Weekly Update

Chicago, IL February 22- Motorists should be aware of the likelihood of a sharp rise in gasoline prices in the next few days and through the weekend in Texas. "I expect stations to increase prices as much as 5-20 cents per gallon by the conclusion of the weekend with some stations starting to raise prices immediately," says Patrick DeHaan, Gas-Buddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst.

DeHaan warns that a refinery fire in

Washington state is boosting prices significantly throughout the entire West Coast region, and rising spot prices in Great Lakes area is boosting prices 30-45 cents per gallon today in Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky. Prices have also been reportedly rising fast in New England, Florida, and areas of the East Coast.

Gregg Laskoski, Petroleum Analyst also cites the refinery fire in Washington for an expected jump in California, saying "prices across the State of California already made significant advances in the prior seven days, and with the refinery fire, motorists should expect prices to rise in similar fashion as last February when the Libyan situation unfolded."

Texas, February 27- Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 8.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.55/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 11.3 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.64/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 33.0 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 28.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 26.6 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 29.8 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"2012 is looking increasingly like 2008," said Gregg Laskoski, Senior Petroleum Analyst for GasBuddy.com. "Gasoline prices are climbing aggressively as speculation drives crude oil higher; and once again, it's an election year. But this time its the volatility in the Middle East that has everyone wondering 'How high is up?'," he added.

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors for February 22 2012: The weather varied from mild to extremely cold. Soil moisture continued to be mostly short to very short. A few areas reported receiving some moisture. Farmers continued preparing fields for spring planting and were actively irrigating wheat. Most winter wheat was in fair to poor condition. Rangeland and pastures were in fair to very poor condition, with most reporting poor to very poor. Those producers who didn't liquidate their herds during the drought began the spring calving season. They also continued providing supplemental feeding as rangeland grasses were sparse and wheat pasture was

Plan to visit and draft the document. The committee, consisting of George C. Childress, Ed-Conrad, James Gaines, Bailey Hardeman, and Collin McKinney, prepared the declaration in record time. it was briefly reviewed, then adopted by the delegates of the convention the following day.

The document parallels somewhat that of the United States. It contains statements on the function and responsibility of government, followed by a list of grievances. Finally, it concludes by declaring Texas a free and independent republic.

This day is a legal holiday in Texas recognized by the United States. It is considered a partial staffing day in state offices. Sam Houston Day is also observed on March 2nd, marking the birthday of the man who led the Texans to victory over Mexican troops at the battle of San Jacinto.

We joined the union in 1845, but have remained unique and one of a kind. Sam Houston stated in June 1850 to the U.S. Senate: "Texas is a state of mind. Texas is an obsession. Above all, Texas is a nation in every sense of the word. ... A Texan outside of Texas is a Foreigner."

Words from
Faith & Grace

During the second week of the Season of Lent, as we examine ourselves we note the meaning of names to God, the promise that comes through faith, and the meaning of the gift of life. We study Genesis 17:1-7,15-16, Psalm 22: 23-31, Romans

We study the promise of God to Abram when Abram was ninety-nine years old and his wife, Sarai was ninety God promises Abraham "You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations." God then called Abram, Abraham 'Abraham" in Hebrew means "ancestor of multitudes. Similarly God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai, your wife you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. 'Sarah" in Hebrew means "princess". Many of my friends here in Hansford County are in their late eighties and early nineties. How many of them would believe that God would make them parents of nations at their age? Abraham believed God and God reckoned this as righteousness. Consider this dear Christian, I alone cannot do much; but, I and God can do anything. Is it any wonder that Abraham and Sarah named their son, Isaac (Hebrew for "laughter").

The Psalmist sings an individual lament. We will study the beginning verses of this Psalm on Good Friday; but, this portion of the Psalm is the resolution of the Psalmist's cry of complaint to God. This is the Psalmists expression of praise and adoration for the God who heard him when he cried to him. Consider, "For he did not despise me or abhor the affliction of the afflicted; he did not hide his face from me, but heard when I cried to him". I have counseled many who felt abandoned by friends and family, who felt as if life was no longer worth living because they were not worthy of life. To be crude, "God did not make any trash!" Regardless of the mess that may be your present life, God cares for you and his healing presence is with you. God hears when we cry out to him in faith, and that faith is freely given us by God's grace; we do not 'earn' it.

Paul tells the Church at Rome that the Promise to Abraham did not come through the law, but through the righteousness of faith. God 'reckoned' Abraham's faith in God as righteousness. Dear Christian, that applies to all of us who are "children of Abraham" by faith in our Lord, Jesus The Christ, who died for our sins and was raised for our justification. It is appropriate during this Season of Lent to reflect that our salvation comes from God's grace in his gift of Jesus and the enabling of the Holy Spirit who stirs us to have the faith to believe.

Jesus tells his disciples for the first of three times in the Gospel of Mark that he is going to suffer greatly, be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and scribes and be killed. Peter cannot accept this and rebukes Jesus. To which Jesus replied, "Get behind me Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." Jesus then goes on to say to the disciples and the crowd: "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me". Reflect in this time of Lent that God has given you life, not to keep it or hoard it, but to spend it in God's

May the Holy Spirit enable your faith and allow you to serve God gratefully.
