imately $\$ 25,000$ in consulting fees to Freese and Nichols, engineers for the dam project. Lee said that any ar-
tifacts found at the new dig site,
along with historical finds already
located, will be placed in permanent storage at the Panhandle Plains Museum at Canyon
Other business discussed at the PDRA meeting included possible
refinancing of bonds, which refinancing of bonds, which were issued for construction of the dam
and lake area. Lee said that the and lake area. Lee said that the
board is studying the possiblity of refinancing the bonds, which could bring down the interest rate on the bonds from 7.6 percent to 6.55 per-
cent. He said refinancing the bonds cent. He said refinancing the bonds
could save up to $\$ 1$ million in interest

PDRA board members discussed water wells at Palo Duro Lake,
noting that three wells are needed to noting that three wells are needed that the wells must meet Health Department standards for quality and the PDRA hired an engineer for
the project. He said signs have been the project. He said signs have bee
placed on the wells that are alread located in the area, which warn that the water from the wells is not potable and should not be drunk.
