



Crop Insurance Deadline Nears

Ron Berryhill, Director of the Oklahoma City Regional Service Office, Risk Management Agency, announced today the sales closing date for 1998 crop insurance is September 30, 1997 for wheat. Last year in Texas, \$171.5 million in protection (liability) was provided to producers through more than 20,000 policies.

"The freeze of last April is a vivid reminder that eventually everybody will have to cope with crop losses or low price," said Ron Berryhill. "Appropriate crop or revenue insurance protection will help you survive these hardships."

Sales closing dates are significant because signing up for insurance, changing the crop insured or level of protection, and changing insurance providers, must be done prior to the announced date. Sales closing dates vary by crop and location.

Beginning with the 1998 crop year, crop insurance is available exclusively through crop insurance agents. USDA will continue to subsidize all policies, establish policy terms and conditions, rates, and guarantee funds for the payment of approved claims. Although a producer's policy will be randomly transferred from USDA to an insurance company, producers have the right to choose their own agent prior to the sales closing date for the insured crop.

To ensure that all producers are served, insurance companies are required to insure all eligible crops, and provide all levels of coverage in the states in which they operate.

A waiver of administrative fees for producers who qualify as limited resource farmers is available from all crop insurance companies. Private agents are willing and prepared to assist those qualifying producers with determining eligibility.

See You At The Pole

The annual See You at the Pole event has been set for September 17th at 7:30 a.m. Youth will lead the way when three million or more teenagers are 'expected to gather in a spirit of unity to pray on at least five continents during See You at the Pole, an international day of student prayer.

Elementary, junior high, high school and college students will meet for the event before school on that September morning. Students meet at the flagpoles of schools, courthouses, churches and other locations--not to demonstrate or protest, but to pray for local and national concerns.

See You at the Pole began as a student-initiated, student-led movement, and has maintained that distinction for six years. Early in 1990, some groups of high school youth near Fort Worth, Texas, began meeting spontaneously at their schools to





Focus On The Family

QUESTION: How can damage to brain tissue cause frantic activity in a child?

DR. DOBSON: Relatively little is known about the human brain and its malfunctions. I once knew a neurologically impaired child, for example, who could read the words, "Go shut the door," with no understanding of the written command. However, if an audiocassette recording was made while he read, "Go shut the door," this child could hear the replay of his own voice and understand the words perfectly

Another patient in a mental hospital could completely disassemble and repair complex television sets, yet did not have the common sense to handle the routine responsibilities of living outside a hospital setting. Another man, wounded in combat, had the sad characteristic of being unable to keep any thought to himself. He mumbled his innermost ideas, to the embarrassment and shock of everyone nearby.

Brain disorders are expressed in many strange ways, including the frenzy of hyperactivity. No one can explain exactly why it happens, other than the obvious fact that the electrochemical mechanisms which control body movement have been altered, resulting in excessive stimulation to the muscles.


By this time the Judge was fairly interested in Farmer Joe's answer and said to the lawyer, "I'd like to hear what he has to say."

Jim Potts attended this pitching camp held at Wichita State where one of the best baseball programs in the country is located.

The segments of this article highlighted in red may be of interest to you. It concerns running and lifting weights to stay in top condition. After reading this, I concluded that track and baseball can go hand in hand in Gruver. Participating in track will improve baseball, basketball, and football players.

The most often heard objection to baseball in the schools is that is will "ruin the track program." It doesn't have to. I believe it will depend on the attitude of the

coaches and their willingness to work together for the benefit of our students. Does track need to be protected from baseball?

As you know, two of our teachers have expressed interest in coaching the school baseball program. Both are outstanding classroom teachers and are respected by the students, faculty, and community. They are enthusiastic and dedicated to the welfare of our students and look forward to coaching baseball this coming spring. As part of your research, you may want to visit with them before you vote on baseball September 15th.

One last thought/question. How would you vote if it were you own child who wanted to play baseball? The students of Gruver ARE your children, and you are voting for all of us.

"Kemnitz was asked to be more specific on his running program for pitchers.

"What we like to do in the preseason is run two miles, and most of the time, I will time them. Then we will do what I call "burnouts" which is basically a long sprint. We will do up to seven of those. This all takes place in January and February."

"When the season starts, it depends on whether it's a starter of reliever. I want a starter to run at least two miles the day after he pitches and then anywhere from 3 to 5 of those long sprints as well. For relievers, I leave it up to them. Some like the sprint work, and others prefer the distance running. Some like a combination. I leave it up to each guy as far as what works best for him and make sure each one is sticking to the plan."





PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a person to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65-and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law took effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence homesteads for ad valorem taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spouse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of whether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad valorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to permit a taxing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conservation initiative has been implemented."

If an episode of mass violence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were depleted first.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment designating the purposes for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may be used."

Service of Gruver, has been accepted into The Prudential Helping Hearts Program. The program is a nationwide matching grants initiative designed to help volunteer EMS squads purchase portable cardiac defibrillators. These machines, which administer jolts of electricity to "reset" the heart's natural rhythm, have been called one of the most important lifesaving inventions of the 20th century.

During 1997, Prudential will be accepting approximately 500 volunteer rescue squads into the Helping Hearts program from across the country, and providing matching grants of up to \$2,000 each to cover roughly half the cost of their defibrillators.

Kicked off in New Jersey on February 14, 1994, the Helping Hearts program has been providing defibrillation grants to volunteer EMS squads in selected states for the past three years. At the end of 1996, nearly 1000

Recently Sam and Sue were snowbound after a barn raising near the schoolhouse. Sam promised her the sun, moon, and stars; a trip around the world; diamonds; and Grandma's engagement ring. They seemed to be in the garden of Eden.

Then yesterday as Sam was watching wild geese fly over Grandmother's flower garden, he noticed that the hen and chicks had gotten out through the hole in the barn door and into the nine patch of corn and beans. Sam borrowed Jacob's ladder and began to fix the hole with a wrench and circular saw, when through the windowpane in an open box he saw Joseph's coat and Joseph's necktie. Then he knew! Well, that started him down a drunkard's path. According to the next door neighbor, Sue was cleaning spider webs from Grandmother's fan when she saw him though the attic window. He was drinking Old Crow. Like a whirlwind she threw a Dresden plate across the melon patch at him. Later, the police found coffee cups and broken dishes everywhere.

After following Sue's pet turkey's tracks, they found her and an Arkansas traveler in Des Moines, headed out on the road to California. They claimed to be following the Ohio star, but authorities knew it was a wild goose chase because they were using a mariner's compass.

When Sue was apprehended, she was carrying a flower basket with an Indian hatchet, double ax head, and a rolling pin wheel hidden inside. As she was led past the barrister's block up the courthouse steps, her defense attorney as quoted as saying,

"This case was a real lawyer's puzzle until I discovered she had escaped from a crazy house and is as looney as crazy Ann." Sue seemed to have no remorse, because she stood there listening to the Rolling Stones and playing with her yo-yo.

The final resting place will be at the Lucky Star Cemetery. Caroline lilies will be placed on a bed of roses as a final tribute to Sam. Mourners are asked to bring a scrap basket to help work on a friendship quilt following the service.

The wild turkeys are hanging around the parks north of the dam in flocks that range in size up to 35 or so.

The hawk migration has begun. Watch the high line poles and fields for these visitors. Some of the raptors live here all year, but others will just pass through, and still others will spend the winter.

At one time the raptors were all considered pests. In 1885, Pennsylvania enacted a hawk

and owl bounty that paid 50 cents for each raptor scalp. The first two years they paid out \$90,000 for 180,000 bounties. Orchards and fields were soon overrun by mice and other vermin, and farmers were asking for the repeal of the law, which happened two years later.

Much of my life these birds were to be used for target practice, but when we saw that the bald eagles and whooping cranes might become extinct, there was a definite change in attitude.

An article in the Amarillo Daily News, Sept. 4 "Rescuing hawks a blessing, but use great care" by Debby Willet is an example of this change. Her family rescued a young Mississippi Kite and a night hawk using soft towels for the capture of the injured birds and pet carriers to transport them to Timber Creek Vet. Hospital, where Dr. Gregg Veneklasen is authorized to take care of federally protected animals. The telephone number of the Timber Creek Veterinary Hospital is 488-2321


