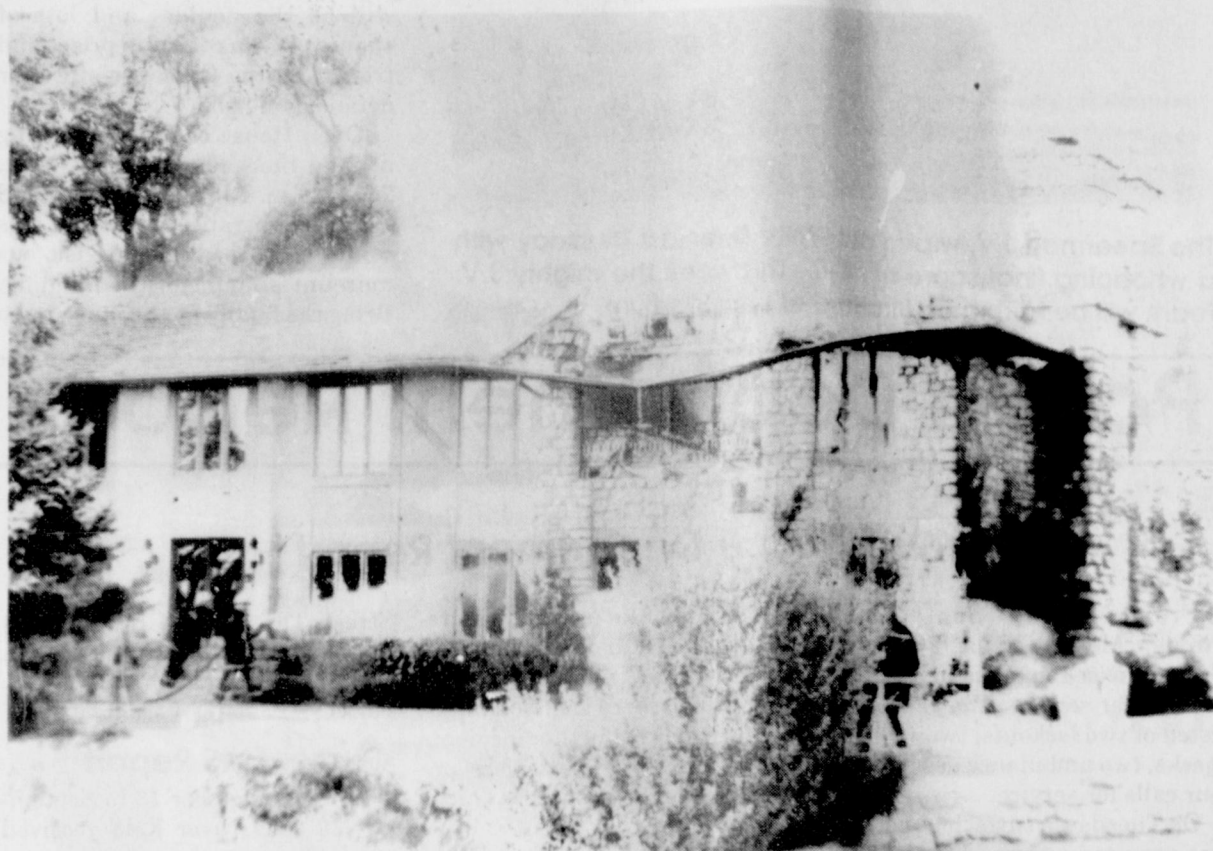

Gruver I.S.D. Board of Education proposes tax rate for 1993-94

The Gruver I.S.D. Board of Education voted to propose a tax rate of \$1.1123/per \$100 valuation for 1993-94 year during the regular meeting held Wednesday, Sept. 15. The district will be holding a public hearing on Wednesday, Sept. 29 at 1 p.m. At this time they will receive public input on the proposed tax rate, according to Superintendent Barry Haenisch. The district's proposing a lower tax rate than the 1.2064 approved in 1992-93.

In other business, the board heard a report from Gruver High School annual sponsor Gerald TeBeest. In the report he stated that a small profit from annual sales in 1992-93 was expected. He

then proposed that reserved annuals be sold for \$25, while those not reserved be sold for \$28. The board approved the rate.

On a 7-0 vote the board approved the Hansford County Appraisal District's budget. They also approved the district contract with the Hansford County Appraisal District for the assessment and collection of county taxes.

Three teacher's aides were hired during the meeting. Mrs. Phyllis Hoel will work a half day in Special Education. Mrs. Rhonda Hicks was hired as a teachers aide for the kindergarten. Hired as an aide for English as a Second Language was Mrs. Angie Lopez.

A Language and Proficiency Assessment Committee composed of Linda Lackey and Angie Clawson of the English as a Second Lan-

guage program; Araceli Briones, a parent; and Bob Burgoon, elementary principal was approved.

After the board heard the second reading of policy FB local dealing with equal educational opportunities and DAA local dealing with equal opportunity employment, they adopted the policies on a 7-0 vote.

The board then heard the first reading of Update 44, which brings the policy book into compliance with new laws passed by the legislature.

The 1994 senior trip policy was discussed, but no action was taken. The board requested more information regarding the matter.

In regular business the board voted to pay bills for the period in the amount of \$169,129.21.

Gruver City Commission sets tax rate, and amends garbage rates

The Gruver City Commission approved the budget for the 1993-94 fiscal year, set the tax rate and amended the garbage rates during the regular meeting held Wednesday, Sept. 8.

The commission set the 1993-94 budget for \$880,939.50, City Manager A.J. Ratliff reported. This is up from the \$865,000 set for the 1992-93 budget. They also set the tax rate for 1993-94 at 55¢/per \$100. Ratliff said, this has remained the same as the rate set for 1992-93.

Then the commission approved ordinance number 234 which amends the garbage rates. According to Ratliff, the residential rates are going to be increasing from \$8.50 to \$10.50.

In other business, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Bagwell were present at the meeting for the discussion of the sewer problem behind their home on Garrett Street. The Bagwells suggested locking the manholes and laying a separate line for the school. A motion was made to lock the manholes. It was seconded and the motion carried. The Commission also approved making a map of the homes with basements.

A motion to approve authorizing City Manager Ratliff to apply for a Community Development Block Grant was approved. He explained that city is applying for the grant to be used to drill a water well. If the grant is approved the new city well will be drilled at Seventh and Cator.

The Municipal Retirement System was updated during the meeting. The change made to the retirement system deals with service credits, Ratliff said. He explained

Palo Duro River Authority appoints budget committee

The Palo Duro River Authority appointed a committee to work on the 1993-94 Fiscal Year Budgets for the Project Fund and Park Fund during the regular meeting held Thursday, Sept. 16.

The consideration of purchasing a vehicle was also tabled until the October 12 meeting.

In regular business, the board approved the minutes, treasurer's report and payment of bills for the month of August were also approved.

A general discussion of the new office at Palo Duro Lake was held. Construction is underway and at the time of the meeting the floor had been poured for the basement, Derington stated.

Glitch in state's school finance law

Tax rate increases exaggerated due to problem with school finance law

With the publication of the Spearman I.S.D. tax rate increase notice, needless concern spread throughout Hansford County. Due to a glitch in the school finance law, tax increase notices published by the school districts are greatly exaggerated.

The districts are required by the law to publish a notice if the tax rate will increase by more than 3 percent from the previous year, but it fails to consider the elimination of the county education districts (CED).

Gruver Superintendent Barry Haenisch said, "It's like comparing apples to oranges." He explained that the districts are required to compare the total tax rate for this year to the local tax rate for 1992-93, which did not include the CED.

He continued, "If the district approves the proposed tax rate for 1993-94 it will look like it is a 360 percent increase, when in actuality it is being lowered by 9.41¢."

He gave an example. In 1992-93 the CED rate was 89.58¢ and the local rate was 31.06¢ making the total \$1.2064. This year's proposed tax rate for the Gruver I.S.D. is \$1.1123.

"On the form it recognizes that the CED existed, but in the tax rate increase it does not allow for the district to explain what the CED rate was," Haenisch said. "It's a confusing situation for everyone."

The people are reading that their taxes are going up by 200 or 300 percent."

Pringle-Morse Superintendent Beryl Sears and Spearman Superintendent Willard Murrey, also agreed that the publication of the tax rates are deceiving.

Sears stated that the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. is proposing a rate that is the same as the CED and local rate in 1992-93, \$1.22, but because of the new law it looks like a 300 percent increase.

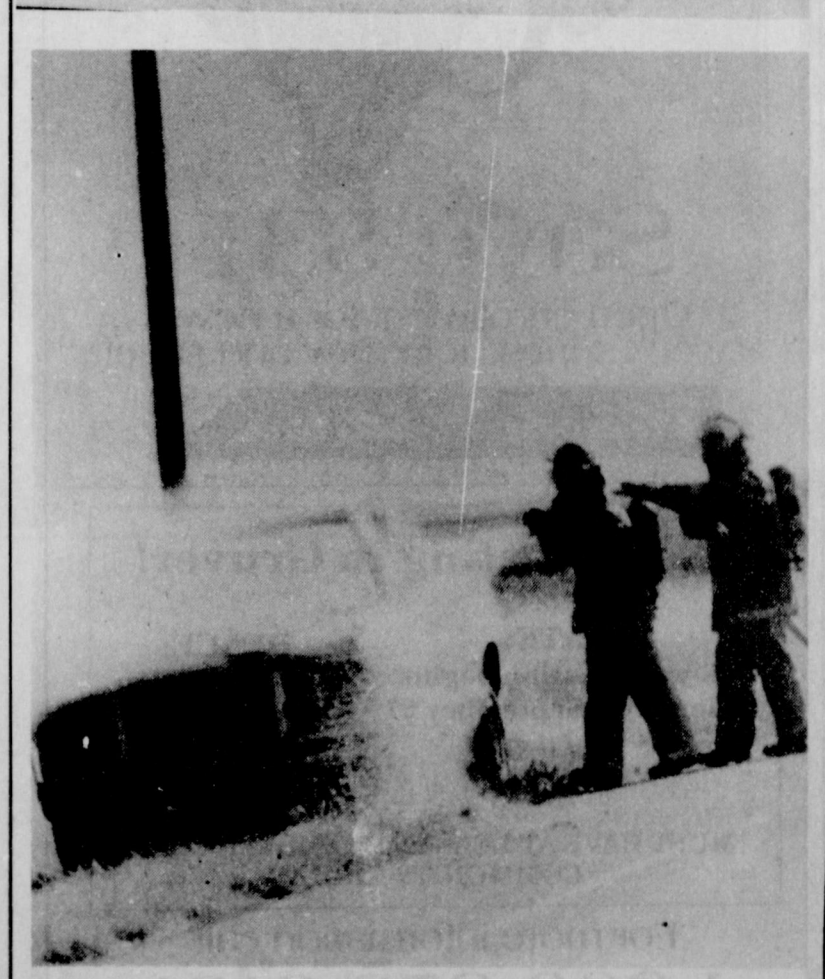
Sears explained, "In actuality the projected tax rate is the same as last years - 33.8¢ local plus 89.9¢ CED."

He continued that the citizens in the Pringle-Morse District will not be sure of the tax rate until it is passed at the end of October. "Pringle-Morse is one of the districts chosen as wealthy and the state has to approve it before it passes," he concluded.

In the Spearman school district it is the same situation. Murrey explained that if tax payers will work this example it will be easier for them to understand. Take your property value and figure it with the 1992-93 tax rate of \$1.2358.

Then take the same property value and figure it with the proposed 1993-94 tax rate of \$1.19902. "It will figure as a reduction," Murrey stated.

If Hansford County residents still have questions about the seemingly inflated tax rates, please contact the appropriate school district.

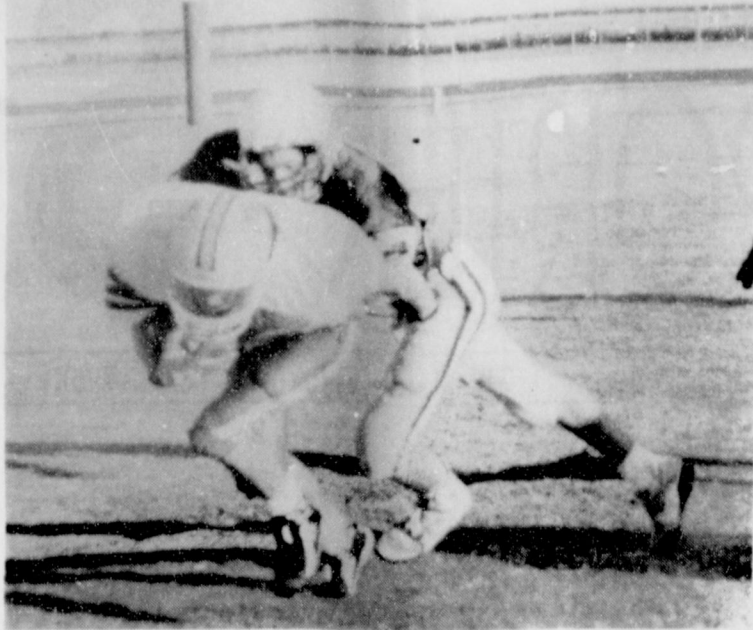

Jeremy Blan scored the final Lynx touchdown on a 9 yard run and Elliott kicked a successful PAT. The score at the half was 42-0.

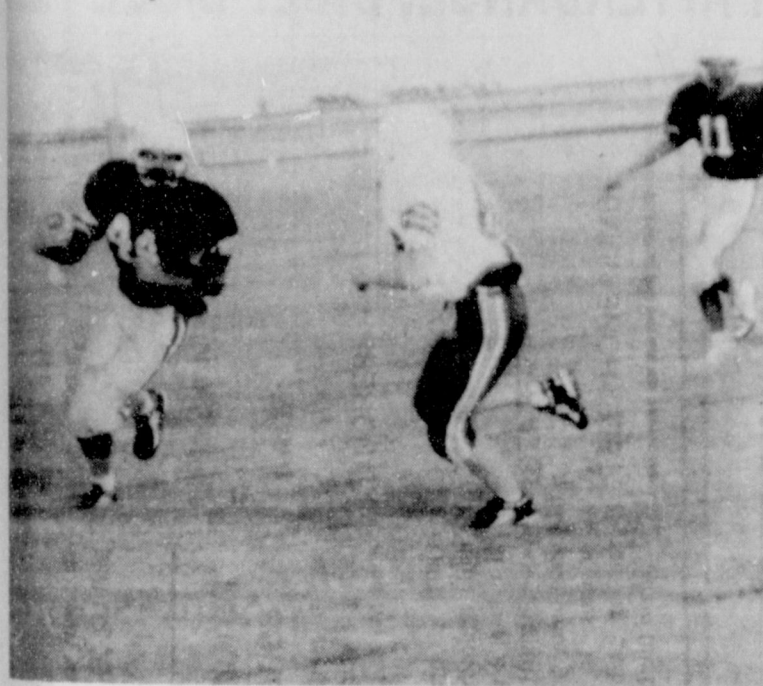
In the second half of the game, the defense of both teams took control of the game allowing only two points to be scored.

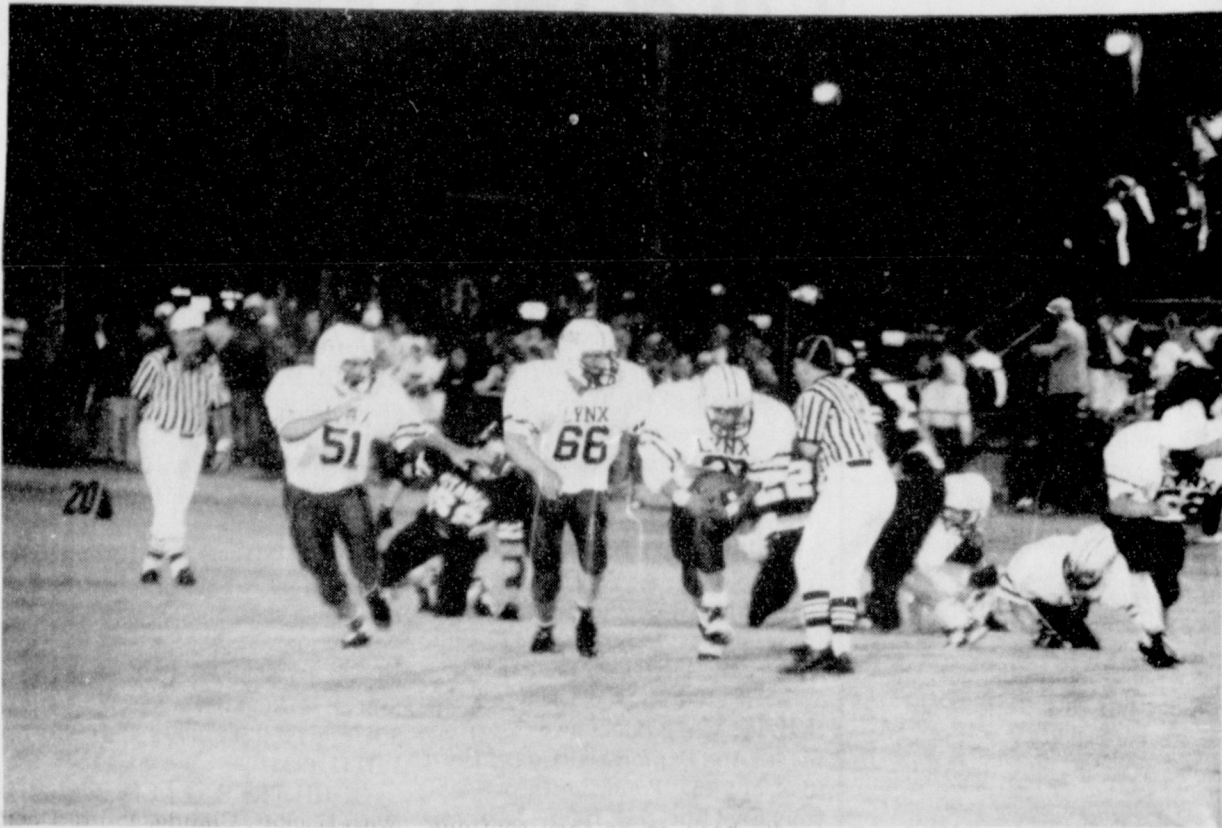

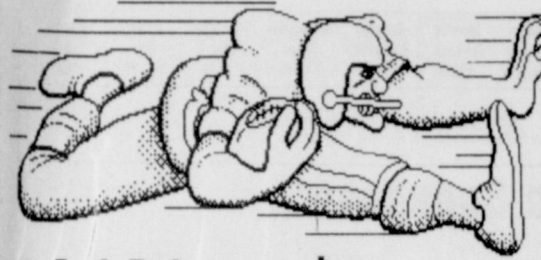

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Final 6-6 at White Deer; Hounds sustain second tie game

For the first time since Gruver High School's very first year in eleven-man football, 1951, the Hounds have sustained as many as two tie games in one season. The latest tie for the hounds was a classic defensive struggle, 6-6, against the White Deer Bucks at White Deer this past Friday, Sept. 17. The draw with the Bucks left the Hounds 1-0-2 for the season. In 1951, under Gene "Woody" Wood, the Hounds were tied by Bovina and Texline, and finished 2-4-2.

According to Hounds Head Coach Doug Frick, "It was a hard-fought ball game - both teams played their hearts out."

Six times the Bucks in this game penetrated the Gruver 20-yard line, and six times they came away empty of points. The "Run and Shoot" offense, or as Buddy Ryan (defensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers) calls it - the "Chuck and Duck" offense -, failed in its match with the vaunted Gruver defense of 1993, that has allowed opposing offenses only two scores in three games this year.

White Deer's only score in this game was a defensive score, as Jason Howell of the Bucks picked a Gruver pocket and stripped the ball, returning the "fumble" 45 yards for a Bucks touchdown. That score came with 10:19 left in the second quarter and put the Bucks up 6-0. The kick failed. The score would remain 6-0 until 9:55 left in the fourth quarter when Aaron Frick romped 25 yards up the middle for a score to tie the game 6-6. Again, the snap was fumbled and the kick attempt failed.

The Hounds offense has been

struggling all year, and really needs a big game this week against the Highland Park Hornets at Greyhound Stadium to snap out of it. There were some good signs, as the rushing attack was more than adequate in this game - Victor Lopez rushed 24 times for 127 yards, and Aaron Frick had 16 carries for 64 yards. But turnovers - two pass interceptions and two fumbles lost - cost the hounds dearly.

Aaron Frick had a 35-yard field goal attempt just missed by inches wide to the left in the fourth quarter, that would have given the Hounds a 9-6 victory. It looked good

from the press box.

Early in the game, on the Bucks second possession following a Gruver fumble, came the defensive highlight of the game for the Hounds. The Bucks had a second and goal from the one-yard line, and three straight times the Hounds defense stood up and stuffed the Bucks, for gains of 0, -1, and 1 yard on fourth and two. Five subsequent drives penetrated the Gruver 20, and five more times they were stopped. Hail the Hounds defense!!! Coach Frick credits the entire Hounds defensive team, not any one or a few individuals, so credit

the Hounds defensive line - Wylee Maupin, Chris Stork, Robert Whitaker and Ricky Oliva; their linebackers - Max Frick, Aaron Frick and Jace Dawson; and their secondary - Ryon Atwood, Joe Bravo, Victor Lopez and Kenton Odom. Also credit Ricardo Soto, Eric Wright and Isaías Arzate, as Coach Frick noted they played a lot against the Bucks. Soto had a quarterback sack.

Some highlights - there were two pass interceptions, one by Bravo and one by Wright. There were two key fumble recoveries, one by Dawson, and one by Maupin at the

Bucks 26 yard line, leading to the only Gruver score of the night, which followed on the second play on the run by Aaron Frick.

Coach Frick talked about what the Hounds need to do to beat Highland Park. "Offensively, we need to execute. Defensively, we need to play with the same intensity that we have been playing with for the past three weeks."

Coach Frick talked about the Hornets. "Highland Park has a very good ball club. (Justin) Proffitt is a good quarterback, with speed. He has a good arm. They have better than average speed at the running back position, and we cannot allow the big play."

The Hounds and the Hornets have gotten together in football action only twice, in 1987 and in 1992. The Hounds won in 1987 at Highland Park, 35-6, and the Hornets won last year at Highland Park, 25-6. The Hornets are 0-3 this year, losing to Happy 25-0, White Deer 41-40, and Nazareth 34-6.

Freshman Jarrod Hoel blocked a Sunray punt late in the second quarter at the 40 yard line of Sunray, and Bailey Barkley carried it to the 30 yard line, leading to the winning touchdown, as the Hounds used their defensive expertise to ward off the Bobcats 14-12 in a football game played Thursday, Sept. 16, at Bobcat Stadium in Sunray. The Junior Varsity Hounds are unbeaten this season thus far, with three victories.

Hoel scored that winning touchdown from 4 yards out, then ran in for the two-point conversion, giving the Hounds a 14-6 lead at half-time. The Bobcats had a late fourth quarter drive - 14-plays, 85-yards-to cut the score to 14-12, but the Hounds stopped the run in the backfield and they were unsuccessful on the two-point conversion.

Then with under a minute left, the Bobcats had the ball again, but again Hoel made the big play - an interception at the Gruver 29 yard line to dash Sunray's last hopes.

Gruver's first touchdown in the first quarter to take a 6-0 lead was spectacular. Daniel Bort made an outstanding catch and run for 22-yards, of a pass from Barkley, and the Hounds were on the boards first.

But Sunray, with their explosive backfield, came right back to tie the game 6-6 in the first quar-

ter, but the PAT kick failed.

Travis Ferguson carried 11 times for 63 yards, Hoel 13-61, and Bort 8-44.

The Hounds were tough on defense when they had to be. They allowed an outstanding Sunray backfield 51 attempts for 207 yards, but only the two touchdowns. Sunray's quarterback was 2-4 with an interception, for only 21 yards. Gruver carried the ball far fewer times than the Bobcats - 35 times for 169 yards. In total offense, Sunray had 228 yards, the Hounds 213.

Loss of Taste and Smell -- A Culprit to Malnutrition

Good nutritional habits should never get old. Yet malnutrition is a serious health problem among the nation's elderly, according to recent research in which health professionals found that one in four of all elderly patients is malnourished.

In other words, one-half of all elderly patients in hospitals and 40 percent of nursing home residents suffer from malnutrition.

Among the primary reasons many elderly become malnourished are losses in their senses of taste and smell, according to Susan Schiffmann, Ph.D., professor of medical psychology at Duke University Medical Center.

Imagine the loss of all simple pleasures of taste and smell in which the overall quality of life is greatly reduced, especially for the elderly whose senses decline due to

aging.

This loss in taste and smell usually begins around 60 years of age and becomes more pronounced in subsequent decades of life. Certain diseases and/or medications prescribed for such conditions also can contribute to these sensory losses.

Thresholds (the levels at which flavors are detected) are about 2.5 times higher in the elderly than in young college students. But the threshold for detecting fat in food is four times higher in the elderly, especially a problem for many seniors following low-fat diets, making it very difficult for them to follow a low-fat diet.

How can the elderly increase eating of lower-fat, nutrient dense foods? Improve the taste by adding herbs, spices or flavor enhancers such as monosodium glutamate (MSG).

Before scientists believed that only four taste sensations -- sweet, salty, sour and bitter -- existed. Today new data suggests that there are many more tastes such as glutamate. This taste, known as "umami" to the Japanese, has been described by Westerners as brothy or meat-like.

Elderly people may be unknowingly consuming large amounts of fat without being able to really perceive it. Flavor enhancers can be used in foods to help replace some of the mouthful normally contributed by fat, allowing older persons to enjoy their food while maintaining a nutritionally adequate, low-fat diet.

Studies have shown that adding glutamate to blended or table food improves appetite and reverses the effects of anorexia among the elderly in long-term care settings.

The latest word on the landfill situation is somewhat more positive than we have had in a long time. The latest proposal would let cities who meet the arid exemption (those that have less than 25 inches of rainfall a year and dispose of less than 20 tons of garbage a year) to have an additional two years to meet the EPA regulations. Spearman qualifies for the arid exemption and in order to get the two year extension, we must have an application for the arid exemption to the Texas Water Commission by October 8. The City is applying for the arid exemption and we are holding our breath hoping that the proposed two year extension gets approved.

For Spearman residents, this means that we may keep the landfill open for another two years. However, it is likely that we will only be able to take normal household garbage in the landfill. We may have to

dig another pit for grass clippings and tree limbs. If we have to dig another pit, citizens wouldn't be allowed to put grass clippings and/or tree limbs in the dumpsters. You would have to haul the grass clippings or tree limbs to the landfill

yourself or hire someone to do it for you.

I will try to keep the citizens informed about what the landfill will be and won't be able to take as the proposed regulations become law.

Jesus is Lord.

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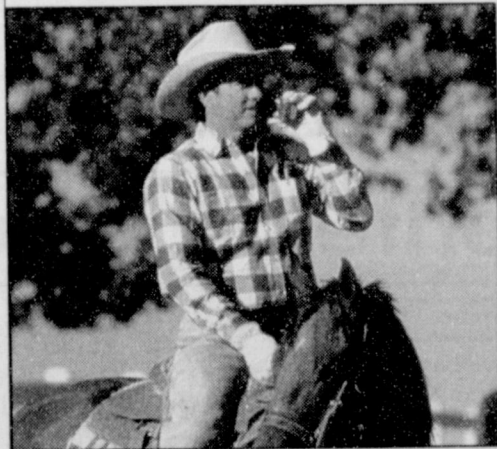
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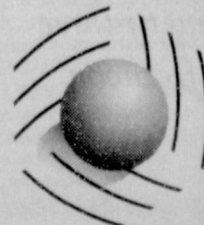
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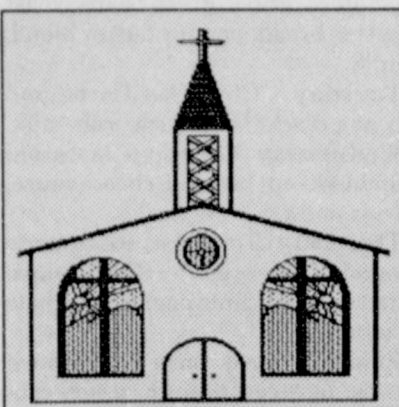

Fall Is My Favorite Season

The nights are cool and the hint of winter is in the air. The early cold fronts that chill the county fairs serve as a wake up call for both the hunters and anglers. The doldrums of summer are finished.

Dove season on the High Plains is a bit and miss situation, and my new bifocals are a great new excuse for my misses. Why do local doves use any modest cool snap as an excuse to fly south, while the doves to our north refuse to migrate until after a major cold front?

Dove season, even in the good years, is spotty and subject to rapid changes. Dove hunting can be easy or impossible at the same field on consecutive hunting trips. Dedicated hunters call it "paying your dues."

The best dove hunting is usually located in the eastern Panhandle, and judging from the hunters that I have talked to, 1993 is about an average year.

This most recent cold front will finally push down the Kansas doves, so if your opening weekend was a disappointment, it's time to return to the old water hole and get ready for some great shooting.

Tip of the week-A few quick rounds at the local gun club will greatly increase your hand/eye coordination and will add to your hunting success.

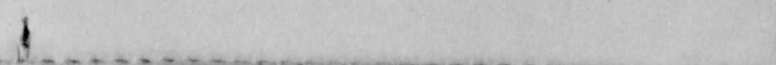
Why do fishermen love the fall? The same lakes that, two weeks ago, were filled to capacity with noisy water-skiers and brash jet skiers are now deserted. Cold weather and Texas football force the dare devils to alter their weekend pursuits.

Fall, with its cooler water temperatures, sends nature's signal to the fish that winter is coming. In August, successful bass anglers fished their favorite baits as s-l-o-w as possible. When the water temperature drops only a few degrees, these same lethargic bass will suddenly start chasing crank baits. My favorite fall lures include Rat-L-Traps, large Shad Raps, and buzz baits.

Fall is a great time to go hunting and fishing. The scenery changes daily and so does the wildlife. The days are getting shorter and winter will soon be here, but right now, the weather is perfect for enjoying the great outdoors.

The fishing tournament schedule draws to an end for 1993 with these final three events open to all interested anglers: Oct. 2, Saturday--\$2,000 Big Bass at Lake Baylor; Oct. 9, Saturday--\$1,000 Lake Greenbelt Championship; Oct. 16, Saturday--\$1,000 Lake Meredith Championship.

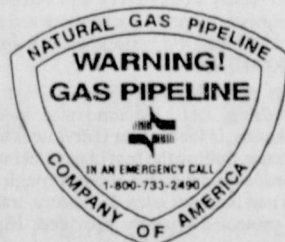
