## TDOH imposes first rabies quarantine

## State officials have drawn the

 lines to help fight rabies. The State of Texas has imposed a statewide rabies quarantine. The spread of virulent rabies strainsfrom southwest Texas to Montana from southwest Texas to Montana and Texas Department of Health to impose the first ever statewide ra bies quarantine.
The rabies quarantine has triggered fears that the disease might
spread into urban areas. Texas offispread into urban areas. Texas offi-
cials had been concerned that two cials had been concerned that two
rabies strains, the coyoterabies and rabies strains, the coyote rabies and
gray fox rabies, were spreading from coyotes and foxes to domestic pets in nearby urban areas; where offi-
cials estimate that only 40 to 60 cials estimate that only 40 to 60
percent of dogs and cats were vaccipercent of dogs and cats were vacci-
nated. This despite a state law renated. This despite a state law re-
quiring annual rabies inoculations. Area residents are asked to be Area residents are asked to be
careful around stray or wild ani-

## mals, and to monitor their pets closely. Residents should also get closely. Residents should also get

 their pets vaccinated. According to a news release, since 1988, more than 500 cases of canine and fox rabies have beenidentified in the state: 275 in coyidentified in the state: 275 in coy-
otes, 216 in dogs and 45 in other otes, 216 in dogs and 45 in other
animals. Four people in Texas have died of rabies since 1990 and more than 1,600 have been treated for exposure to the virus. People who are exposed are given an injection of rabies-immune globulin on the fist day of treatment, along with a rabies vaccination shot in the arm

Every since 1983, when the pro gram was started in Los Angles by Chief Gates in just 18 of the area schools, the D.A.R.E. program has reached out to millions of kids in a way that they can understand in all 50 states and in 5 foreign countries. It not only teaches them about the dangers of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco, but it also teaches them how to gain self esteem. "The program
is based on $95 \%$ self-esteem, so that we can teach kids not break down in pressure; so that they will not fold like cards," stated D.A.R.E. Officer Jamie Downs. "We like to target kids in the fifth grade because they are the most vulnerable at this time of their life - the time when they start looking for role models in the higher up grades.
"This program is different and better than the 'Just Say No Program ter than the Just Say No Program
because it teaches the kids how and why to say to drugs," Downs went on to say.

This is the first year for the pro gram, and Officer Downs has more than done his part to help it out For the last 17 weeks, Downs has schedule as a police officer to come and teach these kids in Shirley Atwood's class. All 62 kids had a choice between going to the librar or staying in the program, and non of them chose to quite, which say quite a bit for Officer Downs and Spearman schools.
In order to graduate from the program, each kid must live up an accomplish four guidelines. They must stay in the program all 17 weeks, stay workbook, and at the end of the course, they must write an es say on what they have learned as well as make a promise notdodrugs. and operation of the proposed swine facilities in Section 31-Block 4 and Section 46 -Block 4 T in Ochiltree County, Texas. Pollution of surface water can occur during large rainfalls that may overflow said pits, allowing sewage and waste water to contaminate natural waterways and surrounding lands. Such contaminated overflow can damage and harm wildlife and livestock that at frem in said wery least, in accordance with the Nationat Environmental Policy Act of 1969, an environmental impact study should be conducted and published prior to any consideration of such swine facilities and operations.

The proposed swine operation will have little, if any, economic benefit to the surrounding uisance formote the conomic welfare of the area.
