Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for September in Spearman at the TDH office located at 720 Archer.


Wednesday, Sept. 21 from 9-11:30

A Licensed Temperament Therapist, Dr. Lane employs a counseling method based on the belief that, instead of spending sessions trying to find "hidden problems," the client and the therapist are better off follow a step-by-step procedure developed to target the problem.

"It's a very practical approach." Lane said. "I use lots of pencil and paper exercises at the beginning. It is so easy to talk all around a problem and end up right where you started, but when you write, you can pinpoint your temperament and from there identify your need."

There is a special questionnaire used in Temperament Therapy designed to accomplish this end which is interpreted by a diagnostics specialist at the headquarters of the National Christian Counselors Association.





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
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
