Crisis Center Asking for Cell Phones

The Panhandle Crisis Center is asking citizens of Perryton and the surrounding area to donate unneeded or unwanted cell phones to help the victims of domestic violence and sexual assault or abuse.

The cell phones would give these victims the ability to call 9-1-1 for help.

The people who need this emergency phone assistance are those who do not have a phone or those in a situation where the perpetrator has disabled the phone to prevent the victim from getting law enforcement intervention.

The phone chargers need to be donated with the phones so they can be kept in working order. The phones will be programmed so they only dial 9-1and no other number.

Kerry Symons, owner of Perryton Office Supply, will reprogram the phones. The donor's phone number will be removed. This is done by reprogramming the phone with the number 111-111-1111.

"This is the way cell phones arrive at the business," Symons said, "ready to be programmed for a customer." This programming will prevent anyone from calling the cell phone, but it will still allow 9-1-1 calls.

Cell phones (and the chargers) may be donated by taking them to the Panhandle Crisis Center, Perryton Office Supply, First Christian Church in Spearman, or the Reporter-Statesman office, 213 Main St.

The crisis center is always in need of community support. Helping with this cell phone project is just one of the many ways people can offer their support of this needed service.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Now Accepted

Effective December 19, 2000, 243 counties in Texas were designated as a primary natural disaster area based on the damages caused by excessive heat and drought that occurred from January 1, 2000 and continuing.

This designation makes family-sized farm operators in both the primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for low interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency (FSA). FSA will consider each loan application by taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability, and other eligibility requirements.

Farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less (maximum amount \$500,000). The farmers must be unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders to be eligible for the emergency loans. The interest rate on the actual loss loan is 3.75%

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an emergency loan. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 20, 2001 but farmers should apply possible soon as Applications may be obtained at the local FSA office

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a sub-stantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or coopera-tives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

Public Radio Comes To The Panhandle

Public radio is coming to the Northern Texas Panhandle, via a new 100,000 watt FM station. High Plains Public Radio has been working for the past 2 years to expand its coverage to include Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Carson, Gray and Wheeler counties. The new station will deliver programming that includes in-depth news, classical, jazz and folk music, and a variety of other information and entertainment programs currently not available in

Programming will include National Public Radio's award winning daily news programs of Morning Edition and All Things Considered, along with other public radio favorites such as A Prairie Home Companion with Garrison Keillor and Car Talk. Regional news, information and public affairs programming, along with promotion of area arts, educational and cultural organizations, will also be featured daily. All programming will be broadcast commercial free. As a non-profit organization, High Plains Public Radio relies on individual and business contributions to fund its service.

In September, 2000 HPPR was offered a grant of nearly \$437,000 from the Telecommunications Facilities Program of the National Telecommunications Information Agency to help construct the station. Over the next three months, High Plains Public Radio will work with residents of the Texas Panhandle to organize a capital campaign to pay for equipment, construction and initial operating costs not covered by the grant.

The station would broadcast at 89.5 FM from a centrally located 800' tower. Final approval of an application to the FCC for a construction permit for the station is still pending. High Plains Public Radio, which began broadcasting in 1980, currently serves residents of Western Kansas, portions of Southeastern Colorado and the Oklahoma Panhandle, and Amarillo. It can be heard in Amarillo at 94.9 FM and 91.3 FM.

Federal Conservation, Development Areas to Include High Plains

The Texas High Plains Resource Conservation and Development Areas were recently designated as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's RC&D program, making them eligible for future USDA funding.

The RC&D program is designed to help people in rural areas plan and implement activities that increase conservation of natural resources, support economic development and enhance the environment and quality of iving. In the Texas High Plains, this includes reducing soil erosion,

mproving water quality and diversifying local business opportunities. The FY2001 Agriculture Appropriations bill included a \$7 million increase in RC&D funding, providing an increased chance that a RC&D area will be eligible for federal funding.

Risk and Return: How Much Are You Willing To Take?

Progress always involves risks. You can't steal second base while keeping your foot on first.

Frederick Wilcox One of the main inhibitors of success is the fear of risk. Webster defines risk as "the chance of injury, damage or loss." Many great business ideas were never acted upon because of the risk involved.

Those who go to work every day in jobs they dislike are practicing risk avoidance, too. They go on because they are afraid to risk quitting without having another job. Now I'm not advocating quitting your job without having a better opportunity lined up. That's too risky.

The truth is we all take risks. Sometimes we don't recognize the risk. Other times we may see risk where it doesn't exist. The story of former newspaper columnist Arthur Brisbane illustrates this point.

Brisbane worked for William Randolph Hearst, who owned 18 major newspapers at the time. Hearst hired bright, able talent and paid them well. He also had a habit of rewarding outstanding work.

Based on his excellent contributions to the papers, Hearst offered Brisbane an all-expense-paid, sixmonth sabbatical. Brisbane turned

When Hearst asked why Brisbane

refused the paid time off, Brisbane replied, "First of all, I'm afraid that if I quit for six months, the circulation of your newspaper may go down. And, secondly, I'm afraid that it may not."

What stopped Brisbane from enjoying the reward was the potential for loss. And that fear can stop us as well.

What Is Risk? Here are some different views on

risk. Let me challenge your think-

 Risk is having one boss. In the corporate chain of command, you answer to a boss who has the power to promote, fire or demote you. Your fate rests on what that one person thinks of you.

An entrepreneur, on the other hand, has many bosses. We call them customers. While the objective of every great business is to satisfy all customers, none do. But when you have hundreds of customers, you can disappoint one occasionally and not lose your business.

If your business only has one customer, you have the same risk as an employee with one boss. That one customer controls your future.

· Risk is having one source of income. As an employee, your employer is your source of income. As an entrepreneur, you have as many sources of income as you have products, services and customers.

Finding a new source of income in a slow economy is a problem for employees who find themselves out of a job. Entrepreneurs can add new products, lines or services and keep right on going.

· Risk is not being in control of your own destiny. Recently I received an e-mail from a reader whose friend had been treated unfairly by a ruthless boss. The friend lost her job despite the fact

that she had been an exemplary employee. When you work for someone else, you give up some control of your destiny.

Entrepreneurs take control of theirs. They know they have to solve their own problems. They know their own efforts control their income, so they work hard and smart. They know they grow stronger when they face adversity, so they accept the risk and grow.

before making a major business decision. The key ingredient here is self-confidence. You either believe in your own decision-making abilities, or you don't.

I believe I can make good, balanced decisions and I usually do. I also know that I'll make some mistakes, so I don't lose my confidence when I do. Hence the old saying, "If at first you don't succeed, try again."





Weasels, elongated and slender with short legs, are extraordinarily quick and agile. They usually leap on prey, grabbing it behind the head. The killing bite into the back of the neck is an instinctive behavioral pattern. The upper teeth penetrate the rear skull roof, and the lower teeth press behind the ear into the brain, leading to a fast death. Blood running from the wounds is licked up. This has led many to

think weasels suck the blood out of their kill. These animals like to carry off and hide their victims for

As long as there is live prey, a weasel's instinct is to kill it. That gives them a very bad reputation among poultry raisers. Otherwise, they are valuable at keeping mice and rats thinned out.






