting individual projects. Draft versions of current transportation plans will be presented at the meeting for public comment.

The public is invited to speak about projects currently being planned or any additional projects which might be proposed. Speakers are limited to five minutes. Verbal and written comments from the public regarding any project may be submitted at the meeting. The Board of Trustees of the Spearman Independent School District met in Regular Session on April 11, 1995 in room #114 of the High School at 7:00 P.M.

Mr. James Schnell, President of the Board of Trustees, announced that a quorum was present and called the meeting to order.

Jan Williamson requested the use of the varsity gym and activity gym on April 29, 1995 for a little girls basketball tournament as the first order of business. This would not be an AAU sanctioned activity. The Board then went on to the Action Items portion of the agenda.

Following a discussion, the Board requested additional information from Joe Means with Southwest Recreational concerning the track renovation. A called meeting in the near future will be scheduled for a report to the Board and possible action.

The Board then accepted Hoover Brother's bid of \$36,928.00 for auditorium seating.

They next accepted Witt Builders' bid of \$9,404.10 for carpet for the auditorium, and they also accepted Jack Thomas & Son's bid of \$8,989.00 to paint the auditorium. The Board then approved the

use of Birdwell funds for the auditorium renovation.

They accepted Mike Murphy Company's bid of \$32,100.00 to paint twelve rooms and hallways in the old part of the elementary school.

They accepted Nunn Electric's bid of \$6,912.00 for new light fixtures in the old part of the elementary school.

They accepted Denman Building Products' bid of \$12,779.00 for drop ceilings in the old part of the elementary school using Birdwell funds.

They approved the nomination of the Superintendent and one principal for the Texas School Improvement Initiative Program.

The Board then approved the Technology Interlocal Agreement with Pringle-Morse and Stinnett.

They established the 1995-96 Transfer fee at \$4,562.00, and finally they accepted the gas/diesel quote from Spearman Equity.

During the discussion items portion of the agenda Board Training opportunities in April and May were presented.

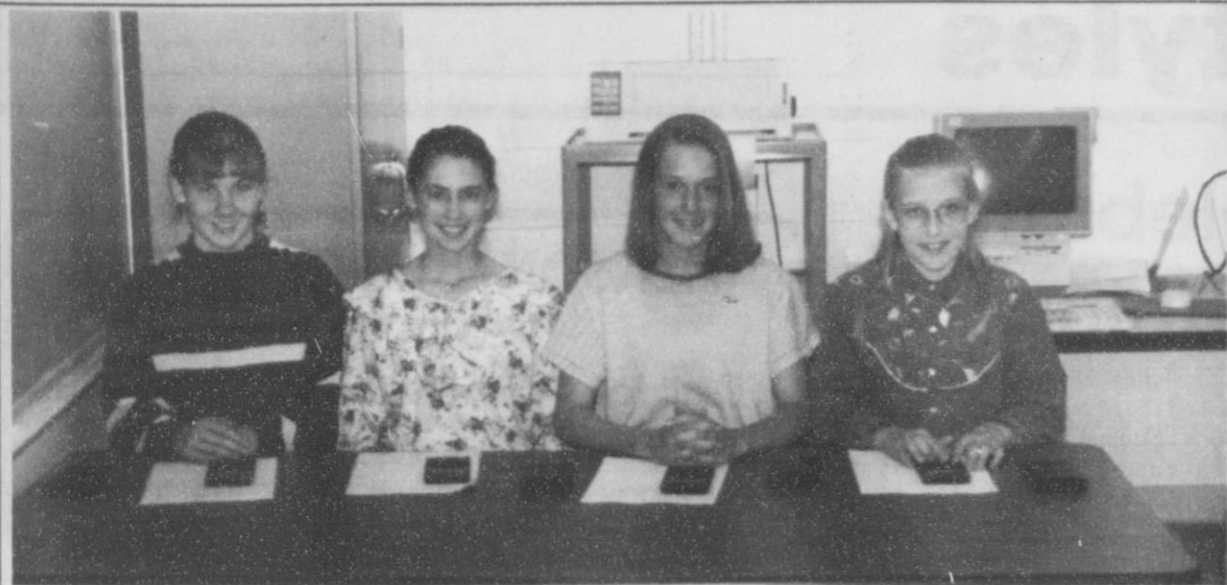

This week's **Livestock Weekly** had a short piece titled "Imported Prairie Dogs Anger Utah Ranchers". It seems that there is a species of prairie dogs known as the Utah Prairie Dog that is designated a threatened species by the National Division of Wildlife Resources. Some of the dogs occupy the site where the new Cedar City, Utah Post Office is to be built, and they are to be relocated thirty miles northwest of Cedar City to some BLM grazing land. The ranchers that use the land are upset.

Our prairie dogs are the black-tailed ones. The next in numbers

are known as the white-tailed prairie dogs. The species known as the Arizona and the Mexican are protected by law as they are on the Endangered Species List. Our black-tailed dogs are very gregarious, and towns 250 miles long and 50 miles wide containing an estimated 100 million inhabitants were once common.

The white-tail dogs are found generally in mountain meadows and high plateaus. They are not as gregarious as their larger cousins and live in small towns containing only a few animals.

Charles Goodnight told of crossing a herd over the Platte River when it was in icy flood and finding the stream full of prairie dogs swimming for the south bank. He pulled one out of the water and put it behind his saddle. It rode there until he came up to the chuckwagon and deposited it. The little creature became a great pet to the cowboys, went on north with them, and then back to the Pecos.

# Recycling Words

One of the toughest products to sort and recycle are plastics. Every plastic you see has a recycling symbol on it, even bags, so why can't you recycle them?

Well, plastics are made up of a variety of wondrous recipes that are mixed up differently. One is chocolate cake and the other is spaghetti. Lets face it, the two just don't mix. It's like having a child who won't eat the mashed potatoes if the jello leaks into it. Plastics users are the same way. They won't, and can't use plastics that are all mixed up. Plastic must be sorted and recycled separately.

Even the color of the plastic makes a difference. There is small demand for mud colored plastics, so each color must be sorted and recycled separately (white is a color). That is why our recycler only accepts #1 soda bottle type plastics and #2 milk jug type plastics. Patience can be your best friend here as market demand grows and more users seek out the colored plastics. Then you can have at it!

Till then recycle only #1 beverage bottles and #2 milk jugs, water

jugs, and clear frosted jugs with a #2 on the package. It that is still too confusing, recycle only milk jugs and soda bottles. We don't want any needless suffering.

Polyester carpet can be as much as 50% recycled pete (#1) plastic. Some plastic is burned for fuel. They are creating clothes and fibers from recycled plastics. They come up with new uses every day.

There are just a few rules for recycling plastics.

1. Rinse them. Sour milk is a scent that appeals to a very small market...among them rats and bugs.

2. Squash them. We can squeeze 50% more plastics in a container if you squash (and you can take out any frustrations you may be harboring by stomping on that milk jug-it's therapy!)

3. Remove the lids and rings.

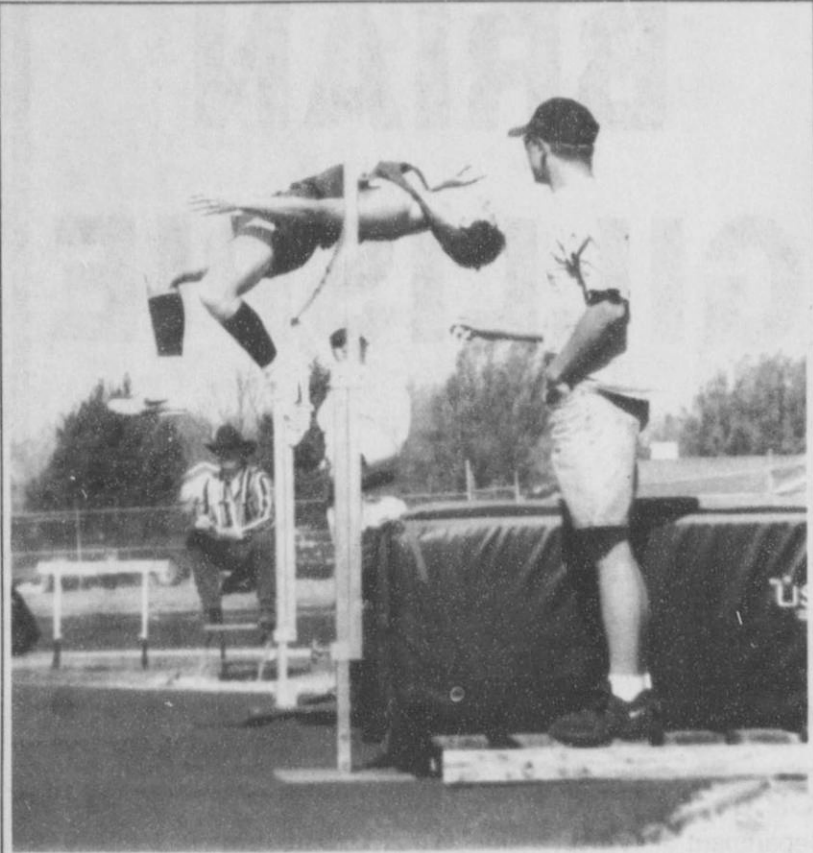

## Ten Hansford County girls qualify for Regionals

A total of 10 girls will be representing Hansford County this coming April 28th and 29th at the Regional Track Meet in Abilene, due to their impressive performances last weekend at the District Meet in Gruver.

The Lady Hounds, which destroyed the rest of the district, grabbed the district title with 170 points, which is quite understandable, after looking into how each girl placed. Eight of these 10 girls, who are going, are from the Lady Hounds' team, and in fact, three of them will be going as double, triple, or quadruple qualifiers to the meet. Amber Murrell, the only triple qualifier, will be going in the high jump, in which she placed 1st with a jump of 5' 2" last weekend, and the 400 m Dash, in which she took a silver medal time of 64.12. She was also a part of the 400 m Relay team that took a silver medal and a time of 53.98, and the 1600 m Relay team, which took the silver, with a time of 4:25.84. Molly McLain will go with Murrell in the high jump, after she hit the 5' 2" mark, but because she had more attempts than Murrell, she took home the silver. ## District Meet finish allows six varsity boys to travel to Regionals

Spearman's Matt Gafford and Josh Furlow, as well as, Gruver's Aaron Frick, Wylee Maupin, Bailey Barkley, and Joe Bravo, will be more than busy at the Regional Track Meet in Abilene in the coming weeks. These six guys were the only Hansford County tracksters to double qualify in last weekend's District Meet in Gruver.

The Hounds, who took 2nd in district behind overpowering Boys Ranch, finished the meet with 134 1/2 points. Of course, Aaron Frick will be at the meet, after he sent his disc and shot way over the district winning mark. Although he has done better in both events, his throw of 167' 8" in the disc, and his throw of 54' 3 1/4" in the shot, easily won him the district title in both events. Going into the high jump, one of the favorites to win the event was Wylee Maupin. Maupin had more attempts in the event, so his tie with two other guys at 6' 6" did not give him a right to go to Regionals. However, he was a close 2nd at the Triple Jump, in which landed only 2 inches behind WT's Mitchell's jump of 43' 5". Maupin will also help out his 2nd place team in the 1600 m Relay, who took a time of 3:29.79. Most people think the long distance events would easily go to Boys Ranch, but Bailey Barkley proved that it just wasn't that way. Barkley took two different Ranch runners easily, Stephenson and Loveless, in the long 3200 m Run and the 1600 m Run. He finished the 3200 with a gold medal time of 10:27.57, while he grabbed another gold in the 1600, with a 4 lap time of 4:55.31. Joe Bravo, the last of the double qualifiers, snatched the silver in the 800 m Run, with a time of 2:07.57, and he too will run on the 1600 m Relay. Rosalio Arreola and Ryon Atwood will finish up the last two legs on the longest of relays for the Hounds.

The battle for the fastest sprint man was close last weekend. Although Stratford finished way behind Spearman in points, 76 compared to 107.5, the Elks' Cruz nipped-out Furlow in both the 100 m and 200 m Dash by only tenths of a second. In both events, Furlow

took a silver, as he finished the 100 with a time of 11.16, and the 200, with a time of 22.83. Matt Gafford, the only other Lynx double qualifier, will throw with Frick at the Regional Meet. Gafford had one of his better days, as he chunked out a silver medal throw of 143' in the disc, and another silver medal throw of 46' 7 1/2" in the shot. The Long Jump was also very close in deciding who was the district champ. Tigrett kicked up sand on the 20' 2 1/2" mark, to give him a try at Regional and a silver medal. Some time back, around 1983, 6' 6" was set as the new high jump record for Spearman. This past weekend, a high-flying Heath Archer soared to that height to tie the record, but in previous jumps, Archer had more attempts at different heights than the Ranch's Wright, so he took the silver. This is quite impressive, considering the massive height difference in the two athletes. Once again, the race for the district's best Pole Vaulter was close. Stratford's Stewart and Britt Savage battled it out at 12', but in the end, Savage missed his last vault barely, so he took the silver. Shawn Moore, Brent Collins, and Phillip Sanders will join Furlow on the 400 m Relay team, but as alternates. Michael Witten, who took 3rd in the 800 m Run, and Eric Varnon, who took 3rd in the disc, will also go as alternates for the Lynx.

Gruver and Spearman will showcase their talents this weekend at the Regional Qualifiers Meet, and from there, they will go on to the Regional Meet in Abilene.

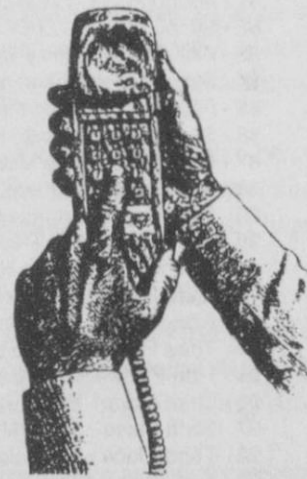

The Whitfords enjoyed Easter Sunday, along with other family members, spent Easter Sunday with their daughter Jodi and Bill Harnish of Perryton.

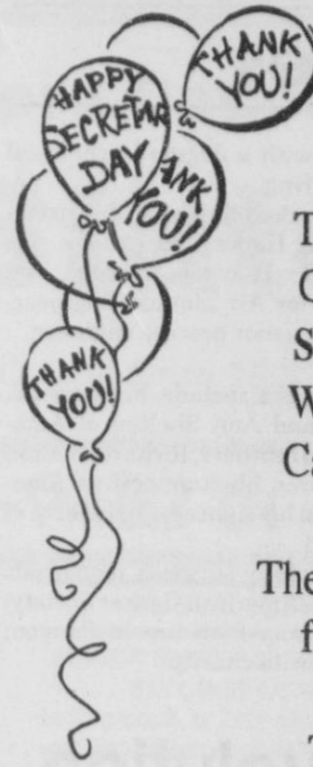

## Extension News

A popular misconception among many women is the belief that when you stop growing, your need for milk and other dairy foods ends.

The fact of the matter is that your bones are constantly rebuilding and your need for dairy foods and the calcium they contain never ends.

Every woman should take measures to build maximum bone mass during the only years it is possible-the teens through about age 35. After that time, the same measures should be taken to help maintain bone mass at its highest possible level.

Many experts believe that a lifelong intake of dairy foods and the calcium they contain can help prevent osteoporosis.

In addition to sufficient calcium, getting proper exercise is very important. Exercises that stress your bones such as aerobics, walking, jogging, and bike-riding are among the best as they permit your body's weight to help stress your bones and increase their density.

Remember that women who smoke, drink alcohol, or are heavy caffeine users increase calcium loss from their bodies and increase their risk of this bone disease.

To get the calcium you need and maintain a low-fat diet use skim or low-fat milk in soups, baked products, or sauces. Try undiluted evaporated skim milk as a substitute for cream.

Use plain low-fat yogurt or

whipped cottage cheese as a substitute for sour cream in dips or salad dressings. Substitute plain low-fat or nonfat yogurt for some of the mayonnaise or salad dressing in recipes.

Many experts believe that teenage and adult women need at least 1200 to 1500 mg. of calcium every day. Using calcium supplements solely to replace calcium-rich food is not the best choice. Foods have a combination of nutrients that helps your body absorb and utilize calcium.

I have presented this information to FCE clubs for their April programs. Handouts are still available at the County Extension office and may be received by calling 659-4130 or 733-2901.

I would like to urge Hansford County residents to write the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) and request a public hearing for the proposed confined swine feeding operation (CAFO) south of Spearman, Texas.

Persons living in the country should particularly be concerned and alarmed. Anyone living in the country could one day soon discover a swine CAFO being located near their home. For instance, I have a proposed swine CAFO site one and a half miles south of my home. There are four other homes closer to the proposed facility than my own home.

Citizens of Morse should also be concerned about the potential location of these facilities near their town. The first two proposed sites of swine CAFO's are being located north and south of Waka. What is happening to Waka could happen to Morse, too.

Citizens of Spearman who have ever smelled the feedlot northeast of town and have complained of the smell should ask themselves if they really want a swine CAFO located just a few miles south of town and they might begin to ask themselves how many will be located near town and how close to town before they begin to complain?

Many people have accused those of us opposed to swine CAFO's of being against progress; hiring "Sierra Club" lawyers to take away everyone's water rights; of basically creating a "stink" over nothing. In answer to these accusations, I would say if progress represents the location of swine CAFO's next to my home and the homes of my neighbors and friends then I am against progress.

Concerning the so-called "Sierra Club" attorney and his agenda to take away everyone's water rights I can only reply that during the public hearing of the proposed swine CAFO near my home, I intend to have the aid of an attorney knowledgeable in the procedures of the TNRCC hearing process. Who he might have worked for in the past is immaterial. He will be working for me and my neighbors and his agenda will only be ours.

Yes, this issue is a "stink" but it is not over nothing. It is over homes and communities and whether we will sit back and let what has happened to Guymon and the Oklahoma panhandle happen to us.

The permit application for the proposed swine CAFO's located south of Spearman was printed in the Thursday, March 30 edition of the Spearman Reporter-Statesman. Request for a public hearing must be filed within thirty (30) days after this printed notice.

If you want to request a public hearing, you must state:

- 1.) Your name, mailing address and daytime phone number;
- 2.) The permit number of other recognizable reference to this application (permit #03784 for the Hansford sites south of Spearman;
- 3.) the statement "I/we request a public hearing";
- 4.) A brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application;
- 5.) A description of the location for your property relative to the applicant's operations; and
- 6.) Your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for a hearing.

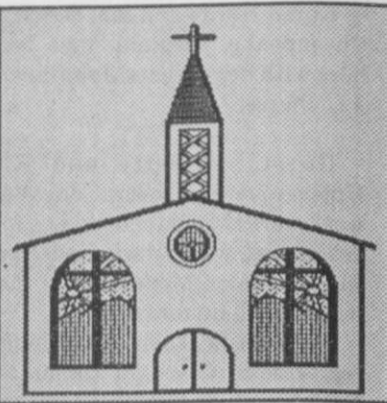

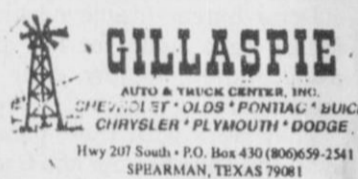

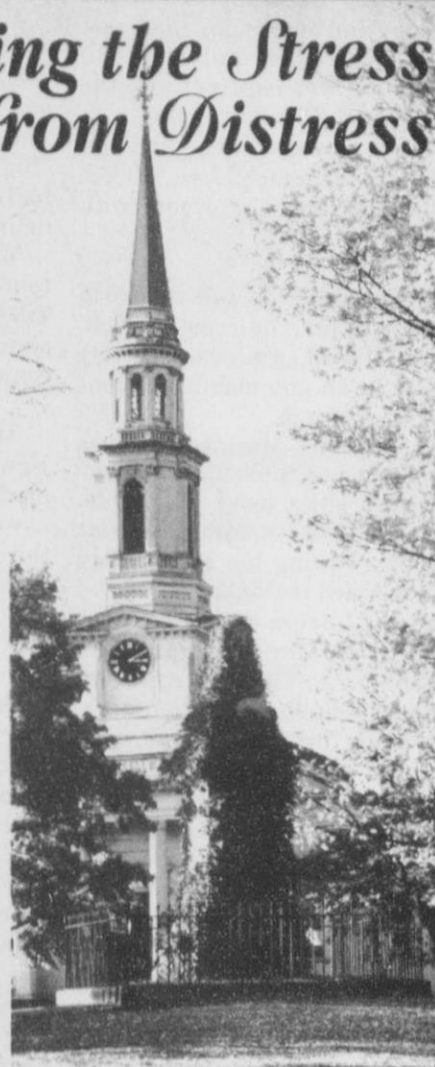
