Pampa man arrested in Gruver Burglaries

Pampa Man Arrested in Gruver Burglaries

On the night of August 31, several business in Gruver were broken nto. The burglar(s) pried open back doors of the buildings, and kicked in several locked office doors. The burglar(s) went through desks, cash registers, and file drawers. An undetermined amount of cash was taken from the businesses.

Gruver Police immediately notified most police agencies in the central part of the panhandle. Gruver PD immediately received information that, in addition to the burglaries in Gruver, many businesses in Gray County, Carson county, Donley county, Hutchison County, and Oldham County were also burglarized.

Within a couple of days, due to cooperative investigations amongst the various departments, a suspect was arrested. On Wednesday, September 14, the suspect was arrested in Pampa by Pampa Police Department, who then notified all other agencies involved. Gruver Police responded to the Gray County Jail, and, after being questioned, the suspect admitted to the burglaries. He was charged with numerous counts of burglary.



Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

On August 30, 2005, the Pringle-Morse CISD Board of Trustees set an ad valorem tax rate of \$1.425 per \$100 valuation for the year 2005. Maintaining a low tax rate has always been a priority of the board and administration and will remain so as long as the rate is feasible. It is becoming increasingly difficult, however, to maintain a low rate because of the complex formulas the State of Texas uses to calculate public school funding.

According to the State, Pringle-Morse is a Chapter 41 (propertywealthy) district and by law is required to send locally collected tax dollars to the State Comptrollers Treasury Operating Department so it can, in turn, distribute local tax dollars to property-poor districts. This system of recapture substantially impacts the local tax rate and, therefore, local taxpayers.

Recapture has such a dire effect on the District's budget that every year the recapture payment must be calculated first, then the maintenance and operations budget is cut considerably, and expenses are monitored very closely throughout the year; all the while property-poor districts are spending local tax dollars sent to Austin.

How it works: For the year 2005, the Hansford County Chief Appraiser certified Pringle-Morse's taxable values at \$148,785,262. At the \$1.425 tax rate these values will generate approximately \$2,077,786 (98% collection rate) in revenue for the District. From this \$2,077,786, Pringle-Morse CISD must send \$839,682 to the State Comptroller. In other words, to satisfy the State's "Robin Hood" school funding mandate, forty cents of every locally collected tax dollar leaves the District. Without the recapture payment, a tax rate of \$0.8755 would be sufficient to operate Pringle-Morse CISD.

Pringle-Morse is aware that its situation - a rural school district in an agricultural community -- is not unique. Chapter 41 districts across the State are in the same predicament, and many property-poor districts are suffering financially as well. Because expenses are rising faster than student growth, triggering larger and larger recapture payments, rural school districts in Texas are growing poorer every year.

Since the percentage of recapture increases as local values increase, the Robin Hood system is draining property-wealthy districts. Some districts pay as much as 70% of every locally collected tax dollar to the State. Many districts--including Pringle-Morse-- filed a joint lawsuit against the State seeking relief from high property taxes and high recapture payments. The courts ruled in favor of the school districts, but that decision is currently being appealed by the State.

The State Legislature, elected senators and representatives, spent months and months in time, and thousands and thousands in tax dollars, in an effort to solve the Texas public education funding crisis. They failed to reach a solution. There are many reasons for this failure, however it seems that partisan politics in the Capitol once again prevented the schoolchildren of Texas from attending public schools that operate under an equitable funding system.

Words from Faith & Grace

Our duty as Christians is not going to Church, but being the Church. Our study this week is in Ezekiel 18:1-32, Psalm 25, Phillipians 2:1-13, and Matthew 21:23-32.

The Word of the Lord through Ezekiel is that the person who sins shall die. The Old Testament earlier taught that the sins of the fathers were counted against the children; while psychologically this can be true, as a matter of our faith, it is not. We, dear Christian, are accountable for our own faults and sins. Don't blame your parents, your siblings, or circumstances; we have to face the "Lick Log", we are responsible for our own lives.

The Psalmist prays God to "do not remember the sins of my youth or my transgressions"; he asks that God forgive him and lead him in His ways.

Paul is still concerned over the lack of unity in the Church at Phillipi. He advises the young faith community to do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit; to regard others as better than themselves; to have the same mind as Jesus Christ. In short, don't go to church to appear good, don't believe that your sin is less than your neighbors, and don't preach Christ's gospel for your own glory.

As Christians we live with the same Holy Spirit, we serve the same Master, we should exhibit His love in our lives. Paul says "work out your own salvation with fear and trembling"; what those words mean is that we should "complete" our salvation in body, mind and spirit. A church is not a building, it is not a warehouse for saints, a church is the living body of Christ composed of each of its members. The church is not on a certain street corner, it exists wherever its members are.

Jesus is continuing his struggle with the Pharisees. The Pharisees believed that they were already "good enough." They kept the law in its smallest parts; they did not associate with sinners; they were the "good people" of their day. Jesus told them they did not know God. His parable was the father who asks his two sons to work in his vineyard. One says, "no way Dad," yet he later goes and works. The other says, "yes, Dad,' but does not go. Which son did the will of the father? The answer - the son who actually did go as requested.

The Pharisees said, "Yes, Lord" but they did nothing to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, heal the sick or sustain the orphan and widow; they did nothing to ask God's forgiveness for their sin. The tax-collectors and the whores who heard Jesus, repented and asked forgiveness. Jesus told the Pharisees that the tax-collectors and whores would enter the Kingdom of God before the Pharisees. Again the first will be last and the last will be first.

May the Holy Spirit give you the strength to recognize and ask forgiveness of your sin that you may be empowered to "be" a part of the living Church.
