This week's Livestock Weekly had a short piece titled "Imported Prairie Dogs Anger Utah Ranchers". It seems that there is a species of prairie dogs known as the Utah Prairie Dog that is designated a threatened species by the National Division of Wildlife Resources. Some of the dogs occupy the site where the new Cedar City, Utah Post Office is to be built, and they are to be relocated thirty miles northwest of Cedar City to some BLM grazing land. The ranchers that use the land are upset.

Our prairie dogs are the blacktailed ones. The next in numbers

are known as the white-tailed prairie dogs. The species known as the Arizona and the Mexican are protected by law as they are on the Endangered Species List. Our black-tailed dogs are very gregarious, and towns 250 miles long and 50 miles wide containing an estimated 100 million inhabitants were once common.

The white-tail dogs are found generally in mountain meadows and high plateaus. They are not as gregarious as their larger cousins and live in small towns containing only a few animals.

Charles Goodnight told of crossing a herd over the Platte River when it was in icy flood and finding the stream full of prairie dogs swimming for the south bank. He pulled one out of the water and put it behind his saddle. It rode there until he came up to the chuckwagon and deposited it. The little creature became a great pet to the cowboys, went on north with them, and then back to the Pecos.

sort and recycle are plastics. Every plastic you see has a recycling symbol on it, even bags, so why can't you recycle them?

Well, plastics are made up of a variety of wondrous recipes that are mixed up differently. One is chocolate cake and the other if spaghetti. Lets face it, the two just don't mix. It's like having a child who won't eat the mashed potatoes if the jello leaks into it. Plastics users are the same way. They won't, and can't use plastics that are all mixed up. Plastic must be sorted and recycled separately.

Even the color of the plastic makes a difference. There is small demand for mud colored plastics, so each color must be sorted and recycled separately (white is a color). That is why our recycler only accepts #1 soda bottle type plastics and #2 milk jug type plastics. Patience can be your best friend here as market demand grows and more users seek out the colored plastics. Then you can have at it!

Till then recycle only #1 beverage bottles and #2 milk jugs, water

One of the toughest products to jugs, and clear frosted jugs with a #2 on the package. It that is still too confusing, recycle only milk jugs and soda bottles. We don't want any needless suffering.

Polyester carpet can be as much as 50% recycled pete (#1) plastic. Some plastic is burned for fuel. They are creating clothes and fibers from recycled plastics. They come up with new uses every day.

There are just a few rules for recycling plastics.

1. Rinse them. Sour milk is a scent that appeals to a very small market...among them rats and

2. Squash them. We can squeeze 50% more plastics in a container if you squash (and you can take out any frustrations you may be harboring by stomping on that milk jug-it's therapy!)

3. Remove the lids and rings.



Citizens of Spearman who have ever smelled the feedlot northeast of town and have complained of the smell should ask themselves if they really want a swine CAFO located just a few miles south of town and they might begin to ask themselves how many will be located near town and how close to town before they begin to complain?

Many people have accused those of us opposed to swine CAFO's of being against progress; hiring 'Sierra Club" lawyers to take away everyone's water rights; of basically creating a "stink" over nothing. In answer to these accusations, I would say if progress represents the location of swine CAFO's next to my homne and the homes of my neighbors and friends then I am against progress.

Concerning the so-called "Sierra Club" attorney and his agenda to take away everyone's water rights I can only reply that during the public hearing of the proposed swine CAFO near my home, I intend to have the aid of an attorney knowledgeable in the procedures of the TNRCC hearing process. Who he might have worked for in the past is immaterial. He will be working for me and my neighbors and his agenda will only be ours.

Yes, this issue is a "stink" but it is not over nothing. It is over homes and communities and whether we will sit back and let what has happended to Guymon and the Oklahoma panhandle nappen to us.
