

# Lynx Pounce On Panhandle

The Spearman Lynx started their 1999-2000 football season with a bang. The opening night final scoreboard in the battle against the Panhandle Panthers tallied 50-0.

Aaron Winegarner threw a 26-yard scoring pass to Clayton Wilkerson to open the scoring. Dusty Barber scored three rushing touchdowns plus a two-point conversion. Jordan Brock, Kelsey Henton and John Brock each added a rushing touchdown.

Spearman also scored when a Panhandle running back was tackled in the end zone for a safety.

Casey Villines had nine carries for 99 yards; John Brock had 11 carries for 28 yards, including one touchdown; Dusty Barber had 12 carries for 98 yards, including three touchdowns: Aaron Winegarner had ries for 15 yards, including one touchdown; Kelsey Whitefield and Aaron Winegarner.

Henton had seven carries for 86 yards, including one touchdown; Jimmy Gaytan had five carries for 38 yards; and Steven Vasquez had two carries for four yards; for a team total of 56 carries for 387 yards and six touchdowns.

Winegarner completed three of four passes for 57 yards and one touchdown. Clayton Wilkerson had two catches for 40 yards, including one touchdown, and Jordan Brock had one reception for 17 yards. The Lynx offense for the night completed 60 plays for 444 yards, with 7 touchdowns.

Panhandle rushed 28 carries for 15 yards, and had one completed pass on 15 attempts, including one interception for 16 yards, for a total of 31 yards.

### Comptroller Delivers Sales Tax To Hansford County

Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently delivered a total of \$272.3 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,098 Texas cities and 117 counties, a 6.4 percent increase over the \$255.8 million allocated in August 1998. Year-to-date, payments to cities and counties are running 6.5 percent ahead of last year.

Texas continues to gain new businesses and new jobs, and consumer confidence remains high as the state economy continues to expand, Comptroller Rylander

August sales tax rebates include

local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and by quarterly filers during April, May and June, and reported to the Comptroller in July.

The sales tax rebates included \$251.9 million to Texas cities. Thus far in 1999, rebates to cities are 7.0 percent higher than for the same period in 1998.

Texas counties received August sales tax rebates of \$20.3 million. Year-to-date rebates to counties are up 0.4 percent compared to 1998. Another \$8.9 million went to 42 special purpose districts around

# Library Receives Grant

The grant in the amount of \$2,588.00 will be used to purchase a new computer center for additional equipment that will be received through a TIF grant and a new set of World Book Encyclopedias for the reference

The Tocker Foundation was established in 1964 to implement the philanthropic interests of Phillip and Olive Tocker. They endowed the foundation with their

estates in 1993 and 1994. In 1992, Hansford County Library has the foundation board decided to focus grant distribution to small, rural libraries serving a population of 12,000 or less. The direction is to assist libraries in making services more accessible to individuals who by reason of distance, residence, handicap, age, literacy level or other disadvantage are unable to receive the benefits of public library services. Grants are distributed to assisting libraries to serve as community information referral centers and provide literacy and bilingual programs. The foundation partners with community libraries to meet the particular

needs of the community.

1999 is the fifth year that Hansford County Library has received a grant from the Tocker Foundation. Previous grants have been used to purchase CD-ROM reference materials, videos, displays, Accelerated Reading titles and Spanish and bilingual materials. We feel very fortunate to be on the receiving end of such generosity. The foundation has contributed over \$25,000 to our library, and enabled us to provide many additional items and better service to this community.

### Crop Production Forecasts For Spring Of 1999

planted crops rebounded from the drought-reduced crops of 1998, according to the first forecast released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

The 1999 Texas Upland cotton crop is expected to total 5.3 million bales, 47 percent more than in 1998 and 3 percent more than 1997. "Harvested acreage is estimated at 5.0 million acres, up 52 percent from last year. Although some abandonment has occurred, the loss of acreage is not nearly as severe as in 1998," according to Robin Roark, State Statistician. Yield is expected to average 509 pounds per acre compared with 524 pounds last year.

Corn production is forecast at 233.6 million bushels, up 26 percent from last year's production, but 3 percent less than the record production in 1997. Based on August 1 conditions, statewide yield is expected to average 135 bushels per acre, 35 bushels more than 1998, while harvested acreage is down 6 percent from last year. Data for the High-Plains District is: Corn - Planted Acres: 1998 - 915,000 acres, 1999 -740,000 acres; Harvested Acres: 1998 - 791,000 acres, 1999 -665,000 acres; Yield Per Acre: 1998 - 170.3 bushels, 1999 - 198.5 bushels; Production: 1998 -134,676,000 bushels, 1999

Planted Acres: 1998 - 2,300,000 acres, 1999 - 2,300,000 acres; Harvested Acres: 1998 - 2,754,000 acres, 1999 - 1,510,000 acres; Yield Per Acre: 1998 - 35.8 bushels, 1999 - 40.7 bushels; Production: 1998 - 62,841,000 bushels, 1999 - 61,400,000 bushels.

Texas peanut production is virtually unchanged from last year, at 914 million pounds. Statewide yield, at 2,900 pounds per acre, is up 160 pounds from last year, while harvested acreage is down 6 percent to 315 thousand acres. Sorghum production is forecast

at 105.6 million hundredweight (cwt), 78 percent more than last year and I percent more than 1997. Harvested acreage is estimated at 2 9 million acres, up 26 percent from last year. Sorghum replaced some lost cotton acreage this year. Yield, at 3,640 pounds per acre, is expected to be 1,064 pounds more than last year. > Rice producers expect to harvest 16.9 million cwt. up 7 percent from 1998. Yield is forecast at 6,300 pounds per acre, 700 pounds more than a year ago. Rice harvest has begun.

The 1999 Texas soybean crop is forecast at 9.6 million bushels, up 62 percent from last year's production. Harvested acreage is up 19 percent, and yield is expected to average 30 bushels per acre, compared with 22 bushels last year.

United States corn production is forecast at 9.56 billion bushels, down 2 percent from last year's crop. A yield of 134.7 bushels per acre is forecast, up .3 bushels from last year. The sorghum crop is expected to increase 13 percent to 329.3 million cwt. The U.S. Upland cotton crop is expected to total 13.2 million bales, up 26 percent from last year. Soybean production is forecast at 2.87 billion bushels, up 4 percent from last year. The U.S. peanut crop is estimated at 3.8 billion pounds, down 3 percent from a year ago. U.S. rice production is forecast at 214.2 million cwt. up 14 percent from

Now [Jesus] began teaching them again about the Kingdom of God: "What is the Kingdom like?" He asked. 'How can I illustrate it? It is like a tiny mustard seed planted in a garden; soon it grows into a tall bush, and the birds live among its branches. It is like yeast kneaded into dough, which works unseen until it has risen high and

[He also] said, "In solemn truth I tell you, anyone believing in Me shall do the same miracles I have done and even greater ones, because I am going to be with the Father. You can ask Him for anything, using My name, and I will do it, for this will bring praise to the Father because of what I, the Son, will do for you. Yes, ask anything, using My name, and I will do it!"

"Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He who believes and is baptized will be saved but he who does not believe will be condemned. And these signs will follow those who believe; in My name they will cast out demons; they will speak with new tongues; they will take up serpents; and if they drink anything deadly, it shall not hurt them; they will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover."

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# Letter To The Editor

This is in response to your editorial, which appeared in your paper on September 2, 1999.

You state that Hansford County Hospital, "being the only primary health provider for Hansford County receives certain federal and state funds." You go on to mention that having a physician come in, may jeopardize your hospital's financial base. Am I of the understanding then that you are for continued welfare-like support of your hospital district? Would you encourage the continued lack of physicians in your county so that your district can continue to collect certain funds from the federal and state level?

You also mention that sending Gruver residents to hospitals outside the county will further erode your hospital's financial base. In these times of managed care, patients are rarely hospitalized. Technology has allowed what was previously labeled major surgery to be done on an outpatient basis. Less than five percent of my medical practice and I'm quite sure Dr. Bentley's practice has a similar percentage, involves caring for patients while they are confined in a hospital.

Your editorial goes on to say that a few years back, there was a great deal of resistance from the Gruver residents when the hospital attempt ed to open a clinic. The premise being that a full-time physical would not be available. But wouldn't a clinic open for at least 40 hours a week, to be managed by either a board-certified family practitioner such as Dr. Bently, or a board-certified internist such as myself, or a certified physicians assistant such as Ms. Hays, be better than having no medical care at all.

We do not desire to compete with your local hospital. The main reason we are contemplating a clinic in Gruver is to provide quality medical care to the area. It is the people of Gruver that will have to decide whether they want such care in their area.


