Three injured in pick-up roll-over

Christina Loefelholz, 31, Kayla Loefelholz, 9, and Jim Peirce, 34, all of Guymon, were thrown from a 1988 Ford Ranger when it rolled over approximately four times, one mile north of Bernstein Elevator on Highway 207, Sunday, January 22.

Kayla was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital by Medivac helicopter at around 8:45 p.m., Sunday night, with massive head injuries. Christina was Medivaced out at around 11 p.m. with internal injuries. Both are in critical condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Peirce was admitted to the Hansford County Hospital with rib injuries Sunday. He was released Monday. There were two other children in the vehicle, ages 2 and 7, they were not injured.

According to Toby Schaef, Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper, the couple was traveling from Amarillo to Guymon. Schaef went on to say, "It is thought, at this time, that all the passengers were asleep and that the driver may have fallen asleep and drove off the road, over corrected and lost control of the vehicle.

Trooper Schaef said that the accident is sill under investigation

TDOH imposes first rabies quarantine

lines to help fight rabies.

The State of Texas has imposed a statewide rabies quarantine. The spread of virulent rabies strains from southwest Texas to Montana and Florida has recently prompted impose the first ever statewide rabies quarantine.

The rabies quarantine has triggered fears that the disease might spread into urban areas. Texas officials had been concerned that two rabies strains, the coyote rabies and gray fox rabies, were spreading from coyotes and foxes to domestic pets in nearby urban areas; where officials estimate that only 40 to 60 percent of dogs and cats were vaccinated. This despite a state law requiring annual rabies inoculations. Area residents are asked to be

careful around stray or wild ani-

State officials have drawn the mals, and to monitor their pets closely. Residents should also get their pets vaccinated.

According to a news release, since 1988, more than 500 cases of canine and fox rabies have been identified in the state: 275 in coythe Texas Department of Health to otes, 216 in dogs and 45 in other animals. Four people in Texas have died of rabies since 1990 and more than 1,600 have been treated for exposure to the virus. People who are exposed are given an injection of rabies-immune globulin on the fist day of treatment, along with a rabies vaccination shot in the arm to trigger the immune system. Similar rabies vaccinations are administered on days three, seven, 14 and

> If someone suspects an animal to have rabies they are advised to stay away from the animal, and call law enforcement officials.



"After the worker is unable to work any more, who takes care of him/her, it is a question that we should all ask ourselves" Ramon told the crowd.

Texas Wheat Producers to hold mail election

The Texas Wheat Producers Board engaged in wheat research, market development and services designed to add to the value of the crop, will hold its twelfth-biennial mail election between March 6 and March 20, 1995, according to Ben Scholz, Farmer-elected chairman of the organization. The board was formed in 1971 in the Panhandle-North Texas area and expanded statewide by a producers referendum in 1985. The terms of five of the current fifteen board members expiring at this time include: District I: Cagle Kendrick, Stratford; District II: Tommy Womack, Tulia; District III: Keith Spears, Varnon; and District IV: Jack Norman, Howe and Billy Vinson, Abilene.

In 1971 the board was formed by produces as a self-help program to enhance the value of wheat in Texas, the 1.5 million acre crop produced 31.4 million bushels, market priced at \$1.25 per bu. for a value of about \$37 million dollars. Texas' peak harvested acres of 5.8 million in 1985 produced 187 million bu. crop valued in excess of \$800 million. Charges in government programs, particularly the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Agri Conservation Reserve (ACR), 0/92 and Conservation Use (CU) has combined with changing cropping practices to drop Texas harvest acres to 2.9 million this current year. This reduced acreage produced a 75.4 million bu, crop for a value in excess of \$300 million dollars.



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PETITION

We, the undersigned by virtue of this petition dated December 26, 1994, oppose the construction and operation of the proposed swine facilities in Section 31-Block 4 and Section 46-Block 4T in Ochiltree County, Texas. Said facilities should not be allowed because of the potential environmental pollution to the immediate area and the limited economic impact such operations will bring to the area. Furthermore, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission should deny permit application Nos. 03768, 03769, 26624 and 26625 for said facilities.

Environmental pollution will most likely occur as offensive odors to the reidents who live in and around said operations and as a potential source of ground water and surface water pollution occurring from sewage and retention pits needed for the operations. Pollution of ground water from said operations can potentially affect the fresh water supply of local residents and business for several miles from the source. Pollution of surface water can occur during large rainfalls that may overflow said pits, allowing sewage and waste water to contaminate natural waterways and surrounding lands. Such contaminated overflow can damage and harm wildlife and livestock that consume water from sources in said waterways. At the very least, in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, an environmental impact study should be conducted and published prior to any consideration of such swine facilities and operations.

The proposed swine operation will have little, if any, economic benefit to the surrounding communities and thus will be a nuisance for those wishing to conduct business and promote the economic welfare of the area. The proposed operation will bring in construction labor and materials, swine and feed from other areas. The swine, when fed out, will be shipped out of the area to other markets. Taking this into consideration, local residents and business will not and cannot economically benefit from said operation. Furthermore, it is our opinion that the odors and sewage from the operation would prevent further ecnomic development in the area, harm current agricultural business and devalue surrounding real estate and agricultural properties.
