



Grant Writing Workshops to be held this fall

The High Plains Resource Conservation and Development Inc. Area is going to sponsor two Grant Writing Workshops this fall. Grant Writing I will start October 30 and end November 1. Grant Writing II will start November 2 and end November 4, 1995.

Both workshops will be taught by Dr. Don Udell of Norman, Oklahoma. Dr. Udell teaches grant writing all over the United States, and he also reviews grant applications for several major foundations. This will be four workshops to be held in the Panhandle of Texas.

In Grant Writing I, Dr. Udell will teach you about foundations and how they provide funds to nonprofit organizations. Subjects covered will be outside sources of funding, components of a proposal, national and regional foundations, design and proposal evaluations and the role of an RC&D Area in grant proposal.

In Grant Writing II you will learn how to prepare a grant application. A few of the areas covered in this workshop will be structuring your organization for success, developing your needs into a proposal, review of prospecting procedures, initial contacts with selected foundations and the writing of the applica-



The Texas Tomorrow Fund, which was approved by the Legislature earlier this year, will offer prepaid tuition plans for colleges and

universities in Texas.

Klett, a 17 year old high school student, came to the Johnson family in mid-August, just in time to enroll as a senior in the Gruver High School. In Germany Klett had classes last year that included German, geography, history, English, French, mathematics, physics, chemistry, fine arts, sport, and ethics. In Gruver her schedule includes American history, American government, English III, English IV, algebra II, drivers education, and keyboarding.

'American government is the hardest class," laughs the German. "We never studied American government in Germany. I am excited about taking drivers education. In German, we have to pay for private drivers lessons before we can get our license. This costs more than \$1,000. If I can get my license here, then I can get an international license and not have to pay in Germany. But I need to have someone teach me how to turn the car on. I really enjoyed seeing an American 'homecoming' because we don't have anything like that. It was just fun."

Klett's hometown of Hamburg is a city with 1,600,000 people. Living 18 miles outside of Gruver,

Luke Johnson is learning Ger- Texas, has been a little bit of a culture shock. The people are different, also, according to Klett.

"The people are very friendly and frank," she explains. "Germans are also frank but they need more time. But my family is crazy here-Luke is the craziest one. They say some really crazy things. I really like it here.'

Klett's host family is Chris and Melyn Johnson and their children Justin, Luke, Missy, and Lisa.

"When we were looking at the forms of exchange students wanting to come to the U.S., "says Melyn," Vanessa sounded like someone who would fit in our family. She enjoys riding horses, which is what Lisa loves, and listening to the same music as Luke and Missy. She also likes writing letters, which is another activity several of the family members do. She also wanted to live in a rural area and we definitely had that.

"So we picked her off a fax where the picture was really bad. After we got her paperwork we couldn't believe how much she looked like Missy! It was the perfect match."

Klett was matched with the Johnson family through World Learning, Inc., an organization that helps young people around the world who have a dream of living

and studying in the United States make that dream come true. The teenagers, between the ages of 15 and 18, come to America to live with American families and learn what it really means to be an American. They learn America is not Disneyland and "Dallas" but hardworking families in small
