



line prices in Texas have fallen 1.1 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.44/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 2.8 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.61/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 96.3 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 17.0 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 9.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 91.6 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"Retail gasoline prices finished last week quite strong in some areas on concern surrounding Hurricane Irene," said Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst. "The concern sur-rounding refinery production on the East Coast helped boost gasoline prices outside that area as well. The good news for motorists is that damage to refineries was likely minimal and gasoline production will resume soon. However, with Labor Day weekend fast approaching and these refineries taking days to resume production we still may see retail prices gradually climb during this week," DeHaan adds

## **National Rural Teacher of the Year** The Rest of the Story

There has long been a debate in the education community of what makes a good teacher. Some believe good teachers are born with the gift to teach while others feel good teachers are a product of their environment. In the case of Kristi Ramon, who was recently named by the National Rural Education Association as the 2011 National Rural Teacher of the Year, her own story and circumstances in her life most definitely helped mold and shape her into the teacher she is today!

Kristi was born in Liberal, Kansas. Her parents divorced when she was a young child. Her mother was a good mother who did whatever it took to help raise her three daughters, including working three jobs to help support her family. Kristi heard the following story years later about the hard times of her childhood: It was near Christmas and her mother was working as a waitress. Some of the regulars at the restaurant asked her mom if she was excited about Christmas, and she told them she was not. When questioned, she added that her girls were growing up and

wanted bicycles for Christmas and that she did not have the money to buy them what they wanted. To her surprise when

the customers left, they left her a 100 dollar tip, and her mom used the money to buy her girls the bikes they wanted for Christmas. Kristi said, "Looking back I realize that we were poor, but at the time I really didn't know any better.'

When she was nine her mother remarried, and later her family moved to Turpin, Oklahoma where she graduated from high school. Kristi said that while in Turpin she had some outstanding teachers who took her under their wings. However, she added that she was not the best student in the world and was a real "stinker." "It was not that I was a super bad kid, but I really didn't apply myself," she added. It was in high school when another student told her that one of her teachers had said that she (Kristi) would never amount to anything in the world. Kristi said, "To be fair to the teacher, I did not give the teacher any reason to believe any differently." However, that statement has helped shape her philosophy which is times give us a reason not to Patterson.

Furthering her education after high school was not really anything that was expected of her family. In fact, Kristi said she was the first in her immediate family to go to college and the first to receive a degree. She went to college for one reason she said and that was because her cute fiancé was attending and she thought it would be fun. Shortly after starting college, she got married. College was hard for her, and she would come home crying wanting to quit school. She said, "My husband told me that quitting was not an option." She added what happened next was something that she would be forever grateful to her husband for and that was he never gave up on her. He came home every day and worked with her and eventually taught her how to study. While at OPSU she met a homemaking teacher, Mrs. Latham, who she enjoyed and who encouraged her and helped her graduate with a degree in homemaking in 1985.

Kristi and her husband moved to Spearman shortly after she graduated; however, there were no jobs available as a homemaking teacher in the Spearman school system. She was a stay at home mom for about a year and later cleaned houses to supplement their income.

**Staples letter requests** hay

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples sent a letter dated Aug. 25 to conviction other states' agriculture officials requesting hay donations for drought-stricken Texas cattle raisers. The idea is to identify sources of hay and get the contact information posted on the Texas Department of Agriculture's Hay Hotline.

"The need for hay is dire and getting more desperate each day," Staples said Aug. 26.

According to the state extension service, Staples said, agriculture losses due to the 2011 drought have already reached \$5.2 billion and are now the costliest in state history for Texas farmers and ranchers.

# Words from Faith & Grace

In the twelfth week of Pentecost, we study Ezekiel 33 1-11, Psalm 119: 33-40, Romans 13: 8-14, and Matthew 18: 15-20. We learn something about our duty to God, our duty to our fellow Christians, our desiring of God. and how to deal with conflict with other believers through the real presence of Christ.

Ezekiel is told by God that he is to speak to the people for God and warn them to turn from their evil ways. God holds his prophet responsible for delivering the message, the Word of God. If the people disregard God's message, God holds the people accountable for their sin. God does not desire the death of the wicked, but he wants the wicked to turn from their ways and live. We, as Children of God, are called not to condemn others, but to share the good news of the gospel.

The Psalmist in this passage sings about desiring God. He seeks to find God in scripture and in doing so uses eight different words to describe the Word of God, towit: 1) law ('better instruction'), 2) commandments, 3) ordinances, 4) precepts, 5) decrees, 6) words, 7) promises, and 8) statutes. He starts out, "Teach me, O Lord, the way of your statutes, and I will observe it to the end.'

Paul exhorts the Romans to not owe anyone anything, but the debt of love. For love is the fulfilling of the law. He calls upon the Romans to realize that our time here is limited and we must live honorably. Paul asks us to 'put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires." To "put on" Christ is literally as if to put on a coat. If we 'wear' Christ in our every-day lives, others will see Christ in us.

In a rather difficult passage, Jesus instructs his disciples in cases of personal difficulties with another believer to discuss the problem with the other privately. If this fails to resolve the problem, take one or two others with you not as witnesses for a trial, but as facilitators of settlement. If this fails the entire assembly (church) should hear and seek to resolve the problem. Jesus then says, "...if the member refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector." Yet, this is not judgmental, for Jesus was said to be the friend of Gentiles and tax collectors; Jesus did not give up on anyone. Jesus then promises, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." With the real presence of Christ, discord and animosity disappear.
