In a game that could have possibly gone both ways, Spearman fell victim to a vicious attack by the Panhandle Panthers. The Lynx opened their season at home Fri-

day night against the Panthers, and what should have been possibly a win, ended up in defeat for the Lynx, 28-12.

The Panther's tail back Brady Shadid, as well as his teammate, Cody Wilkinson combined to bring most of the points for the Panthers. From the start Panhandle began

D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program comes to the children of Spearman in hopes of keeping their futures alcohol and drug free.

Officer Jamie Downs, Spearman Police Department graduated from the D.A.R.E. Instruction School August 6th. The D.A.R.E. program starts in the Elementary School where Downs has an office and teaches, once a week, K-5th grades about drug and alcohol and the effect of them. These are one on one classes where the children can have fun and learn without being preached at. "It is my hope that this program will grow with the children, as they move into the Jr. High and High School the D.A.R.E. program will expand with them" Downs said.

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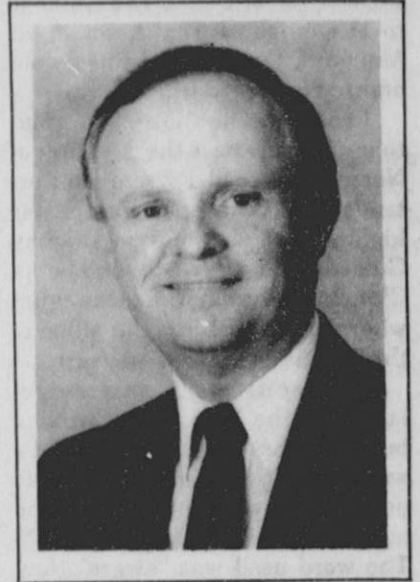

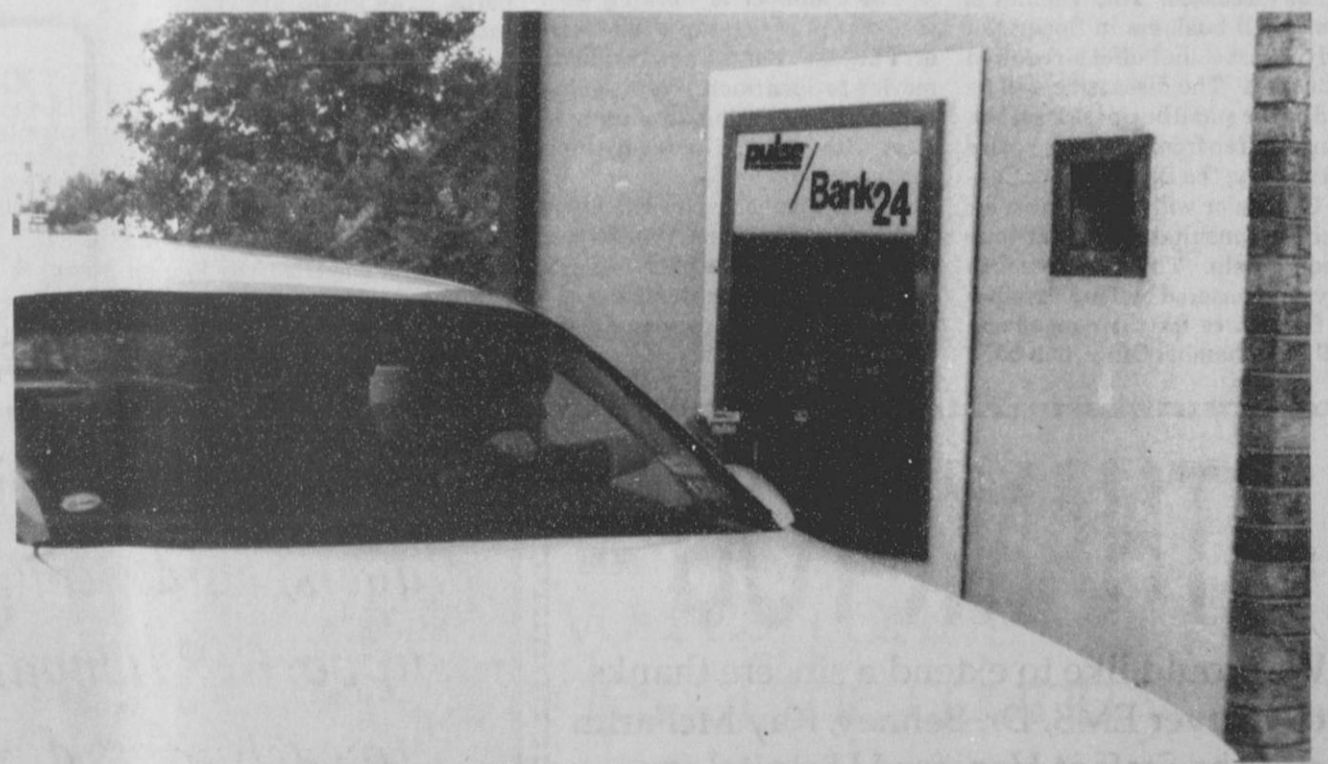
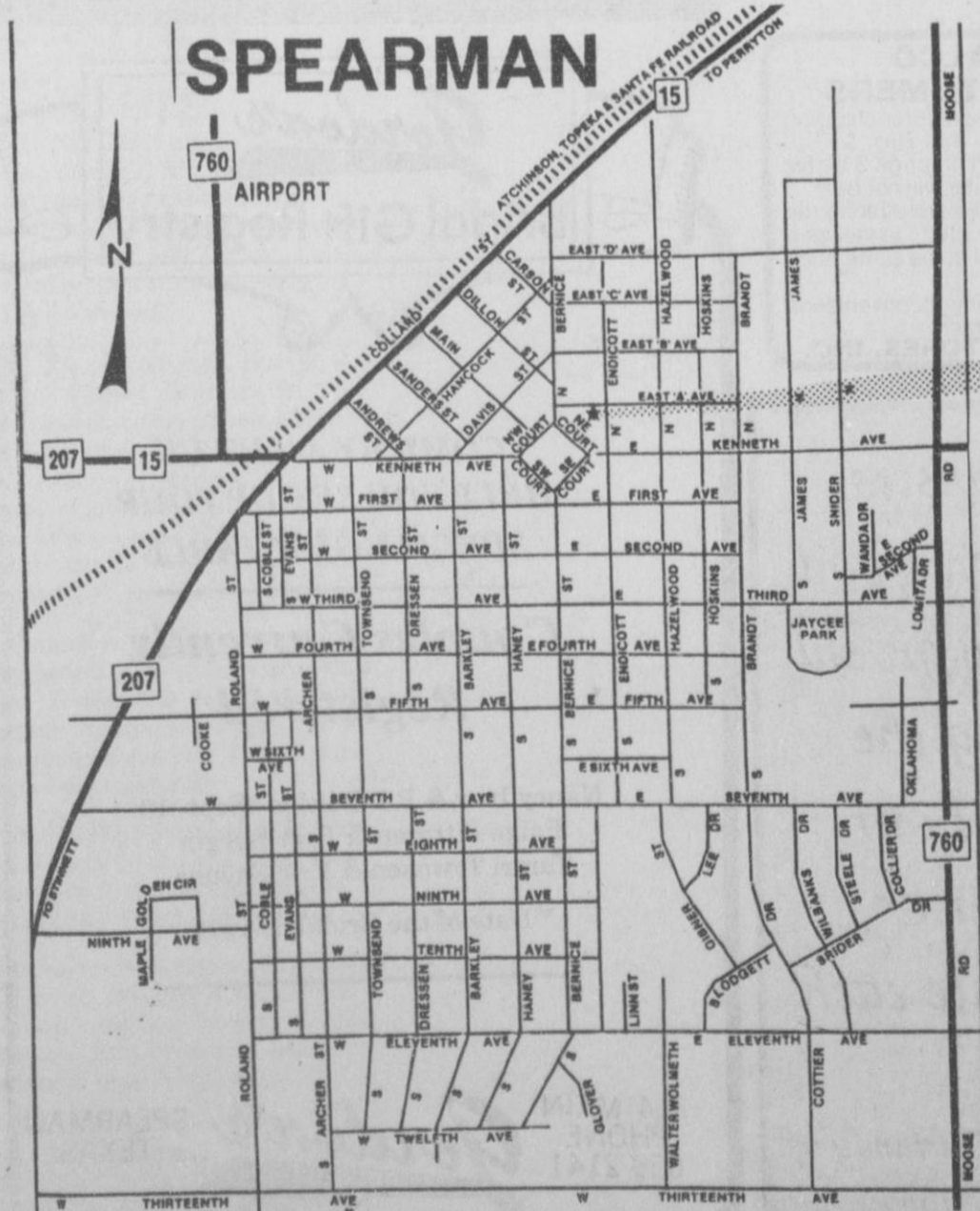

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Out at the Lake

The lake level is 23 over and holding. With the more pleasant weather use of the park has increased. Several R. V. Vehicles have utilized the facilities over the Labor day week-end. The family has been used for some family reunions. The fishing in the childrens pond has been excellent and several children have been thrilled with the size of their catch. Their names were unavailable.

The recent rains have made the Palo Duro Park a lovely place for nature hikes and drives. As summer blends into fall different species of flowers are blooming.

One of the most prolific this year is the White Stickleaf Sand Lily. They are thickest in the creek bottoms just north of the bridge across the Palo Duro creek, but can be found over all the park.. The blossoms open in the late afternoon and close in the morning. The plants are two to three feet tall and many branched. The rough, sticky foliage is covered with hairs with tiny barbs. The leaves are easily detached from the plant, and the barbed hairs enable them to cling closely to clothing and the hair of animals. The white flowers with their ten petals and many stamens each are about two and a half inches across.

Another showy white flower at the park is one from the Spurge Family called Snow-on-the-Mountain. These plants from one to four feet tall are found at various places

in the area, but some really fine specimens are growing in front of the cottonwoods that edge the caliche road on the west side of the lake. The flowers are small, white, borne in clusters, and have fine white, rather long appendages. A solid stand of this plant gives the appearance of being covered with snow. In the east it is often cultivated as an ornamental. Here this weedy plant is a problem on abused ranges, but it can be controlled by mowing before it seeds.

This weed is very unpalatable to livestock and is not eaten by choice. It contains a milky juice or latex that flows when the plant is wounded. This juice contains a poisonous substance that may produce inflammation of the skin similar to poison ivy. Even though cattle do not eat the plant on the range, they may die from the cumulative effects of eating hay that contains large amounts of this plant, although this is a rare occurrence.

Lane to be speaker at Methodist Revival

Dr. Jerry Lane of Pampa, Texas, will be featured speaker at First United Methodist Church of Spearman's fall revival, Sunday, September 11th through Tuesday, September 13th.

According to Pastor Jeff Lust, the theme of this year's revival is "New Elastic for Stretched-Out People," and the five sessions will deal with such topics as effective communication in interpersonal relationships and how individuals can better handle feelings of stress and anger. "Everyone is invited to attend the sessions," Lust said. (See Revival Schedule on this page.)

Jerry Lane, PHD, holds a doctorate degree in Counseling Psychology and is an ordained minister. Currently, Dr. Lane serves at Clarendon College as a counselor and as a professor of psychology. He has also established the Lane Counseling and Guidance Center at 2007 Williston Street in Pampa. His professional membership include the National Christian Counselors Association, the American Association of Christian Counselors, Christian Counselors of Texas, and the Texas Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors.

Lane, a Panhandle native, said he went into Christian counseling because of his years of work with children and youth through his teaching career and music minis-

try. After graduation from high school, he went on to earn a double major at McMurray College in 1968. His degrees combined his interests: elementary education and religious education.

"I taught school in Abilene, Herford and Pampa and was in music ministry at the Methodist churches in Panhandle, Memphis and McAllen," Lane said. "In fact, I was one of the first male kindergarten teachers in the state of Texas!"

While presiding over his classroom in Pampa, Lane pursued an advanced degree through Emmanuel Baptist University in North Carolina and started the Pampa Independent School

System's drug and alcohol program for elementary school level through high school level. He also established a Student Assistance Program for the School system.

During these hectic years, Lane went on to earn his doctorate in Counseling Psychology and his ordination. When asked how Christian counseling differ from secular counselors, he explained: "Christian counselors realize we have to heal the physical, the mental and the spiritual person." He also said most psychologists and counselors operate only during regular office hours, whereas he is available to his clients "night and day." "Problems often occur during non-busi-

ness hours, such as in the middle of the night, and I am available to those who need me then as well as during their scheduled appointments," Lane said.

Lane added, "I do use a twelve-step type program, a Christian-based program." In this program, the therapist and the counselee "work together to find scriptural ways to meet every need," according to Lane's guidance center brochure.

When asked what kinds of people need his services, he responded "Anybody! Anybody who is having a problem and cannot deal with it."


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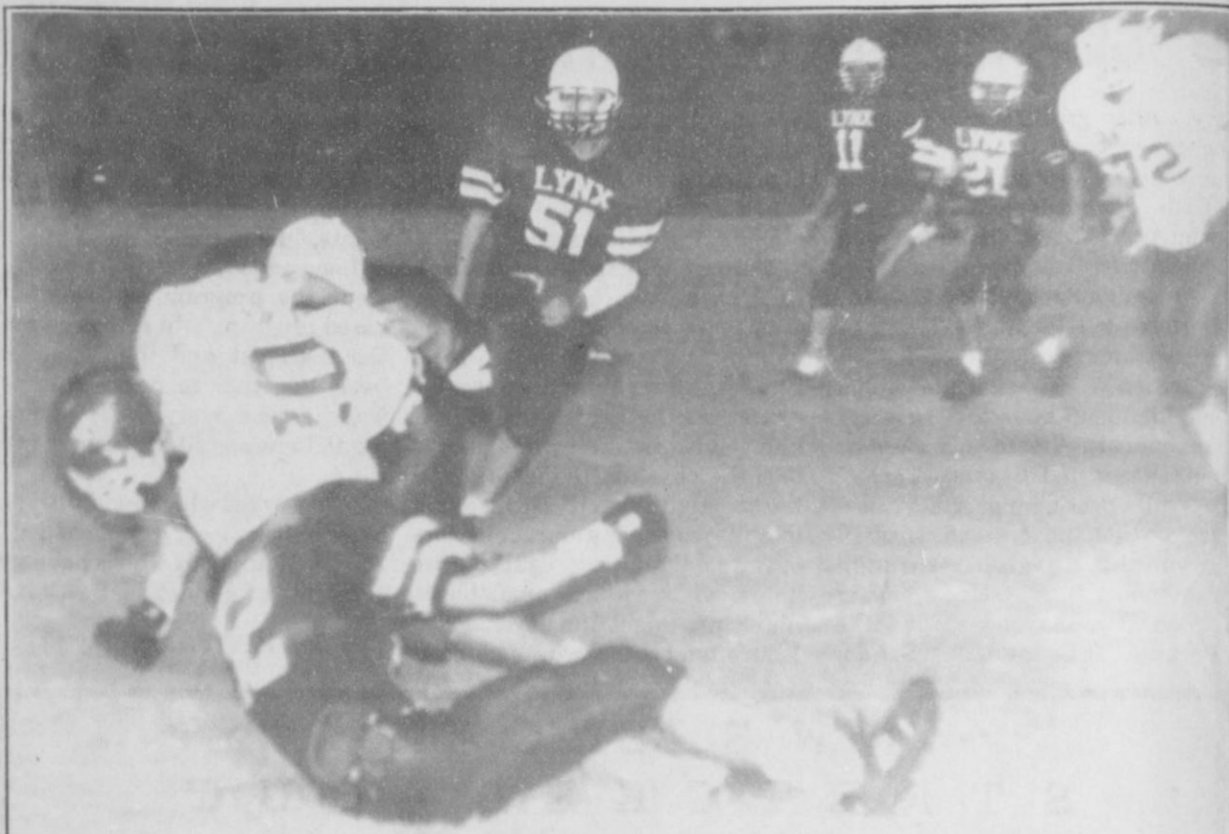

Lynx record impressive stats

The Spearman Lynx suffered a disappointing season opening loss to Panhandle last Friday night, 28-18. But the SHS squad did manage to put up some impressive numbers against the Panthers.

The Lynx ground attack managed to churn up 158 yards on 41 tries for a 3.86 average. Their passing attack could have been a bit more if a few of the aeriels would have connected. However, regardless of the near-misses the SHS squad finished with 77 yards in the air.

SHS quarterback Chad Wilkerson hit nine of 22 attempts for all of the 77 yards recorded and two touchdowns.

Wilkerson used a four-man receiving corp throughout the night. His biggest target in the game was Josh Furlow.

Furlow only caught two passes for 29 yards, but they were for touchdowns giving him a 14.5 yards per catch average.

Shawn Moore was on the receiving end of three passes for 28 yards, Phillip Sanders had two catches for one yard, and Jeremy Blan had two receptions for 19 yards.

The ground game was led by

Martin Sanders and Shawn Moore as they combined for 104 of the 158 yards recorded.

Sanders had just one carry but it was for 56 yards and a touchdown.

Moore had 14 carries for 48 yards, giving him an average of 3.44 per carry.

Phillip Sanders and Coyt Tigrett both finished with 26 yards in the game. Sanders got his the hard way carrying the ball 11 times for a 2.36 average, and Tigrett picked up all of his yards on just one try.

Chad Wilkerson had seven carries for two yards, and Jeremy Blan and Dillion Miller also carried the pigskin but were unable to pick up any yardage against the PHS defense.

Panhandle finished with 59 yards on the ground off of 28 carries for a 2.1 average. However, the bulk of their offensive output came through the air as they completed 10 of 20 passes for 208 yards and two touchdowns.

Panhandle takes advantage of this, and several plays later Wilkinson completes a 33 yard pass to Shadid for the Panther's second touchdown. The Panthers get the two point conversion, and go on top 14-6.

The Lynx try to answer back, but are denied, and forced to punt. However, Panhandle can't seem to get things going either and are also forced to punt. Several plays later, the Lynx again forced to punt, but this time Panhandle capitalizes. On a second down and ten yard play, Wilkinson passes yet again to Shadid for another Panther touchdown.

With the ball in the hands of the Lynx again, they try to make a

comeback, but end up short, thus forcing them to punt again. Panhandle is then forced to punt also, but is soon back on offense because of a fumble in the backfield of the Lynx.

On the next play, Panhandle's Wilkinson completes a pass to Dale Daniels for yet another Panther touchdown. The extra point was good, thus bringing the first half to a close, Panhandle 28 Lynx 6.

The second half looked brighter for the Lynx, and possibly, as many of the players said, "We could have pulled it out, if only we played the first half like the second."

Although it took towards the end of the third quarter for Wilkerson to complete another touchdown pass

to Furlow, things began looking up for the Lynx. The two point conversion failed, which left the Lynx trailing 28-12.

The Lynx then later in the fourth quarter, got the ball back after a long series of plays by the Panthers. On a play that will long be remembered Spearman's quarterback Wilkerson throws a lateral screen to Martin Sanders who blazes by the Panther's defense, thanks to his speed and great blocking by the offensive line. The two point conversion failed, leaving the Lynx trailing 28-18.

The Lynx then force Panhandle to punt, and get the ball back. Spearman in the punting situation again also, pull off a well executed fake by Coyt Tigrett, who easily gets the first down.

Panhandle forces the Lynx to yet punt again late in the fourth quarter. Several plays later Spearman's Micheal Witten intercepts a Panther pass.

With the Lynx driving hard late in the fourth quarter, Panhandle's Wilkinson picks off a pass to seal the game, as well as the fate of the Lynx.

Statistically, the Lynx had twelve first downs compared to Panhandle's nine. Panhandle's Wilkinson had a total of 214 yards passing compared to Wilkerson's 134. The Panther's offense combined for a total of 294 yards, while the Lynx had 266 yards.

The Lynx will travel to Memphis this Friday to battle the Cyclones at Cyclone Stadium. Game time is 8:00 p.m.

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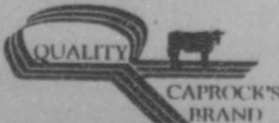

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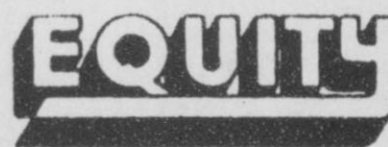
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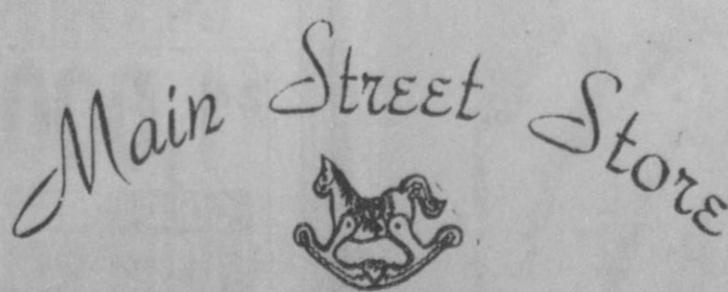

According to Head Coach Doug Frick, the defense was outstanding. The "D" gave up less than 100 yards, and Wheeler scored off a turnover, their only touchdown. Coach Frick was pleased with the offensive line. They were unproven, but played well. Coach Frick was impressed overall, other than with the penalties.

A Licensed Temperament Therapist, Dr. Lane employs a counseling method based on the belief that, instead of spending sessions trying to find "hidden problems," the client and the therapist are better off following a step-by-step procedure developed to target the problem.

"It's a very practical approach," Lane said. "I use lots of pencil and paper exercises at the beginning. It is so easy to talk all around a problem and end up right where you started, but when you write, you can pinpoint your temperament and from there identify your need."

There is a special questionnaire used in Temperament Therapy designed to accomplish this end which is interpreted by a diagnostics specialist at the headquarters of the National Christian Counselors Association.

"The solutions are practical, because you're just rethinking who you are--how you think and speak and act--and from there, we can get hold of our feelings instead of having them get hold of us," he explained. Lane added that "most of the time" it is not necessary to go into a person's past in great detail. "When dealing with guilt, it's im-

portant to recognize what happens, but then we have to move beyond the past and not hang onto it," he said.

To further exemplify his approach, Lane paraphrased a famous Eleanor Roosevelt quotation: "Nobody can get to me unless I let them."

Once the client's problem is identified and he or she has a clear understanding of his/her unique temperament, Lane said getting to the solution can be a short-term matter. As a therapist and behavioral analyst, Lane said he gives guidelines and offers options and possibilities in a supportive environment.

His own reward, He said, is "seeing people become their own person and walk out of there free." He compared a successful counseling session to the feeling of "seeing a light go on for someone." "When he is not counseling and teaching, Lane enjoys spending time with his family. His wife Mary Lou, is a teacher in the Pampa school system. Daughter Tamara is a psychology major at Texas Tech University and son Jeffrey works in the DNA research laboratory.
