Davis' Named Hansford County Pioneer King & Queen

When Irvin and Betty Davis were asked to serve as Pioneer King and Queen for Hansford County Pioneer Days, they were hesitant, thinking they wouldn't be qualified to fill the position. After more persuasion, they finally agreed.

Irvin and Betty Davis are true citizens of Hansford County. Irvin was born in Spearman. His parents were J. W. and Martha (Mattie) King Davis, and along with a sister and brothers, they attended Spearman schools. Like all kids in the 1930s and 1940s era, they did chores and worked at various jobs in the town's businesses.

Irvin worked in his dad's service station, Davis Oil Company when seven years of age. At the age of thirteen he was driving a truck to Sunray, picking up loads of gas at the refinery. Then at the age of sixteen Irvin was able to buy his first car, a 1929 Model A for \$20. He still found time to play football and basketball during his Sophomore and Junior years. Due to the war, there were no organized

sales tax holiday, Texas shoppers will not have to pay state and local sales tax on certain energy efficiency-rated products. "It's a great opportunity for consumers to save at the register and at home, where they'll see the benefits returned in energy savings on their utility bills," Combs said.

The tax break applies to air conditioners priced less than \$6,000, refrigerators priced less than \$2,000, ceiling fans, incandescent and fluorescent light bulbs, clothes washers, dishwashers, dehumidifiers and programmable thermostats.

The tax break also applies to installation and delivery charges for the products on the list, Combs said.

Patterson: Coast clear

Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson on May 13 said the Deepwater Horizon oil spill slick was about 160 miles east of the Texas coast.

"Despite some media reports, Texas is not yet affected by this spill," Patterson said. "We're watching and waiting, but it's just not time to go to general quarters. No news good news."

Arizona a no-go for city of Austin

Austin City Council on May 13 unanimously adopted a resolution to curtail official business travel to Arizona to protest the state's new law tightening immigration enforcement.

Before the vote, Mayor Pro Tem Mike Martinez said, "The reasons for introducing this measure are two-fold. First and foremost, we want to ensure that we are not exposing city employees to risk by sending them into an uncertain and potentially hostile environment Arizona.

"Second, we want to send a loud and clear message to the State of Arizona that our community stands in vehement opposition to racial discrimination in any form."



Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: The weather was warm and dry early in the reporting period, then a cold front brought cooler temperatures and rain. The rain helped to replenish soil moisture that was lost earlier due to high winds. Most wheat was heading out and was good condition. Dryland wheat showed moisture stress. Producers continued to cut wheat for hay on the fields where the yield potential was not as high as originally hoped. Strong winds burned newly emerged corn, and some fields might have to be replanted. Growers were prepping fields for planting other spring crops. Rangeland was in good to excellent condition, and cattle gains were good.



When barely eighteen, Irvin enlisted in the Army and after basic training he was on to Las Vegas, NV to be trained as a tail gunner on a B-17. His career holds right alongside of many others of our country's soldiers. Assigned to a crew of 10 men, they ended up being stationed in Foggia, Italy. Before the war ended, they flew 13 missions. This was the 15th Air Force 99th Bomb Group, 347th Squadron. On a tough mission in Yugoslavia they encountered a lot of flack. A 2x4 board on the floor in the tail where Irvin was, saved him from a serious injury. He had his knee on the board when it was hit by a piece of flack. Upon returning to base, Irvin dug the piece of metal out to keep. Irvin made friends with a fellow from Brooklyn who worked at Squadron Headquarters. Thanks to him, Irvin was able to travel all over Northern Italy and Switzerland, visiting Rome several times. He also attended school at the University of Florence for six weeks. Being discharged in 1946, Irvin returned home and back to work in the Davis Service Station.

Betty Jean Clement came with her parents, Everett Dave and Carrie Gatlin Clement, along with three older children, from Mobittee. Betty was just a toddler at this time. Betty Jean and her siblings all attended and graduated from Spearman schools. In the spring of 1946, she and Irvin began dating, and they were married in November of that year. Their first child, Phyliss, was born in December 1947.

The young father worked diligently at various occupations, before he began custom farming - plowing for 50¢ an acre. (How many can remember what farm prices were back then?) Irvin bought a small herd of cows, and upon selling them, started running cattle on wheat pasture and grass for a number of years His father-in-law, Everett Clement, leased Irvin land, and in time he started farming for himself.

Betty Jean and Irvin had now added to their family Mike was born in 1951 and Jerry Pat in 1955. (Mike passed away in 2001.)

Betty and Irvin, members of The First Christian Church, serve in several capacities - summer Bible School, other youth groups, Deacon and whatever else is needed to sustain the church.

Betty Jean was recognized as the Citizen of the Year in 2008. No better honor can be stated of a worthwhile citizen than was said by son Jerry Pat, daughter Phyliss Collins and grandchildren. Indians Obtain Horses

The native American' horses had died off thousands of years before a different breed of horses were brought back by the Span-Florida and Mexico. I had learned that when Coronado made his trip from Mexico up through the Panhandle in 1540, the Indians had stolen horses from him and started their own horse herds. Now I read that this is no longer considered to be true. Most of the experts think that by when rancheros had been settling New Mexico, particularly around Santa Fe and Taos, they had thousands of horses along with their sheep.

The nearby Indians were forced into slavery and learned to ride and tend to horses. The government decreed no Indian was allowed to own a horse. The Indian Revolt of 1680 drove many of the Spaniards out for fifteen years. During this period many of the horses were left behind.
