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



Dad-Lad Cake Bake





Skeletons aren't just for Halloween! Following are some quick and easy tips for 'boning' up on calcium:

- Drink calcium fortified juice with meals.

Currently, we average about three servings of fruits and vegetables a day rater than the recommended five. Try these suggestions for boosting your servings of these important foods.

* Add pureed cooked vegetables such as carrots, corn, and zucchini to ground meat dishes like meat loaf and burgers.

* Try whole pineapple chunk (or rings) and apricot halves as a topping for baked or grilled chicken

* Serve apple, pear, or banana slices topped with peanut butter.



This and other laws passed by the 74th Legislature are designed to make individuals responsible for their own actions. We'll look at others in the future. For now, that's the way I see it from where I sit.
