Rabies Found In County


Deanna and Rex Williams are now in the process of taking the 5 required rables shot for an encounter with a rabid skunk. September 1 at their home 18 miles northeast of Gruver, Deanna heard a noise of kittens in distress. She investigated and found a skunk intent on killing a litter of kittens near their barn. As she scared the skunk away from the kittens, it would run at her for a short distance and then return to the kittens. Finally she got the skunk in a nearby irrigation pipe and penned it there by stopping both ends. Rex came home as she turned to see about the kittens. Both handled the slobbery kittens, finding one dead and two in critical condition.

Rex called Dr. Latta. A report of probable rabies gets the persons affected in a well thought out system. The veterinarian and all the others they talked to said when you saw a skunk in broad day light acting in a strange fashion you could bet it was rabid. His advice was to kill the skunk, being careful not to shoot it in the head, and then to bring the remains to his office.

From there it was sent by a deputy of the sheriff's department to Canyon and then on to the Texas A&M lab. By Wednesday, they were notified that the skunk had tested positive for rabies, and they should start on the shots. Both Deanna and Rex had cuts on their hands, making them candidates for infection. First they were given shots of gamma globulin that are based on body weight. Rex said that was the really painful one. In his case the shot was broken in two parts because of the volume. The actual rabies shots are more like taking a flu shot.

The sad part of the story for Rex and Deanna was that the state required all 24 of their barn cats to be killed. They were wild. It meant someone had to shoot them. Rex knew he couldn't do it. He asked Sam Gruver if he would kill them. Sam said he wouldn't enjoy it, but he would do it. One of the Williams son-in-laws helped.

The time was around 4 p.m.







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Words from Faith & Grace

The Spirit of God seeks out and restores the lost as we study Jeremiah 4:11-12, 22-28, Psalm 14, 1 Timothy 1: 12-17, and Luke 15: 1-10. Jeremiah warns the people of coming destruction. He equates natural disaster with the moral failure of the people of God. He pronounces God's judgment upon them; yet, in the midst of the words of destruction we see salvation in the distance. In the doom of the temporal we see a manifestation of the eternal. The Psalmist sings of "fools" and notes that the Lord is looking to see if there are any wise. Note that the "fools" are not silly or unintelligent, rather they are those who deliberately act in an unwise manner. Disorder in our society (e.g. drugs, gangs, violence, racism, poverty, etc.) are symptoms of a crisis of character of our people. Destruction in our society comes from our lack of the Spirit of God.

Paul writes a letter of comfort to a young pastor, Timothy, who is struggling in his ministry. Paul reminds Timothy that Jesus Christ came to save sinners! Paul remembers his sins and then tells Timothy that he is grateful because Jesus chose Paul to serve Him, because Jesus trusted Paul to serve Him after Paul had persecuted the church, because Jesus appointed him to service and then empowered Paul to serve. When God chooses us, he chooses us to act, to live for His service and He empowers us to do so. We receive forgiveness and freedom in Christ, not to horde, but to share with others.

Jesus faces off with the Pharisees once again. The Pharisees criticize Jesus for eating and socializing with sinners. The Pharisees believed that there will be joy in heaven for every sinner who is obliterated before God. Jesus tells the parable of the shepherd who had one hundred sheep and leaves ninety-nine of them to search for the one that is lost. He tells the parable of the woman who has ten coins and who loses one, searches her house until she finds it. In each case when that which is lost is found, the finders tell their friends and celebrate. Thus, Jesus teaches that there is more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than for ninety-nine who need no repentance. Please note as you study these lessons, that God is seeking the "lost" who are in the faith community, not unbelievers. Before we think too highly of ourselves as Christians, let us remember our sins, renew our repentance and then, we will more easily be able to communicate the grace of God to others. I was lost, now I am found, I go to church on Sunday to celebrate my good fortune with others!

May the Holy Spirit restore you and appoint and empower you to His service.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 2007

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 103)

HJR 103 would update the constitutional reference to Angelo State University to conform with the statutory transfer of that institution from membership in the Texas State University System to membership in the Texas Tech University System.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballor as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the continuation of the constitutional appropriation for facilities and other capital items at Angelo State University on a change in the governance of the university."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 57)

SJR 57 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to college and university students, and to enter into bond enhancement agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students and anthorizing bond enhancement agreements with respect to general obligation bonds issued for that purpose."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 40)

HJR 40 would authorize the legislature to limit the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for property tax purposes in a tex year to the lesser of the most revent appraisal valuation, or 110 percent, or a greater percentage as determined by the legislature, of the appraised value in the preceding tax year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for ad valorem taxation is limited to the lesser of the most recent market value of the residence homestead as determined by the appraisal entity or 110 percent, or a greater percentage, of the appraised value of the residence homestead for the preceding tax year."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 65)

SJR 65 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue up to \$1 billion in general obligation

bonds, the proceeds of which would be dedicated to maintenance, construction, repairs, and equipment purchases, as authorized by the legislature for the following state agencies: the Texas Building and Procurement Commission; the Parks and Wildlife Department, the Department of the Adjusant General; the Department of State Health Services; the Department of Aging and Disability Services; the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired; the Texas Youll Commission; the Texas Historical Commission; the Texas Department of Criminal Justice; the Texas School for the Deal; and the Texas Department of Public

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in bands payable from the general revenues of the state for maintenance, improvement, repair, and construction projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 44)

SJR. 44 would authorize the legislature to permit cities with a population of less than 10,000 to hold an election to allow the city to enter into an agreement with a property owner to temporarily freeze taxes on property either in or adjacent to an area approved for funding under the Downtown Revitalization Program or the Main Streets Inprovements Program administered by the Department of Agriculture.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the voters of a municipality having a population of less than 10,000 to anthorize the governing body of the municipality to enter into an agreement with an owner of real property in or adjacent to an area in the municipality that has been approved for funding under certain programs administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture under which the parties agree that all ad valorem taxes imposed on the owner's propcrty may not be increased for the first five tax years after the tax year in which the agreement is entered into."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would authorize the legislature to execupt from ad valoreau tax one motor vehicle owned by an individual that is used by the individual for both business and per-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional

amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation one motor vehicle owned by an individual and used in the course of the owner's occupation or profession and also for personal activities of the owner."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 30)

HJR 30 would allow a governmental entity to sell property acquired through eminent domain to its immediately previous owner at the original purchase price, if the public use of the property has been canceled, if no progress is made toward that public use by a prescribed deadline, or if the property is rancessary to accomplish that public use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow governmental entities to sell property acquired through emment demain back to the previous owners at the price the entities paid to acquire the property."

PROPOSTITION 8 (HJR 72)

HJR 72 would clarify home equity loss procodures and protections and make conforming changes to the written disclosure provided to the borrower at the loan closing. The amendment would establish that the sums of whether property is an agricultural homestead for the purpose of receiving homestead protection, would be determined by whether it was designated for agricultural use on the date of the loan closing. The amendment would provide that a declared state of emergency (e.g., following a natural disaster) would justify execution of a second home equity loan on the same property less than one year after the first bome equity loan. It would provide that non-substantive omissions on a loan application would not affect the agreement. It would require a borrower to receive a copy of all executed loan documents, and a disclosure list of fees and costs at closing. It would prohibit the use of preprinted checks for the use of unsolicited loan advances to obtain a home equity line of credit.

PROPOSITION 9 (SJR 29)

SJR 29 would authorize the legislature to exempt all or part of the market value of the residence homesteads of veterans certified as having a service-connected 100 percent

disability rating. SJR 29 would also clarify the progression of property tax exemptions available to vetering who are less than 100 percent disabled.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt all or part of the residence homesteads of certain totally disabled veterans from ad valorem taxation and authoriaing a change in the manner of determining the amount of the existing exemption from ad valorem taxation to which a disabled veteran is entitled."

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 69)

HJR 69 would remove constitutional references to the former office of inspector of hides and animals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the constitutional authority for the office of inspector of hides and animals."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 19)

HJR 19 would require a vote taken in either house of the legislature to be recorded by record vote, if the vote was on final passage of a bill, other than local bills, a resolution proposing a constitutional amendment, or any other resolution that is not purely coremonial. The record vote must be archived and available for public viewing on the Internet for at least two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to require that a record vote he taken by a house of the legislature on final passage of any hill, other than certain local bills, of a resolution proposing or ratifying a constitutional amendment, or of any other nonceremonial resolution. and to provide for public access on the Internet to those record votes."

PROPOSITION 12 (SJR 64)

SJR 64 would authorize the Texas Transportation Commission to issue up to \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvement projects, the proceeds of which will be used to pay for projcets, costs, and payments owed under related credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballet as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds by the Texas Transportation Commission in an amount not to exceed \$5 billion to provide funding for highway improvement

PROPOSITION 13 (HJR 6)

HJR 6 would authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates conditions of release

in a family violence case and permit the legislature to authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders in a family violence case.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders or conditions of release in a felony or family violence case."

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 36)

HJR 36 would limit a state justice or judge's service to December 31x of the fourth year of the term if he'she is elected to all or part of a six year term, and reaches mandatory retirement age during the first four years of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a justice or Judge who reaches the mandatury retirement age while in office to serve the remainder of the justice's or judge's current term."

PROPOSITION 15 (HJR 90)

HJR 90 would require the legislature to esmblish the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and would provide for its management, duties, and powers. It would authorize the issuance of up to \$3 billion in general obligation honds to he used for operations and grants for the purpose of scientific research of all forms of human

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the creation of the Caucer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas and authorizing the iss snance of up to \$3 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for research in Texas to find the causes of and cures for cancer."

PROPOSITION 16 (SJR 20)-

SJR 20 would authorize the issuance of up to \$250 million in general obligation bonds. by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to economically distressed areas of the state to help provide adequate server and water supply services for residential use.

The proposed amendment will appear on: the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of 2 additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$250 million to provide assistance to economically dis-

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




